VANCOUVER (CP)—Prince Rupert may become a world port, it was indicated at the Foreign Trade Conference of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce here today. R. S. O'Meara, trade commissioner for British Columbia, said the Department of Transport has agreed to review load line restrictions which at present make it impossible for an 8,000-ton vessel to load to within three tons of its maximum. "This means that its cargo costs 21c per ton more than for other ports," he said. The subject is on the agenda of the conference on Safety of Life at Sea to be held in October 1947.



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#### VICTORIA DAY

OFFICE-FAGGED and chore-weary Canadians can blame strict tradition at fixed status for blitzing thoughts of marking the loungers still hugged the birthday with today's trend to long week-ends.

For although it is 128 years since Alexandrina Victoria's birthday and 110 years since she ascended the throne, this Dominion sticks strictly to procedure and again marks tomorrow-long week-end or no-as Victoria Day.

Canadian observance and acceptance of May 24 to honor the memory of Victoria the Good is unique in the British Empire, for Canada is the only dominion to set aside the day as a national holiday. Other members of the Commonwealth merge it with Empire Day.

Victoria's reign lasted 63 years. Not only did she consolidate her throne and empire, she captivated the people and through shrewdness and sheer faith in a Britain which had seen the industrial revolution arrive and awaited the coming of a new era of commercial development, won the awe of boundary-makers such as Bismark and politicians such as Disraeli and Gladstone.

While many of her counsellors were perturbed when the Chartist movement in 1839 brought to the House of Commons a petition signed by 1,280,-000 of her subjects asking greater representation for Britain's working people, Victoria remained calm and sure.

Her reign was marked by great colonial expansion and the growth of power on land and sea. The Queen became Empress of India and it was during her reign that the Dominion of Canada grew from a group of scattered colonies to a strong. confederation under the British flag.

And in these days of vigorous pursuit of antidotes to man's physical ills, it is interesting to recall that the girl queen who was to guide an empire through its most turbulent years-was the first member of Britain's royal family to be vaccinated. Yos, she did what any modern six-week-old lassie would do-she yelled a blue streak!


