Victory Over Germany rorecasts churchill

Mass Assault From Skies-

Greatest Air Bombs Yet, Eleven Tonners, Used By Lancasters on Germany

Great Damage Caused By Missiles, Almost Twice As Large As Anything Previously Used

LONDON, March 15 (CP)-Five thousand Allied planes, spearheaded by British Lancasters carrying huge eleven-ton bombs, have swept Germany with a hail of explosives during the past 24 hours in a terrific mass assault.

During the night, British heavy bombers struck let. His companion, a logger

at the towns of Zweibrucken and Homburg, both of which are reported to be packed with German troops and military stores. Mosquito bombers pounded Berlin again for the twenty-third straight night.

Yesterday British and Canadian fliers gave the Germans their first taste of the new eleven-ton bombs. Previously the six-ton "earthquake" bomb, which sank the battleship Terpitz, was the largest ever used

The target for the huge misiles was an enemy rail viaduct at Bielfeld, eight miles east of the Rhine. The gigantic new superbombs are credited with knocking out a big chunk of the important viaduct.

One British airman told of the effect of the bomb as it exploded. He said it felt as though S UD O through a window. A two-month someone had kicked him in the back when the bomb burst on the ground below. He added that his plane bounced well over 500 feet up in the air as the bomb was released.

Seventh Army Gaining PARIS-The largest gains on the western front have been

made by the United States Seventh Army. It moved ahead four miles in the attack against the last sizable enemy holdings west of the Rhine. The Seventh found enemy resistance light, and moved right up to the Saar River. Across the Rhine, the American First Army has stormed to within a mile-anda-quarter of the big super highway linking Cologne and Frankfurt. There have been no important developments at the northern end of the western front.

Reds Killing Germans

MOSCOW-Russian forces in the East Prussia pocket have killed 4,000 Germans and captured 2,000 prisoners. Red Army formations have made a four-mile gain across a 17-mile front near Koenigsberg. In the Stettin area, the Germans say the Russians are forming for a new assault.

Demoralizing Japan


WASHINGTON-The most recently large-scale superfortress attack on Japan is believed to have destroyed the armament centre at Osaka. So powerful were the explosions that rocked the arsenal that a number of the giant bombers were tossed about by the concussion. Some of the superforts were damaged, but all reached their home bases. Business and industrial areas of Osaka, Tokyo and Nagoya have been widely devastated and completely demoralized. The government is said to be frantic over the situation.


British Fleet in Pacific





HELPED BY NEIGHBORS

Huge Vanload of Household Gifts From Undamaged Houses Helps Restock Damaged London and Coastal Towns

ONDON. March 15 ()-The 'good neighbor scheme," an idea that started in a London borough flat and spread through the land, is restocking the furniture of Britons who have lost it in air raids from the furniture of those who have been more fortunate and are benevolent in their recognition of the fact.

It all started in Holborn the borough that has been the site of R.C.A.F. overseas headquarters through the war-when a housewife, Mrs. Boyd, walked into a women's voluntary service headquarters late last year and laid before them the suggestion that every woman whose home had not been blitzed should godmother a blitzed home by one gift of a piece of furniture.

Seventy - six countries and county boroughs are collecting for 52 London boroughs and nine badly - blitzed coastal towns. Loads of gifts are flowing into London faster than they can be given out.

Rapid Response

The response, Holt said, has been so great that several ministries have been called in. The ministry of war transport had to arrange for the huge movement of vehicles. The ministry of home security granted permission for the use of civil defence vehicles. The ministry of health, responsible for rehousing, had to be consulted.

In order to distribute the gifts fairly a points system has been introduced. Each bombedout home gets 50 points for the home and 30 points for each member. A guide to pointing, listing more than 500 articles and the number of points for each, has been issued. In addition certain luxuries are half points, such as pictures, ornaments and bric-a-brac.

As one example of a system which has sprung up. Suffolk has adopted Dover and a Dover housewife has gone there to tell the women of houses without even a safety pin, of children born in cave shelters.
