Seasonable Ideas for Housekeepers Spring's Own Vegetable - Asparagus Here Again and Much in Favor

welcomed is the return of those often served with a cheese and new inspiration to the weary vor. menu planner. Asparagus is undoubtedly the most popular veg-

etable of these spring foods. When purchasing asparagus the stalks should be green for almost their entire length. They closely compact. Branched tips indicate that the asparagus is too mature and may be tough and woody.

Asparagus wilts quickly and if allowed to stand for any length of time looses much of its delicate flavor. Break off the tough woody ends from the stalks and remove the scales since sand may collect under these and cause grittiness. Wash thoroughly and cook in boiling, salted water for 12 to 15 minutes. Save the cooking liquid and use making gravies, soups and

Many homemakers have difficulty cooking asparagus so that it will be tender without losing color and flavor. Too often when the stalks are cooked sufficiently, the tender, delicate tips lack flavor and are too soft to hold their shape.

To avoid overcooking, home economists offer a few suggestions. Cut the stalks in equal lengths and tie in bunches. Cook these in an upright position in a deep saucepan. The water Cook asparagus in boiling salted should come about half way to the tips which should be cooked dry ingredients and warm milk, by the steam alone. Cook asparagus only until tender, but not soft. It is better slightly undercooked than overcooked. After

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

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
