## New Government Swept Back Into Office In Ontario

**Given Overwhelming Majorities In Provincial Election — C.C.F. Suffers Heavy Rebuff**

TORONTO, June 5—Premier George Drew's Progressive-Conservative government went back into power by an overwhelming majority as a result of Monday's general provincial election in Ontario. With three constituencies remaining to be counted, the following elections were indicated:

Conservatives	66
Liberals	11
C.C.F.	6
Labour-Progressives	2
Liberal Labor	2

In the last provincial election the Progressive-Conservative government had but 38 seats while the C.C.F. had 32 and Liberals 16. Col. Drew was re-elected personally with a 3000 majority in Toronto High Park over Lewis Duncan, C.C.F. Mitchell Hepburn was defeated by F. S. Thomas, Progressive-Conservative, in Elgin and E. B. Jolliffe, C.C.F. leader, lost in York South to Capt. H. J. Sale. It was Hepburn's first defeat in six elections.

**Provincial Government Official In City During Survey Tour of District**

Making a survey of possible postwar rehabilitation measures in this district, Andrew G. Graham, regional engineer for the provincial postwar rehabilitation bureau, has been spending the past few days in Prince Rupert. He met the local departmental rehabilitation committee and discussed with them information that has already been assembled in regard to local industries and other matters. From here Mr. Graham is proceeding to the Interior. Formerly city engineer at Nanaimo, he served during the present war as an officer with the Royal Canadian Air Force.

## Area 2 Fishing Now Extended Until June 15

Closing date for halibut fishing in Areas One and Two has been extended from June 12 to midnight June 15, the International Fisheries Commission announced today. A decrease in landings during the last few days has justified a three-day extension beyond the June 12 closing date originally announced by the commission last week. Quota for Areas One and Two is 3,500,000 pounds.

# Germany Is Stripped of Conquests

## BATTLE OF OKINAWA

**United States Infantry and Marines Tightening Grip On Big Prize**

GUAM, June 5—American infantry and marines are fighting for the big prize of the Okinawa campaign—the Naha airfield. Half of the airfield already is in American hands, captured by marines in a surprise landing. The army advance on southwest Okinawa is so rapid that supplies have had to be parachuted from planes. Smashing gains have been made on all sections of the front, despite heavy rains and deep mud. American units offshore supporting the land operations have had to pay a heavy price. Two destroyers have gone down off Okinawa, with heavy casualties. Their sinking raises to 313 the number of American vessels lost since the start of the war. Admiral Nimitz says the main Japanese force on Okinawa has been wiped out.

**PREMIER DREW'S SUIT**  
 TORONTO—Premier George Drew of Ontario said today that he has filed a writ seeking \$100,000 damages for libel against the Toronto Star and Joseph E. Atkinson, its publisher. So far two libel suits have been filed or planned against Premier Drew. One is planned by the defeated CCF candidate in Toronto-Riverdale and the other by a former member of the provincial police.

**A.R.P. READY**  
 VANCOUVER—Civilian defence machinery is ready and waiting for Jap bomb balloons, manned or unmanned, to visit these shores. Five emergency fire fighting pools have already been set up—at Victoria, Cloverdale, Nanaimo, Prince George and Smithers.

**HAARON RETURNS**  
 OSLO—King Haakon of Norway, who has been in England since the start of the war, will return to Norway this Thursday on a British warship.

**HOUE'S DENIAL**  
 MONTREAL—Mayor Camilien Houde today denied a statement attributed to him that Hitler would some day be the master of the world and would visit Canada when he (Houde) would welcome him.

**EISENHOWER IN BERLIN**  
 PARIS—General Eisenhower has left his headquarters at Frankfurt-on-Main, in Germany, for Berlin. At the capital, he is meeting with Allied occupation commanders representing Great Britain, Russia and the Provisional Government of France.

**Union Impatient With Council On Pioneers' Home**  
 Protest over the delay in building the proposed new Pioneers' Home was conveyed to the city council Monday night in a letter from the Prince Rupert Industrial Workers' Union. It was proposed that the city should go ahead with the building of a suitable home with the funds already on hand.

Ald. Hills said that it had already been explained that the amount of money on hand was not sufficient to build a suitable building. However, efforts were being made to get the inmates of the present home into improved quarters.

The situation will be explained to the complaining union in a letter of acknowledgment which was ordered sent.

## Borders of Reich Are Back to Pre-War

### Four Occupation Zones Are Formally Set At Meeting of Allied Military Leaders in Berlin

WASHINGTON, D.C., June 5 (CP)—Germany's frontiers were rolled back to the boundaries of December 31, 1937, today in a joint occupation statement by Allied powers. The statement, announcing occupation zones for the United States, Great Britain, France and Russia, recreates the German nation as it was before Adolf Hitler's annexation of Austria and Czechoslovakia.

## Pound Kobe End to End

**Superforts Are Out in Strength Over Great Japanese Port**

GUAM, June 5—The American Twenty-First Bomber Command has delivered its fifteenth incendiary strike against Japan. This time, the key industrial centre of Kobe was the target for 3,000 tons of fire bombs. About 450 superforts made the raid, pounding Kobe from one end to the other. They concentrated on railway networks, the commercial dock area and a heavily industrialized section.

## 19 WOMEN CANDIDATES

OTTAWA, June 4—A record number of women candidates have been nominated for the June 11 Dominion election at which the 20th parliament will be chosen. Of the 964 nominees, 19 are women. Two women members sat in each of the last two parliaments.

The Labor-Progressive party leads with eight women nominees, the C.C.F. has six, the Progressive Conservative and Social Credit parties two each and the Liberals one.

Women candidates are running against three cabinet ministers, with Trades Minister MacKinnon opposed by two in his riding of Edmonton West—only constituency in which there are two women nominees.

The other members of the cabinet are Solicitor General Joseph Jean, opposed in Montreal-Mercier by Miss Marie Gill, C.C.F., while Defence Minister McNaughton in Qu'Appelle has Mrs. Gladys Strum, president of the Saskatchewan C.C.F. party, running against him.

Mrs. Cora T. Casselman, Liberal, and Mrs. Dorise Nielson, Labor-Progressive, only women members of the 19th parliament, are again running in their western constituencies of Edmonton East and North Battleford.

Most of the women are running in the "big city" constituencies in Montreal and southern Ontario, or on the prairies. Montreal boasts four women candidates, while Hamilton, Ont., Peterborough and Toronto each have one. Saskatchewan has six, Alberta five and British Columbia one. Manitoba, the Yukon and the Maritimes have none.

## CAFE OWNERS DESIGN MASS BUYING SCHEME

A plan for co-operative buying of foods designed to ensure a higher quality of foodstuffs reaching counters and tables in public eating houses in the city is under consideration by the local Cafe and Restaurant Owners Association. While not yet complete, the scheme would call for the co-operative purchasing of large quantities of food through local wholesale houses on the basis that it would be more efficient than the present system of individual buying.

The idea was advanced at a meeting of the Association Monday night in the Prince Rupert Health Unit office.

Endorsement was given a motion to make the forthcoming reduction in the sugar ration more flexible in relation to certain other commodities.

The restaurant owners gave unanimous approval to Sanitary Inspector M. J. Harper's program of lectures and examinations for food handlers. These will be held June 12 and 13 and June 19 and 20.

At the conclusion of the business meeting Mr. Harper showed a film, "The Rat Menace," depicting the damage done by the rodents.

## Politicians Get Together

### Three Candidates on Same Platform at Labor Meeting

A crowd of 400 labor people heard three of the four federal candidates for Skeena riding outline their political views from the same platform at a lively two-hour meeting sponsored by American Federation of Labor and Canadian Congress of Labor union groups in the Oddfellors' Hall last night.

After each candidate had spoken for 15 minutes the audience had the opportunity of trying to impale the speakers on jagged points of policy by submitting written questions. Replies were received and delivered in an atmosphere of good sportsmanship which was one of the outstanding features of the meeting.

The speakers were Bruce Mickleburgh, Labor Progressive; LAC Harry Archibald, C.C.F., and Edward T. Applewhaite, Liberal. Major J. T. Harvey, Progressive Conservative candidate, was unable to attend because of a previous speaking commitment at Ocean Falls, and was represented by Crawford Moore who read a prepared statement on his behalf.

Personalities were definitely "out" as each candidate wooed the hundreds of voters in the hall, although broadside salvos at opposing parties were commonplace.

Before making derogatory comment about another party each of the speakers meticulously observed the "present company excepted" rule.

**ILL BODING OF ONTARIO**  
 Sufficient information on Ontario's Progressive Conservative triumph had trickled in by the time leading speaker Bruce Mickleburgh rose to the floor to enable him to see in the Ontario trend a horrible fate for the rest of Canada.

"Reports coming in on the Ontario election are a danger signal," he declared. "If it is not stopped we will have a Tory government of black reaction which will launch a vicious attack on Labor. The L.P.P. has always called on Labor to keep out the Tories and, while that danger is hanging over our heads, we are definitely on the offensive in calling on the people to unite. The Tories must be defeated to save the gains of Labor."

Labor, Mickleburgh said, must have a strong voice in government and the L.P.P. would hold out its hand to any parties which would join in giving labor a political voice.

**SEE "RACKET" IN CAPITALISTS**  
 C.C.F. Candidate Archibald, unsmiling and forthright almost to the point of terseness, saw Labor's wartime gains as part of a capitalistic "racket" and forecaast a more difficult time for Labor after the war.

Capitalism, he intimated, holds no future for the working man. "Do you think you are going to maintain your unions after the war? Modern industrialization is going to scrap you. The modern machine is going to rebuild the world. We must carry socialism to the world all the time and never let down. Under capitalism we are going to have one big union after the war—a union of unemployed."

The C.C.F. stands for government control of private industry, and the labor laws already effected by the C.C.F. government in Saskatchewan are the best in North America, he said.

**APPLEWHAITE IN HAPPY MOOD**  
 Edward T. Applewhaite drew a ripple of laughter from the audience when he described himself as happy to be on the offensive.

### So Goes Ontario . . .

The Progressive - Conservative party may well feel gratified over the outcome of the provincial general election in Ontario which gave the Drew government such a resounding endorsement. No doubt the Conservatives will consider the result in the provincial contest of great insignificance in connection with the national election next week. Certainly it must be very heartening for them.

If the great Conservative victory is of significance in connection with things to come in Canada next week, the thumping rebuff which the C.C.F. received may be regarded as of equal significance. It would seem to substantiate the political talk we have been hearing of late that the C.C.F. tide is on the wane in Can-

ada. As far as the national hopes of the C.C.F. are concerned, the outcome in Ontario must be regarded as a body blow. The observations of M. J. Coldwell, national C.C.F. leader, that the Labor-Progressives were responsible for his party's misfortune is but a confession of weakness through defection. The Labor-Progressives are in a position in the national contest to be as damaging to the C.C.F. as Coldwell admits they were in Ontario yesterday.

Although it does not follow that as Ontario goes so goes Canada, the Liberals cannot find much comfort in the Ontario result. Prime Minister Mackenzie King's only comment was that "a provincial election is one thing and a federal election another." The antics of Mitchell Hepburn has not helped the Liberal party.

The political "hot stove" league can now interest itself in pondering over a result which has seen the Progressive - Conservatives almost double their former strength to obtain an unwieldy majority of seats while the Liberal representation was cut by one-third with the greater disaster coming to the C.C.F. who will have less than one-fifth the number of seats in the new House that they had in the last.

## Notes and Views of the City Council Must Get Together

There was another crop of applications at last night's meeting of the city council for permission to hold tag days. The following dates were granted: Gyro Club, July 7; Cambrai Chapter I.O.E., October 13; Galloway Rapids Chapter I.O.D.E., November 24.

Carl Poulsen, east-end merchant, had a letter before the council asking that something be done about filling holes in the street in the vicinity of Postal Station B. Mr. Poulsen expressed willingness to share in the cost of a cement sidewalk. The matter was referred to the board of works.

The board of directors of the Prince Rupert General Hospital, in a letter to council, offered to contribute fifty percent of the cost of the joint operation of the ambulance for the balance of the year provided it does not exceed two-thirds of \$400, the city to be responsible for administration and operation. The matter was referred to the ambulance committee.

Whether or not use of the northwest corner of Third and McBride Street should be permitted to be used for a service station came under discussion at last night's meeting of the city council. Negotiations for the acquisition of this property which is held by the city have been under way of late. Council decided to get further information on the matter before making any decision.

"How is the garbage question coming along?" asked Ald. Nora Arnold. "I see we still have to carry the cans out to the front dock." Judging from remarks of

Mayor Daggett in reply, there still seemed to a manpower difficulty mitigating against an improvement in service. M. S. Arnold rather pointedly suggested that there might be some manpower available for the garbage department from among shovel leaners on road work. She had noticed one of the public works employees playing with a child and a kitten.

There have been seven applications so far for the position of city engineer, it was disclosed at last night's meeting. The time for receiving of applications has been extended to June 15.

### Alberta Ranch Girl London Dock Drive.

LONDON, June 5.—Mrs. Elsie Scott, Alberta ranch-owner who in 1940 came to England from the Yukon Valley to help in the war effort is going home with four "yearlings" driving on London docks.

"In 1940 I made a resolve that I would do my bit," she told a London reporter when she left her ranch. "Within a few days I was in the Canadian Mechanized Transport Corps. Two months later I was in England and was assigned to the dock as a driver."

"Scottie" as she is known to her fellow drivers was on duty day and night during the blitz and "had a great time" despite the fact that the M.T.C. trucks were covered with "chrome" holes. Her job was to drive an ambulance and a mobile canteen. She is taking two souvenirs back to Alberta—the Port of London Authority's Certificate of Gallantry and a piece of silver inscribed with good wishes.

**COMMON MISTAKES**  
Perhaps the two commonest mistakes of the average gardener, especially the one of limited experience, is planting far too much too soon and not planting enough in late May and June. During the first warm weeks of spring, such as the fortnight late in March and early April, practically every human being, even those cooped up in a crowded war apartment, has the urge to get out and dig. He rushes to the nearest seed store, gets supplies and is liable to put in a whole lot of things which should never be planted until the soil and air warm up permanently. **Timely Hints**  
Stakes for tall flowers should be in position and driven home as soon as possible so that the roots will not be disturbed or damaged. Melons and squash are best grown in hills. These may run up to three or four feet square. They should not be more than six inches above the surrounding ground. Best material to use is well-rotted manure or black soil from a swamp. This should be lightly mixed with the regular garden soil and then given a two-inch dressing of the same on top. Have at least 2 feet between hills.
