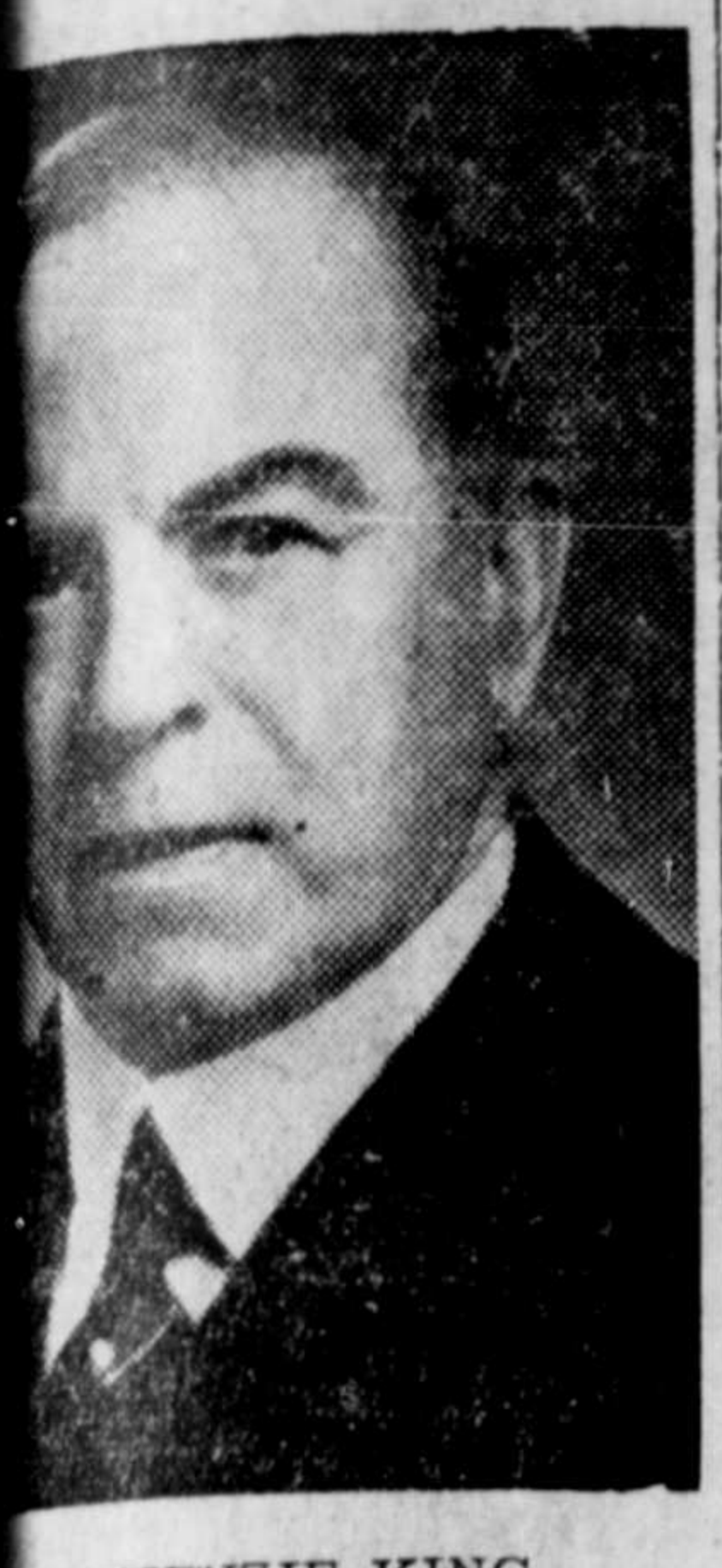

## Archibald Wins Skeena Seat; Goes to Parliament for First Time

Young Archibald secured Plurality Over Liberal Candidate As Local Riding Swings to Proportional Government

Liberal for fifth year continuously, Skeena riding yesterday defeated a five-year blush of socialism as votes from 130 polling divisions in the federal election gave victory to Leading Aircraftsman H. G. Archibald, C.C.F. candidate. It is the first time that Skeena has ever gone Socialist either federally or provincially.

## Candidates Reactions

Archibald Sees Greater Party Achievements — Applewhite and Harvey Look Ahead

Victor in the federal election campaign in Skeena riding, LAC Harry G. Archibald told friends and supporters in the C.C.F. committee rooms here last night that he considered his victory not so much a personal triumph but as a step forward for the C.C.F. movement.

The youthful former North Vancouver seaman spoke informally in his initial moment of triumph over three other candidates, promising that "in the next election we will be the government."

"We will start working right away to win the next B.C. provincial election," he said.

He visualized the growth of his party as a development of "the brotherhood of man on a national, then an international scale."

Applewhite "Sadder—Wiser" He spoke after Liberal candidate E. T. Applewhite, runner-up, conceded him the election. Wry humor poured from Mr. Applewhite when asked to speak in the C.C.F. stronghold.

Confessing himself "sadder and wiser," Mr. Applewhite urged C.C.F.'ers and their new members to not forget the "overwhelming responsibility on your candidate who is to be the mouthpiece of this district for the next five years."

## Mackenzie King and His Liberal Government Returned to Power

### LIBERALS LOSE IN POPULAR VOTE—C.C.F. SHOWS GAIN

Incomplete compilation of civilian vote from yesterday's federal election indicated Liberal candidates had polled 39 percent of a record national vote as the party was re-elected to power in the Dominion election. In 1940, the Liberals had polled 51 percent of the vote.

### CANDIDATE MAY LOSE DEPOSIT

At least one candidate in Skeena riding is in danger of losing his \$200 deposit as a result of voting in yesterday's federal election. On the basis of 117 polls heard from at noon today, Labor-Progressive candidate Bruce E. Mickleburgh lacked 382 votes of being able to reclaim the \$200 which each candidate was required to put up as indication of good faith.

### DISCARDING NAVY SHIPS

OTTAWA—With the end of the convoy system more than 1000 ships of the Royal Canadian Navy have been declared surplus of naval requirements and will be stripped at Sydney, Nova Scotia, of materials that can be used in the battle against Japan.

### AGED MAN DIES

VANCOUVER—Wallace Henderson, 85, died as a result of injuries sustained when struck by an automobile May 12.

### SECRET GERMAN RADIO

LONDON—A secret German radio is still operating. It has said: "Hitler will return. Germany will save herself."

OTTAWA, June 12.—M. J. Coldwell, C.C.F. leader, attributed his party's lack of success in the federal election yesterday to "falsehoods and distortions" and confusion caused by the "Communists under the guise of Labor-Progressives."

### Will Have Close to Over-all Majority in Leading Country Through Last Stages of War and Opening of Peace Era

OTTAWA, June 12 (CP)—Canadians are relaxing today after the fevered activities of the general election campaign which ended in a Dominion-wide vote yesterday, the returns of which made definite that the voting public had chosen Prime Minister Mackenzie King to lead the country through the last stages of the war and the first stages of the peace. It will be the third straight term for the Liberal party headed by Mr. King to be returned to power as Canada's governing body. It was Canada's second wartime election.

### Election Echoes

SESSION IN AUGUST Prime Minister Mackenzie King is planning the calling of a session of Parliament not later than the middle of August.

SOLDIERS' VOTE TO DECIDE The soldiers' vote may decide the issue in 64 federal election seats in which there were close results yesterday.

TWO MINISTERS DEFEATED The Liberal party lost six seats in British Columbia yesterday.

ONLY ONE WOMAN There will be only one woman member in the next Parliament—Mrs. Gladys Strum, C.C.F., who defeated General McNaughton in Qu'Appelle.

### WELL KNOWN DOCTOR DIES

MONTREAL, June 12.—One of Canada's best known medical men, Dr. John McCombe, former chief medical officer, Canadian National Railways, who retired two years ago, died Monday at his home in Dorval, Quebec.

Born in Belfast, Ireland, John McCombe was educated in Dublin. He took his M. D. degree at McGill University, Montreal, and took post-graduate courses at St. George Hospital and the London School of Tropical Medicine, in England, and received the degrees of M.R.C.S. and L.R.C.P. He became chief medical officer for the Canadian National system in 1928.

While he was with the C.N.R. Dr. McCombe's contribution to industrial hygiene was recognized in the United States. He was twice elected president of the Association of Railway Chief Surgeons and was appointed as chairman of the medical and surgical section of the Association of American Railroads. After he retired in April 1943, Dr. McCombe remained consultant to the railway's medical department.

In addition to his widow, the former Ethel Mabel McGinnis, he is survived by two sons, Squadron Leader Robert McCombe, G. M., with the R.C.A.F. in Europe, and John, now in business in northern Ontario, following military service overseas.

LAVENHAM, Suffolk, Eng.—John Paulsen has retired after being chairman of the Lavenham Parish Council for 25 years.

### The Federal Election . . .

The federal election went rather as we had expected—both in Canada and in Skeena. In the Dominion we find the Liberal government of MacKenzie King returned to power a little short of a clear majority of the total of 245 seats in the House of Commons but probably assured of sufficient support among miscellaneous minor groups to ensure it of consistent legislative backing providing it hews fairly close to the line. Features of the election result, apart from the heavy cutting down of the Liberal representation, was the substantial increase in the number of Conservative members and the failure of the C.C.F. to make the big sweep it expected.

As for the government party, it may realize that the temper of the people was, undoubtedly, in the direction of a change but the majority felt that a chance at this critical time might be inadvisable if not perilous. The Dominion was fortunate, we believe, that it retained the Prime Minister and the better talented among his colleagues to lead it through the trying times to come.

The official Opposition, at last under the actual leadership of its official head, is substantial enough in numbers to afford useful criticism

and effective aid for whichever the need may be.

With fitting and reasonable co-operation and co-ordination among the parties and due consideration of the better interests of the world and the nation, Canada, under its new Parliament and government, should be assured of another era of good and useful administration.

The result in Skeena:

Here in Skeena we have chosen to sit in the ranks of the Opposition. Possibly it might have been better had we done otherwise at this time. However, if we get capable representation and fair consideration of our needs, we should have little to fear. Of course, we may expect nothing more than our due and, on occasion, it may be necessary to fight hard and unitedly for that.

The earnest and, undoubtedly, capable young man who has been elected our member, in carrying out his work at Ottawa on behalf of the riding, will need the support of all the constituents he represents—organized or otherwise. He, in turn, will have to appreciate the fact that he is no longer a C.C.F. candidate and missionary of the Socialist doctrine but the elected and entrusted representative of all the people of the riding with his first charge and responsibility the fostering and advancement of their community interests. We hope that he will realize that fact and govern himself accordingly. The people of Skeena have not engaged him as an apostle of Socialism but as their spokesman and advocate. If he conducts himself as such he will best serve his riding and will most effectively reflect credit upon the political party whose nominee he was.

## Waterfront Whiffs

### Nineteen Million Pounds of Halibut Landed at Coast Ports During First Month of Season—Spring Salmon Run Good On Rivers.

Records of the International Fisheries Commission show that for the period from the beginning of the season May 1 to May 31 a total of 19,182,474 pounds of halibut was landed at all American and Canadian Pacific coast ports from Areas Two and Three. Of this, 13,955,872 pounds were landed from Area Two and 5,226,602 from Area Three.

Quota set by the Commission to be taken from both areas is about 52,000,000 pounds, of which about 24,500,000 pounds is allowed to come from Area Two. Thus, in the first month of the season, more than half the Area Two quota has been caught.

Landings from Area Two at all ports were almost equally divided between American and Canadian boats, with American vessels having a slight lead. The American fleet landed 7,653,533 pounds, while the Canadian vessels brought in 6,902,339 pounds.

From remote Area Three, where fishing is done mainly by larger boats, the American fleet brought in 5,158,535 pounds, while 68,067 pounds were caught by Canadian boats in that area.

With the Area Two season due to close at midnight Friday, after a 46-day season, landings at Prince Rupert are likely to be well over 7,000,000 pounds. Landings for the season here to Monday were 6,479,500 pounds, more than one-quarter the Area Two quota. At the close of the Area Two season last year total landings at this port were 5,169,899 pounds.

During the last 10 days, 1,231,500 pounds of halibut have arrived here. American boats landed 200,000 pounds and Canadian boats brought in 1,031,500.

High winds which have roughed the straits over the week-end have slowed fishing operations and landings in the final days of the Area Two season are likely to be considerably smaller than the earlier part of the season as a result.

Spring salmon fishing in the Naas and Skeena rivers is fairly good, according to reports reaching the city. The Naas river fishermen, apparently are doing better than those on the Skeena, averaging 12 to 15 fish per boat per day. The fish are reported to be unusually large. Any good fishing that is had in the rivers now will be appreciated by trollers who missed out on the earlier run of springs off Langara Island in April when prolonged fogs held them in harbor during the season in the straits.

The sockeye salmon season in the Naas and Skeena is due to begin on June 24 and gillnetters are making ready to harvest the run.

### FURTHER CHURCH UNION IS HINTED

Twentieth Anniversary of United Church of Canada Marked Here

At the regular services held in the First United Church yesterday Rev. J. A. Donnell reminded the congregations that Sunday marked the twentieth anniversary of the formation of the United Church of Canada.

He recalled how, following years of careful negotiations, on June 10, 1925, in Toronto, three great processions entered the arena through three different gateways and then combined into one large congregation. One of the processions consisted of members of the Congregationalists, one of the Methodists and the other represented two-thirds of the Presbyterians in Canada. In an impressively simple ceremony these 10,000 participants indicated by their physical presence the union of the three great denominations. They showed that from then on they would unite their energies in the great work of advancing the Kingdom of Heaven upon earth. The years since were a convincing proof of the success of the great adventure.

There were fears that certain differences might arise, that certain problems might disappoint the hopes of those who had labored for the combining of the churches then attempting union. These fears had been groundless.

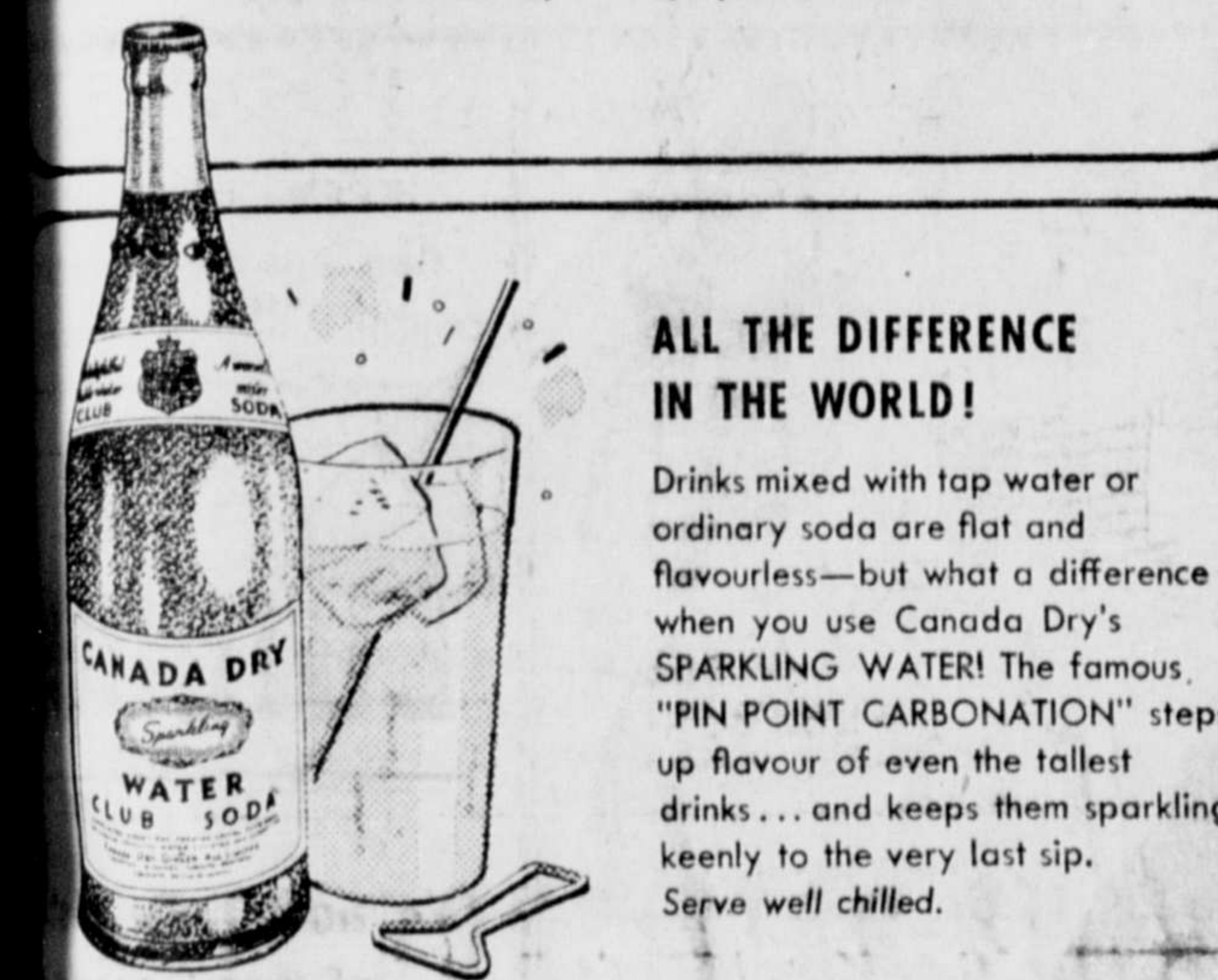

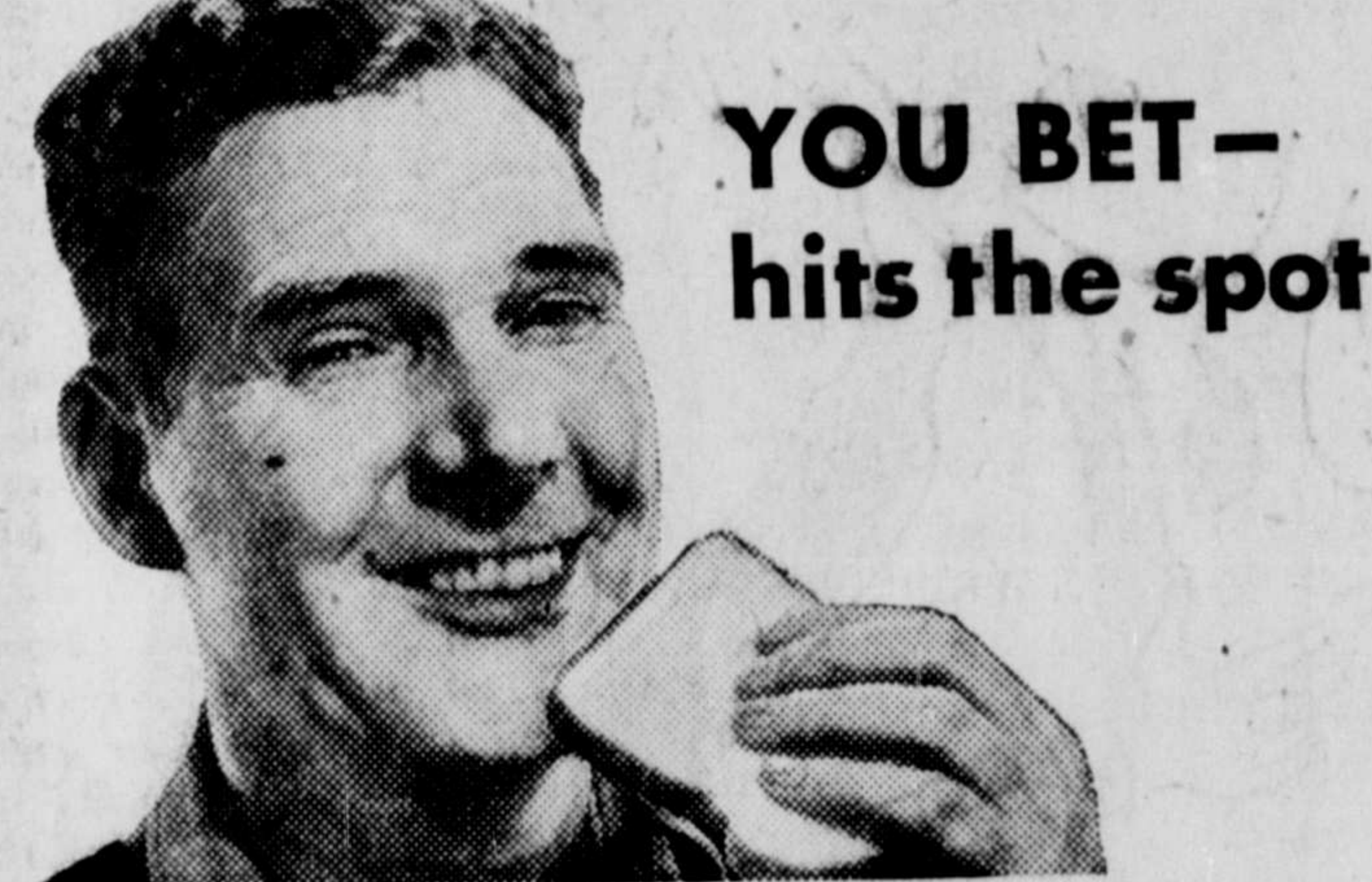
