Inexperienced with marine engines, Mr. Joyce was unable to get the Audrey W. moving until two hours after the rowboat had overturned.

"He was guided to the drifting rowboat with its exhausted victims by their cries in the darkness. All admitted that they would not have been able to hang on much longer.

"The rowboat capsized when a sudden squall raised high waves. The two boys disappeared when the boat upset. Mr. Langille and Cpl. Baker dived into the dark water repeatedly before they were able to find the two boys and bring them to the surface. The rough water made it almost impossible to hang onto the capsized boat.

OLD SECESSION STORY IS SHARPLY DENIED BY FORMER PRIME MINISTER

SYDNEY, Australia (P-Sharp denial was made here today by Rt. Hon. William Morris Hughes, Australia's Prime Minister in 1921, of a statement reported to have been made by Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler, president emeritus of Columbia University at New York, that Australia, Canada, New Zealand and India had threatened to withdraw from the British Empire in 1921 unless given greater independence. There was not a word of truth in the Butler report which Hughes dubbed a "fantastic tale."

Dr. Butler was reported to have disclosed in New York today what he said were the first details of an historic meeting in the summer 1921 when the withdrawal was threatened. He said that the parley was held at Chequers, the summer residence of the then British Prime Minister, the late Rt. Hon. David Lloyd George.

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North Lies Prince Rupert

PELIVERING AN ADDRESS in Vancouver yes-I terday on the subject of transportation in the course of which he dealt with many phases of transport in this Dominion, Hon. Lionel Chevrier, federal minister of transport, was careful not to be any too commital in regard to specific transportation channels. Nevertheless he must be fully cognizant of the Prince Rupert channel as well as that to Vancouver. He told how, during the war, action was taken "to ensure the most efficient and best possible use of transportation equipment and facilities of the country" and it is an old story now of the great use that was made of Prince Rupert in war's emergency. Mr. Chevrier suggested that the policy was to project into peacetime the same efficiencies that existed in war. It is logical to assume then that Prince Rupert will receive its due consideration.

Possibly, Mr. Chevrier became impressed while in Vancouver with the bottleneck that is developing economically at that port. He was invited to Prince Rupert to discuss the fuller utilization of transportation facilities in this quarter but, un-

fortunately, could not come. It is significant enough that Mr. Chevrier, during that Vancouver speech, observed: "The signs in our country that pointed to fortune once read: 'Go West, young man!' but now they read: 'Go North!" Mr. Chevrier was speaking in the extreme southwest corner of Canada. Northwest lies the great and unused port of Prince Rupert the minister knows if he did not say. In the transport of the resources and trade of northern Canada which Mr. Chevrier conceded was the next step in the economic development of Canada, Prince Rupert must play a great part. The minister is in a key spot to see that due and fitting attention is given to the port of Prince Rupert which loomed so large in the national transportation policy of the illustrious Sir Wilfrid Laurier whom he quoted as saying that "the railway found Canada scarcely a geographic expression and made it a nation." Canada's nationhood will not be completely developed until Sir Wilfrid's plans for the utilization of this port and railway is fully effected by his successors including Mr. Chevrier.
