Dark Monday For Britain

Not Lightened By New and Heavy Snowfall-Country Faces Food Disaster

DEBATED TONIGHT LONDON (During a critical debate in Parliament today, forced by the Opposition after the government would have postponed it until tomorrow, Prime Minister Clement Attlee told Commons that he could not forecast how long Britain's coal and power crisis would last. Attlee did not minimize the gravity of the situation. "If we are to main-tain essential services, there ARE REDUCED tain essential services, there must be drastic restrictions of consumption of electricity by the general public," he declared.

Mr. Attlee was challenged by former Prime Minister Winston Churchill, Conservative leader, and Anthony Eden. Churchill, criticizing the lack of warning given Parliament before steps were taken to cut all the electricity, asked Attlee why the decision had been reached so late. He joined the prime minister in asking for public co-operation.

There were cries of "Resign" as Emmanuel Shinwell, fuel minister, spoke, saying that, if the people would co-operate for the next four or five days, the country would get through.

PARIS—The peace treaties with Italy, Rumania, Bulgaria Hungary and Finland, Axis satellites, were signed today. There were formal protests at the terms but the treaties were signed nevertheless.

Italy, Hungary and Finland are shorn of territory. Rumania obtains Transylvania from Hungary.

A billion dollars worth of reparations are provided for. The conquered nations are prohibited the use of atomic energy, rockets, bombers, submarines and torpedo boats.

LREADY in an industrial crisis, there is no A doubt that the United Kingdom is heading rapidly for political showdown. Weather or not, when she has to close down her industries, discontinue her exports upon which she depends for food and economic balance, the situation becomes serious. When people get cold and hungry, and there is no longer the war and immediate physical salvation as incentive, they become impatient—even long-suffering Britons.

It is not unduly critical or even in an unfriendly spirit to observe that the Labor government is running into serious difficulties. Nor is it because of any spirit of inimicability to suggest that the force of circumstances of a hard winter-which admittedly, of course, accentuates the situationis the sole cause of the rapidly deteriorating economic and political position. Members of the goverment themselves are frankly admitting the deterioration.

The experience of some countries in the past, on arriving at a situation of economic and political crisis such as the United Kingdom finds itself in today, has been to go to one extreme or another in political administration — fascism or communism. However, there is little likelihood of steadygoing Britons, no matter how hard hit they may be, doing that.

Unless conditions improve unexpectedly and rapidly, the present Labor government will, it appears almost certain, be overthrown on some issue or other-either domestic or international. The probably is that solution and relief will then be found again, as it has been in the past, in some form of national administration with all reasonable elements combining in the face of emergency.

Military Service

NIVERSAL compulsory military service under any scheme of immigration is advocated as the key to rapid assimilation of newcomers seeking to make Canada their home, in an autobiography by the late Maj .-Gen. William A. Griesbach, noted soldier and legislator of Edmonton. It was he, who a few days after outbreak of war in 1939 urged immediate conscription in Canada and the despatch of an expeditionary force as soon as it could be trained and properly equip-

The book, "I Remember," (Ryerson Press), is a graphic, witty narrative by a Westerner who lived through the frentier skirmishes of the North-West and served with distinction through three wars.

Variously, mayor of Edmonton, member of the House of Commons, the Senate and commander of the 1st Canadian Brigade in the First World War, General Griesbach was recalled from retirement in 1940 to become inspector-general of active force units in Western Canada, a post he held until ill health forced him out in 1943. The reminiscences he embarked upon in his book were cut short by death in January, 1945, before he had set down recollections of an eventual career during the last two wars.

Canada's best immigrants, he says, are Norwegians, Dutch and Danes, who come from small countries, learn English easily and are fully prepared for constitutional, democratic government. The German probably has it in him to be the best settler of all, but it is not until the third generation that he acquires loyalty and can be fully trusted.

Educational Balance







"Bread For China" Day February 17

It will be the climax of the Canadian Aid to China campaign which has been in operation during January and February. During that time, all banks in the country have been receiving centres for contributions to the fund.

"I am expecting more information this week but, from the information I have, I understand that churches in the province are using the 'Bread for China' theme as the basis for sermons on February 16." Mr. Applewhaite said.






