Reds 90 Miles From Berlin

Soviet Forces on Frontier Of Brandenburg Province; Break Through to Danzig

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LONDON, Jan. 26 (CP)—Berlin said today that the Russian army was only ninety miles from Berlin. This is presumably in the Poznan area. Poznan itself has been outflanked. The Russians are on the frontier of Brandenburg Province. This is the province which contains Berlin. At Moscow Premier Joseph Stalin today confirmed that the Russians had broken through to the Bay of Danzig, entirely cutting off East Prussia from the rest of Germany and enveloping an estimated 200,000 German troops.

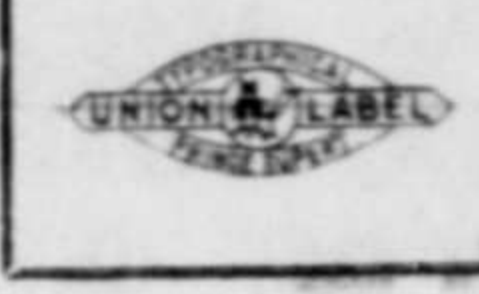

aid at all times and particularly so in days of war and congested population when danger of disaster is greater than in the quiet days of peace.

In recommending that Prince Rupert people avail themselves of the first aid instruction now being offered by the local St. John Ambulance Association branch we can do no better than point out that first aid may save life, restore the drowned, prevent infection of fatal wounds and ease pain in the case of accidents. A child or an adult may choke to death in front of their family if none know how to treat foreign bodies in the throat. In electricity many rescuers have been killed for want of knowledge of how to effect a rescue.

Sympathizers are not lacking when an accident occurs or when someone is taken ill in the street but for the most part they cannot help by reason of their ignorance of first aid. There is no need for that ignorance in Prince Rupert.

**Condition of Cemetery . . .**

Visitors to Fairview Cemetery of late have been mentioning the unkept and neglected state of affairs into which the place is falling. True there has been difficulty the past few years in getting help to even carry on the normal cemetery functions. However, things in that regard are easing up now and will, no doubt, continue to do so.

It might not be out of place to suggest to the civic authorities having cemetery matters in their care that the situation be gone thoroughly into and a plan devised for an adequate cemetery service.

If it is a matter of additional fees, it might well be that many people who would be directly interested through the fact that the remains of their dead repose they would be glad to contribute providing the service was properly organized and the public advised of the service available and the cost of same.

**DR. KNIFE REPLIES**

Editor, Daily News:  
In view of recent developments and especially the apparent misunderstanding on the part of some of the public on the methods and effects of chloramination of public water supplies, may I take this opportunity for an expression of my opinion.

Sterilization of water by chloramination positively causes no harm to the human organism and the introduction of approximately one quarter of one part of chlorine and ammonia to one million parts of water should not give the public cause for concern and certainly does not warrant apprehension on the part of anyone. With the introduction of chlorine and ammonia in these amounts the individual citizen is not being poisoned, softness of water has not been affected and water looks, tastes and smells as it always did.

For our own information yesterday the Sanitary Inspector and myself conducted an experiment taking samples of untreated and treated (chlorinated) water. We submitted these to a number of persons. The results were quite inconclusive and in fact the consensus of opinion of those tasting and smelling the water was that there was no material difference whatever.

Approximately 85 percent of all public water supplies on this continent are chlorinated and in the course of years there has never been produced any reliable scientific evidence that such treatment is harmful in any way to human beings. We are all familiar with the experience of the armed forces in this respect. Chlorination of water supplies has been carried out in both this and the last war, using frequently and for long periods of time doses of chlorine considerably in excess of that applied in civil practice. In spite of such drastic treatment I do not believe that any war veteran has ever applied for compensation for disability from this cause and I do not believe that any medical board anywhere has ever granted compensation for such reasons.

Every person has, and is entitled to his own opinions as to whether or not a given water supply is safe. Such opinions, however, may be based on limited experience and as such can be misleading. The standards for water supplies for the country as a whole are based on the experience of public health authorities gained over a very wide field. This experience has demonstrated repeatedly that not all but certainly too many sub-standard water supplies sooner or later are responsible for outbreaks of water-borne disease. Of such sub-standard supplies, it is, of course, usually impossible to predict beforehand which will be the actual and which will remain the potential source of disease.

Bacteriological analyses of Prince Rupert water supply as conducted by your health department immediately prior to the introduction of chlorination, Prince Rupert water was grossly contaminated with bacteria of a faecal origin. There was certainly no lack of evidence of the need of chloramination of the city water supply.

It is no doubt true that many people in Prince Rupert are of the opinion that it is unnecessary to chlorinate the local water supply. It should be borne in mind however, that such an opinion is common in every community until an outbreak of water-borne disease occurs and experience indicates that outbreaks will occur in various communities in Canada unless all sub-standard water supplies are effectively safeguarded. If, and where these outbreaks occur, it is possible that young men and women from this community, serving in the armed forces may be affected under such unfortunate circumstances it may be that even those persons who might be inclined to raise their voices against chlorination here would be very harsh in their judgment of the authorities for their failure to insist on the proper treat-

ment of more distant sub-standard water supplies.

In Canada the Department of National Health and Welfare has accepted the standards for water supplies recommended by and based on the experience of public health authorities, and to do otherwise, most people would agree, would be to fail in its duty to the armed forces and the people of this community. It has been suggested that the Department of National Health and Welfare has acted in an arbitrary manner in ordering chlorination and that the procedure should be opposed on such grounds alone. Actually of course, the public accepts the enforcement of many regulations of a technical nature formulated for its protection without any apparent loss of democratic principles. Application enforcement, and duration of quarantine for instance is not decided by popular vote.

In conclusion I would suggest that in accepting calmly and with good grace the chlorination of the domestic water supply, citizens of Prince Rupert have a right to feel that by co-operating with rather than by obstructing a department of government in carrying out its obvious duties to the people of Canada as a whole they are contributing in some measure to the war effort.

**Scotch In Plenty But For 1948 Sale**

GLASGOW, Jan. 26 (P) — Twenty-two thousand gallons of new scotch whiskey pours each day into vats in Highland distilleries but the first of it will not reach the market until 1948.

More Scottish distilleries are expected to begin production soon. Within a few months nearly 35 distilleries will have restarted and several thousand workers will be back in their pre-war occupations.

Plans for the near future call for distillation of between 7,000,000 and 8,000,000 gallons of whiskey yearly—25 percent of pre-war output.

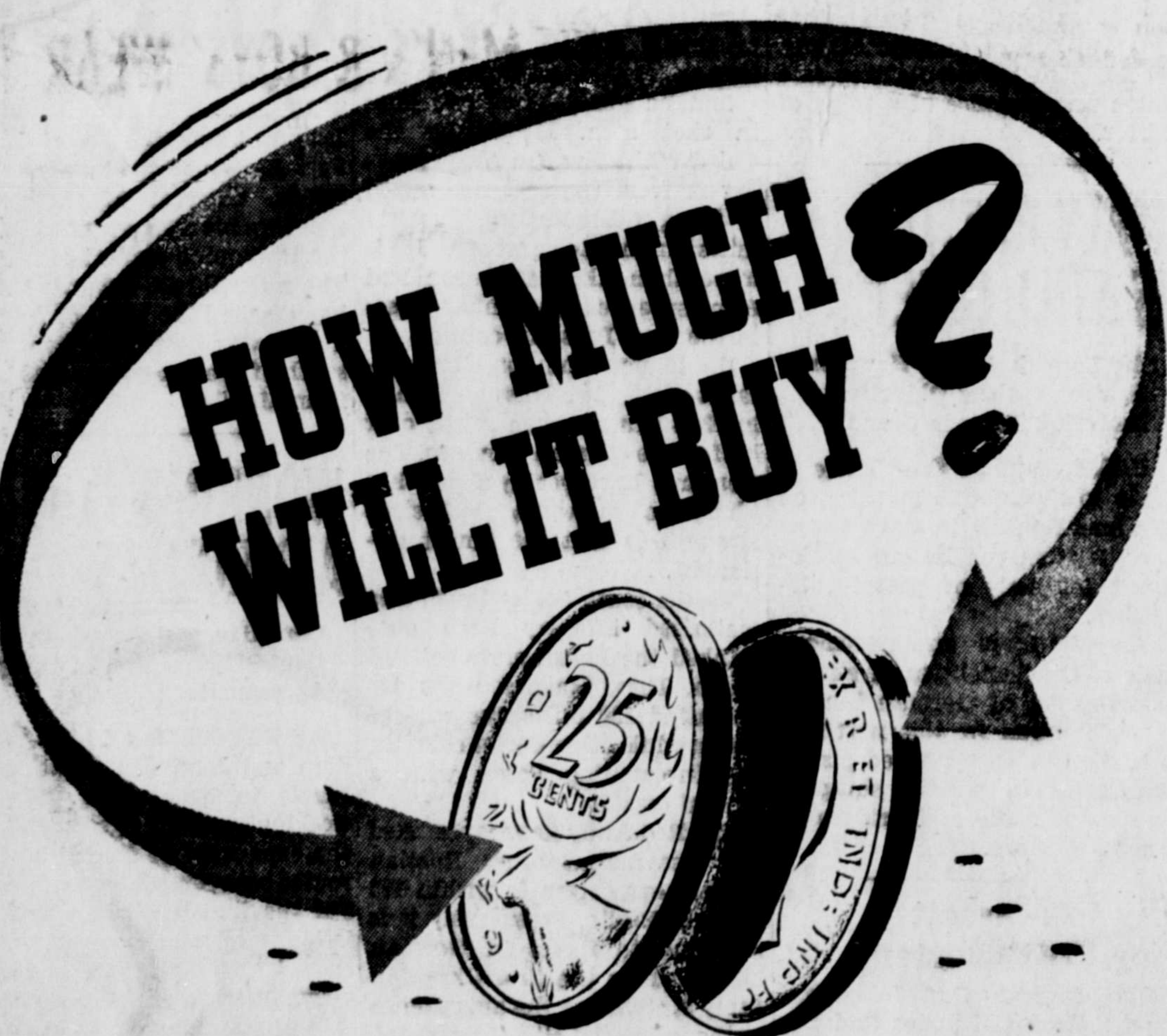

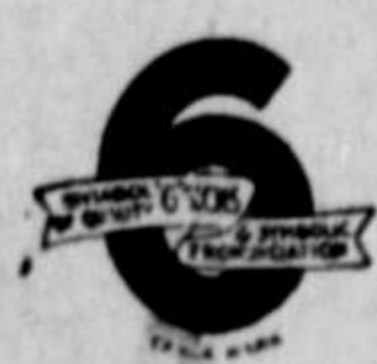

**John R. Fraser, Well Known Yukon Pioneer, Heard From**

John R. Fraser, pioneer Yukon mining man and member of the Yukon Legislative Council in an airmail letter dated at Dawson, sends greetings to his many old Yukon friends now located in Prince Rupert mentioning Norman Watt, Gillis Royer, Joe Slaggard, and Sergeants Otto Nordling and Tommy Rogers of the Armed Forces.

"John R." as he is known throughout the Yukon, is one of the real pioneers of the Camp and has mined on every creek in the Dawson district. He was manager of the Holbrook Dredging Company in the 60 Mile district for several years, government vendor at Dawson and manager of store and roadhouse at Granville owned by the late A. T. Taddie. In recent years he entered politics to the extent of running for the Yukon Council and was elected hands down. As far back as anyone can remember he has been resident campaign manager and agent for Captain George Black, Yukon's Member of Parliament.

Mr. Fraser has never had a political ambition of his own but his name has been mentioned as Controller of the Yukon, formerly known as Gold Commissioner of the Yukon, which position Captain George Black gave up last war to go overseas with the Yukon Machine Gun Company which he recruited in the Yukon.

The office of Controller is now held by G. A. Jeckell, former Dawson school teacher who entered politics successfully many years ago and weathered all political storms since.

John R. Fraser is one of the best known and most respected men in the Yukon.

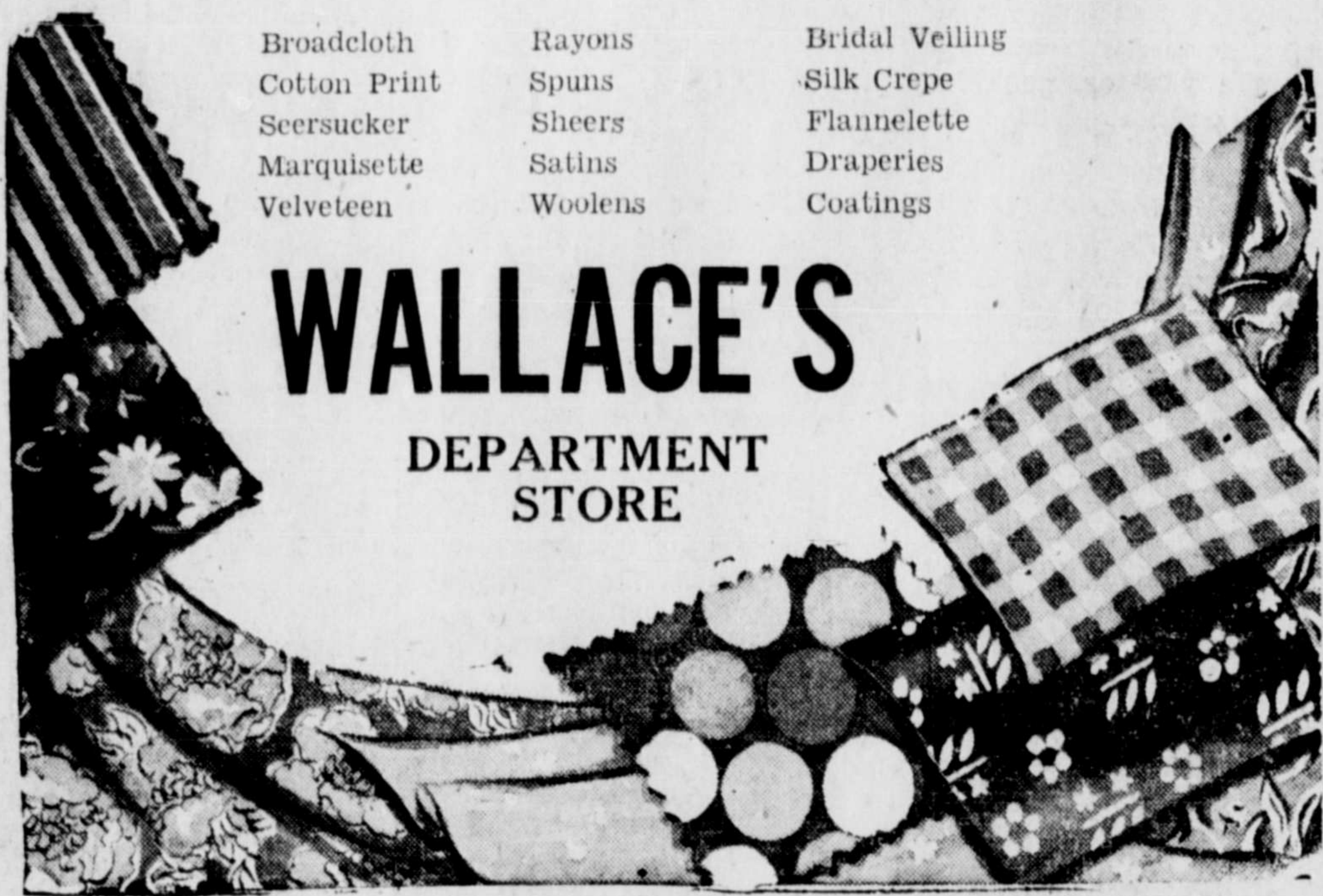
