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## C.C.F. Leader Says Party Losing Support

### First Certificate Of Citizenship Is Issued Here

First certificate of Canadian citizenship to be issued in Prince Rupert since the new citizenship laws were put into effect on January 1 was granted this morning by Judge W. E. Fisher to John Christen, former dry dock and construction worker.

Mr. Christen received the document along with the congratulations of Judge Fisher during a brief session of County Court this morning. Although he actually is not the first to be formally granted citizenship here, Mr. Christen is the first to receive the certificate.

Mr. Christen told a reporter that his certificate is of the \$5 variety, applied for before the price was reduced to \$1. It bears the signatures of Secretary of State Colin Gibson, and Judge Fisher.

A coroner's jury which Saturday concluded an inquest at Bella Bella into the death of infant Ronald Paul Brown, who was killed at Bella Bella on April 11, returned a verdict that the child had met his death by "murder at the hands of William Jefferson Brown," his father.

The inquest into the death of the father, who killed himself with a gunshot after murdering his son and attempting to murder his wife, is continuing. The inquests were conducted by Coroner W. H. Hill of Ocean Falls.



## Cameron Says Winch Is Overly Cautious

### Is Failing to Achieve Revolutionary Purposes of Socialist Movement

VANCOUVER (CP)—Colin Cameron of Comox, re-elected provincial president of the British Columbia-Yukon section of the Co-operative Commonwealth Federation by acclamation at the party's fourteenth annual convention here Sunday, told delegates that the C.C.F. is losing the support of young people in British Columbia because the party is "too cautious."

He claimed that Opposition Leader Harold Winch in the British Columbia Legislature was "too cautious in facing current risks. He faces a greater risk in failing to achieve the revolutionary purposes of the Socialist movement." Members of the new executive include C. Thomas of Prince George.

### AT YARROW YARDS

VICTORIA—Three hundred members of the American Federation of Labor went through C.C.L. picket lines to report for work today. All departments of the yard were working today, including the machine shop, which was closed Saturday, but work has been slowed down, Clarence Wallace said. The accused was charged with shooting with intent to kill Lawrence Kylling, a tie hacker at Topley. Williams was committed for trial at the next Assizes in Prince Rupert.

Magistrate Harvey Davies of Smithers presided, the defence being represented by Indian Agent Boys of Hazelton. The prosecution was handled by Sergeant J. Henry of Smithers. Constable R. W. Strouts of Burns Lake, who had handled the investigation, gave evidence which placed the accused near the scene of the alleged crime about the time it was committed.

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## What Is Money?

WHAT IS MONEY? That may sound like a silly question but it is doubtful if the average individual can answer it, except in a superficial way by saying that it is made up of coins and bills stamped by public authority for use as a medium of exchange. But it is possible to have an abundance of such coins and bills and at the same time have very little real money for their value depends solely upon the amount of things we can procure in exchange.

There is such a thing as too much money. For instance, never has the private sector of the economy in Great Britain been more solvent financially, and more hard up in real terms. Most farmers are out of debt, industrial concerns have large reserves, the banks are highly liquid, and many families have substantial holdings in certificates, post office savings and other encashable investments. There is a \$400,000,000 unemployment insurance fund. These reserves may impart a comforting sense of security but what other solace do they provide in the prevailing austerity? With all this money saved up for a rainy day Britons have been freezing and paralyzed because they did not save up enough fuel.

What is true of coal is true of everything else. The doctrine that full employment can be achieved and smoothly maintained by an adequate supply of purchasing power has failed at the first test and it can go on the shelf with its fellow-delusion that the problem of production has been solved.

So while the government mints coins and prints bills, the value of such currency is dependent upon industrial enterprise, the productivity and the costs of labor and all services—including government services, for which taxes have to be paid. In other words, a nation's real wealth consists of an untrammelled and profitable industrial enterprise which builds up a capital structure which in turn depends upon the reasonable co-operation of labor in keeping down the costs of production.

If labor were to take away in wages all the profits of industry and give a minimum of work in return, the purchasing power of money would decline, and industrial enterprise would die for lack of capital. Moreover there would be no reserves to draw upon for future emergencies or even to meet the various claims of social security.

## PUTTING SOCIALISM OVER

THE Co-operative Commonwealth Federation had its conception in depression, flourished on discontent during the hard times of the thirties and took advantage of the prosperity which most people enjoyed during the war years to spread and develop its doctrines. While believers in other political and economic theories were smugly and complacently inactive, the C.C.F. kept consistently on with its missionary work. Now, at its British Columbia-Yukon conference in Vancouver, presuming that it will come into power at the next provincial election in British Columbia, it is telling what it intends to do when it assumes office. It suggests that, meantime, the country is running into an economic crisis and that a depression is due which will make that of the early thirties look like a tea party. In other words, the C.C.F. is reverting to its typical form of blue ruin talk.

The C.C.F. advocates may not be insincere in their indoctrination but the question still arises if their visionary doctrines would stand up in this world of materialism and desire for personal freedom and the right to do and enjoy for one's self.



## PART OF THE WAY

WE LOOK AT BRITAIN and see where a Labor government, established by a government there which was a counterpart of our C.C.F., is going part way in the implementation of its policies—nationalizing the sources of wealth production and the public services—but not bold yet to go the rest of the way—by commandeering the means of operating those sources and services which means are the services of the people themselves. In other words, they are conscripting wealth but are hesitating about conscripting manpower and the result is that initiative, the exercise of which is vital to any system of personal freedom, is diminishing.

The situation is thereby arising whereby the production of Britain is languishing and the country is in imminent peril of economic ruin and losing her position of greatness in the world. The Labor government has done the easy things and now it faces the difficult and distasteful ones.

Continuation of Britain's greatness is the stake in the political experiment, the outcome of which the world today watches for with the deepest of interest.



**FIND ANCIENT GUNS AT CHURCHILL, MAN.**—A far cry from the modern artillery pieces presently undergoing trials at Fort Churchill is the above cannon which stands in front of the Hudson's Bay Post at Churchill, Man. Originally intended for use in the defence of York Factory, which lies about 150 miles southeast of Churchill, the gun was later brought to the new port. Other guns have been discovered in the muskeg near Fort Churchill including one of Danish origin. It is believed that these guns may have been used in the fighting around the old forts when the French were battling the Hudson's Bay Co. for control in that area about the beginning of the 18th century. ## N.H.A. HOME-OF-THE-MONTH




Previous N.H.A. Home-of-the-Month selections have been single family dwellings providing interesting ideas for Canadians intending to build their own homes with N.H.A. or private financing. Owing to several requests for suggestions for multiple accommodation in the rental field, a four-family dwelling of a type common in Montreal and district has been chosen for this month. Adaptable to duplex or row housing, it is suitable for construction in other parts of the country. Working drawings and cost estimates for a dwelling of this type should be obtained from a local architect.

Rental housing projects may be financed by property owners or builders under Section II of the National Housing Act which provides for loans on a basis of joint participation by Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation and an approved lending institution. All negotiations are conducted through the lending institution selected by the borrower.

The living room and bedrooms of each unit in this four-family plan are slightly above minimum size while the kitchen is unusually large for "apartment" accommodation. The exterior balconies provide some space for outdoor living as well as an alternative means of access from each unit to the ground level and the basement. Exterior walls are wood frame with brick veneer on the lower half and stucco on the upper half. Either a flat roof or a pitch roof may be used.

The approximate cubic age of the four-family unit is 50,000 cubic feet. The sketch plan illustrates the ground floor and the second floor on the left and the right.



**CALLS ON WIVES TO AID BRITAIN**

LONDON—When people tell Lady Nathan she has a "big job" on her hands she invariably replies: "So has every other housewife."

She now is chairman of the influential London County Council—the second woman chairman in the council's history—but in addition to her 40-hour week of meetings and committees she is a housewife still, and proud of it.

"There is no more vital job in Britain today than the housewife's," she said in an interview.

"Britain's future depends as much on women as on men, for with men taking most of the production strain women must give them every ounce of support they can. They can do this by taking that little extra care of the worker—especially the worker—and by giving their children the kind of home that will mean so much to them in later life."

"They have to do this in spite of the strain that every British housewife has to endure these days."

As the wife of Lord Nathan, civil aviation minister, and the mother of a family, children and education are her particular interests. She urges more nursery schools, not only to release mothers who are needed in industry, but "to give children between three and four years the advantages of early school training."

Another of her ambitions is to see the "all-purpose" school established throughout London—a school housing all types of children, learning all kinds of subjects in separate departments under the same roof.

Lady Nathan also advocates play centres and recreation grounds and says she would like to see some of the sites of London's bombed buildings converted into parks and open spaces.

"There is no reason why in rebuilding London we should reproduce past errors. Now, through the war, we have a chance to make London a better and happier place in which to live. During my years as chairman I hope to see some progress toward creating a new London. And after that I shall still go on working for it."

Lady Nathan has an M.A. degree for mathematics and economics; has been a prominent member of the L.C.C. education committee for years and within a few days of Lord Nathan's election as M.P. for Wandsworth in 1937 she was elected to the L.C.C. for the same borough. She was elected chairman March 11.

## Norway Furnaces Largest In World

MOIRANA, Norway — What the builders say will be the world's largest electric pig-iron furnaces will be completed here in 1951. Three furnaces with a total capacity of 180,000 tons of iron a year each will employ generators producing 24,000 kilowatts.

## MARCH POLICE FINES ARE \$882

Almost Double January and February Combined

City police court fines during March were almost double the total for both January and February combined, according to the police report for last month which was considered by the civic police committee at the week-end.

Reason for the increase, according to police Sergeant L. A. N. Potterton, was a basketball tournament which brought some 700 district residents to the city for almost a week. During that time the court collected \$882 in fines, mostly from liquor violations.

Total police fines collected so far this year are \$1,430, of which \$318 was collected in February and \$230 in January. For the first three months of 1946, fine collections were \$2,670, of which \$1,103 was collected in March. Last month, there were 80 convicted cases in court, 49 of which concerned intoxication charges laid under the Indian Act, nine for supplying and three for possession of liquor, contrary to the Indian Act.

Monetary losses during the month from criminal code complaints totalled \$321 of which \$159 was recovered. This did not include the value of five bicycles stolen and later recovered. Most of the losses were based on the estimated values of small articles stolen.

## SAVED 3,000 BATHERS

SYDNEY, Australia — Australia's Surf Life-Saving Association volunteers rescued 3,000 swimmers a year. On one day last summer they pulled to safety 300 bathers who got into trouble in heavy surf.

## Actors Ask Inquiry Into Dressing Digs

LONDON — In 81 provincial theatres recently surveyed, 32 have dressing rooms below street levels, said John Keet in the British Actors' Equity Letter.

He added that in 22 theatres 45 per cent of the dressing rooms have no ventilation at all and 24 per cent of all the theatres have no running hot and cold water in the dressing rooms. "Equity," he said, "has submitted these and other facts to the home office committee of inquiry."


## LED SALLY ANN BAND 64 YEARS



## SHIPS AND WATERFRONT

Ready for Halibut Season  
Opening May 1—Two C.P.R.  
Liners in Port

With trolling boats heading away for the grounds this week, local waterfront servicing establishments are now concentrating on the halibut fleet which will now be engaged in finalizing preparations for the opening of their season on May 1. It is expected there will be about 70 halibut vessels again operating out of Prince Rupert this year and, as it has been since 1940, the various fleets will fish without lay-overs until the year's quotas are exhausted. Last year the fishing in Area No. 2, in which most of Prince Rupert vessels operate, lasted but 41 days. Business preparatory to the opening of the season, largely of routine nature, was dealt with at a meeting of the Deep Sea Fishermen's Union last week with President John Synes in the chair.

Two Canadian Pacific coastal vessels are arriving in port almost simultaneously this afternoon. The Princess Adelaide is due at 3:30 from Vancouver and will be here until 10 p.m. when
