However, while traffic control authorities at Amonton and Dawson Creek allow tourists on the lighway who have good automobiles, these same authorities write communications to prospective ourists discouraging Alaska trips. It is an ambiguous situation. The desire of government officials to keep unreliable people and infirm equipment off the road is understandable. However, f people with substantial equipment are allowed drive to Alaska, then they should be told that such is definitely the case.

Recent communications from Edmonton point out that, although some tourists are denied permits, all persons may appeal their case to the assistant commissioner of the Royal Canadian Mounted Poice in that city. It is our understanding that this official is granting traffic control permits to all fourists who can offer any satisfactory reason for lesiring to drive to Alaska. This is wise policy. Most of the tourists are Americans. Their taxes paid for this first land link to Alaska. They should eallowed to drive over the road if their cars are

A recent dispatch in The Vancouver Daily Province pointed out that hundreds of cars were rolling northward through British Columbia points, bound for Alaska. Some of these cars were described in The Province as those of "holiday seekers" and others as those of "prospective settlers in Alaska." The dispatch said that suitable cars were being permitted to travel northward onto the Alaska Highway. This is as it should be but the Canadian authorities at Edmonton and Dawson Creek should mt forth a specific statement of policy which leaves mambiguities as to use of the Alaska Highway. Tourists with adequate cars are being permitted to travel north. Tourists can board buses without any

The authorities at Edmonton and Dawson Creek have done a good job in difficult circumstances. Last year they prudently kept traffic limited to essential travel. This season, with greater facilities along the road, they should allow all suitablyequipped cars to head North. Street fights which threatened to develop into minor riots when city police made efforts to stop them resulted in 39 persons appearing in police court on varying charges during the last two days with resulting contributions in fines totalling over more than \$1,000 as Police Magistrate W. D. Vance handed down the law.

Continuing trouble at the corner of Third Avenue and Sixth Street caused police to make nightly sweeps of the area in force, picking up intoxicated persons on the street, in cafes and rooming houses.

As a result, 39 people were fined a total of \$1,040 on charges which included drunkenness. obstructing officers and supplying liquor to Indians.

After an unsuccessful attempt 11:00—Weather and Sign Off. to rescue a friend from arrest at the hands of Constables Davidson. Brue and Fletcher, Reggie Sampson and Lloyd Dudoward were fined \$100 and \$50 respectively for obstructing police officers in their duty. Sampson pleaded guilty, while Dudoward was found guilty by the magistrate.

# FEWER HORSES

Manitoba Reports 29 Per Cent Loss But Cattle Population Increases

OTTAWA (P-The number horses in Manitoba is decreasing rapidly in numbers, figures released by the Dominion bureau of statistics show. These were the preliminary figures of the 1946 prairie census, and they reported a decline from 301,763 horses on June 1, 1941 to 215,098 last year, a 29 per cent drop.

Value of Manitoba's farm horses decreased even more to \$10,724,450 on June 1 last year, a decrease of one-third.

1936. The value of cattle showed a much greater increase, being \$49,485,625 last year compared with \$26,495,164 in 1941 and only \$14,238,422 in 1936.

The number of sheep declined to 205,516 from the 1941 total of 246,169 and was slightly below the 1936 total of 207,915. Swine dropped from 503,407 to 308,052 last year, but there will still be more than there were in 1936, when 269,708 were produced.

Total poultry population last year was 17 per cent higher than in 1941, and 60 per cent above 1936, due mainly to sharp increases in hens and chickens.

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
