Anglo-Soviet treaty of 1942 since Marshal Stalin had pointed out parts which he considered outdated. Only a four-power agreement, Mr. Bevin said, will make it possible to curb Germany and re-educate her in the ways of democracy.

"There is no other way," Mr. .231/2 Bevin declared but he added that Britain "should not expect too much from us at Moscow because we have terrific difficulties to face." He said he was not sure that Germany knew the real meaning of defeat and recognized the stupidity of war as an object of policy.

Bevin said he had grave concern in the matter of repatrations but "after this war one had to consider the feelings of the countries invaded." He referred to the war sufferings and demands of Russia, YugoSlavia, Greece and Ethiopia. He declared that great wrong had been done by putting so many Slavs under Italian rule when negotiations for Italy's entry into the First World War were under way.

Two other policemen captured Green and, when he tried to escape, they shot him dead.

Anscomb's Budget

F the spirit of old John Oliver hovers around the Legislative Assembly what a shock he must have had when Hon. Herbert Anscomb brought down his budget yesterday disclosing an estimated revenue of around \$59,000,000.

Well do we remember the consternation and alarm felt and shown by the late Premier John Oliver about 25 years ago when the budget came close to \$20,000,000. That grand old man feared then the Province was headed for bankruptcy with what seemed in those days a tremendous sum to be collected from the tax-payers and expended by the government.

Now, without blinking an eye, the former critic of governmental expenditures when sitting as a member of the Conservative opposition, Mr. Anscomb, brings down his estimates of expenditures to the tune of \$58,781,334.

But we do not think there is any cause for alarm. Our population and production have increased tremendously. Expansion of social services, pensions, education, health, forestry and public works has been going on year by year and must continue to do so if we are to maintain a high standard of these services.

Fortunately our production of wealth both from natural resources and secondary and subsidiary industries has grown well ahead of governmental services and expenditures.

The increased grant from the Dominion Government under the recent Dominion - Provincia! agreement will of course add many millions to the revenues compared to last and preceding years.

According to statistics recently released at Ottawa the national income for 1946 was around \$91/ billions, only half a billion under the peak of the war years. It is safe to assume that the share of the national income in British Columbia is around the billion-dollar mark. It is further estimated that the gross national product in Canada last year was over \$11,000,000,000.

Gross national products includes taxes and depreciation not included the national income figure.

Assuming, therefore, that British Columbia's share of the national product is over a billion dollars, which in our opinion it must be though actual figures have not yet been received, the governmental expenditures of narly \$60 million is not at all out of line with the production and income in the Province.

We do not think there is anything to be fearful

of in these estimates.

In modern society it is essential that the State assume a considerable responsibility for the redistribution of the income wealth of its community. By no means does that imply a Socialist State but tather an enlightened State that leaves enterprise to function in the productive field but sees to it that sufficient is withdrawn by taxation, without unduly penalizing industry and thrift, to ensure that members of the community shall receive those services that can only be supplied by the community's own organization, which is the State, comprised of the executive government who are part of the elected representatives of the communities forming that State.

Whether or not revenues and expenditures will continue to rise in the immediate future yars is too much for us to prophesy. But it is certain, that if capitalism is to function at its best and for the good of all, there must be an expanding economy in these post-war years.

And if we do have an expanding economy it is reasonable to assume that governmental income and expenditure will parallel that expansion.

The Coalition government may not move as fast as some would have it do. But we believe the government has moved steadily and progressively forward, meeting new demands as fast as possible.

A budget of nearly \$60 millions indicates the forward movements in almost every government department.

One encouraging sign is that the municipalities and education are to receive a goodly share of the increased expenditures.

From reports it appears thousands of Canadian boxcars are in the United States, adding to the difficulties of the railways. We do not think carping criticism of the railways is justifiable. Weather conditions, the steel strike and the pressing demand for grain overseas have created a bad condition for which none was prepared. Something similar to this has happened in England with a coal shortage occurring just at the time weather conditions were the worst in 100 years.





Widow of Stony Indian Chief Is 'Dead at 104

HIGH RIVER, Atala. (1) -Louise Bearpaw, 104, who once roped buffalo calves is dead. She was the widow of the late Chief Moses Bearspaw of the Stony Indians.

News of her death was conveyed in a letter written by her grandson, King Bearspaw, who braved many miles of snowblocked trails to reach the post office at Pekisko near where the Duke of Windsor's ranch is situ-

Fort Edmonton, near Edmonton, and Rocky Mountain House, 100 miles southwest of Edmonton, and she used to recall the Red River jig dancing at the lodges in those days.

The aged woman had many stories of buffalo hunting and of her own skill in the hunt. She told of how she had thrown her raw-hide loop over husky buffalo calves and then finished them off with her little axe.

Many traditions of the tribe were handed down in tales told by Louise to her five sons and five daughters, 23 grandchildren, 56 great-grandchildren and 15 great-great-granchildren.

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FINDS COYOTES GOOD TARGETS

Animals Pay Dividends At Ten Dollars a Pelt

REGINA (Canada's pioneer air hunter is an American.

He is George Sands, 46-yearold Havre, Mont., rancher who has harried prairie coyotes for the last three winters and practically single-handed decimated the wolves of his own state in the five years before that from his single-engine plane.

Sands is air-gunning these days along with one of his ranch southwest corner of Saskatcheserve on prairie wolves allocated by the Saskatchewan government after posting a bond.

A pilot for the last 20 years, Sands tours into the area at the controls of the small, two-seater plane with Hammer beside him, an automatic shotgun with heavy shot handy, also keeping an eye peeled for lean, fawncolored animals.

This is business for even now with coyote skin prices the lowest they have been in years, they clear \$10 on each pelt. In previous winters—Sands hunted by air in Alberta for three winters before moving into Saskatchewan last fall-he received about \$25 a pelt and bagged between 300 and 400 pelts a season.

When a coyote is spotted, the plane swoops even lower on the attack and Hammer gets in his shot as Sands manoeuvres the plane. When the animal is killed, the plane skims in on its skis beside it. 
