Road Reopening Soon

IN SPITE of the heavy snows of the past winter, opinion of those who have just seen the situation in the lower Skeena Valley is that the Prince Rupert Highway might well be open again by the end of April, providing, of course, that something unforeseen does not occur. Now that the public works department is evidently undertaking to move out the snow westward from Shames, hope is expressed that snow-clearing operations from this end will be carried out with equal dispatch. Soft spring weather conditions are already aiding the department's snow clearing equipment.

Prince Rupert people are gratified with the prospect that the highway within the next few weeks will be open again and are hopeful that the department will be so organized before another winter rolls around that it will be all-year road with no winter interruption.

VISIT FROM PRESIDENT

being acted upon by city council and chamber of commerce that President Truman of the United States, in the course of a projected cruise to Alaska early this summer, be asked to make a call at Prince Rupert. The city would be highly honored if the invitation were accepted. It would be something really distinctive to have an incumbent chief executive of the United States make a call. Before the several visits to Canada of the late Franklin D. Roosevelt, such calls were very rare. It would be a highlight event indeed for this city.

There is good enough reason, of course, for Mr. Truman to come here. He would see the American sub-port of embarkation which played such an important part in connection with the prosecution of the recent war in the Pacific and which appears to be on the eve of assuming an important role in connection with the commerce of Alaska through being the transcontinental railway terminus so strategically situated in relation to the territory now aspiring to statehood. And, in addition to that, there is the attention, indicated by recent events, that United States capital and industry are paying to the development of natural resources in this area.

UNPRECEDENTED PURGE

THIS is no witch hunt but an impressively large scale purge that President Truman has ordered in the loyalty test of 2,200,000 employees of the administrative and executive branches of the American civil service. In fact, it is something quite unprecedented and would suggest that there is suspicion of infiltration and subversive activity within the very fibre of the government on scale of some substantial proportions.

It is significant that similar clean-ups appear to be under way in other countries such as Britain and Australia. All, it has been suggested, has been to some degree at least inspired by Canada's espionage disclosures of last year.

WORKING FOR GOVERNMENT

DRINGE GEORGE CITIZEN carries an interesting editorial about a small business man who found that he had to spend so much time meeting with government requirements in connection with carrying on the business that he came to the conclusion he better get out of business and rustle himself a government job.

The Citizen enumerates no less than 20 timerequiring jobs of nuisance work that the exasperated business man had to do for the government before he could get around to do something towards carrying on his own work. There were the jobs in connection with federal, provincial and municipal licensing, the Prices and Trade Board, the Labor Board, the income tax, the unemployment insurance, the sales tax, the Workmen's Compensation Board, the Minimum Wage Act, the Hours of Work Act.

There were what were mentioned for this particular small business. Other small businesses have such other requirements to meet as the returns for the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, the provincial and federal surveys of manpower, wages, equipment, costs of doing business, capital, etc.

No wonder we cry in exasperation for relief from all these things which are just as much a charge and a brake on business enterprise and initiative although possibly not quite as apparent as our almost confiscatory income and excess profits taxes have been.





350 CASES OF

Prince Rupert hac, 350 reported cases of communicable diseases during 1946, according to the annual report of the Prince Rupert Health United issued recently by former Sanitarian and Health Unit Secretary M. Hamper. Leading the list was gonorrhea, of which there were 175 reported cases, while chick empox was second with 131 reported cases.

A listing of the reported cases of communicable diseases showed 131 cases of chickenpox, 14 cases of measles, one of typhoid two of whooping cough and one of salmonellosis, a foodborne disease which was contracted in Vancouver.

Reported venereal disease cases totalled 201. 175 of which were gonorrhea and 26 syphilis.

The unit's immunization report showed that during the year 1.129 immunizations were comagainst communicable diseases-diphtheria, 101; smallpox, 826; whooping cough, 84; scarlet fever, 14: typhoid and tetanus, 4. Laboratory tests done by Dr. R. C. Coleman of the Prince Rupert General Hospital in behalf of the Health Unit totalled 2,785.

Clearing

Provincial public works snow plowing equipment, having opened the road from Terrace to Shames River bridge, is now driving westward towards Shames station, a distance of two miles, where it will join up with a further two-mile road clearing which Len Griffiths has made by bulldozer from his sawmill to Shames. The snow clearing will then continue westward through to Tyee and prob-7:30-Leicester Square to Old ably on to Prince Rupert.

Will Robinson, in the city yesterday from Terrace, told the Daily News of the snow clearing work. A rotary plow is being used to drive through the centre of the road, being followed by the bulldozer which shoves off to the side. The snow is hard. packed, holding down progress to three or four miles a day.

Mild spring weather and rains have been reducing the deptn of the snow rapidly. Mr. Robinson measured a depth of 57 inches near Shames last Wednesday and by Friday it was down to 46 inches.

Around Exstew there are some stretches of the highway where there is not much snow and progress should be faster there. West of Kwinitsa there are also spots with little snow although right around Kwinitsa there is about five feet.

Apparently, there is not yet, at least, a big pile up of snow at the outside of the Kwinitsa tunnel, scene of last year's long blockade, but there is, of course, the possibility of slide there dur ing the thaw.

The Terrace jurisdiction over the highway comes as far west as Tyee and from there on in the Prince Rupert public works office is in charge. The road is now open from this end as far as Rainbow Lake.
