All Out Offensive In West Looms

Dissolution and Appeal Expected

Prime Minister King suggests general election—Statements following Grey North... TAWA, Feb. 6 (CP)—An early election of Parliament is in prospect for Canada today as a result of the defeat in his bid for the North seat in the House of Commons. The possibility of an election has been brought forward by Prime Minister King himself. The Prime Minister issued a 300-word statement in which he declared the election of the by-election raises the question of whether any use of the by-election can be served by another session of Parliament before a general election is held. Mr. King said that his cabinet would give immediate attention to the question of a general election. The election result might have circumstances making an election inevitable at a time when the war had reached one of its most serious phases. There is a strong belief in Ottawa that Canada's second war election will follow soon, probably in April or early in May.

APPLEWHAITE IS MENTIONED

Liberals Moving to Hold Federal Nominating Convention Here

March 13 has been proposed by the local Liberal executive as a suitable date for the holding of a Liberal nominating convention for the federal riding of Skeena. The name of E. T. Applewhaite, formerly of Stewart and now a resident in Prince Rupert, is being heard as a possibility for the Liberal nomination. Mr. Applewhaite had no statement to make last night when asked whether or not he would be willing to run were the nomination tendered to him.

Visit of Russian Ship to Be Marked

Proposal was made by J. J. Little at last night's meeting of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce that there be suitable recognition of the forthcoming visit to this port of the first of a series of large Russian freighters which are expected to undergo extensive renovation and overhaul at the local dry dock. The suggestion was made that a luncheon might be held in honor of the master and crew of the vessel.

WEEKLY GARBAGE CAN ORDEAL MAY SOON TERMINATE

Arms that have grown weary packing garbage cans from back doors to the street for the weekly convenience of the city garbage collectors may soon find blessed rest.

That particular consideration took a leading place last night in discussion of a utilities committee report to city council that an application has been made to the Wartime Prices and Trade Board to increase garbage collection charges.

"If you raise the garbage fees are you going to increase the service?" Alderman Nora E. Arnold asked. "I for one am sick and tired of carrying my garbage can to the street."

Alderman Robert McKay replied that they intended to return to the back door system of collection dear to the hearts of householders.

"That will start the ball rolling. The point is that the garbage collection department is going \$50 a day in the hole. We want to do something about it."

"Well, we can't think of raising the collection fees without improving the service," Alderman George Hills commented. "I think that should be written into the report."

Alderman Brett said that, in spite of the total increase in the garbage department's deficit, he did not think that the per capita cost to the city had increased.

"Even before the war the garbage collection cost the city something. I don't think that the per capita cost has increased much over the pre-war years. The loss has simply multiplied with the increase in population," he said.

Council adopted the recommendation, as well as one advising that no consideration be given to the letting of a contract for garbage and night soil collection at present.

"TIN HATS" IN RUPERT

Twenty-three members of the famous "Tin Hats," Canadian service show, which has been playing to troops overseas, arrived in the city Monday afternoon and will play a series of shows in this area. They will perform at the Navy Drill Hall tonight and tomorrow. The shows are for army personnel only.

Soviet Columns Continue Advance to Heart of Reich; Foothold on Oder River

MOSCOW, Feb. 6 (CP)—The German radio has announced that Berlin has become a front line city. The Nazis are not exaggerating. Advancing Soviet columns have moved to within 32 miles of the German capital by taking the Oder River town of Zelin. The Russians are massed in strength along 73 miles of the river. According to the Germans, the Red Army has won three footholds on the western banks of the Oder.

LOOK INTO MARKETING

Special Committee to Look Into Disposal of Interior Products Here

A new committee will be set up by the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce to explore the possibility of further quantities of interior agricultural products being absorbed by the Prince Rupert market.

The matter was brought before the meeting last night by G. A. Hunter who expressed the opinion that, by co-ordinated action of chambers of commerce and other interested bodies, obstacles which had mitigated against a maximum disposal of interior products on the Prince Rupert market might be removed.

Mr. Hunter moved and W. J. Scott seconded that a committee be appointed.

The matter, it is expected, will come up at the meeting in May of the Associated Boards of Trade of Central British Columbia at Vanderhoof.

PLAN SEAL COVE CHLORINE PLANT

Announcement by National Defence authorities that they contemplated installing a secondary chlorination system for the R.C.A.P. at Seal Cove was referred to the City Engineer by City Council last night.

A test by the health department showed that there was little or no chlorine in the water in that district, Mayor H. M. Daggett explained.

"How can you account for one section of the population crying about too much chlorine and another section complaining about not enough?" Alderman Hills asked.

"It shouldn't be that way," City Engineer Hanes replied.

"If they want more chlorine let them have it. I know I'm getting enough," Alderman Ruderman announced.

SCHOOL GROUND EXPROPRIATED

War-time Housing Takes Hays Cove Property For Three Years

A limited expropriation order allowing War-time Housing Limited ownership of the part of Booth Memorial high school grounds occupied by staff houses one and two and the commissary was received Saturday at the city hall.

The order gives the crown company temporary ownership of the property formerly rented by them under the terms of a lease agreement with the city. It provides that the company shall own the land for three years and shall be allowed six months to remove the buildings after the expiration of the order. In case War-time Housing desires to withdraw ownership before the expiration of the three-year period it can do so by giving three months' notice to the city.

The expropriation was put in force after War-time Housing Limited and the city failed to reach an agreement on the renewal of the lease which was previously in force. The order became effective January 30.

Jap Hopes Are Dashed

Remaining Nip Garrison In Manila Faces Destruction

MacARTHUR'S HEADQUARTERS, Feb. 6 (CP)—Japanese hopes for an empire in the southwest Pacific are crumbling fast this morning under American blows in the Philippines. What remains of the Japanese garrison in Manila now is facing almost certain destruction. And all roads leading to Bataan Peninsula are dominated.

General MacArthur is supremely confident of ultimate victory in the Pacific. He says: "we are well on the way, but Japan itself is our final goal."

Local Delegate to Edmonton Meeting

The Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce considers it would be advisable to be represented at a meeting of the Alberta-British Columbia Trade Association which is to be held in March at Edmonton. The suggestion was made at last night's meeting of the Chamber and approved. It being referred to the publicity committee to go into the matter of financing a representative.

KEEPING DRY DOCK GOING

Railway President Heard From Reply from Minister Awaited

Efforts of the special citizens' committee which is endeavouring to find ways to keep the local dry dock in full operation have so far been unable to bring forth information of specific commitments on the part of government authorities but they have succeeded in gaining assurances that the matter is being considered in Ottawa and Montreal. The city council and Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce were so advised last night.

Fear that because of the present uncertainty of the future of the dry dock, many workers may leave the city was basis for the urgency, Mayor Daggett, chairman of the committee, told the council last night.

"There is a good deal of unrest in the city and it could be settled if we knew what is to happen at the shipyard," Mayor Daggett said.

Seeking specific information, the committee wired R. C. Vaughan, president of the Canadian National Railways, and Hon. C. D. Howe, minister of Munitions and Supply, on Saturday.

The following reply was received from Mr. Vaughan on Monday.

"Everything possible has been done and is being done to secure new construction and keep the staff at the dock yard employed."

The Chamber of Commerce felt that the special committee should continue its work in the endeavour to ensure permanent operation of the dry dock.

The Friday night meeting felt that in the light of unrest created in the city by the lack of definite prospects for the local shipyards, it should try to hasten the announcement of a specific program of new work. They immediately moved to have telegrams despatched to Mr. Howe and to R. C. Vaughan, asking for more definite information. Mr. Vaughan's reply came yesterday. Mr. Howe has yet to be heard from.

Final 10,000-ton hull of the present shipbuilding contract is expected to be launched at the Prince Rupert dry dock in March.

"There is a grave possibility that if the uncertainty of further shipyard work continues much longer many residents of the city will leave," Mayor Daggett said.

"We are trying to make Prince Rupert the permanent home of as many people as possible."

C. C. Mills has been appointed to the committee as representative of the Liberal party which did not have a representative at the organizational meeting last Tuesday.

The committee which consists of representatives of political, business and labor groups, met last Friday night to consider the following reply from Mr. Howe:

"This department is endeavouring to arrange new programs for the Prince Rupert shipyards. Details will be announced in due course by Canadian National Railways."

ROBERT GARDINER DIES

CALGARY — Robert Gardiner, 65, one of Canada's most widely known leaders in agriculture and president of the United Farmers of Alberta for fifteen years, died in hospital today. He had been in failing health for some time.

McNAUGHTON IS DENIED GREY NORTH SEAT; GARFIELD CASE IS SUCCESSFUL

OWEN SOUND, Ont., Feb. 6 — Lieut. General A. G. L. McNaughton, minister of national defence, was denied the seat of Grey North in Parliament by the electors of this riding in the by-election yesterday. They chose instead Garfield Case, the Progressive-Conservative candidate. Air Vice-Marshal Earl Godfrey, the C.C.F. candidate, ran far behind Case and McNaughton.

The vote was as follows: Case 7338, McNaughton 6099, Godfrey 3136.

In spite of a heavy snowfall, there was a large vote of 70 percent of the qualified electors. It was a larger vote than in the 1940 general election.

Only in one polling division did McNaughton have the lead.

Joint British-American Operations Are Seen As Result of New Command

Americans Smashing Deeper Into Siegfried Line — Allies Are Pounding Fleeing German Forces

PARIS, Jan. 6 (CP)—There are indications that an all-out Allied offensive soon may be launched on the western front. This is seen in the official disclosure that General Omar Bradley has resumed command of both the American First and Third Armies. The United States Ninth Army remains under Field Marshal Sir Bernard Montgomery's command. Informed sources believe that this new arrangement indicates the possible imminence of joint British and American operations against the Germans.

Allied Headquarters in Paris announces that the Germans have suffered 1,260,000 western front casualties since D-Day.

American First Army infantry slashed into the second concrete belt of German fortifications today to within 1500 yards of Gemund and one thousand yards of Schleidenn, last bastion town on the Siegfried Line. Just to the north other Americans drove through west wall fortifications to within 1500 yards of Schmidt, north of the network of dams controlling the headwaters of the Roer River.

The American Third Army, fighting seven miles deep in Germany, captured the Siegfried Line village of Hascheid, southwest of Prum.

The Germans have been almost completely cleared from the west bank of Ill River in southern Alsace where the Allies are hammering German forces retreating across the Rhine River.

Allied forces are pursuing Germans cut off in the Vosges Mountains and three villages southwest of Colmar on the Fecht River were liberated. They were Mittlach, Mulbach and Walbach.

During four days ending February 3 Allied forces captured nearly 7,000 prisoners on the western front.

Patrol activity is reported from the Canadian First Army front.

MEETING OF BIG THREE UNDER WAY

LONDON, Feb. 6, 1945 (CP)—Official confirmation has been given to rumors that Prime Minister Churchill, President Roosevelt, and Premier Stalin are meeting. Sir Walter Citrine told the British Trades Union in London that the Big Three are holding their long-talked-of conference.

The latest rumor regarding the locale of the meeting comes from a French News Agency. It says the meeting is the Russian resort town of Sochi on the eastern shore of the Black Sea.

YUKON SOLDIER'S GALLANTRY CITED

Sapper Francis Dalton Farr Mentioned in Dispatches

Forty-seven British Columbia soldiers and one from the Yukon, Sapper Francis Dalton Farr, have been recognized for gallant and distinguished service in the field with mention in dispatches according to National Defence Headquarters announcement at Ottawa. A total of 570 officers and other ranks of the Canadian Army are cited in the list.

Sapper Farr is well known in the Yukon and for many years was associated with the mining company at Dawson and worked on one of the gold dredges as winchman.

He is the third volunteer from the Yukon to be mentioned in dispatches, the first having been Private Ernest Winding, the second S/Sgt. J. W. Ballentine.

Private Winding served in the Danish army before coming to Canada and the Yukon where he followed the mining game. He and Jimmy Ballentine won their mention in Italy. Winding is serving with the well known New Westminster Regiment.

CHARGED WITH KEEPING GAMING ESTABLISHMENT

Following a police raid on the North Star club Saturday night Ernest Webster appeared in city police court yesterday morning and was remanded for eight days. No plea was taken. Webster and 16 others were taken into custody and quantities of equipment and paraphernalia seized during the raid. Webster was released on \$200 bail. The alleged inmates were released on \$10 bail. Charges against them have not yet been laid.

40 DIE IN HARBOR

NEW YORK — The death toll as a result of a terrific explosion which occurred in New York Harbor yesterday when an incoming ship rammed a tanker laden with hi-octane gas may reach forty. Eighteen are known dead and 22 are missing.

TRAIN AIR STEWARDS

LONDON, (CP)—British Overseas Airways Corporation is going to pick 100 boys from the Air Training Corps and train them as stewards for overseas routes.

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PRESS FOR NEW HOTEL AND DEPOT

The Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce is to communicate with the federal minister of transport urging the inclusion of an adequate hotel and station project at Prince Rupert in its plans for post-war development. The suggestion will also be offered to post-war rehabilitation authorities.

The matter of improved hotel accommodation here was again raised at the meeting of the Chamber last night when W. J. Scott reported on an interview with W. R. Devenish, vice-president of Canadian National Railways, western lines, who appeared to be quite interested in improvement of hotel accommodation here although making no commitments on the matter.

Vancouver Auditors Appointed by City

Replacement of G. L. Rorie as city auditor by Crehan and Meredith, a Vancouver firm which recently effected changes in the city hall accounting system, was commended upon by Mr. Rorie in a letter before City Council last night. Mr. Rorie explained his position to council. Crehan and Meredith have been retained to audit the books for one year following the institution of the new system.

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The Challenge in Grey North . . .

The Progressive-Conservatives cannot be denied political satisfaction they must feel over the result of voting in Grey North yesterday. They have succeeded in placing the government in a very embarrassing position. This should be a source of much happiness for them from the political standpoint.

The people of Grey North turned out in large numbers to deliver to the government a rebuke on the manner in which they have handled the manpower of this country in relation to the military requirements, particularly to overseas reinforcements. That was the determining issue and the unpopularity there of government policy in this respect caused the voters of Grey North to deliver their rebuke in spite of and disregarding all the other good works of the government in the prosecution of the war.

It was a serious thing that the people of Grey North did in rejecting the Minister of National Defence. They knew that their voice in this matter might be accepted as the voice of Canada.

It is now to be expected that the Prime Minister will regard the result in Grey North as a challenge and call the general election in answer thereto. As Mr. King said last night in his statement after the result of the election had been made known, circumstances appear to have arisen which leave no alternative but to call the election.

As was expected, it was a close fight in Grey North with the Progressive-Conservative and Liberal candidates the only two serious contenders. It was new ground for the C.C.F. but they received a substantial number of votes—a number that, no doubt, would have been smaller had they not had such a distinguished candidate.

We would not go so far as to say that as Grey North has gone so will go the nation but we cannot but think that the Progressive-Conservative tide is running high these days. The government is, doubtless, suffering from its failure to impose conscription more promptly. The C.C.F. wave shows continued signs of recession.

The pity of the whole thing is that we still have one of the key ministers of the war without a seat in the House and carrying on under what may be regarded as at least the implied displeasure of the people. Under the circumstances it would appear to be the logical and reasonable course for the Prime Minister, come what may, to clear the atmosphere by calling the election as speedily as possible in the hope of obtaining a vindication and

recognition of his government's many fine achievements in carrying on and keeping the nation united during the most difficult period in the history of the Dominion and the world.

What Are Japanese Up To? . . .

A few weeks ago after the initial American landings at Lingayen we were predicting that the Japanese might be expected to put up a real fight before Manila. Now MacArthur and his forces are at Manila after a campaign of just a little under four weeks, meeting a surprising minimum of resistance all along the way. So our predictions on the Philippines were somewhat out of line. The outlook now seems to be that the Japanese may soon be driven completely from Luzon, the main island, or be destroyed.

We do not know what may be expected to follow the change in policy of Japanese fighting from fanatical resistance to the death which use to be their technique but which has been changing not only in the Philippines but in Burma and other areas.

The untrustworthy and entirely unscrupulous little yellow men may be conceded to be up to some nefarious sort of strategy so, while we are all glad to see the excellent progress which is being made against them in practically all areas today, we should not be overconfident.

While we are in a much better position to attack and our position is improving every day, it is still quite a way to Tokyo. It may not take as long as we once expected, but we may rest assured that there is still considerable fighting to be done.

How He Became "Pussy Foot"

The late William E. Johnson, who became an international figure as a dry crusader, acquired the nickname of "pussy foot" as chief special officer of the federal Indian service in the early days.

Appointed by Theodore Roosevelt to enforce anti-liquor laws and clean up bootlegging in Oklahoma and Indian territory, Johnson visited a Haskell, Okla., poolroom proprietor suspected of selling liquor.

Feigning to be a drunken cattleman, Johnson entered the poolroom and demanded a drink. He rejected the sarsaparilla offered and the proprietor then produced whiskey. Immediately, Johnson disarmed and arrested him.

An Oklahoma newspaper, describing the raid, said "the booze hunter strikes like lightning even if he is a pussy foot."

The nickname stuck and Johnson took pride in it. "That name is all right," he said years later. "It traveled around the world faster than I could keep up with it. Pussy foot opened the doors to places that William E. Johnson never could have entered."

Johnson was mobbed and lost the sight of one eye in 1910 when he engaged in a dry campaign in England.

Notes and Views of the City Council

Approval was granted by city council last night to a recommendation of the Board of Works committee that the City Engineer and the Board of Works chairman be authorized to examine the city's rock crushing equipment and, if it is found necessary to purchase new equipment, the committee chairman be authorized to go to Vancouver and purchase any equipment found necessary. In moving adoption of the report, Alderman Rudderham pointed out that he had examined a rock crusher for sale on the highway and found it not suitable for city use. In the meantime council is making arrangements for the city to use the Provincial Works Department rock crusher.

City Council approved a recommendation of the utilities committee that the basis of holidays with pay for all city employees be one working day for each month worked in the preceding year.

A street light is to be installed on Tenth Ave. E. near Bacon St.

A recommendation of the Board of Works that permission be granted to the area works officer to build a fire exit at the rear of the Knights of Columbus Hall providing that construction complies with city by-laws was approved by council.

Council last night approved a recommendation of the utilities committee that a 3/4-ton truck be purchased for the telephone department as soon as priorities are available.

Accounts totalling \$35,537 for the second half of December were approved for payment by Council on recommendation of the finance committee.

Licensing committee reported that a license to conduct a transfer business has been granted to David Myers.

Finance committee received endorsement of its action in purchasing \$3,100 in Prince Rupert 4 percent refunding debentures, 1955, at \$1.02 and accrued interest for the Water Works Utilities trust account.

A provincial order-in-council approving an increase in the salary of Magistrate W. D. Vance to \$175 a month was read in City Council last night. Council had previously approved the increase and submitted it to the office of the Provincial Secretary.

A letter from the local Firemen's Union asking for a 5 percent wage increase for city firemen was referred to the special committee to consider wages.

HOW CAN I ???

Q. How can I separate a water glass when it becomes stuck in another?
A. Pour cold water in the upper one to contract it and then immerse the lower one in warm water to expand it. They can then be easily separated.
Q. How can the skins from beets be removed very readily?
A. Place the beets in hot water for a short time, drain off the hot water and immediately fill the vessel with cold water.
Q. How can the shiny parts of a garment be removed?
A. Sponge it with a solution of one teaspoon of ammonia to one quart of water. Then press on the wrong side.

Of General Interest

Firm Anchorage
Do you have trouble with a food chopper that won't stay firmly anchored to the table but slips and slides as you grind? There's a cure and it's a simple one. Put a piece of sandpaper, gritty side up, on the edge of the table before screwing the chopper in place.

Cutting Remarks
For easy cutting of fresh bread for dainty sandwiches first thoroughly chill the loaf. Cheese will slice without crumbling if you use a strong thread or piece of string instead of a knife.

Not Hopeless
An old knitted garment so shrunk and matted that travelling is hopeless is not a dead loss—not by a long chalk. When the seams are unpicked the pieces can be cut as though they were cloth. Sew around the edges by machine before stitching seams and be careful not to stretch. There may be a parka, a child's warm shirt or panties in that old sweater of yours.

The Experts Say . . .

ONION HARVEST: Onion lovers have a patriotic reason today for indulging their taste for this flavorful vegetable. A bumper crop has resulted in plentiful supplies and "making the best use of available foods" is the wartime eating slogan.

Applied to onions, this requires some knowledge of the characteristics of various types. Large, Spanish-type onions are mild in flavor and they are first choice for baking and for generous use raw, in salads and sandwiches. Other varieties of yellow and red onions are stronger. Their uses: For serving boiled, with a cream sauce, to "smother" a steak or liver, and for flavoring.

Shallots or spring onions cooked and served like asparagus are sweet and mild.

CHEAP NOURISHMENT. Housewives know that cereals and bread are the cheapest foodstuffs in Canadian meals today, besides being excellent fillers-up for the hollow-legged members of the family.

Canada's Food Rules recommend one serving of the "whole grain" cereal every day. Reason for the emphasis on the "whole grain" says the Nutrition Division, is that whole grain cereals are such excellent sources of thiamin and niacin, the B-vitamins which aid digestion and steady the nerves. They are also a good source of iron, the mineral necessary for making red blood cells.

In the process of turning whole grain into refined cereals many of the B-vitamins are lost.

BEEF HASH: It may not sound like a romantic dish but in the past months lowly corned beef hash has become glamorous . . . because, in different forms, it is a favorite with our fighting men overseas. When they have to cook a meal in a hurry with the least possible preparation and the greatest return in delicious food they make hash. The main difference between theirs and ours is that they generally use bully beef as the basis for their hash where civilians use corned beef.

This basic recipe, which may be varied by using other meat or vegetables, comes from the Nutrition Bureau:

Combine two cups of corned beef, three cups of chopped cooked potatoes, one small chopped onion, and one-half cup of milk. Season with salt and pepper to taste. Cook slowly in a little fat or salad oil until browned, turning frequently. This serves four.

SOUP AGAIN: Yesterday's gravy makes tomorrow's hot beef broth . . . but careful about making it too rich. Dilute it with vegetable water, add vegetables and brew it a bit for good flavor.
