Battleship Tirpitz Was Sunk by Canadian Flier Is Again Seeking

LONDON, March 7 (CP)—The pride of the German Navy—the battleship Tirpitz— was sunk by a 12,000-pound bomb in a direct hit scored by a Flying Officer from Rivers, Manitoba, Walter

In his address in the British Parliament yesterday, Sir Archibald Sinclair declared that, although the Tirpitz was perhaps the toughest ship afloat, she did not stand up against a pin-point attack made by British squadrons off the coast of Norway last November.

Sir Archibald described the bomb-sight used as of "extraordinary complexity, ingenuity, and accurancy."

Reds Move On Stettin

MOSCOW-While the R.A.F. bombed Sassnitz, Soviet artillery shells were hurled into Stettm. Red Army infantrymen are moving on Stettin in two columns north and south of the Baltic port. The Russian drive aims to seal off Pomerania and prevent the Germans from doing anything to stop the coming smash at Berlin.

Heavy Fight On Iwo

GUAM-The campaign on Iwo Island in the Pacific has flared up again after a twe-day lull. Three American divisions have resumed their drive towards the northern end of the island. Heavy fighting is raging. The Americans are getting support from fighter planes taking off from the island's southern airfield.

Final Philippine Phase

MANILA—The Philippines campaign has entered its final phase with the American invasion forces finishing the job against four Japanese divisions on northern Luzon. On Corregidor Island in Manila Bay, the Americans have sealed off three hundred caves and tunnels. The Japanese inside will die, since they have refused to surrender.

Fewer Bombers Being Lost

LONDON-The percentage loss of R.A.F. bombers dispatched against enemy targets has been reduced to approximately one-quarter of the 1942 totals. This was revealed in London yesterday by the British Air Secretary, Sir Archibald Sinclair. However, he disclosed that between April and September last year the Bomber Command suffered heavy casualties. During the first two months of this year, bomber losses have only amounted to one point one percent of planes dispatched.



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Western Front . . .

There is no doubt that the Germans' delay in countering the serious threat to their whole position west of the Rhine has been due to their need to hold the push by United Kingdom and Canadian troops from the northwest beyond Goch and Kleve. The U.K.-Canadian troops paid for their success in this distraction of the enemy's attention, by meeting much heavier oppo- Far East . . . sition.

These observations help to put into perspective the latest Allied advances on the West Front. United Kingdom and Canadian troops were opposed by large numbers of German's very best regular troops and, as a result, the High Command was not able to find men to hold the heavy attacks of the American First and Ninth Armies. The whole operation was thus a first "class example of Allied co-operation.

An important point now is not what the Germans possess in the way of fixed defences, but rather the number of men available to them to man these defenses. It is by no means unlikely a small number of divisions, some of alone. them armored; their problem, however, is to know when to commit these. Not all the Allied Armies are as yet engaged and the enemy may well fear that if he now commits his "Old Guard" there may come a yet more critical moment which will find him without any reserve whatever.







WASHINGTON, March 7 9-More than 300,00 members of the Indian Army-now more than 2,000,000 strong - have served outside India, says a bookiet en-

The booklet, issued and distributed by the government of India Information Services here, FOR RENT - Furnished room, says Indian soldiers have served (57) in the defence of East Africa and the Sudan, in Eritrea, Ethiopia, Western Desert, Tunisia. Italy, Syria, Iran, Iraq, Malaya, and the East Indies, Burma and Hong Kong.

One of the units of the allvolunteer army which has travelled the farthest and lought the most is the 4th Indian Division. It was part of Field Marshal Lord Wavell's small army in the Middle East in 1940; fought in the Ethiopian campaign, helped defend the Egyptian frontier against a drive by Rommel; saw hard fighting in Syria; took part | in the 1941 offensive and retreat in Libya and Egypt; and fought all the way from El Alamein in Egypt to Tunisia. In 1944 it was fighting with the British 8th Army in Italy.


