DUKES RESIGNS AS GOVERNOR COMMANDER OF BAHAMAS



LONDON, March 15 (CP)—The Duke of Windsor has resigned Governor and Commander-in-Chief in the Bahamas. The British Government announced tonight.

RACE RESIDENCE BURNED; INMATES ESCAPE BY WINDOW

BRACE, March 15 (Special to Daily News)—About 8 o'clock last evening caused destruction of a one-storey frame building owned by Mr. and Mrs. William Grier and occupied for but one day by Mrs. Henry Allard. The fire started from a lamp which was being lit and the building was consumed within a few minutes.

Front— Nazi Peace Failed

Foreign Office says German bid for peace failed.

Stockholm, March 15 (CP)—The rumor front comes from a newspaper story of the German bid for peace. The Stockholm paper (Svenska Dagbladet) says German foreign representatives recently contacted with British and Swedish authorities to arrange a truce.

Swedish publication says Hitler is said to have demanded unconditional surrender but proposed that he and Himmler should retain Germany in order to avoid chaos. This was not a proposal to the British.

Swedish approach was made by a third party to the Swedish legation at Stockholm.

Victory Over Germany This Spring, Forecasts Churchill

Mass Assault From Skies— Greatest Air Bombs Yet, Eleven Tonners, Used By Lancasters on Germany

LONDON, March 15 (CP)—Five thousand Allied planes, spearheaded by British Lancasters carrying huge eleven-ton bombs, have swept Germany with a hail of explosives during the past 24 hours in a terrific mass assault. During the night, British heavy bombers struck at the towns of Zweibrucken and Homburg, both of which are reported to be packed with German troops and military stores. Mosquito bombers pounded Berlin again for the twenty-third straight night.

BOAT WRECKS, LOGGER DROWNS

News of Harrowing Tragedy Off Skeena Mouth Brought Here The story of how two men clung for hours to a wrecked fishing boat near the shore of Whitecliffe Island off the Skeena mouth until one, Blackie MacGee, succumbed to exhaustion and slipped into the dark sea was told today by James Anslow, the survivor.

GREATEST JAP CITIES ARE TO BE EVACUATED

LONDON, March 15 (CP)—In swift aftermath to powerful raids by American superforts, the Tokyo radio said today that the Japanese government has decided to evacuate five major cities, among them the fire-blitzed capital, of all persons except war workers. The cities are Tokyo, Yokoyama, Nagoya, Osaka and Kobe.

Is Up To Dominion

Post-War Rehabilitation Programs Should be Dovetailed, Says Perry VICTORIA, March 15 (CP)—Hon. H. G. Perry, minister of education, said in the Legislature during discussion of a \$50,000 vote for the provincial bureau of post-war rehabilitation and reconstruction, of which he is chairman, that the province itself is not capable of solving post-war problems, and that Dominion and provincial programs should be dovetailed.

GOVERNMENT'S GREAT DEEDS

Skeena District Liberals Acknowledge Splendid Leadership of Mackenzie King Declaring that the leadership of the Prime Minister had been primarily responsible for bringing into being the family of nations functioning as the British Empire so effectively in world affairs, that Canadian trade and commerce had been at its highest peak during his tenure of office, that his administration had given the greatest strides in the status and progress of labor, world leadership of Canada in production and economy had been brought about by his organization and the family allowance measure was outstanding in world social legislation, the Skeena District Liberal Association convention was inspired Tuesday to unanimously pass a resolution expressing absolute confidence in the leadership of Rt. Hon. William Lyon Mackenzie King and pledging unflinching support to his government and its policies.

VANCOUVER, March 15 (CP)—Labor Minister George Pearson said Tuesday that he has asked the three major labor organizations in this province to name three representatives each to a joint labor committee to deal with the provincial government on legislative matters involving labor.

Premier King— To Preside At 'Frisco

Canadian Prime Minister May Lead Great Economic Conference LONDON, March 15 (CP)—The London Evening Standard says there are widespread reports that Prime Minister King will be chairman of the San Francisco world security conference to be held next month.

CANNERY MEN FISHERMEN

VANCOUVER, March 15 (CP)—The largest single union of British Columbia fishermen and fishing industry workers came into being Tuesday with ratification of the amalgamation of the United Fishermen's Federal Union and the Cannery and Reduction Plant and Allied Workers' Union. The new union will be known as the United Fishermen and Allied Workers Union, A.P.L., and will contain about 3,000 fishermen and 2,000 cannery workers.

ONE MILLION PRISONERS SO FAR CAPTURED

LONDON, March 15 (CP)—More than one million prisoners have been taken by British Empire forces since the start of the war. Empire casualties up to the end of November, last year, totalled 1,043,000 including killed, wounded, prisoners and missing.

War News Highlights

Seventh Army Gaining

PARIS—The largest gains on the western front have been made by the United States Seventh Army. It moved ahead four miles in the attack against the last sizable enemy holdings west of the Rhine. The Seventh found enemy resistance light, and moved right up to the Saar River. Across the Rhine, the American First Army has stormed to within a mile-and-a-quarter of the big super highway linking Cologne and Frankfurt. There have been no important developments at the northern end of the western front.

Reds Killing Germans

MOSCOW—Russian forces in the East Prussia pocket have killed 4,000 Germans and captured 2,000 prisoners. Red Army formations have made a four-mile gain across a 17-mile front near Koenigsberg. In the Stettin area, the Germans say the Russians are forming for a new assault.

Demoralizing Japan

WASHINGTON—The most recently large-scale superfortress attack on Japan is believed to have destroyed the armament centre at Osaka. So powerful were the explosions that rocked the arsenal that a number of the giant bombers were tossed about by the concussion. Some of the superforts were damaged, but all reached their home bases. Business and industrial areas of Osaka, Tokyo and Nagoya have been widely devastated and completely demoralized. The government is said to be frantic over the situation.

British Fleet in Pacific

LONDON—A Tokyo broadcast heard in London says the British fleet has gone into action in Philippine waters. The British warships are said to be operating from bases in Australia. According to the unconfirmed enemy broadcast, the British naval units are taking part in the operations against Mindanao.

British Prime Minister Would Guide Peace Days

Pledges Himself and Party to Free Enterprise and Warns Against Socialist Plan to Alienate Way of Life LONDON, March 15 (CP)—Prime Minister Winston Churchill held out hope today of victory over Germany this spring, pledged the dominant Conservative party to promotion of free enterprise in the post-war period and served notice that he intends to guide Britain in the trials of peace. He told a Conservative party conference that "victory lies before us certain and perhaps near. The war in Europe might conclude before summer ends or even sooner."

FACED STRONG GERMAN POSITION ALONE, PT. SIMPSON SOLDIER CITED

Standing alone and without shelter in the face of a strongly entrenched enemy with only a light automatic to divert the Germans while his comrades closed in to capture the strong point was the feat which won Pte. Clyde Moraes, 28, of Port Simpson the Military Medal.

Big Fund For Work

Quarter of Billion Dollars Being Set Aside to Offset Unemployment BRANDON, Man., March 15 (CP)—The Canadian government has established a fund of \$250,000,000 to offset unemployment in the post-war period. This was disclosed Monday night when Federal Labor Minister Humphrey Mitchell addressed a Brandon, Manitoba, Liberal nominating convention. Mr. Mitchell assured the meeting that returned men and women will be given the first break in re-establishment but he did not elaborate on the statement.

GYROS TALK PLAYGROUNDS

Will Seek \$1000 from City— Welcome Arch Project Under Discussion Playground work for the coming season was discussed at yesterday's monthly business luncheon of the Prince Rupert Rotary Club in Reid's Cafe and the outcome was to seek a grant of \$1000 from the city to assist in the financing of physical improvement to the playgrounds. Last year, the city agreed to carry out certain work on the playgrounds but, owing to lack of labor, was unable to do so. The Gyro Club will now endeavour to find ways and means of doing the work providing the city makes the finances available.

BARRIERS TO BE REDUCED

Roosevelt and King Announce One Result of Their Conference WASHINGTON, March 15 (CP)—President Roosevelt and Prime Minister King have revealed the results of their recent conference. Both leaders have agreed to make bold moves to reduce the trading barriers between all countries. Mr. Roosevelt pointed to relationships between Canada and the United States as an example of how nations could get along together.

### Red Cross Appeal . . .

Instead of 11 separate campaigns for the relief of the people of 11 Allied Nations, there will be held this year just one national drive, that of the Canadian Red Cross which is now under way in all parts of Canada. Of the total 1945 budget of the Canadian Red Cross, \$8,000,000 has been earmarked for distribution among the 11 national funds in Canada, combined after nearly 15 months of effort, into the Canadian United Allied Relief Fund, known as CUARF.

The Red Cross Society's total budget for 1945 is \$22,600,000, and the national appeal for funds now underway is designed to raise \$10,000,000 by public subscription. A big job of the Red Cross is the packing of some 14,000 parcels each week for prisoners of war. Government grants and contributions from the Red Cross Societies of other nations help to finance this gigantic project, which costs \$20,020,000 annually. It costs \$2.75 to send a Red Cross parcel to a prisoner of war.

The objective for Prince Rupert in this Red Cross campaign is \$15,000, enough to send 5,444 parcels to war prisoners. The people of Prince Rupert have never let the Red Cross down, and by a continuation of their

generous support they can help this noble cause to continue their aid to millions of people in Allied countries who are destitute; to suffering wounded soldiers; to prisoners of war.

### Where the CCF Leads . . .

Winnipeg Tribune thinks it is about time that other parties in Canada woke up to the activity and excellence of the CCF organization throughout Canada, including the party machine for electing candidates. This has been demonstrated again and again. In the recent by-election in Grey North—unfavorable territory for the CCF—it was commonly conceded that that party's organization was vastly superior to those of its Liberal and Progressive Conservative opponents.

The CCF organizes, to a considerable extent, upon the lines of the American party machines with their "precinct committeemen" for almost every block in the cities and for manageable areas in the country. The CCF believes in the house to house canvass and its workers concentrate particularly upon all doubtful voters. Once the doubter has been gathered into their fold, the party canvassers proceed to work upon his relatives. They leave nothing to chance. That is how they induce many non-socialists to join what is essentially a socialist party.

During the last Ontario election, many Progressive Conservatives and Liberals reported that they had been canvassed by CCF workers not by their own party.

All this, surely, should give other parties something to think about. They simply are not matching the CCF in constituency organization and canvassing.

### TERRACE BOARD HAVING REVIVAL

TERRACE, March 15 — The Terrace Board of Trade, held its monthly meeting in Terrace Hotel on Tuesday with a full attendance, Harry King presiding, is experiencing a revival of interest, on the part of the public. Several new members were enrolled at this meeting and more names were proposed. They will, in due course, be added to the membership.

Several live topics came up for discussion, two most urgent at the moment being a rumor that the railway is contemplating a reduction of trains and the other a proposal concerning certain sport fish.

It was said that steps are proposed by the canning interests to cease the destruction of cut-throat trout in the interests of salmon, the idea being that the trout eat up the salmon dry. The meeting went on record as being emphatically against any such move, claiming that if the young fry are being thus destroyed, the hatcheries should be re-established. Also it was pointed out that great havoc is caused among mature salmon by the hair seals, which havoc is a much more potent cause of any decline in the salmon runs. The meeting endorsed a resolution from Prince George on this subject.

The board is sponsoring an advertising or publicity campaign, the objective being the production of suitable literature, with map and perhaps photos designed to draw business from the tourist visitors that are likely after the war. It was felt that now is the time to get these things ready and, as the Associated Boards of Trade will be holding their convention in May next, Terrace board hopes to bring to that convention their contribution writing up Terrace and vicinity. It is hoped other districts covered by the Associated boards will do the same and thus produce a suitable folder or pamphlet.

**Briefs From Britain**

LONDON, ☉—Britain is consuming 400,000 tons of margarine annually, more than twice the amount used in peacetime, the food ministry reports.

CHELMSFORD, Eng., ☉—A shortage of bicycle lamp batteries has taken cycles off the roads at night and resulted in long queues at bus stops.

### HELPED BY NEIGHBORS

**Huge Vanload of Household Gifts From Undamaged Houses Helps Restock Damaged London and Coastal Towns**

LONDON, March 15 (P)—The "good neighbor scheme," an idea that started in a London borough flat and spread through the land, is restocking the furniture of Britons who have lost it in air raids from the furniture of those who have been more fortunate and are benevolent in their recognition of the fact.

It all started in Holborn, the borough that has been the site of P.C.A.F. overseas headquarters through the war—when a housewife, Mrs. Boyd, walked into a women's voluntary service headquarters late last year and laid before them the suggestion that every woman whose home had not been blitzed should god-mother a blitzed home by one gift of a piece of furniture.

William Holt, BBC reporter, said "the idea is now moving huge vans full of household gifts from all over the country to bombed-out families. The idea is sweeping through Britain like a prairie fire."

Seventy-six countries and county boroughs are collecting for 52 London boroughs and nine badly-bombed coastal towns. Loads of gifts are flowing into London faster than they can be given out.

#### Rapid Response

The response, Holt said, has been so great that several ministries have been called in. The ministry of war transport had to arrange for the huge movement of vehicles. The ministry of home security granted permission for the use of civil defence vehicles. The ministry of health, responsible for rehousing, had to be consulted.

In order to distribute the gifts fairly a points system has been introduced. Each bombed-out home gets 50 points for the home and 30 points for each member. A guide to pointing, listing more than 500 articles and the number of points for each, has been issued. In addition certain luxuries are half points, such as pictures, ornaments and bric-a-brac.

As one example of a system which has sprung up, Suffolk has adopted Dover and a Dover housewife has gone there to tell the women of houses without even a safety pin, of children born in cave shelters. Suffolk housewives are now putting aside all those little things that go to make a home, ornaments, crockery, curtains as well as furniture, bedding and clothing.

In Bristol when the furniture vans had been loaded and were moving out people came out of their doors carrying things and ran after them.
