GUAM-An apparently defenceless Japanese homeland has taken another beating from the big guns of the most powerful battleships in the British and American navies. Super battleships of the combined Allied fleets are hurling salvo after salvo of 2700-pound shells at Japanese industrial targets only six miles away and, according to the Japanee, the Tokyo area is under another heavy attack by Allied carrier-based aircraft.

All British Columbia Ports to Be Used to Capacity in War Against Japan

VANCOUVER, July 18 (P)—Rear Admiral Victor Brodeur, commander of Canada's Pacific Coast naval units, outlined at a press conference the part to be played by shipyards and shipping facilities in British Columbia ports as the Royal Canadian Navy moves into the Pacific. All will be operating at capacity.

With concentration of overhaul and repair work at Vancouver and Victoria, it would be necessary to transfer work to Prince Rupert.

British Columbia will be an important rear base for Canadian naval vessels engaged in the Pacific war and much repair and refit work required by these ships wil be done on the west coast.



The new 22,000-pounder, known as "grand slam," is 35 feet long, with a diameter of 3 feet 10 inches. It is streamlined, deep penetration type, being a sealed-up version of the six-tonner, with a tail unit approximately 13 feet 6 inches long. One of R.A.F.'s "grand slam" bombs is seen being hoisted from the bomb dump. Attachment of the streamlined formed fins at five degrees to the bomb axis, imparts a spin to the bomb in flight, enabling a very high degree of accuracy of aiming.



A statement by Rear Admiral Victor Brodeur, commanding officer of the Royal Canadian Navy on the Pacific Coast, at a news conference in Vancouver yesterday that "the Royal Canadian Navy may have to use Prince Rupert for refitting of some of the ships assigned to West Coast service if Vancouver and Esquimalt shipyards become too busy to handle them in addition to Far East jobs" smacks very much of an attitude of relegating Prince Rupert

to a secondary place. It is somewhat difficult to understand just why Admiral Brodeur should phrase his statement in such a way as to reluctantly concede that Prince Rupert might get some work after Vancouver and Victoria have had all and more than they can handle. Evidently the good admiral, who surely must recognize the importance of Prince Rupert's strategic location and its ability to carry out just such work as is being discussed, has become imbued with the favorite attitude of making Prince Rupert look like the poor beggar who may be permitted some scraps from the rich man's table.

To prepare them, start by picking over and washing firm, ripe sweet cherries, black or white. Pack unpitted, with stems attached, in clean jars. Cover with the following cold vinegar mixture:

Boil together for five minutes one cup cider vinegar, one cup water one teaspoon salt, three tablespoons brown sugar, and two tablespoons whole cloves with 1/8 stick of cinnamon tied together in a cheesecloth bag. Cool the syrup, remove the spice bag and pour over the cherries and seal. This amount of syrup is sufficient for four pints of cherries. If whole spices



LONDON, July 18 (9- Three Canadian servicemen and the British Council are combining on a film to be finished this summer which is intended to give the Dominion an idea what England meant to the men who served here.

Called "Letter From Britain," the film is just that. The vocabulary of the camera will bolster thousands of letters Canadian servicemen have written home describing what they were doing and seeing here.

Framework of the story is a day spent in London by three Canadians - Lieut. William O'Connor, R.C.N.V.R., of Ottawa, and Toronto; Maj. David Pugh of Okotoks, Alta., and Oliver B. C.; and Sqdn. Ldr. Gilles Duhamel of Quebec City. The meeting and the places they go will give the London angle, while "cut-backs" as they reminisce on leave spent in Britain will cover the remainder of the coun-




