# Flash

**U.S. ADMITS**  
WASHINGTON—The United States Navy officially acknowledged today that two of its fighter planes had brought down a Russian bomber over waters off Korea Monday. United States claims they were armed. Russia denies this. Both sides have protested.

**ROTARY BARREL RACE**  
NEW WESTMINSTER — The New Westminster Rotary Club's Barrel Derby from Lytton to New Westminster ended last night. Time was 69 hours, 35 minutes, 15 4/5 seconds. Winners have not yet been announced.

**WITHDRAW FROM KOREA**  
OTTAWA — Two hundred members of the Canadian Peace Congress, led by Rev. J. G. Endicott, marched to the Parliament buildings today and demanded that Canada withdraw from the Korean war and instead adopt a policy of mediation and negotiation.

**STRIKE "JUSTIFIED"**  
OTTAWA — Senator J. W. de B. Ferris said today that the recent rail strike was "most justified" and urged consideration of steps to avoid tie-ups of such vital industries in the future. One such consideration, he told the Senate, might be establishment of a Labor Court in Canada.

## More British Election Talk

LONDON — Speculation has cropped up again about the possibility of a general election in Great Britain before the end of the year and it is reported that Conservative organizers have been told to be all set for an appeal to the country in November. Government sources, however, brand the reports as being "unadulterated nonsense."

## SIOUX NOT RETURNING

ESQUIMALT—Royal Canadian Naval headquarters here denied a report yesterday that HMCS Sioux was returning immediately from the Korean war. Instead, the Sioux is continuing to operate with the other Canadian destroyers—Cayuga and Athabaskan—under United Nations command.

## Murder On Diamond?

BOSTON — An anonymous letter writer last night threatened the lives of four members of the New York Yankees—Phil Rizzuto, Hank Bauer, Yogi Berra and Johnny Mize.

A pencil-scribbled note, postmarked at Hartford, Connecticut, was received by Shortstop Rizzuto last evening. It read in part: "If the Yankees are still in the pennant race on the last two days of the season and you dare to show up at Fenway Park to play the Red Sox, I have contrived to shoot you (Rizzuto) Bauer, Berra and Mize from the stands."

## THE WEATHER

**SYNOPSIS**  
Ground frost occurred in northern interior valleys and in part of the Kootenays last night. Skies are clear over most of the province today although some cloudiness still persists on the north coast. This pattern is expected to continue today and tonight. A major storm off southwestern Alaska is moving eastward toward the Alaskan Panhandle and some effects should be felt on the northern coast tomorrow afternoon. The southern and eastern parts of the province will continue sunny tomorrow with temperatures generally higher than those of today.

**FORECAST**  
North coast region—Cloudy, clearing by noon and clouding over again after midnight. Rain beginning tomorrow afternoon in the northern part. A little warmer. Light winds increasing to southeast (15) tomorrow afternoon. Lows tonight and highs tomorrow—At Port Hardy 45 and 65; Sandspit and Prince Rupert, 45 and 62.

## Controlling Of Credit

**Larger Down Payments to be Required on Cars and other Luxury Items**

OTTAWA — Finance Minister Douglas Abbott today gave notice that he proposes to seek consumer credit controls during the current session of Parliament. Buyers will have to shell out bigger down payments on instalment purchases of such items as passenger cars, refrigerators, electric stoves and other consumer goods.

The government, however, does not intend to increase down payments required in construction of new homes or purchase of new trucks or farm machinery.

The main purpose of the regulation will be to fight inflationary trends in consumer prices.

Preliminary hearing of the charge of reckless driving against Lorne Anderson was adjourned until September 15. The charge arose from an accident in which a pedestrian, Swan Peterson, was seriously injured some time ago.

## Secret Session Turned Down

**Old Tradition Revived by George Drew in Parliament**

OTTAWA — The House of Commons voted 156 to 64 today against a Progressive-Conservative suggestion for a secret session to discuss defence matters.

The vote developed upon a statement "I spy strangers" which was made by George Drew, Progressive-Conservative leader. This is a traditional form of demanding that the galleries be cleared of spectators. It dates down from Charles I's time in the British House of Commons.

The Liberals voted almost solidly against the secret session with C.C.F. and Social Credit parties joining with the Progressive-Conservatives.

Before seeking the vote, Mr. Drew warned again of Communist menace in Canada and reiterated demands for tightening of the law to "deal not with dupes but with these traitors."

Mr. Drew also charged Defence Minister Brooke Claxton with "evasion" in supplying details of defences.

When he threw out his call for a secret closed session, Mr. Drew charged that the Russians had more information about the state of Canada's defences than had Opposition members. His request came late in the first day of battle over the government's \$850,000,000 program for expanded defence and armament measures arising from Korea. Prime Minister St. Laurent was not in the Commons at the time and there was no immediate reply.

## Ready To Pounce On Communists

WASHINGTON, D.C. — J. Edgar Hoover, director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, was reported to have told senators today that his agents are ready to arrest 12,000 dangerous Communists in the United States if war should break out with Russia. Mr. Hoover was asking for increased appropriations.

## Tito Condemns North Koreans

BELGRADE — Premier Tito's government has condemned North Korean aggression and said it brings peace of the world into danger. It is the first time that Yugoslavia has taken a definite position on the Korean war.

## French Round Up Fifth Columns

PARIS — Counter-espionage agents, in widespread secret raids today, detained 208 alien communists in which the Ministry of the Interior described as an effort to "destroy fifth columns."

## Enemy Now Within Seven Miles of Important Taegu

TOKYO (CP)—Fresh communist attacks north of Taegu were rolled back by United Nations troops today but not before the enemy had increased its pressure on three sides of the important base city in the centre of the front. They reached to within seven miles of the city and further cut communication lines

## British Casualties— Fighting Off Communists

TOKYO — A British Army spokesman said today that a British brigade had fought off probing attacks against its sector on the Nakdong River and came under heavy artillery and mortar fire during the night.

Four British soldiers were wounded when a patrol came under Communist fire from high ground at their rear. They were the first British casualties in the Korean campaign.

## Killing After Week-End Party

WILLIAMS LAKE — Following Royal Canadian Mounted Police investigation, Gerald Wesley McClure, 40-year old rancher, was charged yesterday with murder in the fatal shooting in remote Buffalo Creek district of the storied Cariboo country of William Hole, colorful logging operator and veteran of both world wars.

Forty-eight years of age and said to have been the oldest air gunner in the Royal Canadian Air Force during World War II, the victim was a close friend of the man who is alleged to have slain him.

Police gave no details of the shooting which occurred seventy miles south of here. No motive has been discovered as far as can be learned. The shooting occurred Sunday following a party.

## Luxuries May Be Taxed Again

OTTAWA—While details of the defence budget of Finance Minister Douglas Abbott are a closely-guarded secret until the minister makes his announcement to Parliament this evening, speculation is that taxes on motor cars, luxury items, tobacco and liquor will be increased.

There may be an increase in the income tax.

It has already been indicated that compulsory saving will not be resumed.

## Dollar Haircut In Pr. Rupert

Prince Rupert barbers are today announcing an increase in prices. Henceforth it will cost \$1 to have a professional haircut and 75c for a shave. Junior can have a haircut for 75c if he goes other than on a Saturday or a day preceding a holiday.

Eight members of the Barbers' Association join in announcing the price increase.

Most of 84 Russian-made tanks which the North Koreans threw into battle yesterday were destroyed or damaged.

Allied aircraft are credited with destroying nineteen enemy tanks and damaging 22 more in a record of 625 sorties. Seventeen others had been knocked out Wednesday.

Two Red thrusts against Taegu have been stopped, an official United Nations communiqué said. One lunge was halted seven miles north of the rail and supply centre along the Kumhwa Highway by United States troops. The other was forced back east of Yongchon, road junction twenty miles east of Taegu.

A spokesman for General MacArthur's headquarters said the Allies were holding firm on all fronts.

## Is Named School Health Inspector

A delegation of powers of direction and administration of school health services in the district to the Prince Rupert Health Unit and naming the director of the health unit as health inspector passed the board of trustees after discussion at their meeting last night.

In presenting the papers to the board, Dr. D. McC. Black, director of the unit, said the health unit had been performing the duties for the past few years and that the transfer was effective in all other districts in the province that had health units.

Chairman of the Board Dr. R. G. Large said he would feel concerned if examination of school children was taken out of the hands of the board. He felt the idea was all right but he did not want to have the board's control over health prejudiced. He was assured the health unit was responsible to the union board of health and, if differences arose, they should be handled through the union board.

## Baby Budget Is Awaited

OTTAWA — New taxes will be announced tonight in the House of Commons by Finance Minister Douglas Abbott.

Contents of the "baby budget" will remain a secret until Mr. Abbott speaks but one thing is clear—the government needs more revenue to meet expenditures arising out of participating in the Korean war, out of the accelerated defence program at home and out of the provision of arms-aid to Europe.

There is general belief that there will be increases in taxes on corporations and on luxuries such as automobiles.

Some observers believe personal income tax will remain the same. Others predict it will be increased, starting January 1 next.

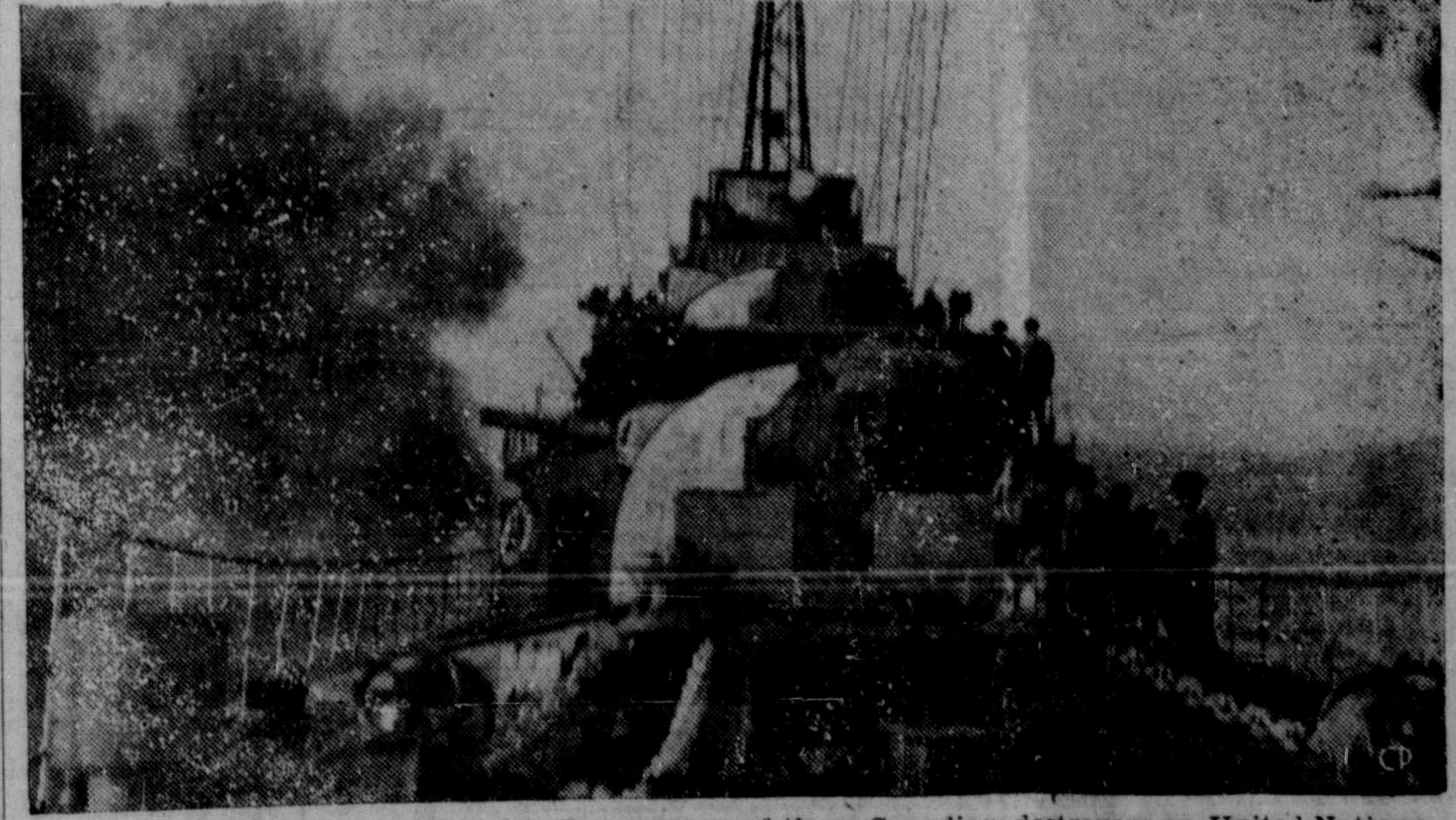

## Sufficient Unto the Day

ALTHOUGH Prince Rupert is a point upon which much attention is being focussed from the defence standpoint, little appears to be going on about doing something about it.

The Opposition has been making a big thing of the vulnerability of the coast but the government does not appear to be very worried about the situation, so far at least, although the minister of national defence does not rule out the possibility of diversionary raids and admits that the country cannot be considered impregnable.

Of course, the big defence budget has yet to be approved. When appropriations start to be made from that, it is reasonable to suppose that some attention will be given to Prince Rupert.

But, even if the government is complacent about us out here, that complacency is matched by the calm attitude of the people resident here themselves. We seem to be a lot less worried than, for instance, the people of Vancouver, who are getting worked up about the need for civil defence measures, and the people of Alaska, who seem to think the territory a potential Korea.

Some people find it difficult to make up their minds just what is the realistic stand—whether it could or couldn't happen here. None of us want to be alarmists. We all like to feel secure. We are always hopeful and like to think wishfully.

After all it may have been a wise prophet who cheerfully said: "Sufficient to the day is the evil thereof?" Yet some might say he was improvidential.

### ARGUMENT REFUTED

If there is any sure key to the trend of permanent population it should be a comparison of school enrolment. Yesterday we reported an increase of seventy in the elementary school population of Prince Rupert in one year which is pretty close to nine percent on the total of 794 a year ago. This, it should be remembered, does not take into account the High School population or that of Annunciation School which could almost double the total figure.

The city council, at a recent meeting, theorized that the transient population of Prince Rupert might be decreasing, suggesting by such a theory that the housing situation might soon not be as serious as some have been suggesting.

Certainly, this very marked trend to increase in school population is no indication of any decrease in population, present or impending, unless, of course, we allow conditions to persist that would make it impossible or uncomfortable for the people to stay here.

As a matter of fact, almost everyone knows that there would be more families and more children here even now if accommodation could be found for them.

DESK CLEAN-UP

I DON'T KNOW whether I can call my summer activities a holiday or not. It always takes me a week or so to get back into the groove or rut or whatever you want to call the routine of work.

Then, too, my desk is always piled up. Here for instance are marked copies of several articles in Communist papers attacking me for advocating Canadian participation in the UN resistance to the aggression by North Korea. There is a marked letter to the editor of the Vancouver Sun from a lady attacking me for precisely the opposite. Obviously she either can't read, or is so eager to take a whack at me that she first misquotes me as saying exactly the opposite to what I did say then lashes out on the basis of her own fabrications.

ONE LADY sends me the second draft of the manuscript of a novel she has written.

There is an invitation to attend the premiere performance of the Cowichan Indian opera, "Tingquaw" and an inquiry from an important women's organization which wants to sponsor the first performance of same on the Canadian mainland.

There is a fine poem from a friend of Swedish origin, Calle Erickson. It is called FARM BOY'S TRUE LOVE but, as it has nine verses, it is too long to publish here. It's about a homesick man in the city who yearns to go back.

Where the air is fragrant with perfume of the soil, and the wheat stands high.

O God, if I stay in the city I will wilt away and die.

O boy, to sit on a gangplow And eawk at the cloud on high.

And dream of my own little sweetheart And our love that will never die.

MR. ERICKSON is no alarmist but he points out that in event of war the destruction of a few bridges over the Fraser would tie this part of Canada in knots. He favors the immediate construction of a tunnel under the Fraser—and so do I.

I think there is a lot of bunk talked about protection against the atomic bomb. What is going to protect us against atomic dust, or against germ killers that can be carried in bottles?

Nevertheless it does seem to me ordinary prudence, or horse-sense, to guard against the obvious and worst dangers. Surely

cities like Vancouver should get busy and start on underground railways—so constructed as also to serve as bomb shelters in time of war.

Apart altogether from their possible value in wartime, as in London and Moscow in Hitler's war, we will have to build them some day—why not now?

AN ITEM from the India Information office says the New Delhi Physical Laboratory is making a new kind of super-accurate clock. It will operate by measuring the oscillation of molecules of ammonia. These oscillations are said to be free from variation due to heat, altitude or humidity.

Another item says that a scientific body will systematically investigate astrology and attempt to separate the truth from the falsity in its claims.

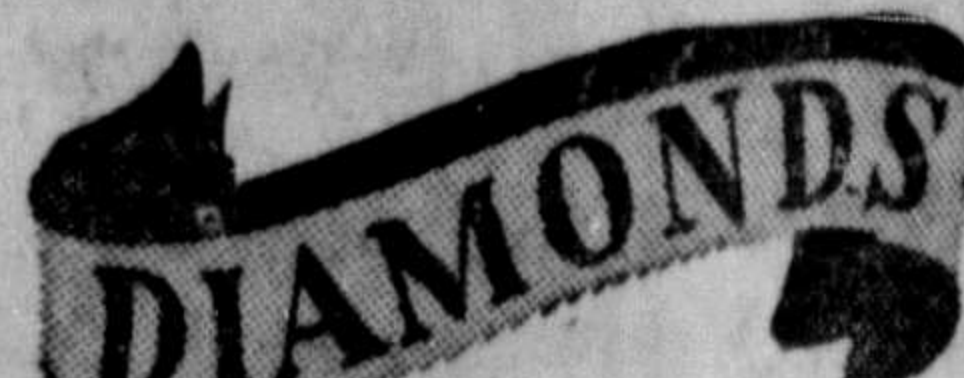

#### School Board Has Building Headache

Last night's meeting of the school board proved a headache factory for trustees as costs above contract price for building the new schools mounted to almost \$15,000 although work has hardly started. Letters from the architects Sharp and Thompson, Berwick, Pratt informed the board of the additional costs involved.

First came the concrete tunnel for protection of the city's water main under the new Booth school at about \$1,500. That was necessary because they had been told by City Engineer Don Stewart before plans had been drawn that reasonable precautions would be necessary and what they considered to be reasonable precautions did not meet the approval of Mr. Stewart. Plans had to be altered accordingly.

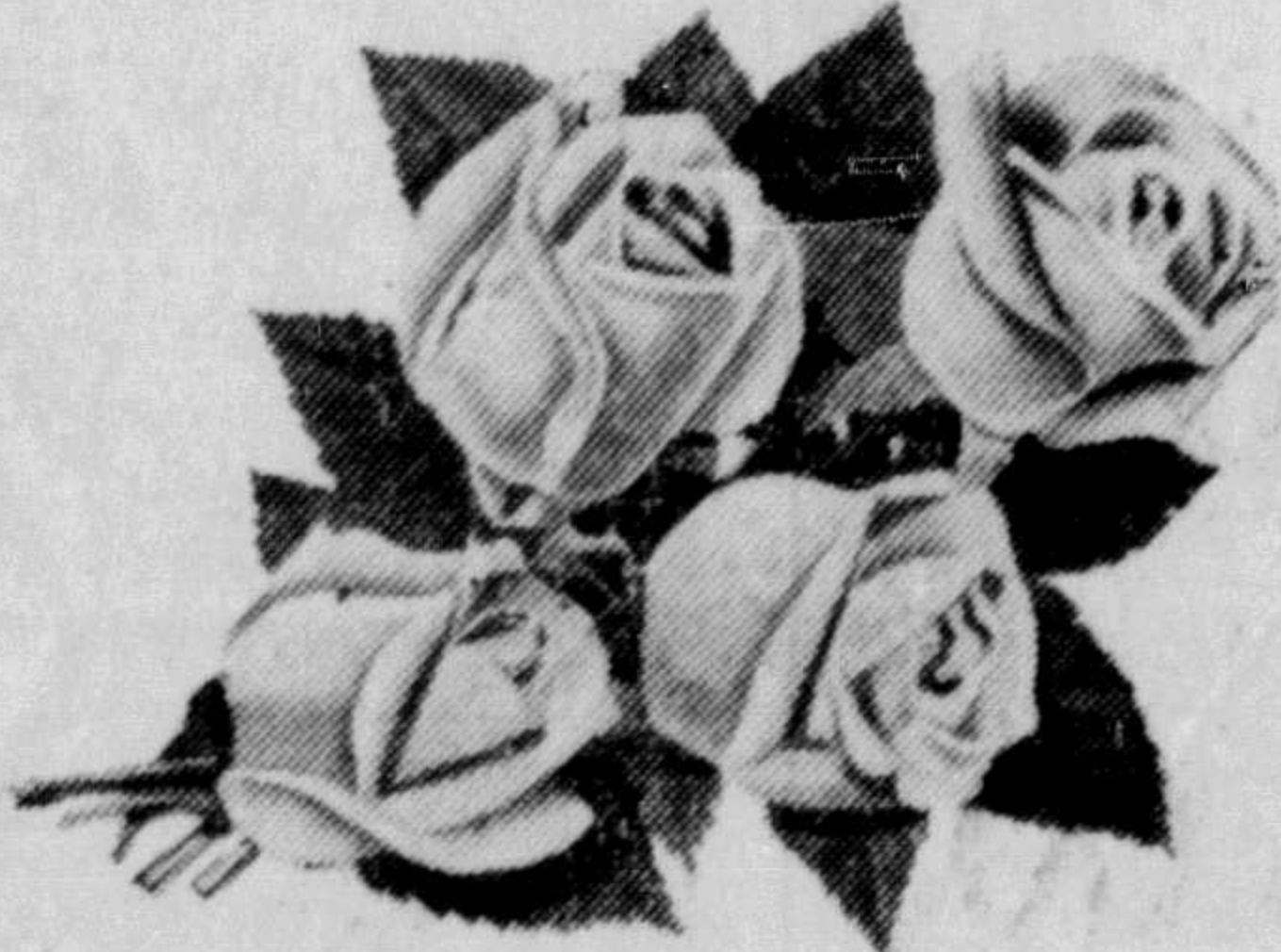
Then there was the matter of gyproc sheeting at an added cost of \$800, geers for the gymnasium at \$9,313, installation of a fuel tank at \$252, all above the contract price. With the exception of the gyproc, the gymnasium doors, and the tank installation, the board disclaimed all knowledge of the changes until after work had been completed. In the case of the tank installation, Trustee Bruce Brown said he had talked with the contractor, who had advised him the tank storing fuel for the old school was in the way of work for the new one and that they had agreed a good plan would be to install the tank for the new school immediately and connect the old school furnace with the tank, the extra cost to be only for connecting. He asked that a separate letter be sent to the architect querying the expenditure. The matter of the doors was an expected charge above the contract. Trustee A. Dominato backed up Trustee Brown's remarks. In addition, the architect suggested weatherstripping window sash at \$560.

On motion of Trustee Brown, seconded by Trustee Mrs. E. W. Becker, a committee was set up to pass on changes of details of construction up to \$500 additional cost between board meetings. The committee appointed by Chairman Dr. R. G. Large consists of Trustee Dominato and Joe Scott.

## Cordova Hits Crab Jackpot

Fisherman Reap Big Profit From Lucky Find

CORDOVA, Alaska, (AP)—Fishermen of this Alaska coastal town have struck a crab leg bonanza. With their daily earnings running up into three figures, it looks as though the strike is as rich as any of the lucky oldtime sourdoughs' early day gold findings. "A yarn that a couple of men were making \$300 a day in a few player gold strike would arouse terrific excitement," wrote Florence Martin, Cordova Times publisher. "Yet the crab fishermen are making that kind of money—and it is just as good as if it came in nuggets."

Cordova is one of the big producers of canned and frozen crab. The species is known on the Pacific Coast as the Dungeness. But until recently all of the Cordova area catch was taken from Prince William Sound, adjacent to the town.

Because the found crab beds always supplied enough of a catch to make a good living for the fishermen few of them ever ventured outside.

It was during the closed season in the south that a venturesome fisherman decided about a month ago to try his luck in the Gulf of Alaska—the vast body of North Pacific water that washes the breadth of Alaska's southern coast.

He put out his traps and brought in a first day's haul of

3,300 crabs. A Cordova packing plant paid him 15 cents a crab—\$450 for his day's efforts.

**BIG CATCHES**  
Soon a half dozen fishermen were working in the same area, each with from 100 to 150 traps. After several weeks of fishing, the boats continued to bring in from 1,800 to 2,500 crabs each. Small boats are manned usually by a man and a boy, or by two men at most, so the daily take has been running \$150 to \$250 each.

Since the fishermen already had the traps for their Prince William Sound fishing, just about the only additional expense for the bait and the boat operation.

The fishermen like it because they can leave early in the morning, run out to the gulf, pull their traps and be back in town by evening. The town likes it because it is the biggest flow of steady money it has seen for a long time.

The men and women who process the crab meat are making big pay checks too. The packing plant crab "shakers"—they literally shake the meat from the shells—are the elite of the packing crews. A skilled "shaker" can remove about 45 pounds of meat a day. At 9½ cents a pound, that's \$42.75 for a day's leg shaking.

The crab meat is either canned or quick-frozen in salmon cans and shipped to brokers in Seattle and San Francisco.

All this is happening in a season when the crab catch has been slim in such normally heavy hunting grounds as Washington State coastal waters.

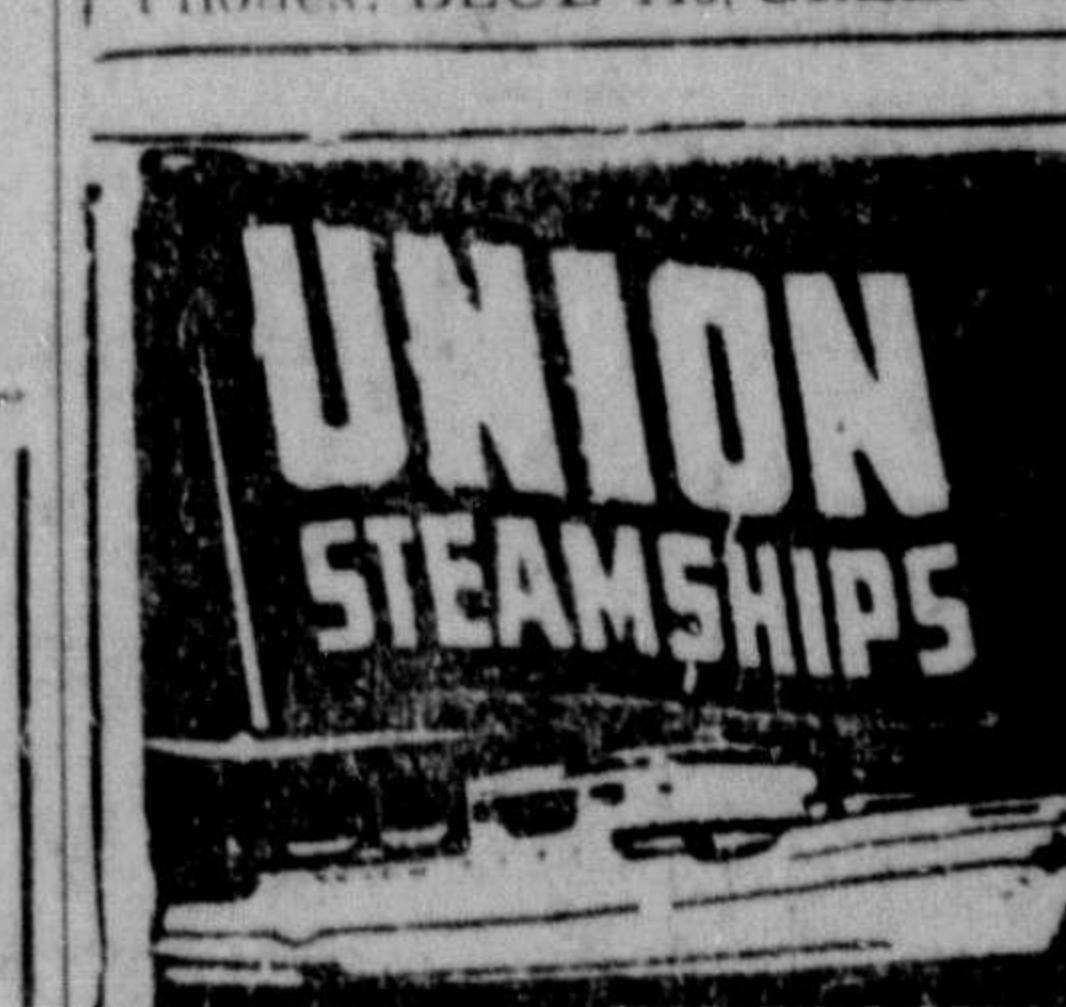

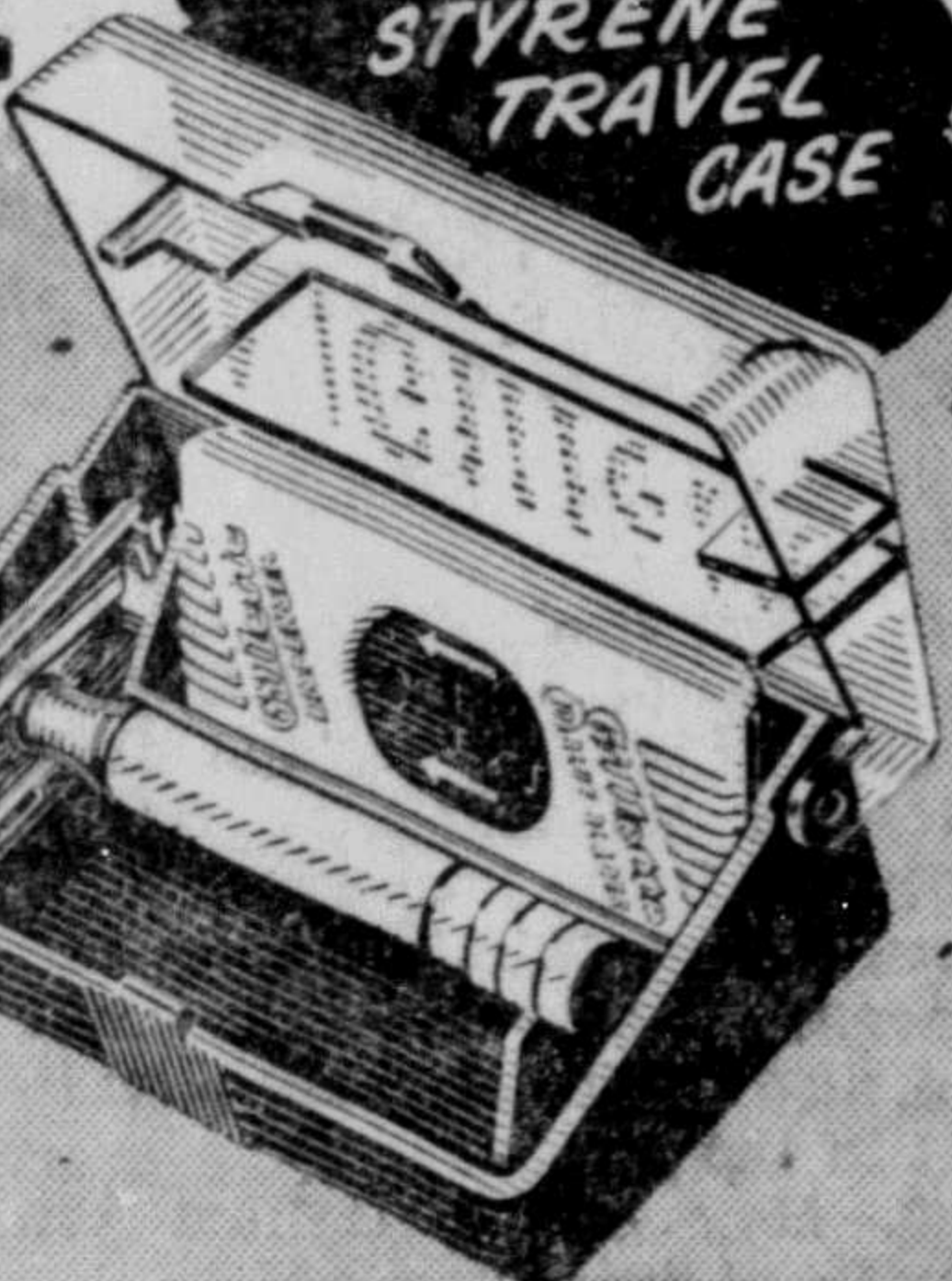

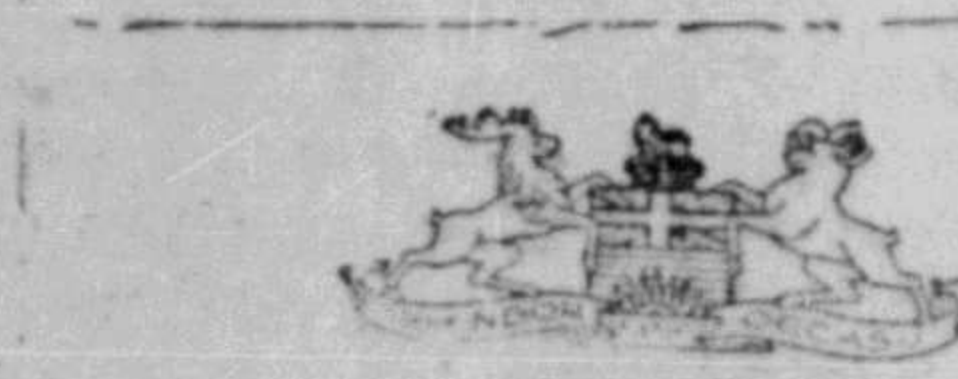

## Improvements For Schools

A letter from the fire marshal read at last night's regular meeting of the board of school trustees said use of the heating plant in the new building at Booth Memorial High School to heat the old building would be satisfactory provided a furnace room complying with specifications laid in a previous letter was built. Otherwise, the recommen-

dations for Borden Street and Port Edward Schools in the previous letter would have to be complied with.

Recommendations for Borden Street included construction of a furnace chamber, installation of sprinkler heads and metal clad doors, widening fire escapes from their present 31 inches to six feet and rehanging doors to open outward. The secretary was instructed to obtain estimates for widening fire escape platforms to six feet and rehanging doors to open outward.

Recommendations for Port Edward were to have fuel supply tanks installed on metal stands rather than on the present wooden ones, the Yukon chimney to be dismantled and rebuilt according to specifications, the bracket chimney to be supported from the ground on concrete and masonry and the exit doors to be widened to 40 feet. The board decided to obtain further information before acting on the suggestions for Port Edward.

## Films Shown At Cancer Meeting

At a public meeting of the Canadian Cancer Society Wednesday afternoon two interesting films on the subject were shown. First was "The Doctor Speaks His Mind," the second "Time Is Life."

In the former a country practitioner has just left a friend who has incurable cancer. He starts thinking of the cases that might have been cured or helped if the people concerned had just gone to the doctor when first symptoms appeared, rather than waiting until it was too late. With this it contrasted his reminiscences of cases that had been reported or found in routine check-ups in time to effect cures. It presented a strong plea for early reporting of symptoms. The picture also pointed out the danger of running into a "quack."

The latter film dealt with the case of one woman who feared a lump on her breast meant cancer, how she finally went to a cancer station, had an interview and then went to her family physician. It then dealt with a minor operation to remove the lump and examine it. During examination, the incision was kept open until the tissue of the lump was examined by a pathologist to determine whether it was cancerous or harmless. When found harmless, the incision was closed and the woman discharged from hospital within a few days. Had it been found cancerous an operation to remove all the cancer tissue would have been performed. The picture went on to show how the woman determined to assist others in discovering cancer and dispelling the fears that keep a person from obtaining diagnosis, and treatment if necessary, in time to be effective.

The meeting yesterday followed on the suggestion of Mrs. Good and Mrs. Dawson, provincial workers, on their visit here last month, that public meetings be held quarterly with either a good speaker or films.

In the short business meeting before the film showing minutes were read by Secretary Rev. F. Antrobus. The treasurer's report was presented by Mrs. W. Murdoch and correspondence was read by Mr. Antrobus. President Mrs. W. Rothwell was in the chair.

Following showing of the films, tea was served to the few who attended.

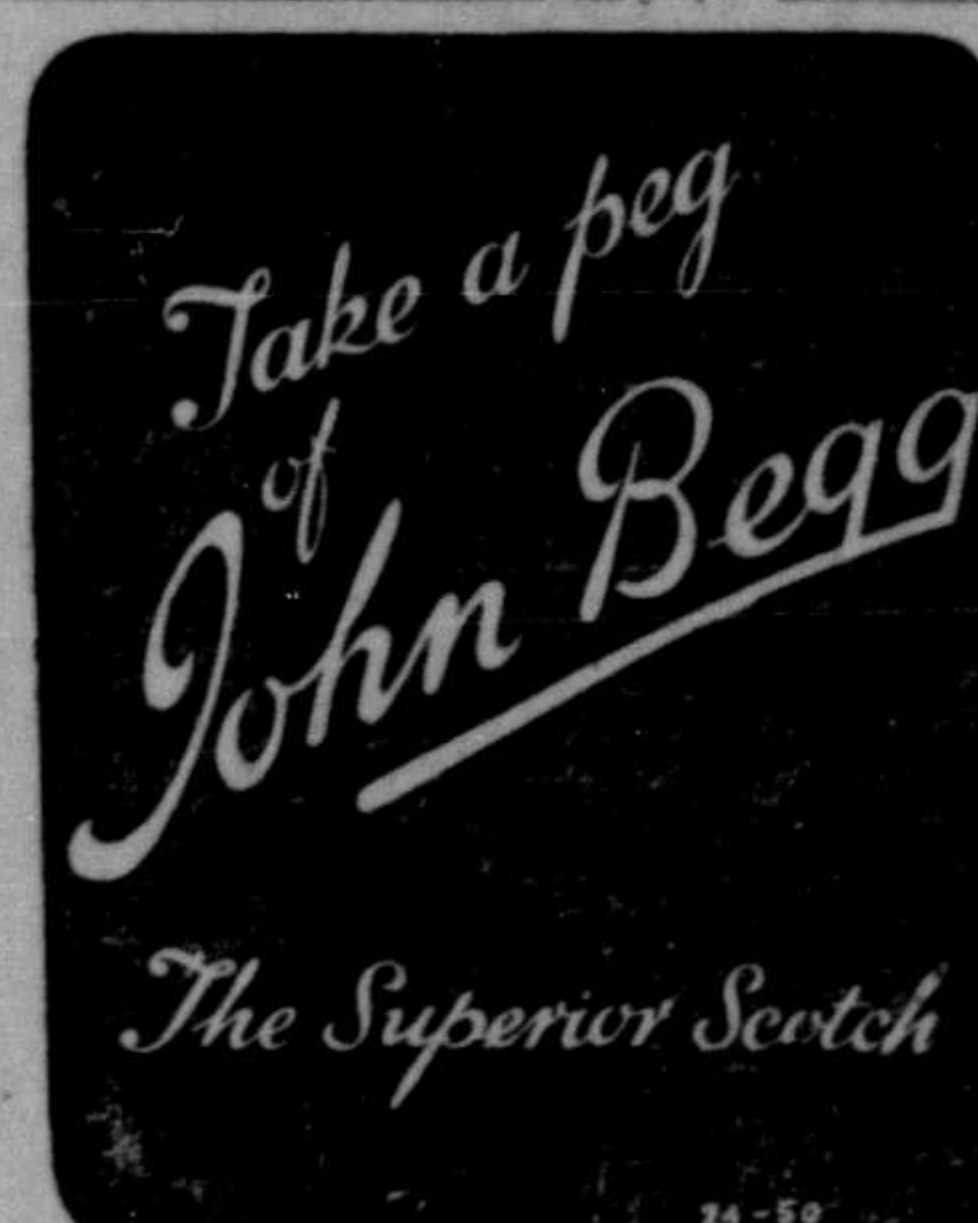

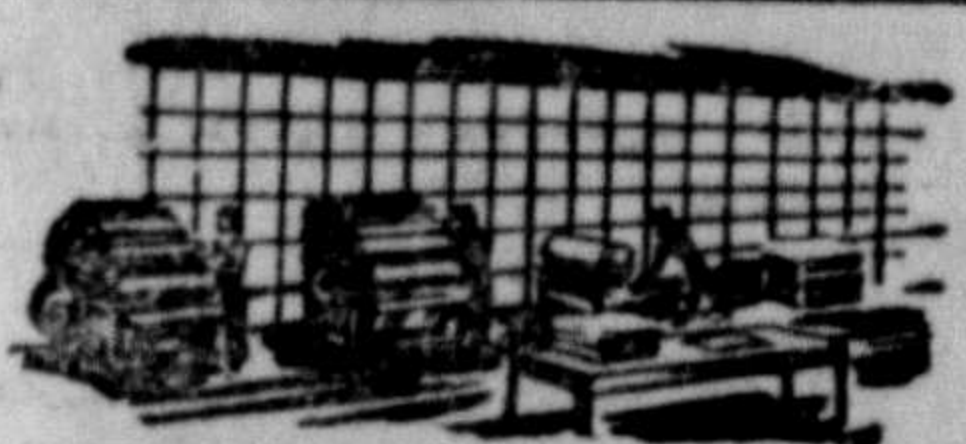
