ELDERLY MEN SETTling THEMSELVES IN PRINCE RUPERT'S SPACIOUS PIONEERS' HOME

Elderly men this week are settling themselves in Prince Rupert's new Pioneers' Home in a bright and liveable place which cancels last dingy record in favor of a building and that can be a source of pride to the community sponsored it.

The building on an elevated hilltop, overlooking the water, opened its doors to receive the small men who will call it their declining years.

Despite the inevitable moving day, the men have been made comfortable in their new quarters. Home supervisors, Mrs. Peter Montchall, and the new men indeed.

Montchall, who at 75, is a man of 50, was busy with the modern kitchen finishing of a pie and was busy but not too busy to take time out to show a reporter around.

The kitchen is his department while Mrs. Montchall takes care of the general housework.

"It's a wonderful place," said Mr. Montchall in quick Gallic accents, interrupting to announce that he is a French-Canadian. "It is convenient and roomy and has a wonderful harbor view. It certainly is a relief to get out of those barracks buildings on Dunsmuir Street."

Mr. Montchall's only complaint was that the supervisor's living quarters are not on the same floor as the charges. "This makes it difficult to hear if anything might go wrong with the elderly men at night," he commented.

Mr. and Mrs. Montchall have three attractive rooms with bath in the semi-basement which also contains the kitchen.

The main floor has accommodation for 20 men in three bright, airy rooms. This includes the sick bay, which will hold three. Two of the bedrooms can accommodate six men and the third is a spacious living room and a large dining room.

All rooms have doors of hospital width so that cots can be wheeled in and out, if needed, and—remembering the tragedy of the Dyer Apartments a year ago—there are plenty of convenient fire exits.

LOADS OF HAPPY SHRINE VISITORS COMING HERE TOMORROW

Prince Rupert will be invaded tomorrow afternoon and, judging by the signs in evidence today, it will be a completely peaceful and happy peneration. In two specially chartered vessels—C. P. R.'s popular liner Princess Norah and Union's brand new luxury cruiser Chilcotin—nobles of Gizeh Temple, Ancient and Arabic Order of the Mystic Shrine—are coming from Vancouver where they assembled from various parts of the province to join in the pilgrimage. The party, close to 300 strong, will arrive in their ships at 1 o'clock in the afternoon and, with the initial event the presentation of a golden key to Illustrious Potentate Richard Nelson by Mayor Nora Arnold as a token of freedom of the city, a program embodying colorful and spectacular ceremony will commence and continue for the entire length of the two-day visit which ends at midnight Saturday with the sailing on return to Vancouver.

CELANESE IS PAYING WELL

Net Income Shows Big Increase as Result of Expansion

NEW YORK—Net income of \$5,180,654 was recently reported by the Celanese Corporation of America for the quarter ended March 31. Announcement was made on May 13. This compared with \$3,434,114 during the corresponding quarter of 1946.

The interim report issued by the president, Harold Blanche, said the sales showed a 45 per cent increase compared with the same quarter a year ago, and attributed this, in part, to expansion in volume of production arising from past expenditure by the company for new plant facilities in the United States.

The latest new enterprise of the company is a \$15,000,000 cellulose pulp plant near Prince Rupert in British Columbia.

ARE TRYING TO SAVE CHANGCHUN

NANKING—Chiang Kai-Shek's headquarters rushed a sizeable force of warplanes to Manchuria today as communistic troops tightened their encirclement of Changchun, the embattled Manchurian capital. Unconfirmed reports from Mukden said two Nationalist armies are on the way to Manchurian battlefronts as reinforcements. Heavy fighting is reported around the Changchun airfields.

MURRAY BANS STRIKES ATLANTIC CITY—President Phillip Murray Wednesday issued an order to three thousand locals of the United Steel Workers of the C.I.O., forbidding strikes for the next two years.

MARITIME COMMISSION OTTAWA—A Maritime Commission, long sought by some of Canada's shipping trade circles, will be created. A bill will be introduced this session, Premier King disclosed in the Commons on Wednesday. The Prime Minister gave no details.

INCREASE IN TRADE LAKE SUCCESS, N.Y.—British and American sources have predicted an increase of reciprocal trade.

BIG MARINE FIRE EASTPORT, Me.—Over a third of Eastport's major industry was wiped out Wednesday night in a spectacular fire with a loss unofficially estimated at close to a million dollars. Two of the city's six sardine factories and a pearl essence plant were among over a score of wooden waterfront buildings razed.

BRITISH LABOR FIGHT LONDON—Labor Party leaders, girdling for a showdown with the leftist rebel bloc, declared today that the aim of the British-American understanding is to prevent war. The Labor Government ruling party's leadership said "it does not propose to take sides in the line-up for the next world war."

MERCY FLIGHT AND RADIOPHONIC CONSULTATION KEEP MAN ALIVE

Gordon Geator, rugged 30-year-old logger, lies in Prince Rupert General Hospital today hovering between life and death, owing his survival thus far to a mercy aircraft flight, radiophonic medical consultation and the local blood plasma bank following an accident in a logging camp at Beatty Anchorage, Cumshewa Inlet, Queen Charlotte Islands. He sustained a severely shattered pelvis and serious internal injuries when a log rolled upon him while at work in the woods.

Following receipt of advice of the accident and the seriousness of Geator's condition, a Norseman monoplane of Queen Charlotte Airlines, piloted by Capt. W. McLeod, was dispatched from Vancouver at 3:20 yesterday afternoon, picking the unfortunate young man up at Beatty Anchorage, together with Don Pollock, first aid attendant, and bringing him in to Prince Rupert. Dr. W. S. Kergin and ambulance were on hand at Seal Cove air base when the plane arrived at 9:40 last night and

During the night operations were performed here and blood transfusion administered from the locally-established plasma bank.

Historic Foreign Policy Is Now Set Into Action

KANSAS CITY (CP)—President Truman, in a hotel room here, today signed the \$400,000,000 Greek-Turkish Aid Bill, setting in force the historic foreign policy of bolstering weak countries against outside aggression and in support to the United Nations. President Truman called it "an important step in support to the United Nations. President Truman called it "an important step in the building of peace and said it offered proof that the United States will make a vigorous effort to help create conditions of peace. "Our aid," said the President, "is evidence not only that we pledge our support to the United Nations, but that we act to support it."

COMPENSATION BEING SOUGHT

VANCOUVER—Having heard what has been done for Prince Rupert, Vancouver aldermen believe the Dominion government should give the city compensation for damage done to city streets by military vehicles during the war.

Ald. Jack Price told city council it should make representations to Ottawa for compensation, especially in view of the fact that Prince Rupert has been reimbursed.

Ald. Charles Jones agreed, but stated that the matter would be discussed at the forthcoming convention of the Union of B.C. Municipalities. He said some other municipalities had suffered much more than Vancouver.

He opposed a suggestion that support of the Conference of Canadian Mayors should be sought.

U.S. BUSINESS GROUP TO VISIT PRINCE RUPERT

Prince Rupert will be host at the end of May to a group of members of the St. Paul, Minnesota, Association of Commerce, who will arrive here either on May 29 or May 31 to join the Briggs Steamship Co. vessel Southeastern which is due to dock here on June 1 on her maiden voyage in the Prince Rupert-Alaska service.

According to George H. Stanbridge, local agent for the company, the group of St. Paul businessmen will sail on the Southeastern to the Alaska ports with Phillip G. Briggs, owner of the company, who will also board the ship here.

The St. Paul group will probably arrive by train either on May 29 or 31, according to a letter received by Mr. Stanbridge from Fred Sperling, secretary of the wholesale department of the midwest city's Association of Commerce. The number of men in the group is not yet known.

Mr. Briggs and the Southeastern are now at Seattle and the ship will sail directly to Ketchikan on the initial voyage. Considerable cargo for the vessel has been stored here for some time.

The St. Paul men are representatives of business firms which will supply products from midwest sources for the Alaska market. These products will be shipped by rail to Prince Rupert and loaded on the Southeastern for delivery to the southeastern Alaska cities.

The active Alaska committee of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce will extend courtesies on behalf of that body.

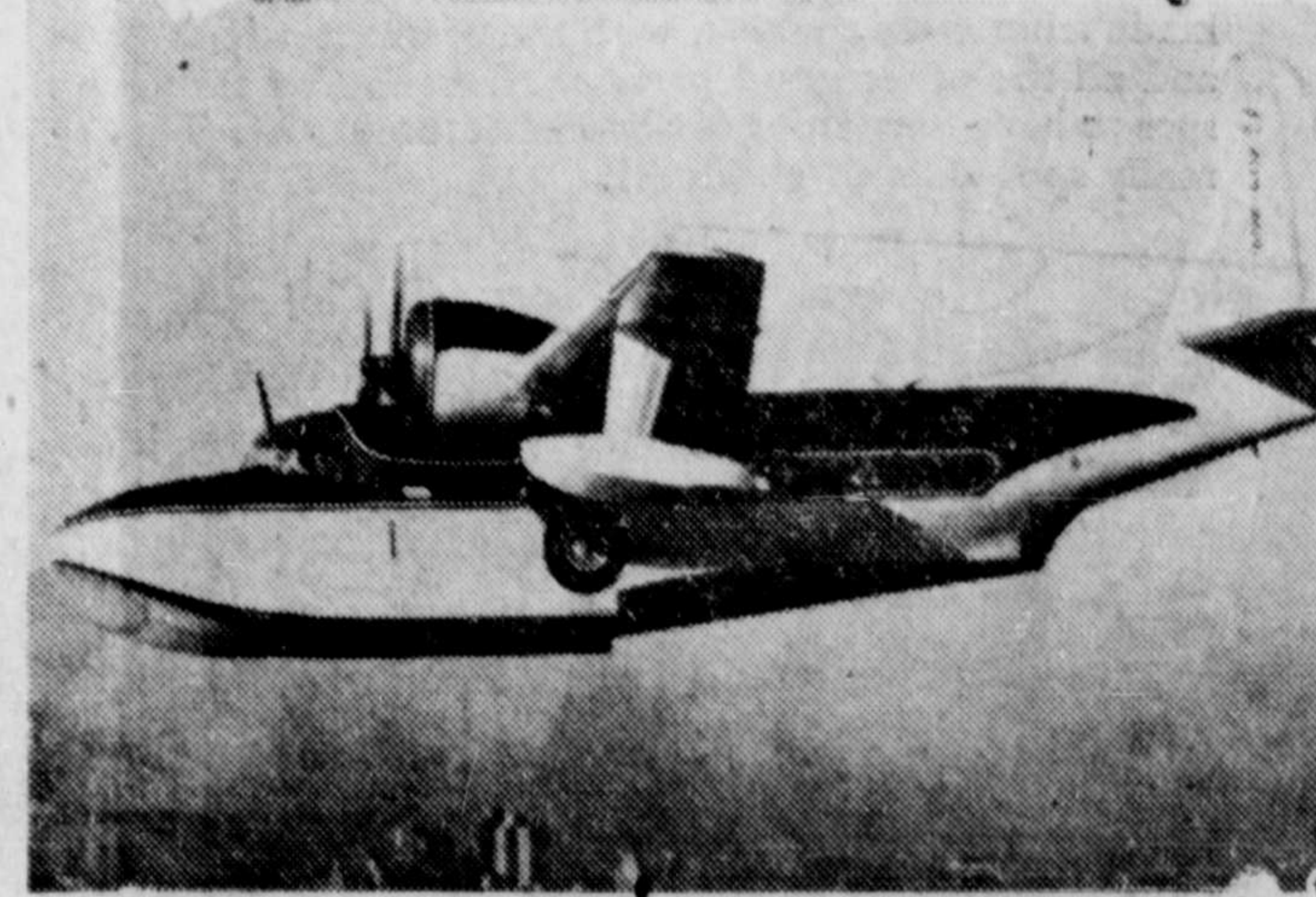

QUESTION OF INDIA

FOR THE SAKE of world security the united India which Britain tried to preserve, and which Mr. Gandhi still hopes for, is greatly to be desired. The breaking up of large areas hitherto organized under law has little appeal for anyone trying to enlarge the borders of peace. In the case of India it seems right that Indians, and other nations to whom they may look for support, should do everything possible to keep India a unit. As such it can be a strong link in the chain of peaceable nations co-operating for defence against war.

Surely the demands of Hindus and of Moslems, as of lesser minorities, can be satisfied in a framework through federation. A federated India could present a common front to external threats or pressures while providing a maximum of local self-government for Indians of all shades of religious and political opinion.

Some of the most outstanding of Indian leaders have endorsed the federal principle not only for India but for world organization. Hope lies this way.

MAKE A DATE AND KEEP IT

EVERYBODY in Prince Rupert, man woman and child, is being expected to take part in the fight against tuberculosis by the simple means of being x-rayed at the mobile unit which is coming here from June 2 to 17 for the purpose of making a community-embracing mass survey. To make it even easier for Mr. and Mrs. John Citizen and their family and with a view to achieving 100 percent coverage or as close to that as possible, canvassing committees will tour all parts of the city next week, calling on all persons to make appointments for the clinic.

Of course, it goes without saying that the large majority of Prince Rupert people will be only too anxious to avail themselves of this free service—both in their own interest and for that of the community. There may, of course, be some who are indifferent or disinterested. These are the ones who are especially appealed to.

It is fortunate that such a splendid health service is available and is being made so simple to obtain.

Prince Rupert people may, no doubt, be counted upon to respond readily to the canvass by acceding to the appointments and later seeing that they are filled.

KING EDWARD P.-T. MEETING

More than 100 persons attended the King Edward Parent-Teacher Association Tuesday evening to fittingly climax and conclude the activities of the term. A short business meeting was conducted by C. H. Insulander, chairman, in which officers for the ensuing year were elected. With no especial fervor in this regard, the office of the presidency was of necessity left open until the September meeting. Other elections were as follows: Rudolph Olson, vice-president; Mrs. Cullander, secretary; Mrs. Vera Martin, treasurer; Mrs. John MacLeod, social convener; Miss C. Mauldon, membership committee; J. Goscoe, press representative; C. H. Insulander, council representative.

The shortage of dentists to accommodate the population of the city was briefly discussed and a motion was passed giving support to the Central Council in their appeal to the proper authorities for one or two dentists to ease this situation.

R. G. Moore, principal, focused the attention of those present on the importance of registering children who will commence school in the fall. In emphasizing this registration he explained its importance, in that a teaching staff is appointed in accordance with the number of pupils. To avoid a condition of overcrowding such as existed last year, a house-to-house canvass is to be made in which Mr. Moore expressed the wish for full co-operation.

Before retiring, Mr. Moore introduced Margaret Giske, King Edward candidate for May Queen. In a few well chosen phrases, this charming nominee expressed her pleasure of the occasion and asked for the support of the school-parents and friends.

The school choir presented the first number of the evening's entertainment by singing the King Edward School song, written and arranged by J. Goscoe. It was enthusiastically received as was each feature of the program which included folk dances and a flag drill by Grade 1, piano solos by Elizabeth Martin and Bernice Mikoloff, tap dancing by little Sonja Berg, three years of age, and also by Elsa Insulander.

RECREATION ACTIVITY IMPORTANT—PRINCE RUPERT IS VERY FORTUNATE

Forward looking plans of his department to improve the health status of school pupils of British Columbia by the extension of physical education services were revealed by Ernest Lee, director of physical education for British Columbia, who was the speaker at the weekly luncheon of the Prince Rupert Gyro Club yesterday. He expressed the hope that schools of Prince Rupert would become equipped under the new building program which was being planned here so that full advantage could be taken of these expanding services. Existing school playgrounds he described as "entirely inadequate" while the structure at the High School used as a gymnasium could hardly be honored with such a name.

Mr. Lee was highly enthusiastic about Prince Rupert's Civic Centre and hoped that the people of Prince Rupert were appreciative of their good fortune in possessing such a "wonderful plant and staff carrying out such a grand program." It was difficult to estimate the extent to which it was contributing to the welfare of the city because it was not easy to measure how much in the way of juvenile delinquency it might be preventing.

Mr. Lee declared that physical education and recreation should not be left to chance. They were of equal importance to straight education and should receive support and direction from government and civic organization on a similar basis. British Columbia government was already taking the lead in that direction and considerable increase in governmental financial support he was sure might be expected both towards construction and operation of civic centres. Another plan was the sending through the province of travelling clinics on physical education.

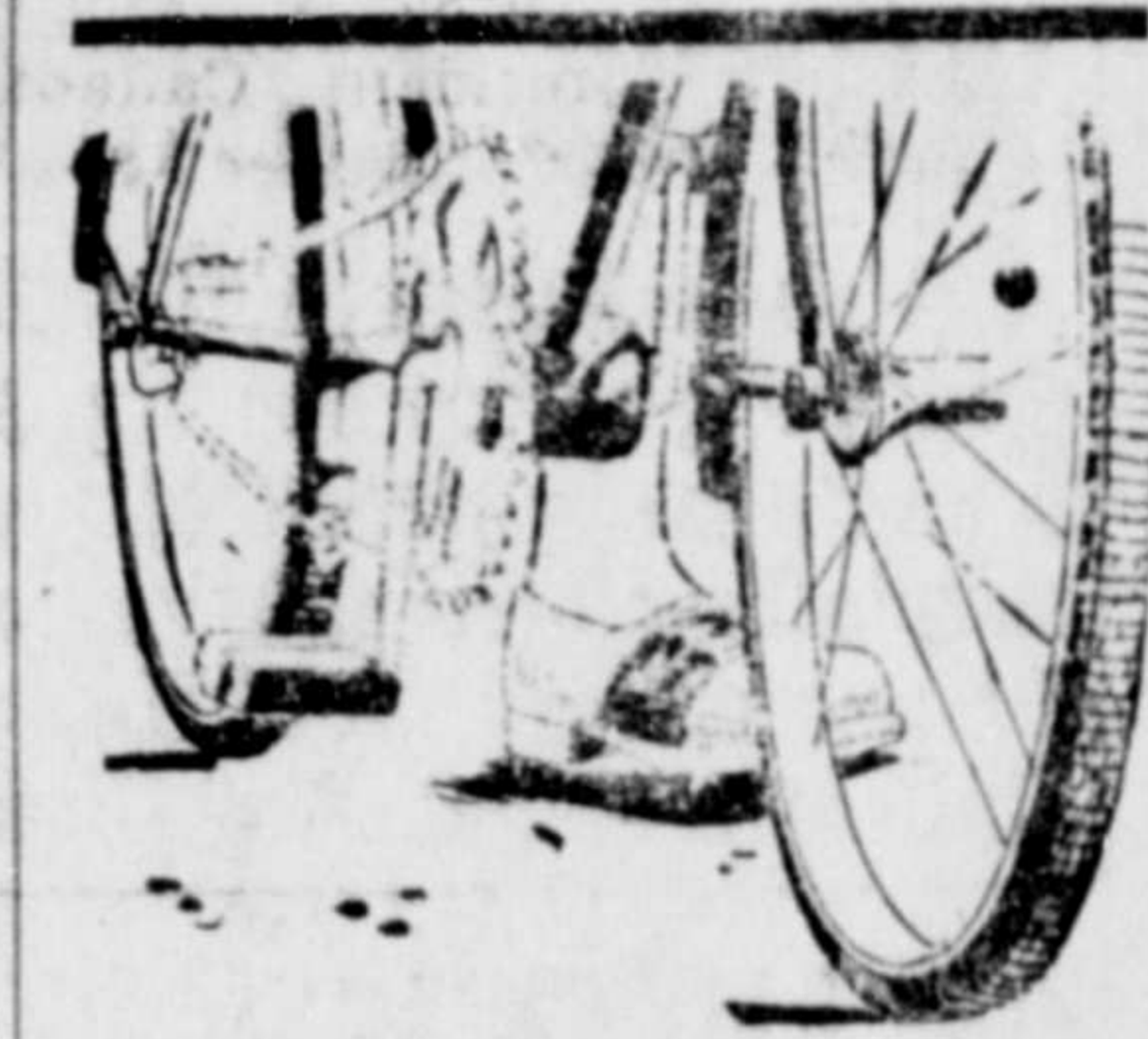

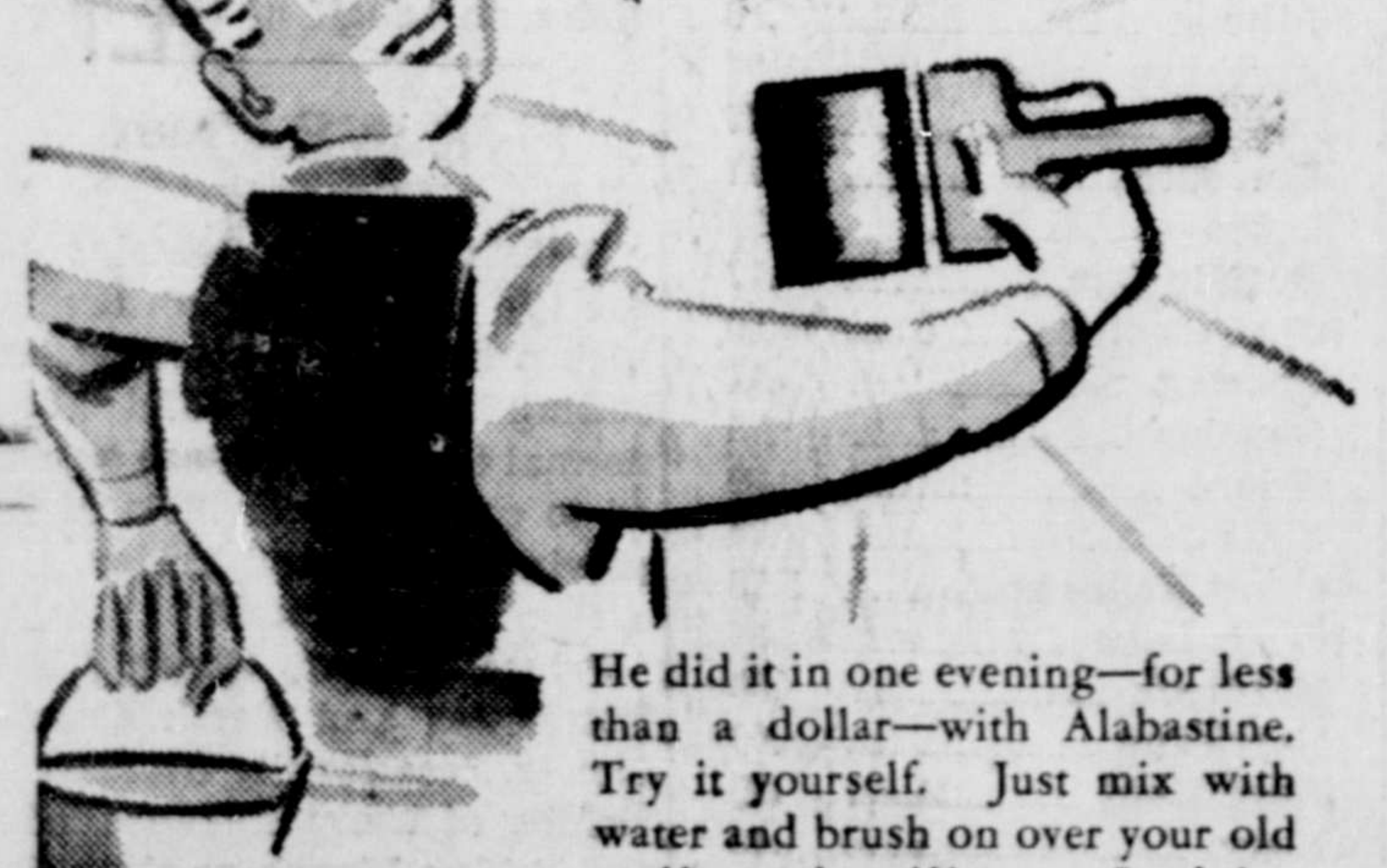

characters who scorn any less complex form of fishing for bass and bass are gently put in their places by Ray Bergman, one of the continent's best fishermen, in his latest book, "With Fly, Plug and Bait." (McLelland and Stewart). Bergman shocks the purists by describing the opening chapter of his 48-page volume to worm-baiting for trout—though not in exactly the barefoot boy fashion.

The book has a comprehensive section on fly-fishing but treats in detail of minnows and other live baits a lure for trout and large and small-mouth bass. Its chapter on how to strike a fish heretically questions the dogma that a bass always pauses to turn a minnow around. And it includes such odds-and-ends as how to raise earthworms and how to thread them properly on a bass-hook.

Bergman's book—aside from its friendly expertness on freshwater techniques—is of particular interest to Canadians. He devotes lengthy passages to his experiences fishing for bass in Lake Erie off Port Rowan and on the St. Lawrence off Kingston; and for native trout in the fabulous lakes of Quebec's Laurentides Park.

Bergman, as freshwater fishing expert for "Outdoor Life," has cast his flies in every part of America. But he says Laurentides Park because of its location and the management which controls it, is probably one of the outstanding brook trout fishing places in North America. He also pays special tribute to the art of left-handed Philippe Gagnon, Quebec's general superintendent of parks: "Incidentally, Mr. Gagnon is an angler of rare ability and prob-

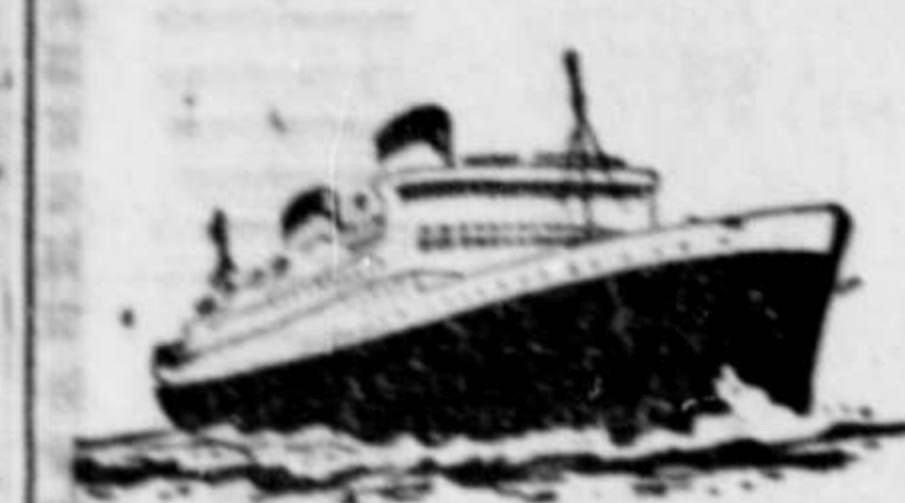

H.M.C.S. Uganda, which was in Prince Rupert recently, called at Port Alberni for two days after leaving here. Capt. K. F. Adams and his officers were dinner guests of Mayor W. C. Hamilton and city council and the cadets were entertained by the Alberni Council Teen Town. There were also softball games and several dances.

Species of fish, totalling 140 different kind, are usually found at the Fulton Fish Market in New York every day. The fish come from far away points, the chief sources of supply including Denmark, Iceland, South America and Alaska, coming by freight boats, trucks and planes. Nearly all lobsters are handled through air.

The crew of a vessel of the Alaska Steamship Co. made pretty fair pay during a round trip between Seattle and Alaska not long ago. They were out a month and there was some overtime. The vice-president, Leslie Baker, says the chief mate drew \$882. The quartermaster drew \$594, an able seaman \$671, a wiper \$441, an oiler \$437, a water tender \$409, a mess boy \$426, chief steward \$385, assistant steward \$403, chief cook \$507, baker \$524, pantryman \$426, bellboy \$244—with everything found.

A new marine service has been instituted at Prince Rupert with the appointment by Canadian Marconi Co. of H. J. Jeffries as radar servicing expert for the

company in this area. Radar is coming into increasingly general use on coastal shipping and the need of a local expert has been realized by the Marconi Co. which installs and operates radar in a similar way to wireless telegraphy on ships.

Expected to arrive on the coast within the next six weeks are 10,000 cases of whiskey now enroute from the British Isles. The refreshment is aboard the steamers Pacific Enterprise and Pacific Exporter. They will be the first vessels of the Furness Line to reach Vancouver since before the war.

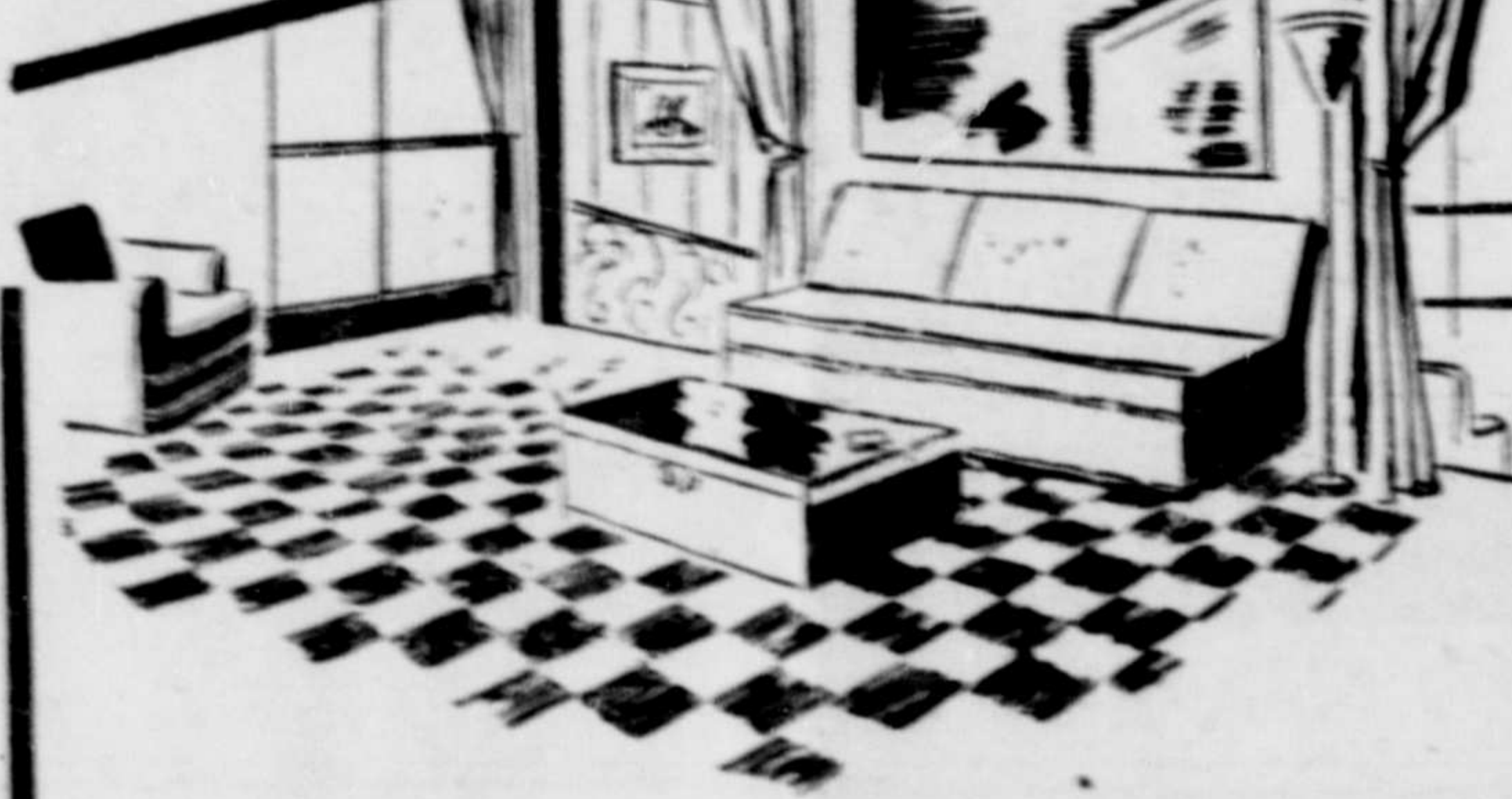
