

Support Chamber of Commerce

DRINCE RUPERT, for many years if ever at all, has not had the proper attitude towards its Chamber of Commerce. Possibly, the Chamber itself has been in a measure to blame if it has come to be regarded somewhat as a clique of business and professional men who, while carrying on a good and useful work through the years, have not been particularly active in the way of enrolling members. Nevertheless, the group, while not large in numbers, has been maintaining the leadership in keeping the spotlight on affairs of importance to the general development of the city and making representations which have often brought gratifying results. It has been on the job and doing a work that has been receiving little general appreciation because it has been going on so quietly and unobstrusively.

With Prince Rupert now entering on a new era of development and expansion, the Chamber of Commerce will have an increasing part to play and will have more jobs to do requiring both financial support and energetic work. It will, therefore, be fitting that the membership of the Chamber should be expanded until it includes every business man and organization in the city. The Chamber will also be entitled to expect generous financial support from the people as a whole which should come in the way of civic grant.

The fact of the matter is that the Chamber of Commerce has been hamstrung in the past by the disinterest of many business men thinking only of their own affairs and by lack of financial support as a result of which its work and efforts have been restricted. It has been unable to carry on functions which it could and would have done.

Considering the handicaps under which it has operated, the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce has carried on a good and useful work. Now the time has come when it should broaden the scope of its activities and to do that it will require the support of the business men generally and the citizens generally.

Mr. Awbery's reply to the question whether accredited representatives of foreign governments in London would be allowed to see these documents was "they will be loaned by the Ministry of Supply to responsible scientific workers who wil be allowed to take them awa for study purposes."

The government's decision allow these documents to be released followed requests for their publication from Prof. J. D. Co kroft, Director of the Gover ment Atom Research Station Harwell, Berkshire.

The documents were viewe at the Ministry of Supply' heavily-guarded atomic development section in the 10-story Shell Mex house building on the Thames Embankment, 'The atom research workers are completely isolated from the rest of the occupants of the building. The walls of their department have been reinforced by heavy iron bars and the only entrances are through steel grilles guarded by uniformed police.


