CONSTRUCTION DURING MARCH TOTAL \$16,000

Increase in the value of building permits issued during March presaged a trend toward greater construction activity in the city although the total for the first three months this year is still considerably less than for the similar period of 1946.

The Civic Green Light

T WAS GOOD NEWS for the city that was received by the mayor late yesterday afternoon to the effect that Ottawa was sending a check for \$143,841 in payment of the claim for damage done to city streets during the war when Prince Rupert was used as a bastion of national defence. It is several thousand dollars less than the city had expected to receive on the accepted basis of settlement of one-half of the actual assessed damage but, nevertheless, news of the award was received with much satisfaction.

After all, the important thing is that the city has won in its campaign for reimbursement at least in substantial part for having been used so roughly in the course of the defence of the nation. It took a long time to achieve this highly desirable result and some rather strenuous campaigning since the first of this year. There was a good moral, if doubtful legal, claim and the city may consider ritself fortunate.

With this payment from the Dominion together with an equal amount to be put up by the city by means of a loan for which approval of the provincial Department of Municipal Affairs has already been assured, there will be a substantial fund with which the city can proceed with the carrying out of work, on streets particularly, which is so badly needed.

There will, of course, be no delay now in perfecting of the program and taking the steps to obtain the materials and complete the organization. There is now no longer the excuse of "no money" to explain further delay.

The city administration, which appears to have been showing renewed vigor of late, is to be congratulated on the success which has been achieved thus far. There had also been valuable co-operation from Mr. MacDonald, the minister of municipal affairs, and other organizations may also have been instrumental in bringing the matter to a successful culmination.

Now badly beaten Prince Kupert will be able to get ahead with its job of civic post-war rehabilitation, helping further to re-establish the stability and spirit of the community.

MONTREAL-CARTIER

THERE WAS NO SURPRISE in the result of the Montreal-Cartier federal by-election yesterday in which the Liberal candidate was elected by a substantial plurality to the seat made vacant by the reading out of Parliament of Fred Rose, the Labor-Progressive member, who was convicted on an espionage charge and sentenced to penitentiary. Montreal-Cartier is a traditionally Liberal seat and it was only by a fluke that it fell into the hands of the Communists. Its population in lower waterfront Montreal is one of the most cosmopolitan in the Dominion. It was only in a riding of such a kind that a Communist could by any circumstances have been elected. Evidently there has been a large change of heart since an anti-Communist candidate was the runner-up yesterday.

Although the winning party, of course, may be justified in feeling some satisfaction from the outcome, the contest, while of much interest, was of principal significance in its repudiation of communism.

NO RECESSION

ESPITE PREDICTIONS to the contrary, business will suffer no violent setback this year, says Dr. Jules Backman, associate professor of economics of New York University.

Any recession in the United States, he contends, will be very moderate and temporary in nature, but "if excessive wage increases are forced, additional price increases will be unavoidable in many important sectors of the economy, aggravating what is already a serious situation, namely, the high level of prices."

Otherwise, Dr. Backman predicts a high level of industrial production in 1947, the backlog of demand for consumers' goods remaining high, and consumer incomes kept at high record levels as a result of industrial activity.

While Canada, owing to its lower price levels due to controls during and since the war, is unlikely to experience drastic recessions such as many writers have predicted for the United States in the second half of 1947, it would be affected to some extent were a serious recession to take place in the United States, owing to the big trade between the two countries.

It is encouraging, therefore, to get the more optimistic views of such an outstanding economist as Dr. Backman, which are qualified only by the warning against the forcing up of wages and prices.



BUILDINGS FOR FLYING CLUB

Prince Rupert Flying Club has entered negotiations with War Assets Corporation and the Department of Transport for the purchase of the former R.C.A.F. officers' mess and quarters at Seal Cove for use as club headquarters, according to Secretary Earl Gordon.

Because the purpose of the club is to promote civilian flying, the members hope to be able to obtain those facilities on a nominal basis, leasing the ground and purchasing the building outright, Mr. Gordon said.

Recently, the club announced its intention to incorporate, a move which may make available to it a quantity of clubhouse furnishings and operational equipment which the air force has declared surplus.

"I have a long list of surplus" air force equipment which is to be made available to approved flying clubs and which covers just about everything the club would need, except an airplane," Mr. Gordon said. "That is one of the reasons we are incorporating—so we will be on the approved list."

The flying club plans to meet Wednesday night to discuss these developments and to lay plans for a membership drive.
