## Prince Rupert to Help

A FLOOD DISASTER is occurring in British Columbia. It has been called national in charac-

ter. Districts of the central interior continguous to Prince Rupert have suffered. Fortunately, the plight in this area, so far at least and bad enough as it might seem to us, does not compare in magnitude with the misfortunes of other parts of the province. It might easily have been different. Then we would have been in a position of seeking help rather than being in the happy position of being able to give it.

It was a wise decision which an enthusiastic and large public meeting of citizens of Prince Rupert took last night to support the provincial food relief campaign as instituted by the Vancouver Board of Trade at the request of Premier Byron Johnson. Thereby, a two-fold purpose will be most effectively and expeditiously served in the present emergency which, in some sections, appears to be getting worse rather than better. First, it is assured that the needs of this area will be adequately met. Second, local people will have the opportunity of contributing to the succor of British Columbians who have been much more unfortunate in the flood disaster than have the people of this area.

Now that the campaign has been set in motion here, we would urgently commend it to the most generous support of the citizens individually and would suggest that local organizations devise all ways and means possible to raise funds for the need.

## Finds Dad's Work Highly Accurate

Son, Checking Boundary Survey, Reports Error of Only 15 Feet

PETERBOROUGH, Ont. (9)-Nineteen years after J. W. Pierce of Peterborough started the Ontario-Manitoba boundary survey, his son, John G. Pierce, reached Hudson Bay 15 feet from the cairn built to mark the northern boundary point.

No survey line had ever been computed with such accuracy, in the opinion of surveyors. F. W. Beatty, Ontario's surveyor-general, said earlier he would have been satisfied with a 200-foot

Starting point for the group which finished the project was Lac du Bonnet which the elder Pierce had reached in 1928. Across stream, river and muskeg the party went, slashing down trees for a distance of 12 feet at the tree line.

Although they were probably the first white men spending much time in the area, they saw little game. Polar bear tracks were seen on the coast of Hudson Bay.

Twenty-four men formed the crew for the operation known as "North Star." Included were surveyors, dog team drivers, pilots, an air engineer and axmen. Three tons of meat and 600 pounds of butter were included in their provisions. Planes, flying 323 hours, covered 34,000 miles in the four-month period.
