Housing accommodation increases are to become effective upon expiration of the present lease. Mr. Abbott said that the two-year lease renewal and 10 per cent increase will not apply to houses built since January 1, 1944. This also includes dwellings created by structural conversion since that date, because rentals on such dwellings have been fixed at higher levels relative to costs of labor and materials.

If the landlord is not prepar. ed to offer the tenant a twoyear renewal of the lease, the tenant may remain in occupancy after the expiration of his current lease as a tenant from month to month at the previous rental ceiling and will continue at the same time to enjoy protection from eviction.

Then tenant has 30 days in which to make up his mind whether he wants to accept the landlord's offer. If he does not accept it, it acts as notice to vacate at the end of the lease, subject to provincial law.

If the tenant accepts, the twoyear renewal lease may be terminated by the tenant at any time on 30 days' notice but i is binding on the landlord for the full two-year term.

Why Not Prince Rupert

\\/!TH maritime observers predicting that Can-VV ada's deep water ports on both Atlantic and Pacific coasts are due this year for a shipping volume that will exceed anything previously recorded, it is quite incomprehensible that Prince Rupert, a port so strategically located, so completely equipped and so anxious to be advantageously utilized, should continue to go idle.

The Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce has been making continuous effort to keep the case of the port before the attention of the authorities that could do something to promote its use. In the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, the support of Western Canada, even Vancouver, has been won in the representations that have been made with a view to developing traffic through the port.

There has been a sort of evasive expression of sympathy every time the question of using the port of Prince Rupert has been brought before the federal departments which could, if they would, be of invaluable assistance in promoting the port. Cabinet ministers, directly interested, come and go but never a one can find time to visit Prince Rupert. The latest snub is from no less a vitally concerned minister than Mr. Claxton, head of the Department of National Defence, the plans of which department, in the changing scene of international relations, are focussed these days in the north. The furthest north he can get on the Pacific coast, however, is a few miles from the United States border.

We are not unappreciative of anything that is done for us by Ottawa and we think we have amply demonstrated our thankfulness for everything we have received but we cannot help but become impatient and irked when we hear of the big and eveloping maritime traffic through the ports of Canada and see our own great port in continuing idleness. It is difficult for us to understand.

NO TIME FOR NEGLIGENCE

AS THE British Columbia Cancer Foundation, A the B. C. branch of the Canadian Cancer Society and the Prince Rupert branch prepare to open their second annual campaign against Canada's No. 2 killer, we are again reminded that the appalling toll exacted by this disease could be virtually halved if citizens would take simple precautions to catch it in its incipient stages.

Medical science has progressed to the point at 11:31-Message Period which this scourge can be arrested before it has been able to establish a firm hold. As far as the individual is concerned, his or her opportunity to avoid becoming a fatal victim rests frequently in an annual medical examination. Such a precaution -is little enough to expect from a public only too familiar with the ravages which may follow negligence.

Statistics emphasize the importance of taking every safeguard. In this province alone approximately 1,300 die annually from the disease. Furthermore, on the basis of past records, one Canadian in eight can expect to die from this malignancy unless its inroads into health are checked.

Fear of the disease provides no protection against it. Common sense dictates a course recommended by those who have made a study of cancer. Certain reasonably reliable symptoms are known. On their appearance, medical diagnosis should be sought without delay.

The crusade against cancer is everyone's business. The campaign progresses with expanding enlightenment.





things generally at the front, satisfactorily. the bigger things at the bottom. For tiny things like French marigolds, allow about 10 inches between, and for the biggest things like cosmos, full size zinnias, etc., two and a half to three feet is not too much room. Where one has only a small piece of ground available, closer planting is advised in order to get more bloom.

MOST FOR SPACE

Where the vegetable garden is small, big growing things like peas, potatoes and other large vegetables create a problem. Unlike lettuce, spinach, beets, carrots, beans, etc., which can be fitted into rows, only 12 to 15 inches apart, these others take up twice or more than that room. Potatoes need from 18 inches to two feet between hills for plants. For enough green peas for a meal from each picking, 30 feet of row, and preferably 50, will be necessary.

Gardeners with a plot 20 feet or so each way usually decide, after some experience, to abandon potato growing. The other hree vegetables mentioned, nowever, should not be given up without more consideration.


