Between Russians and Western Powers At Moscow Widens

MOSCOW (CP)-Absolute deadlock gripped the foreign ministers' council today on Anglo-American proposals to revise Poland's western frontier in favor of Germany. Indications were that stalemate would extend to the whole German boundary question.

General view among western powers is that failure to agree on Germany's eastern border will serve to stymie settlement of any boundary

The situation merely adds up to one more basic split in the widening chasm of disagreement between the Russians and the western powers.

AND TEXAS GET BRUNT

CANADIAN, Texas (CP)—One town of 5,426 persons was to large extent levelled by a sudden tornado which brought death to at least 109 persons and destruction last night to south central United States.

Telephone and telegraph lines being blown down made it difficult to obtain early estimates of what appeared to have been a heavy toll.

The devastating wind concentrated on the panhandle of Texas and northwestern Oklahoma. It ripped through five counties and played worst havoc in four towns. In addition to the dead, at least another thousand persons were believed injured in the wake of the sudden blast of wind.

Hardest hit community was Woodward, Oklahoma, where seventy-two persons are known to be dead. About one-third of the town was flattened by the

Twenty persons are estimated dead at Glazier, a village of 200 population in Texas, and another twenty persons died at Higgins where at least 150 were injured. Rubble blocked all traffic and only ambulances were permitted

to travel. The American Red Cross rush-253/4 ed doctors, nurses, blood plasma,

181/2 bedding and food to the scene. The tornado first hit White Deer, Texas, injuring three persons, blowing a house from its foundations, wrecking a garage and derailing twenty-one cars 721/2 of a moving freight train.

The tornado was sighted at Pampa and Miami, as it moved northeastward along the Santa Fe Railroad line.

It skirted Canadian and struck at Glazier with full fury. After striking Higgins it moved into Oklahoma, missing Shattuck and hitting Woodward and Gage.
