SHAMEFUL CRISIS

The letter calls for the government to pass an order-in-council making the whole army available for overseas service.

Bacteriological analyses of Prince Rupert water supply as conducted by your health department immediately prior to the introduction of chlorination, Prince Rupert water was grossly contaminated with bacteria of a faecal origin. There was certainly no lack of evidence of the need of chloramination of the city water supply.

It is no doubt true that many people in Prince Rupert are of the opinion that it is unnecessary to chlorinate the local water supply. It should be borne in mind however, that such an opinion is common in every com munity until an outbreak of water-borne disease occurs and experience indicates that outbreaks will occur in various com munities in Canada unless all sub-standard water supplies are effectively safeguarded. 


