Three Million Fine Cut

WASHINGTON, D.C. (CP)-The United States Supreme Court today upheld contempt convictions against John L. Lewis and his United Mine Workers of America.

The court upheld a \$10,000 fine imposed on Lewis but ordered the \$3,500,000 fine assessed against the United Mine Workers reduced to \$700,000.

The penalties grew out of Lewis's refusal to obey a court order intended to head off a 17-day soft coal strike last November.

The logger will be required to keep his annual cut to his annual growth. The larger operators will be required to maintain their own forester.

Fire protection will be on a bigger scale, which is just as important as a sustained yield policy. The Minister of Forests is to be congratulated upon what appears from a cursory examination of the bill as a great forward step in maintaining the forest industry in perpetuity.

Citizens' Forum . . .

HAT is the Social Responsibility of Business?" was the subject of the weekly citizens' forum at the Civic Centre here Tuesday night, being one of the syllabus of the Canadian Association for Adult Education which sponsors these forums for the purpose, apparently, of getting the people of the country together in discussion of timely subjects of national importance and significance. The results of the discussions, arising from a CBC broadcast and a set of questions, are duly recorded and forwarded to a central quarter where they are tabulated and, undoubtedly, compiled as an expression of public opinion. Conceivably, under some circumstances, such a poll, and that is what such a meeting amounts to, might be taken as a guide.

In this forum, as well as in other matters of public concern, a certain section of the community appears to be absolutely disinterested, even when such a vitally interesting subject as that of Tuesday night comes up for discussion. Left wingers who, in Prince Rupert at least, comprise the majority of the attendance at these forums are not to be criticized but rather applauded for the interest they display and the time they are willing to give in attending the meetings and taking part in the discussions. Unless a newspapermen, who happened to be a member of the Chamber of Commerce, and a clergyman might be considered to have been such, there were no defenders of the socalled capitalistic or free enterprise faith. The point is that the free enterprisers, through apathy and pure indifference, do nothing to present their side of the case and permit one-sided opinions to get abroad on important public questions. expressed opinions that may not be so unanimously the feeling as the results of the polls might indicate. The citizens' forum is a meeting ground which might lead to a better understanding between sections of the citizenship.
