



SHIMUSHU LANDINGS

There has been no official statement indicating that any British or American troops are involved in the Japanese-reported landings on Shimushu Island. The enemy's Imperial headquarters says that Allied troops landed on the northern-most of Japan's main islands—the Kuriles. It is possible, should the enemy account be true, that the Russians have landed formations on the island from Kamchatka.

It was three years ago yesterday that men of the Second Canadian Division stormed ashore onto the bloody beaches of Dieppe on August 19, 1942, 5,000 men-most of them Canadians - carried out one of history's largest reconnaissance in force operations. It was costly. Of the five thousand, 710 were killed, 608 were wounded and 2,066 were listed as missing or taken prisoner. But from this operation the Allied High Command learned valuable lessons which were applied in subsequent landings on the coasts of Europe.







### Seasonable Ideas for Housekeepers

The easiest vegetable to can is the tomato and its wide variety of uses makes it a "must" for winter means. With a supply of canned tomatoes and juice, the housewife will have an appetizer and a vegetable always on hand. She will make her own tomato soup, and perhaps turn out tomato sherbet to add a fillup to

special meals. Home economists have carried out a series of tests on canning tomatoes and tomato juice. These experiments have proven the tall narrow-necked containers, such as vinegar bottles, to be unsatisfactory for tomato juice. A high rate of spoilage and loss of vitamin content resulted when these bottles were used.

Will Germany Win?

By sending meat to Europe, Canadians are helping to repair the warped minds and the wrecked, twisted bodies of a whole generation of Europe's misery children. Starvation was one of the most potent weapons in Germany's plan of world conquest.

### The Record Speaks

In July 1920 the cost of living in Canada was 89.7 per cent higher than at the beginning of World War I. In July 1945 the cost of living was only 18.7 per cent higher than at the outbreak of World War II in 1939. 




