STAIN BLAMED BY RUSSIANS FOR PLANE INCIDENT--

Situation In Germany Takes On New Turn After British Military Governor's Statement

BERLIN (CP)—The Soviet Union today threw blame for Monday's Russian-British plane crash on the British plane but British officials said the story was "palpably untrue."

Russian investigating commission charged that crash, in which fifteen persons died, was caused by violation of Allied regulations by flying in the Soviet traffic zone.

It said that the pilot failed to comply with the four-power Allied Convention regulations by flying in the Soviet traffic zone.

Marshal Lord Montgomery of the British Imperial staff, went back to London without any public inquiries as to whether his dinner with top military leaders last night had cleared the road blocks in the four-power amity.

Montgomery believed to have discredited the "British crisis."

Montgomery's statement today by Gen. Brian Robertson, British military governor of Germany, that the part of Germany under the Iron Curtain has been temporarily and that they will have to be content with two-thirds of the country.

He believed that the Russians preparing to call for a new government in their zone. This would end Russian control.

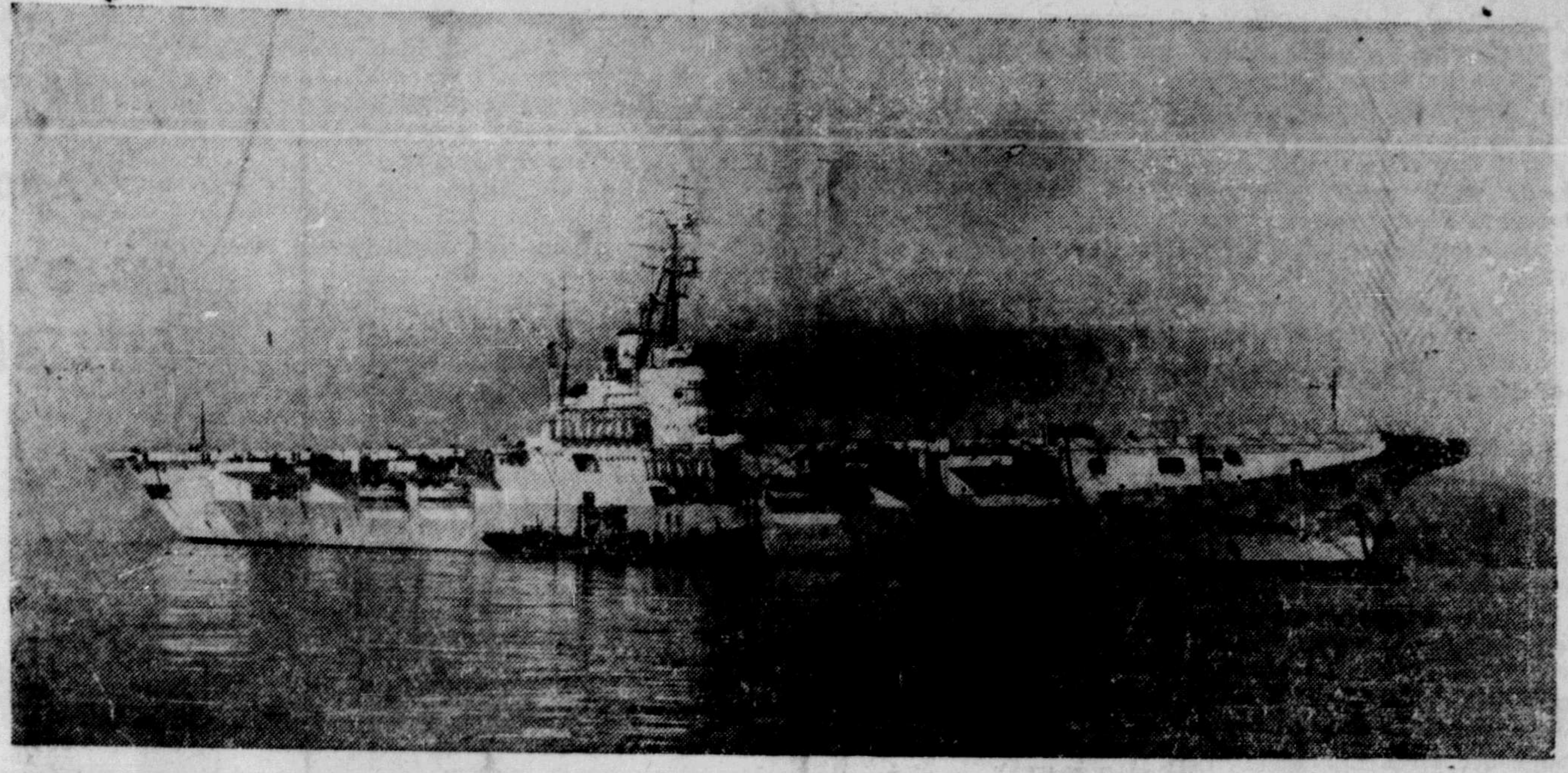

Mile of New Road to be Built Between City and Port Edward

First Step In Hard Surfacing Project By Public Works—Other Projects In \$200,000 Program

Provision for reconstruction of a mile of highway on a new survey that will eliminate dangerous curves at the approaches to the city has been made in this year's public works department estimates, District Engineer J. C. Brady said Tuesday.

Mr. Brady, who returned Monday from the south where he took part in a conference of public works engineers at Harrison Hot Springs, revealed that "at least \$150,000 and more likely about \$200,000 has been appropriated for road and bridge maintenance and reconstruction this year."

The figure is at least double that spent on highways in the district in 1947. For maintenance alone, \$61,000 has been set aside.

"How much we spend will be determined largely by the availability of men and material," Mr. Brady said.

Major items planned for this summer are:

1. Construction of 8 of a mile of highway starting at the city limits as a start on the rebuilding of the Prince Rupert-Port Edward road.

2. Completion of the Port Clements-Queen Charlotte City road, 4 1/2 miles of which are still to be built.

3. Widening of the Skeena River Highway for four miles east of Skeena City where currents have washed away part of the roadbed.

4. Construction of a 240-foot steel truss bridge across the Skeena River four miles north of Hazelton at a cost of \$60,000.

5. Installing of a 15-foot diameter culvert to replace the bridge at Porphyry Creek between Hazelton and Smithers.

6. Stockpiling of a large amount of gravel for future maintenance and reconstruction of the Prince Rupert-Port Edward road.

7. Renewal of bridges over Bitter and Bear Creeks in the Stewart district.

8. Various repair and maintenance projects in isolated villages in the districts.

Construction of the new survey on the Prince Rupert-Port Edward road is the first step in a program of hard surfacing. The gravel stock-piling project also ties in with this. However, hard surfacing will not be begun this summer because of the need to allow the road to settle for at least one season. The new section will be 46 feet wide in muskeg and 34 feet through rock fills. Surfaced area will be 24 feet wide.

COAL STRIKE COMPLICATED

WASHINGTON, D.C., (C)—John L. Lewis today asked a federal court to set aside an order directing the United Mine Workers of America to end the 24-day old soft coal strike. Lewis, through his attorneys, asked a district court for a hearing Friday on his request.

The Attorney General of the United States today obtained a contempt of court citation against Lewis and his union for failing to comply with the order to end the strike.

The order directed Lewis and the mine operators to negotiate a settlement of their pension dispute.

Prospects of union-operator talks to end the strike have, apparently, vanished.

Number of workers idle, due directly or indirectly to the 24-day old soft coal walk-out passed the half million mark today. Heading the list were Lewis' 400,000 miners and, on a sympathy strike, more than 24,500 eastern Pennsylvania anthracite miners. About 60,000 transportation workers, mainly railroaders, are jobless because no coal is moving.

ESSINGTON MAKES FIRST TRIP

The federal public works snag scow Essington left port this morning on its first seasonal trip up the Skeena River in command of Capt. W. F. Robertson. Initial work of its crew will be to repair a water pipe line at Port Essington to insure a supply of fresh water for the vessel's boilers during the summer.

The Essington underwent her annual overhaul and boiler inspection at the dry dock during the winter and during the spring has been doing small jobs around the harbor, repairing floats and assisting in the transfer of the Department of Transport marine equipment from Digby Island to Seal Cove.

This year's initial trip up the Skeena was made a week earlier than in 1947 and will give an advanced start on channel clearing operations both there and on the Naas.

Heavy snowfall in recent weeks in the mountains behind Port Essington has been responsible for the three-mile water pipe line breaking. It must be repaired to provide water for the flat-bottomed scow. In the meantime, the Essington will take on water at North Pacific.

Coalition Caucus Gives Approval To Sales Tax

Premier Johnson Said to Have Been Challenged to 'Go to Country' On Measure

VICTORIA (CP)—The provincial government's three percent retail sales tax proposal is reported by reliable authority to have been given final approval by a special coalition caucus on Tuesday. Five coalitions are said to have dissented.

Premier Byron Johnson threatened to "go to the country" on the issue and was challenged to do so by one coalition member.

Present indications are that passage of the bill through the House is assured but the five coalitions are expected to vote with the C.C.F.

Finance Minister Herbert Anscomb told reporters that the sales tax measure would be brought down "in a day or two."

The government is said to have abandoned hope of prorogation by April 15 and has set April 21 as the new target date.

The British Budget

COMPROMISING between socialistic principles and capitalistic demands, the budget which Sir Stafford Cripps brought down in the British Parliament yesterday, from what we have heard of it so far, appears to be in many ways an admirable document. True, it has aspects of holding up the rich to help the poor, increasing the taxes on investment income and relieving further the tax in the lower brackets of earnings, but there is nothing new in that tendency in Britain. It is not only the Labor government that has been doing that for a long time.

The people of the pubs will grumble, of course, at a penny a pint more for beer and the smokers will growl about the increase in the tobacco impost but the housewife is going to be grateful for some of the benefits she will derive.

The Stafford budget has its sound features too, the Chancellor admitting the aim of checking spending and curbing inflation, at the same time developing the incentive of higher production which he emphasizes is vitally essential and which must be achieved with no delay.

MORE FOR ROADS

PRINCE RUPERT has fared a little better this year in its provincial road appropriation and a statement of the district engineer outlines some useful work to be done here, on the Queen Charlotte Islands and along up the Skeena River into the Skeena riding.

While we, of course, must acknowledge what we are getting, it can by no means be said that we are getting more than our share. Something better, we might have expected toward the Port Edward hard-surfacing project than the straightening out of less than a mile of road beyond the city limits. At that rate it is going to be quite a long time before that hard-surfacing will be accomplished, certainly longer than we had been led to expect.

SNOW REMOVAL

AFTER all our advocating of a policy of keeping the Skeena River Highway open and clear of snow all winter, it seems a little hard to believe that Hon. E. T. Kenney should have sat as hard as the Vancouver Sun suggests he did upon W. H. Brett, the Prince Rupert member, when the latter protested at the failure to keep the road open between Prince Rupert and Terrace during the winter.

In fact, we doubt very much if Mr. Kenney was as emphatic as the Sun suggests he was in emphasizing the "enormous expenditure" which would be needed to keep the highway open and his purported expression as to whether the traffic warranted it. We do not believe that "colossal" is the word to describe the job of keeping snow off the road. Maybe that is not what Mr. Kenney meant or really said.

RUSSIA AND FINLAND

THE NEW Russo-Finnish friendship and mutual assistance treaty does not appear on the surface at least to be as objectionable as might have been feared. Finnish troops are not required to fight out of their own territory and Russians will not enter Finland without previous negotiation. Russia does not interfere, we are told at least, in Finland's internal affairs. But Russia ostensibly does not interfere in the internal affairs of other countries which have admittedly come under her domination. Though Finland, it is said, retains her independence, the treaty is certainly enough designed to keep her within the Soviet orbit and the Iron Curtain.

COST OF FAMILY

BY THE TIME a son or daughter becomes eighteen years of age, it has cost the parents \$8,000. That is the figure, according to research and statistics, so far as the average family in one city is concerned.

Perhaps it strikes you as a shade steep. Well, let's see! It is certain that none of the following can be avoided although there may be differences of opinion as to actual outlay. It is reckoned that birth will mean an expenditure of \$300, food \$2,420, clothing \$810, shelter \$2,690, medical care \$300, school cost \$80, and various minor miscellaneous expenses \$1,400.

CAPITALISM'S PROBLEMS

Editor, Daily News:
I would like to present my views of what is happening and may happen as distinct from what Mr. Casey thinks is going to happen.

No power, no leadership, past or present, has yet found a permanent solution to the puzzle of human nature. Those who loudly claim long standing infallible knowledge and authority concerning it are guilty of self-contradiction for, if the solution had been long known and widely proclaimed, it would no longer be an object of loud discourse and anxious search.

Capitalism's worst failing is to treat men more like tender plants to be tenderly nurtured and protected. People do not want to have things done for them if that means waiting patiently while more competent persons do all the interesting things. Capitalism is losing friends and making enemies faster by efficient production and distribution of wealth than the medieval church and its feudal ruffians ever did by tyranny.

Boredom is one of the easiest enemies to oppose. The contest is a matter of wits more than of material resources, and each of us can do something to relieve monotony.

Capitalism, to maintain its well earned leadership, will have to be more ingenious than the economist, and efficiency expert. Having explored oceans and continents and built nations, Capitalism will next have to concentrate on exploring human nature and discovering ways and means to make man sane and happy and keep him so.

Man has finely accurate sense but he is not very realistic until he reaches the maturity of experience, and not even then if his youthful imagination has been overburdened with creeds, dogmas, paradoxes and hyperbole. Therefore Capitalism cannot safely rely on the broad evidence of facts and experience. Although Capitalism is visibly the highest tide of human achievement, yet the grossly slanderous epithet "reactionary" receives widespread and eager credence.

Man has a heart, but its tenderness is reserved for the "underdog," the weak those he can pity, and for himself, but almost never for his more wealthy, but more competent employer or benefactor. Therefore Capital-

ism cannot rely on the appeal of benevolence or the gratitude of servants or employees.

Man has pride, but his pride is often most deeply hurt by slight contrasts in greater or lesser personal success and not often by large and lurid revelations of his own stupidity and depravity. Therefore Capitalism had best not hope to shame men into being wise and good.

Man has courage, but it is not generally very great, and usually needs the prop of drama and applause. Therefore Capitalism cannot safely rely on the courageous loyalty of employees in the face of widespread antipathy or disaffection.

Man has a personality and a character but it suffers variation and one must not expect him always to be at his best or worst.

Man is weak. But man, either individually or in small, finely co-ordinated groups, is the only currently active intelligence of which we have undoubted experience, excepting of course the lower animals. Man's brain, alert to the outline and details of reality, is man's most valuable treasure.

However, the nascent brain is as meaningless as a blank page until the files of its memory have been enriched with reality and until its habits of thought, speech and action have been sharpened and refined.

One must be reasonable for without reason we are not complete men, nor scarcely animals, and but little removed from the dust and grime that surrounds us.

Self-preservation and growth mean but little, therefore, unless they mean the preservation of sanity and the gradual growth of sane ideas. But the brain is like the other organs in that it is dependent on nor-

PROVINCIAL TRADES BOARD ORGANIZATION

As a result of an organizational meeting held a few weeks ago at Pentleton, a British Columbia Council of Boards of Trade has been formed to handle problems on the provincial level as distinguished from purely local, district or national. It is proposed to hold the next meeting of this provincial body at Kamloops. The Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce is supporting the new organization by sending in its membership fee through the Associated Boards of Trade of Central British Columbia.

Questions which the provincial organization plans to take up at the outset include trans-

mal nourishment, normal exercise, and normal rest. It cannot stay healthy on a restricted diet of words, signs, and symbols. 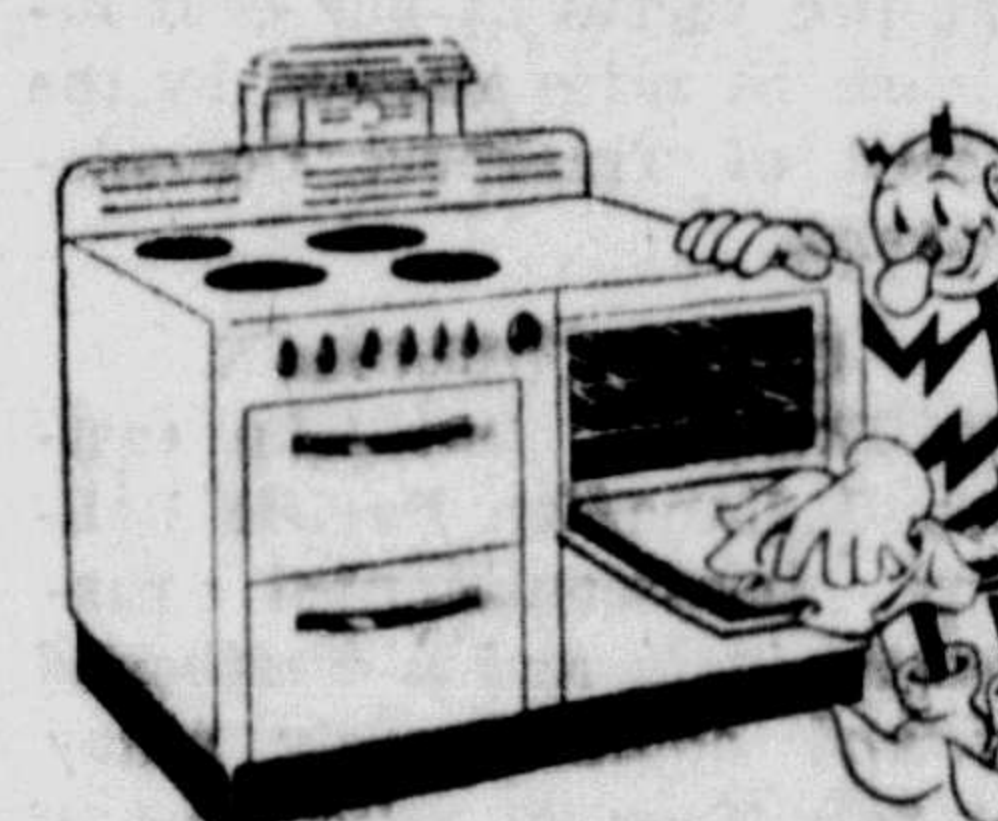

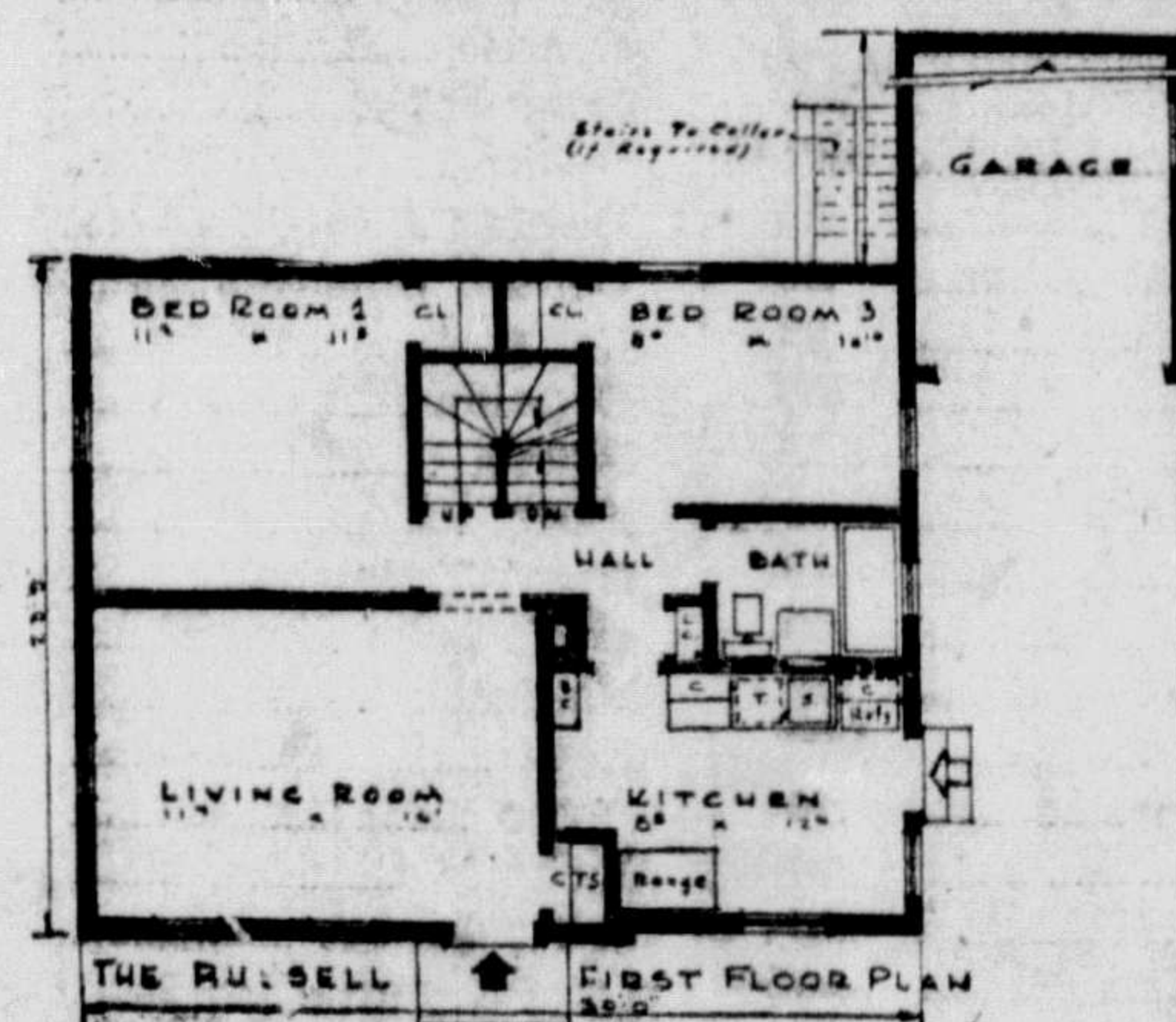

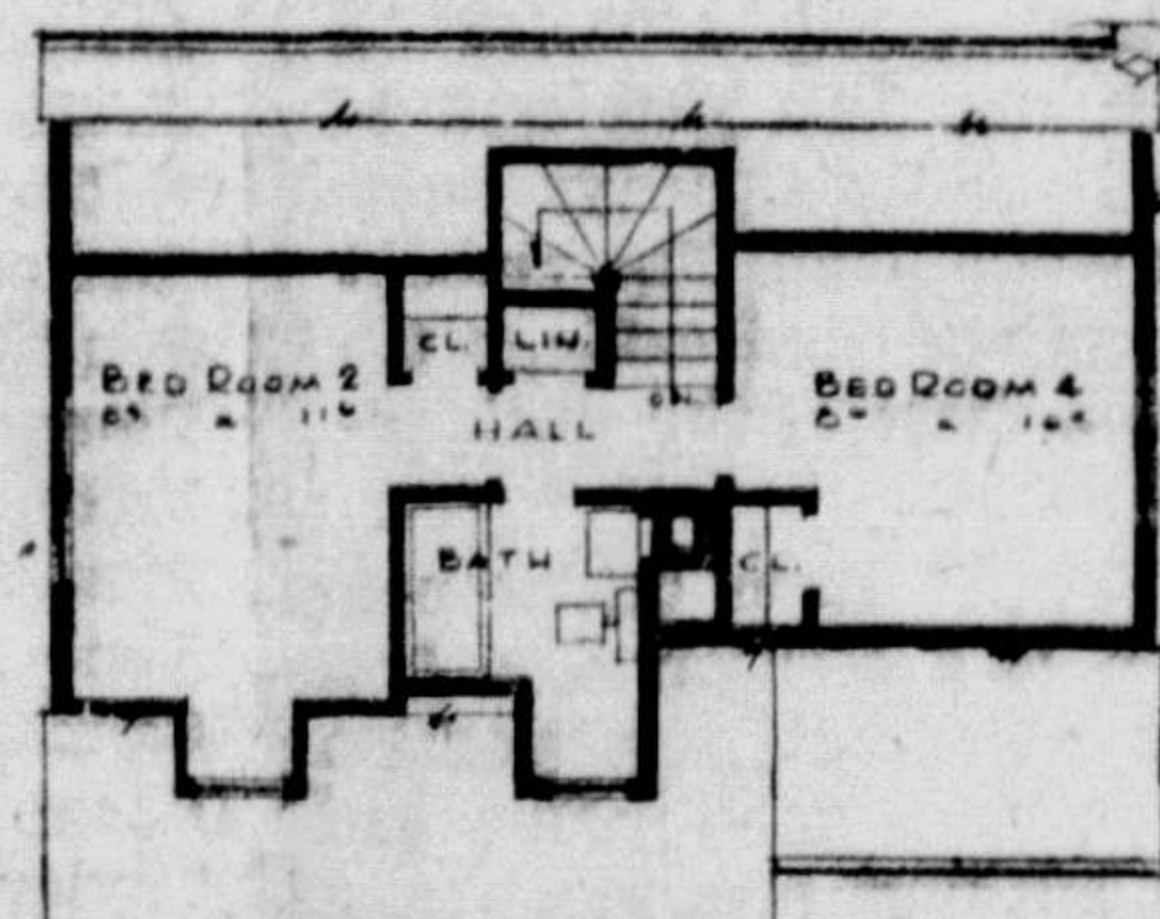

THE RUSSELL — The floor plan of the Adams, one of the earliest of the small houses of our present housing series, seemed to have most of the practical features that so many homebuilders are seeking today. First it was an expandable house that might start off as a four room bungalow and later grow naturally into a two-storey, three bedroom, six room house. Its simple lines made it not only attractive but economical to build. Its style was early American, which remains probably the favorite architectural style of most home building families. It could have a basement or not, depending on personal preference and climatic conditions. It could be built with or without attached garage. It would fit on a small lot. There wasn't an inch of wasted space. It was a home anyone might be proud to own.

This week in the RUSSELL is another house with practically the same floor plan as the popular Adams. In outside appearance it is

entirely different but equally charming. The RUSSELL shows the influence of early Dutch settlers of New Amsterdam and of the rich Hudson farm country. It features a high pitched roof and a wide front overhang, both characteristic of the Dutch Colonial style.

The inside room arrangement is practically the same except that the house is turned differently on the lot and the plan is reversed. Living room and kitchen are to the front, the two bedrooms in the rear. It is the simplest and cheapest type of expandable house. It provides all needed first stage accommodations for the small family on the ground floor. As the family grows two additional rooms and a second bath are pre-planned for the second floor. It is derived from a proven floor plan used by many professional builders who are always on the alert for good, practical plans that permit low cost construction.

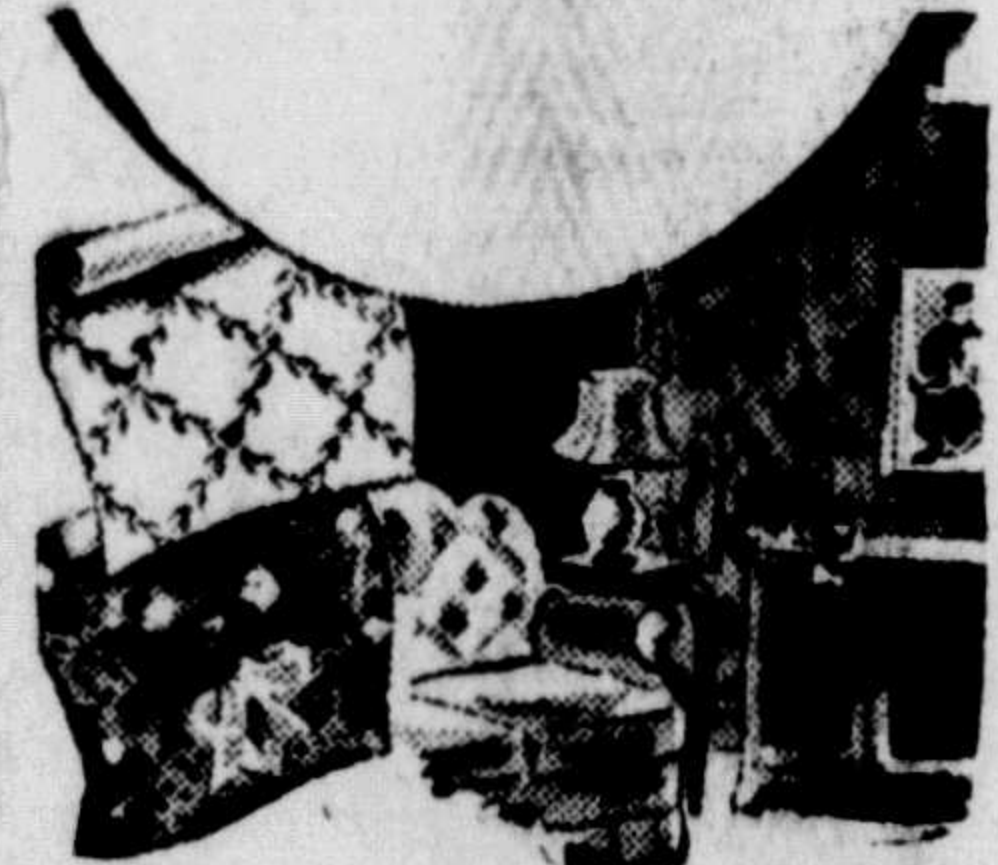

In her report, Mrs. Ross Thompson, who was the Terrace delegate to the Red Cross annual meeting in Vancouver, passed on a statement of Colonel Scott which was to the effect that blood donations had increased to such an extent that dressings were urgently needed in greater quantities and here was where the local branches could help out. She had also been assured that all layettes which were made to be sent to England were not sent to other countries. A hearty vote of thanks was accorded Mrs. Thompson for her fine report.
