IT IS NATURAL that westerners concerned about the survival of democracy in the world are wor ried about events in China. Dr. Daniel A. Poling, president of the World Christian Endeavor Union, editor of the Christian Herald and President Truman's emissary in the Far East, warned a Toronto audience recently that Communist victories in China may endanger not only the rest of Asia but the entire Pacific area.

Opinions on this question of military aid to China differ sharply among experienced observers in China and also in this country. Gordon Walker, correspondent for the Christian Science Monitor in the Far East, wrote from Shanghai:

strictly limited aid to China is more than well founded. It seems inconceivable that anyone could talk in terms of continued aid as a means of bolsering the Nationalist cause." Since the fall of Manchuria, the United States News and World Report has sounded the warning that further American aid to China would serve largely to strengthen Communist forces since such materials have been easily captured or bought by the Communists from the Nationalists. Kuomintang troops have been surrendering in large numbers and they took with them their American supplies.
