# Sucession Talk

FORT WILLIAM, whose Liberals have instituted a move for secession from grasping Toronto and the effete southeastern part of Ontario by whom that part of the province feels it has been selfishly controlled quite long enough, no doubt feels itself in a position just like Prince Rupert and this part of British Columbia has ofttimes felt with respect to Vancouver and the southwestern corner of this province.

Secession of Fort William, Port Arthur and that part of Ontario north and west of Lake Superior, rich basket of natural resources, particularly in timber and minerals, may never come but it is an effective means of protest against exploitation.

In this area there have been occasions when we too have talked this way in the past but, fortunately, of recent years there seems to have been a change of attitude on the part of Vancouver in regard to us. At least there are professions of friendship and readiness to assist. Of course, there may still be exploitation too but it is a quarter of a century since we last heard real talk of secession from the rest of British Columbia.



A verdict of "accidental deat with no blame attached to anyone" was brought in by a corenner's jury which Friday afternoon probed the death of William R. Cranston of Vancouver who fell from the C.N.R. wharf Thursday night. Cause of death, based on medical testimony, was given as "concussion, shock and absorption of water."

Cranston, 35-year old district sales manager for Ford Motor Co., succumbed in Prince Rupert General Hospital about 3 a.m. Friday, the jury found. Evidence indicated that he must have struck his head on the bumper fender on the lower part of the vessel Prince Rupert which was moored alongside when he fell. Time of the accident was set at between 11 o'clock and 11:15 Thursday night.

The jury recommended "that suitable precautions be taken by the proper authorities to prevent, as far as possible, similar accidents." The verdict rider commended "all persons concerned at the promotand efficient manner in which the rescue work was conducted and at the medical and hospital attention given." Eye-witness testimony set the

distance of Cranston's fall from the wharf to the water as between 16 and 22 feet. The victim was returned to the wharf, unconscious, in a matter of minutes after he had fallen. He received preliminary medical attention from Dr. L. W. Kergin and was taken to hospital in the city ambulance.

The accident occurred just as the steamer Prince Rupert was preparing to sail for Vancouver. Dr. Kergin told the court that

the only sign of injury on the body was a two-inch cut on the back of the head, made by a glancing blow. He attributed death to shock, possible concussion and pulmonary anemia, the latter a swelling of the lung tissue induced by the entrance of foreign matter, probably salt

Rescue efforts were described by James Sowter, second mate n the government lighthouse tender Alberni, and by Eric Berner, C.N.R. freight checker, both of whom assisted.

Sowter said that life preserver ines were thrown from the boat and the dock and that he climb ed down one line to the guard fender of the boat. He made a slip-knot in one of the heaving
