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# X DEAD IN B.C. ARMY TRAIN COLLISION

## Canadian National Montrealer And Trooper Crash Near Jasper

JASPER.—Six persons are known dead as a result of the collision of Canadian National Railways No. 2 Montreal train and a troop train near Canoe River, 83 miles west of Jasper, late this morning.

The passenger train, which left Vancouver last night, was proceeding eastward. The troop train was carrying members of the Canadian First Brigade to Vancouver enroute to Fort Lewis, Washington.

E. G. Skelding, superintendent of transportation, Canadian National Railways, Edmonton, said those killed were all aboard the troop train.

A few passengers on the transcontinental train received "slight injuries," Skelding said.

Hospital trains, with doctors and nurses aboard, are on the way to the scene from Kamloops and Jasper.

The head-on crash occurred at 12 o'clock Mountain Standard Time (11 a.m. Pacific Standard Time).

The disaster, details of which are gradually coming in, is one of the worst in British Columbia railway history.

## Death Penalty Reintroduced

WELLINGTON, New Zealand (CP)—The New Zealand House of Representatives today reintroduced the death penalty — death by hanging—after a respite of fifteen years.

The gallows have been idle in New Zealand since 1935 when the Labor government came into power but now the new Conservative administration will replace the death penalty in the statute book.

Rise of crimes of violence and murder after the war brought much agitation to reintroduce hanging.

## Dominated By Russia

Nationalist China Makes This Charge Regarding Communist China

NEW YORK—A Chinese Nationalist spokesman at the United Nations today charged that Communist China was completely dominated, economically and militarily, by Soviet Russia which had engineered the civil war.

It was charged yesterday that Soviet Russia was not sincere in its case that Communist China should have a seat in the United Nations. Really Russia did not want that and, in making its demand, knew that it was impossible to fulfill.

## Princess Pats Korea Bound

OTTAWA (CP)—Second battalion of Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry, now on the move from Wainwright, Alberta, to Fort Lewis, Washington, is expected to sail for Korea this week-end. The battalion—a 1000-man force—is arriving at Fort Lewis in several trains today and will sail from Seattle.

Four special trains passed through Vancouver today enroute to Fort Lewis and three more are due tonight.

## Bold Raid By Nationalists

TAIPEI, Formosa.—A bold raid by six thousand Chinese Nationalist guerrillas against the Red-held South China city of Wuchow was reported today.

The guerrillas entered the city November 13 and withdrew after destroying three military depots, inflicting heavy casualties on the Communist garrison and capturing 40 Red party workers.

Wuchow is 120 miles west of Canton.

## Bodies in Snow Bank

Double Tragedy Near Houston In Bulky Valley

SMITHERS.—Bodies of Robert McCauslane and Joseph Lapointe have been found in a snow bank near Houston in the Bulky Valley east of here. Royal Canadian Mounted Police are investigating.

Lapointe, operator of a small sawmill, and McCauslane had been in town at Houston and left Friday night on their return to camp in a light truck. They had evidently had trouble in negotiating a small hill and backed the truck down into a snow bank and are believed to have climbed out and got back into the cab again.

Belief is that they had been overcome by carbon monoxide fumes from a broken exhaust.

The bodies were found when a search was instituted the next morning.

An inquest was being held in Smithers today.

The same day an Indian, Joseph Holland, died of a heart attack in a Houston sawmill camp.

## Reno Under Six Feet of Flood Water

## Divorce Capital Inundated In Third Day of Big Deluge

SAN FRANCISCO (CP)—Raging flood waters today swept through northern and central California and western Nevada for the third consecutive day, causing uncounted millions of dollars damage and leaving nine persons dead and thousands homeless. In Nevada the main section of Reno is covered

with six to eight feet of water as the swirling Truckee River hit with crushing force last night. Plush hotels and gambling casinos were flooded. A three-block-wide torrent raged through the heart of the city. There were two flood deaths.

In California the American River swelled over its banks at Sacramento, forcing hundreds of people from their homes. Sections along the Bear River reported flood conditions. Governor Earl Warren declared a state of emergency.

WARSAW.—Speaking at the peace congress here today, Rev. Hewlett Johnson, the "Red" Dean of Canterbury, charged that the United States was deriving economic benefit from the war in Korea.

## Tree Falls, Wrecks House

VICTORIA.—Mrs. Charles Barrett suffered from shock after a 70-foot fir tree fell on a house seven miles from here in a 50-mile gale which swept the area last night. The house was half crushed, Mr. and Mrs. Barrett were in bed at the time.

The gale was felt throughout southern Vancouver Island and the lower mainland. At Vancouver the velocity was 40 miles per hour.

northwest where a severe battle may ensue as the Communists gather their forces together for expected renewed resistance.

United States bombers have been ordered to take special precautions in regard to attacking targets near the frontier so that there may be no violations thereof.

Tired American infantrymen slogged into the ghost city of Hyesanjin on the Manchurian border of North Korea and occupied it without firing a shot. It was the first American unit

to reach the border.

"We will sweep through the town and then go back into good hill positions and see what happens," said Col. Herbert Powell, commander of the 17th Regiment.

There is no further hint of the next move of the 17th Regimental combat team at Hyesanjin.

Col. Powell said Red Manchuria is within easy artillery range but his guns would not fire across the river "unless they fire at us first."

United Nations intelligence

officers predict that the Korean war will continue well into next spring. Wild inaccessible mountains, head-high in snowdrifts, and temperatures of 20° or more below zero will delay United Nations final victory until then, they fear.

The Communists still have a great network of military highways and railways in the north-east linked up with Manchuria where Korean Communist armies are reported being reorganized.

## To Rotate In Service

Regular Leaves to be Provided for Soldiers Going to Korea

VANCOUVER (CP)—Canadian troops who serve in Korea will be relieved on a rotation basis, Brigadier J. M. (Rocky) Rockingham said last night. But he added that it is impossible to estimate the time they must spend overseas.

"I do not think any specified time has been set," he told the Canadian Press from Fort Lewis, Washington. "It all depends what they (the Canadians) are doing."

Brigadier Rockingham has been at Fort Lewis, Washington, where the special brigade is being assembled for dispatch to Korea.

## Coalition Government to Stay With Opposition Meantime, Refusing to Go Alone

Single Transferable Vote—Resolutions On Many Matters

Coalition government in British Columbia broken during the present parliament and a full party convention decides that it should be dissolved, according to J. D. McRae, M.L.A. for Prince Rupert, following his return from Vancouver where he attended recent executive sessions of the

British Columbia Liberal Association, which H. G. T. Perry, of the Prince Rupert, is president, and

Finance Mr. McRae said. Meantime, there are active promotion of the party in readiness to go again as a single government.

McRae is a vice-president of the Liberal executive. The resolutions adopted at the Vancouver meeting were to the effect that the adherents of the party are firmly of the opinion that the application of the principles by the enactment of a single transferable vote would deprive voters of the franchise, Mr. McRae expressed the opinion that it was hardly likely that the legislature would approve of any measure that would deprive such electors of the power of the vote.

The Liberal executive, in another resolution, asked the provincial government to implement a resolution of the last Liberal convention recommending that consideration be given to the subject of redistribution of representation in the legislature on the basis of the next federal census.

Other resolutions passed by the convention urged the provision of the granting of the old age pension, with the means test, at the age of 65, and without the means test at the age of 70.

Exemption from social security and municipal air tax (three per cent tax) of all meals, children's clothes, school books, all medicines, soaps and all purchases for the personal use of all pensioners who are exempted from income tax.

The executive protested as "discriminatory and unjust" with "no ethical or reasonable basis" the debarment from employment of persons 45 years of age and over and resolved that both provincial and federal governments be urged to make provision for opportunities of employment both on temporary and permanent basis for men and women regardless of age who have the

Nehru May Be Sorry

CHINESE Communists, even with the backing of Soviet Russia, will have their hands full in trying to occupy Tibet and impose a Communist government upon the Tibetans.

The latest news is that India has sent a note to Peiping expressing surprise and regret at the invasion, but the Reds claim that the "liberation" of Tibet is "an internal matter," and declare they will not tolerate any outside interference.

NEW HIGHWAY DEAL

SKEENA DISTRICT has a new district engineer and assistant engineer. However, in all fairness to the new officials and the men who they succeed, we think it should be made clear that the deficiencies which have been felt in the district for so long are not due entirely to local circumstance.

The head office for the department at Victoria holds the solution to the future of roads in Skeena and the Central Interior. Requests and pleas for some definite program in conjunction with that set out by the Hart government to provide the province with a first class highway system have been to no avail, and Mr. Carson has been adamant in his dictatorial policy of providing Vancouver Island and the southern interior with good roads while doing nothing for the Central Interior.

Taxpayers and organizations in Smithers community have sent brief after brief to Victoria regarding the lack of a highway policy, not only for this area, but for the entire district from Prince George through to Prince Rupert.

We wonder if the change of officials might possibly mean a changed attitude at Victoria? It would be welcome, especially if the district were to receive the machinery necessary for an adequate road maintenance job. Let us hope the department will at least rectify the ridiculous situation that existed this year, when public works crews had to load gravel trucks by hand to patch up a road because the head office refused to OK the purchase of a new shovel to replace a 25-year-old relic.

We asked for a new deal in public works for this district. We have had the shuffle, it's up to Mr. Carson now for the new deal.—Interior News.

BOOKS AND ODD BITS

IN THE 28 YEARS I have been writing for Canadian newspapers a lot of books have come my way.

Some have been chores assignments to write about. Many I have bought, with my own hard cash. Others have been gifts, often from readers whom I have never seen.

But the postman never brought a more welcome surprise than three brand new volumes, each containing fifty full color reproductions. They cover the works of Van Gogh, El Greco, and Renoir, respectively.

IT IS NOT POLITE to look for a price tag on a gift. But I can't help passing on the information that these volumes sell for \$10 each. I can't imagine anything that would make a lovelier, more beautiful Christmas gift. For I just can't imagine anybody not keeping these books for a whole lifetime—and getting pleasure out of their beauties year after year.

They are published in Canada by Thomas Allen.

IF YOU REALLY want to know the background of the war in Korea get "Korea Today" by George M. McCune, late of the U.S. State Department.

It is a pretty terrible story it tells—fully backed by facts and statistics. You are left wondering whether the Koreans were worse off under the hard-boiled Communist police state, north of the 38th parallel, or under the harsh, reactionary police state presided over by Syngman Rhee.

One thing stands out clearly in this book. There was nothing remotely resembling democracy in either South or North Korea. Neither part of the country was given the chance to get what the overwhelming majority of the people naturally want—that is unity of their nation and a chance to rebuild the country in peace.

This book is published by the Institute of Pacific Relations. Price \$3.50.

A FULL fledged doctor writes me about recent remarks on pains from "Phantom Limb". He claims that if the amputated limb is cremated the person will suffer no "phantom limb" pains. But if the limb is buried, there may be phantom limb pains for awhile. Don't ask me to explain it.

MR. FAURE CORRECTED

Editor, Daily News: A letter signed by Mr. Faure in the November 18 issue of the Daily News has caused this branch of the Canadian Legion some concern, with particular reference to certain remarks contained in the penultimate paragraph thereof.

Mr. Lien, together with the members of his Band, were invited to join with the parading veterans as guests of the Canadian Legion immediately following the Armistice Service on November 11th, as has been the practice in former years. It was regrettable, indeed that, due to certain restrictive laws who prohibit our Native friends from joining with us in licensed premises, we were unable to extend a similar invitation to Mr. McKay and the members of his Band.

We considered it only right and fitting, therefore, in order to eliminate as far as possible this obvious gesture of discrimination (which policy the Canadian Legion wholeheartedly deplores) to invite Mr. McKay to the banquet held after the Armistice reception as a measure of appreciation of his Band's participation in the Armistice program. Certainly there was no intent to slight Mr. Lien personally, or the members of the Shrine Club Band, whom we hold in the highest regard, and whom we are proud to have financially assisted in its early formation and prior to its present sponsorship. Rather it was our desire to extend as far as possible to Mr. McKay, courtesies commensurate with those offered our local band. Furthermore, we are confident that Mr. Lien did not interpret our actions in the light that was indicated by Mr. Faure's uninformed comments.

In view of these circumstances, we have considered it necessary to reply publicly to these uncalled for remarks in order that the public may be correctly informed as to our course of action in this regard.

May we suggest to Mr. Faure, also, that he confine his criticisms to matters with which he is comparatively familiar, rather than to maliciously mislead, intentionally or otherwise, the public of this City.

Five Thousand TB Seal Letters

With the rumpus room of Mrs. Alex Mackenzie's home on Fourth Avenue East as dispatching headquarters, Prince Rupert Soroptimist Club is this week sending out five thousand letters containing the familiar TB Christmas seals from the proceeds of which the British Columbia Tuberculosis derives much of the revenue for its various good works—including the x-ray facilities at the Prince Rupert General Hospital which are available at all times.

The amount which the recip-

ient of the seals may send back to the Soroptimist Club for transmission to the Tuberculosis Association is entirely optional but the average is \$2. Some may not feel themselves able to send that much while many send more.

Last year Prince Rupert topped British Columbia for its showing, having obtained a 98 percent return from the seals sent out, raising some \$2500. Special recognition was voiced at the convention of the Association on this accomplishment.

Scald 3/4 c. milk, 1/2 c. granulated sugar, 1/2 tsp. salt and 1/4 c. shortening; cool to lukewarm. Meanwhile, measure into a large bowl 1/2 c. lukewarm water, 1 tsp. granulated sugar; stir until sugar is dissolved. Sprinkle with 1 envelope Fleischmann's Royal Fast Rising Dry Yeast. Let stand 10 mins. THEN stir well. Add cooled milk mixture and stir in well-beaten egg. Stir in 2 c. once-sifted bread flour; beat until smooth. Work in 2 1/2 c. once-sifted bread flour, knead on lightly-floured board until smooth and elastic. Cut off 25 of dough, knead into a smooth ball, place in greased bowl, grease top of dough, cover and store in refrigerator until wanted. Shape remaining 3/4 of dough into a smooth ball, place in greased bowl and grease top. Cover and set in warm place, free from draught. Let rise until doubled in bulk. Cream 1/2 lb. butter or margarine and blend in 1/2 c. brown sugar (lightly pressed down), 1/2 tsp. ground cinnamon and 3 lbs. corn syrup; spread about 1/2 of this mixture in bottom of a greased loaf pan (1 1/2" x 8 1/2") and sprinkle with pecan halves. Punch down risen dough and roll out into an 8" square; loosen dough. Spread with remaining sugar mixture and sprinkle with 1/2 c. raisins. Loosely roll up like a jelly roll. Cut roll into 6 slices. Place in prepared pan. Grease tops. Cover and let rise until doubled in bulk. Bake in moderate oven, 375°, 25-30 mins. Let stand in pan for 5 mins. before turning out.

Today, the same lads—Trevor Ford and Len Shackleton—are riding the crest of fame and success, but not with "Gunners." As the spearhead of Sunderland's reconstructed forward-line they have become known as the "Golden Boys" of British soccer. The tag is appropriate — they represent a partnership that cost the Durham Club \$150,000.

Acquisition of Ford from Aston Villa was the surprise of the early season. An automatic choice to represent Wales in the all-star international tests, his services had been eagerly sought by several first division clubs, including Chelsea. But Sunderland won out by plunking \$90,000 on the line, an all-time record. Shackleton, acquired from Newcastle United in 1948, came at a comparative bargain price of \$60,000.

In his first game with his new team-mates, Ford came under a glaring spotlight at Stamford Bridge, before more than 50,000 Chelsea supporters. It was a particularly bad day for the man who overnight had become the costliest soccer player in the world. His every move was jeered by the hostile crowd, apparently laboring under the impression he had spurned an enticing offer to join the Chelsea Club. With Ford bottled up on almost every play, Sunderland lost 3-0.

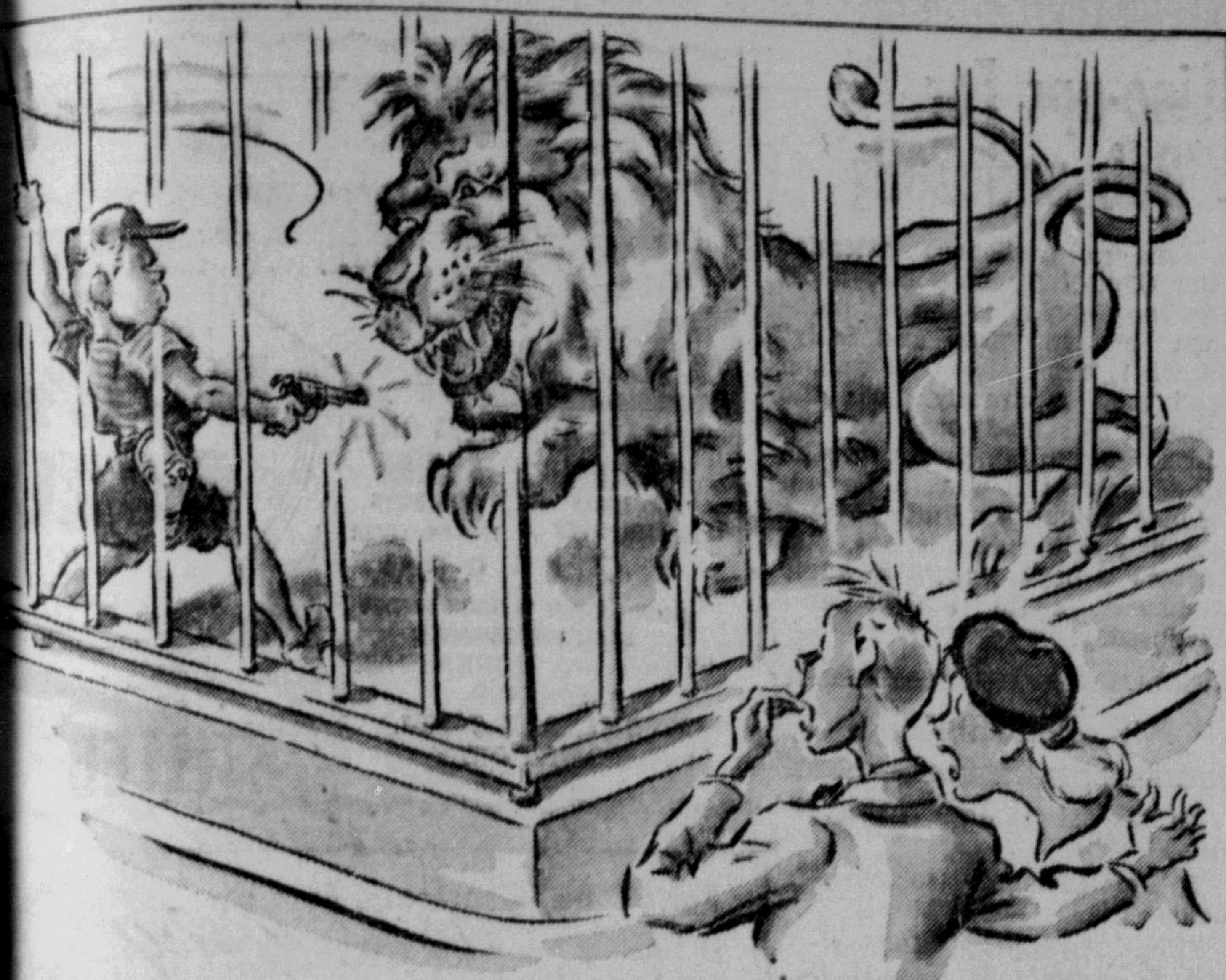

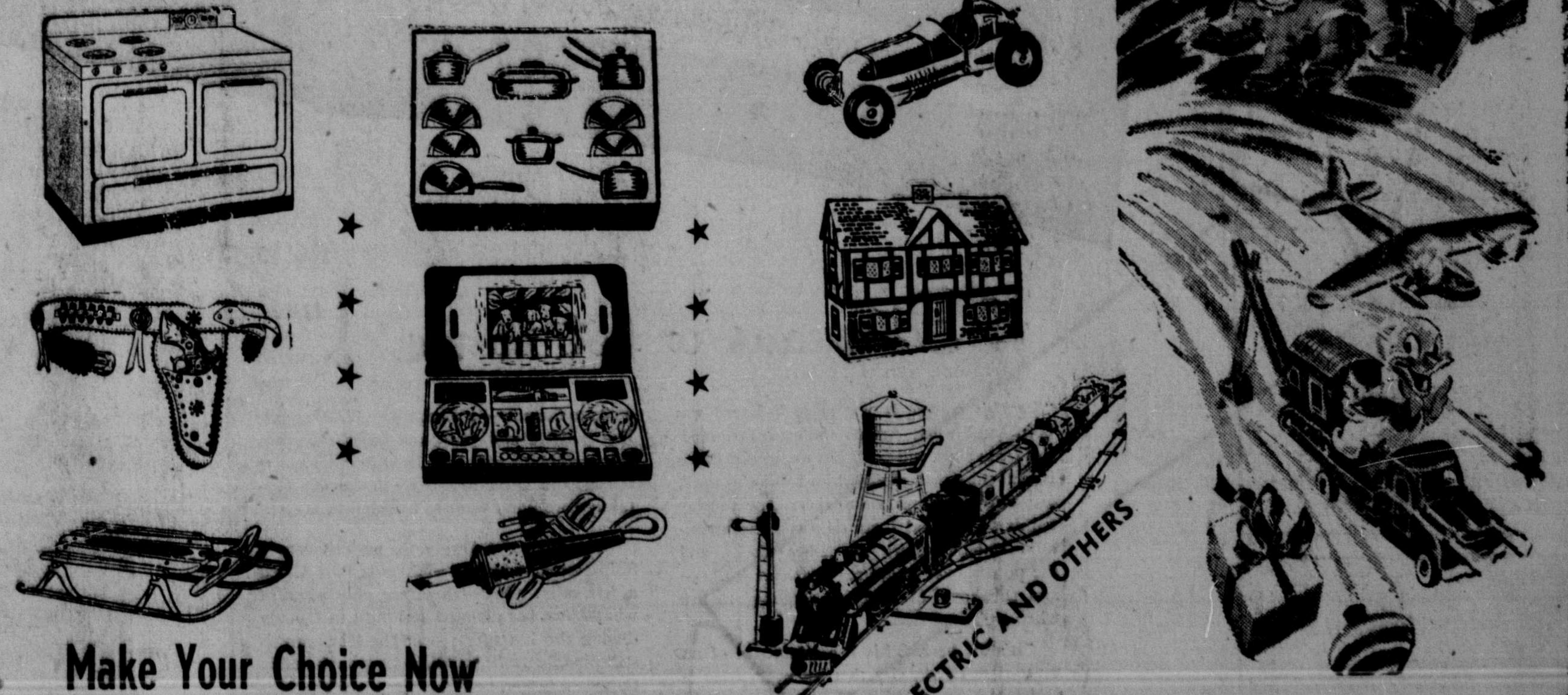

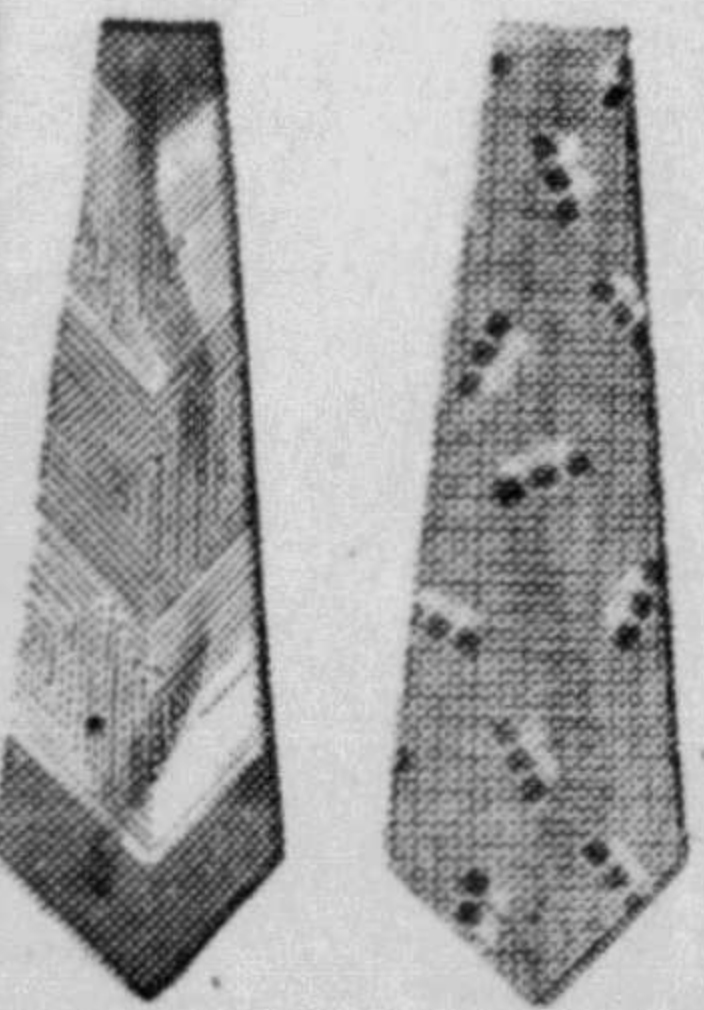

appropriate qualifications. Another resolution favored the supplying without charge of counsel to people of small means in all courts higher than the county court.

**DECENTRALIZATION**  
Decentralization of population and industries in the interests of sounder economy, happier way of life and in the interests of national security and survival in modern warfare was strongly urged with the recommendation that the federal and provincial governments consult with industry and labor unions

with a view to enacting legislation to aid in such decentralization.

Provincial and federal governments were urged to do everything in their power to aid in the establishment of a steel industry in this province.

Removal of price restrictions on distribution of petroleum products was urged by the executive in the interests of development of oil in British Columbia.

In regard to the present exemption of government property from municipal taxation, the executive held that boards, commissions and companies of government operating as commercial organizations should pay their just and proper share of municipal taxation by grant.

The government was urged in another resolution to expedite the completion of the main highway program in the province and make better provision for the improvement and maintenance of secondary and lateral roads throughout the province.

Improving and extending the teaching of the two official languages of English and French everywhere in Canada was approved by the executive.

The provincial government was commended for its efforts to extend the Pacific Great Eastern Railway from Squamish to the Peace River.

A proposal to approve legislation of hospital sweepstakes in British Columbia was rejected.

Setting up of citizenship committees in each riding with a view to acquainting future citizens of the duties and responsibilities of citizenship was urged.

A more equitable distribution of school costs than mere tax on land was also advocated by the executive session.
