## THE AIR BASE

T IS SATISFACTORY TO KNOW from an official of the Department of Transport who is here in connection with the disposition of the Seal Cove air base which is now in the hands of the Department of Transport and the War Assets Corporation that the intention of the Department of Transport is to retain intact sufficient of the facilities to ensure the maintenance of a permanent air station here for the use and convenience of aircraft operating in commercial and civilian flying on the coast. The hope of the Department is that the city or private interests will eventually take over but, meantime, it will be held by the Department so that it may be available for flying and servicing purposes here.

While there may be some issue as to whether the air base should be publicly or privately operated, the important thing is that there should be adequate landing and servicing facilities maintained at Prince Rupert. The government appreciates the importance of this in withholding the whole establishment from immediate disposal by War Assets. Meantime, the city will have to make up its mind as to what, if anything, it desires or is able to do in keeping the facilities permanently in public control. Failing that, other interestseither commercial aviation concerns or servicing companies-might assume control.

Total betting during the day was \$300,000 higher than the previous year.

Cricket is the most popular summer game in New Zealand. There is almost as much interest in England-Australia cricket tests as there is in the two countries chiefly concerned. Although their size is still greatly restricted, newspapers all carry at least two full columns each day on the tests, including long commentaries by former cricket

Yachting has had a notable revival with the recommissioning of many boats that were laid up during the war. Dozens of excellent harbors and hundreds of sheltered inlets around the coast offer fine cruising grounds. Races are held for all classes from large oceangoing yachts to small sailing dinghies.

Boxing, dirt-track motocycle and midget car racing, and cycle racing are all booming. Lawn bowling is by far the most popular sport with older men in the Dominion. A large number of greens are in use both winter and summer in all cities and towns and the numbers playing are steadily increasing. Golf in New Zealand is chiefly a winter sport as the links get too hard and fast in summer. However, some enthusiasts play the year
