The reparations money, granted to compensate for wartime military damage to streets and sewers, is to be put to use as soon as possible but it will require a considerable amount of planning before the project can be properly started.

"Decisions on this matter rest with the Board of Works and City Council," she said, "But it is my personal opinion that the city can do no more than continue its present street maintenance work until the major rehabililitation project is developed. This will entail a tremendous amount of preliminary planning."

Mayor Arnold said she would be in favor of bringing in expert technical advice for the project. She was non-committal as to whether the city should do the work itself or have it done on contract.

We Have Improved

MIGHT WELL take a little time out to consider, in spite of disappointments and dissatisfactions we may have unduly accentuated in our thoughts, some of the improvements and advances we have made-how much better a city Prince Rupert is today than it was, say, ten years ago.

Listing a few of the improvements that come to mind, let us remind ourselves of our fine federal building compared with the old ramshackle structure, our splendid hospital recently augmented by the military wing building, our super civic centre.

Along the waterfront, in addition to the great war-produced shipping and servicing installations, the completely modernized dry dock, we may not realize off-hand the very great improvements which have been made in the handling and processing facilities for our main primary industry-the fisheries.

We may have suffered a few losses but they have been far overweighed by the gains so we can say that, in spite of some continuing vicissitudes, we have come a long way.

Possibly, from a civic standpoint, conditions may not have kept pace but, with substantial new finances now forthcoming, we can expect to see some real improvements in that sphere. Our streets" and sidewalks may be presentable again before long. It may be possible to get around to the renovating of sewers and waterworks. We may even be able to get the garbage cans into the backyards

And, of course, we shall have to do something about our school buildings.

Meantime, we can say that, while we shall be going ahead must faster in the near future, we have not been going behind by any means in the immediate past.

RAILWAY'S BEAUTIFIES

T IS VERY SATISFYING to note the work being currently carried out by the railway company in the way of beautifying its park property grounds. As a result of the clearing and cleaning they are doing these bright spring days, the pre-gardening work that is going on, the coming summer will see a restoration of the pre-war beauty and attractiveness. The old military and industrial shacks will be a thing of the past, there will be only the verdure-covered scars of the old gun emplacements and such things. The city and the citizens might well follow the good example being set by the railway in making Prince Rupert interesting, colorful and attractive not only for the delight and satisfaction of ourselves but for the many people who will come to visit us.

Canuck to Report On N.Z. Medicine

AUCKLAND N. Z. (P)-Dr. Hugh MacLean, Canadian surgeon, who recently retired from practice in Los Angeles, is on a three months' visit to New Zealand in the course of which he will investigate the Dominion's state medical services.

"Dr. D. E. McHendry, professor of political science at the University of California, Los Angeles, is at present doing research work in Wellington and he asked me to come as a surgean and look into the functions of the State Medical Act," said Dr. MacLean. "It is breaking new ground and I want to investigate its successes and failures, if any."

"In addition, Premier Douglas of Saskatchewan is interested in New Zealand's medical services and I wil report to him in an unofficial way."
