

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## Norwegian Independence

OMORROW is an important day for our good Norwegian friends who form a predominant part of the population of the city. It marks the 133rd anniversary of Norwegian Independence. Some Norwegian history, therefore, may be timely.

In the year 1812 the Swedish Crown Prince Karl Johan and the Russian Kaiser met at Aabo in Finland. Here they agreed that Crown Prince Karl 10:00—CBC News Johan should, with 30,000 men, take part in the war 10:10-B. C. News against Napoleon. After the war was won they would force the Danish King Frederick VI to cede Norway 10:30-Dal Richards Orch. to the Swedish King. The Great Powers of Europe at 11:00—Weather and Sign Off that time-England, Austria and Prussia-agreed.

The battle of Leipzig lasted for three days-Napoleon lost. Crown Prince Karl Johan lost no time. He attacked Denmark which could not stand up to such a force. Denmark was forced to surrender and at the city of Kiel the peace treaty was signed. Frederick VI had lost out. Norway now no longer belonged to Denmark.

The Norsemen did not like the idea that their country like ordinary property should be given away and 10:15-World Church News least of all to their old enemies, the Swedes, against whom they always so bravely had defended themslves. They were ready to fight for their liberty 10:55-Weather Forecast and for the independence of their country.

The general opinion among the people was that the time was now ripe to make Norway an independent country.

Christian Frederick, the closest heir to the Danish Throne, was made the Governor of Norway in May, Soothe 1813. The last part of January he travelled around the country—to gather opinions—to come in closer contact with the people. He soon found out the people were ready to do anything to gain their independence. One example from his travels—an old lady, with a lantern in her hand came up to him and said: "You LARGE ECONOMICAL Past-drying. No strong are handsome to look at-but you are too weak to become the Saviour of our country." (This proved to be a prophecy).

The Norwegians were itching for action. Now was the time, they felt, for their representatives to come together and to give Norway its constitution.

On February 16 Christian Frederick met the leaders of the country at Eidsvold. At this meeting he claimed to be the only man who had any right to rule the country. He met with opposition. The representatives as one told him they had had enough dictatorship-second King Frederick VI of Denmark relinquished all the rights for himself and family to Norway at Kiel-then the peace treaty between him and Crown Prince Karl Johan was signed.

Norway now had the right to make its own constitution—and to choose its own king.

Prince Christian Frederick knew that he was in the wrong and that the people were right-and he agreed upon ruling the country while the representatives of the people were making the constitution.

Norway never approved the peace treaty of Kiel. Monday, the day after Easter these representatives had their first meeting.

Their meetings were at times stormy—two parties were fighting each other-one for a union with Sweden. They were in the minority. The other party called the Independence Party had a hard and bitter fight to force the issue through. They knew they could not afford to lose any time. They had to complete the constitution and choose their king before Karl Johan and the Great Powers of Europe had time to intervene.

On May 17, 1914, Norway had its own constitution. They had only to elect a king. Prince Christian Frederick was elected King of Norway on the same date. The king and the law became one and the same

The words uttered by the President of the National Assembly, George Sverdrup, after the Royal election, express the idea of nationhood in a nutshell: "The old Throne of Norway from which her kings, Adelstener and the Sverer ruled with energy and wisdom, has been raised once more." Norway was now an independent country.

Unfortunately the Norwegian people were not able to maintain their newly acquired independence in face of the pressure brought to bear by the Great Powers of Europe and were forced after a short battle to enter into a union with Sweden.

The prophecy of the old woman came true. King Christian Frederick was too weak. He could not think of sacrificing too many lives-he sacrificed himself to enable the people to keep the constitution. It proved that even in the hour of defeat the new king proved to be the upholder of the Spirit of the neaim.

In one of the battles the king shouted when seeing some of his men dead on the battlefield: "My Godam I to blame for this?"

The answer of the people was: We are not complaining of losing too much blood-we are complaining of losing not enough, because the facts remain that Karl Johan was not so sure of winning the war and he did not any longer trust the Great Powers of Europe.


