Announcement was made by the International Fisheries Commission last night that the remaining halibut areas on the coast which have been open to the fishery since May 1 will close at midnight, July 12. The affected are Area Three, Area 1A and Area 4.

Area 2 and Area 1B closed at midnight, June 3 after fected. having produced their allotted quota of 24,500,000 pounds.

Area 3, the most productive portion, has a quota of 28,000,-000 pounds and Area 4, 500,000 pounds. Area 3 lies between Cape Spencer, Alaska and Cape Sarichef on Unimak Island in the Aleutians. Area 4 includes waters north of Cape Sarichef in the Bering Sea. Under the regulations it normally closes at the same time as Area 3 unless its catch has been exceeded before that time.

Area 1A is the most southerly of the halibut zones on the coast, lying south of Cape Blanco. Oregon.



### Liberals Heartened

IBERAL QUARTERS in the federal election L contest, which culminates with the voting a week from Monday and on which interest will now be focussed with a sort of a whirlwind finish, will be heartened by the result of the provincial election which went so strongly in favor of the Coalition candidate. In the federal fight here, there is also a sort of coalition situation since the Conservatives have no candidate in the field. It might be expected, therefore, that the general issue will be somewhat similar in the federal contest here to what it was in the provincial-free enterprise vs. socialism.

It might also be reasonable to expect, from the standpoint of an impartial observer, that, in view of the way things went in the provincial contest fight here, Mr. Applewhaite might now be an oddson favorite to take the seat from the C.C.F. as did Mr. McRae, the provincial. However, we have long since learned that there is nothing sure about a poli-"tical contest until the ballots are counted so nothing should be taken for granted-no matter how favorable the signs may be.

It will now be a short and snappy contest and we hope may be as cleanly and amiably fought out as was the provincial campaign now ended.



#### THE PRAYER BOOK

LISH LANGUAGE evolved from being simply tongue into a modern classical vehicle of expression as a result of three books which came into the

ears and to the hands of the people of England. The first of these in point of time was the Book of Common Prayer authorized for use in public worship on Whitsunday, 1549, just 400 years ago tomorrow. The other two belong to the same period and are the works of William Shakespeare and the Authorized Version of the

The Common Prayer Book has given to Anglicans the heritage of the finest in all Christian devotion in the simple beauty of their own tongue at its purest and highest level . Archbishop Thomas Cranmer was the compiler of this book and this is most certainly his greatest contribution to posterity. He did more than translate the prayers from the ancient Latin service books. He gave to the people a simple language and system of devotion. He also incorporated Miles Coverdale's translation of the Book of Psalms which is still unequalled for devotional use. Revisions and changes have been made chiefly for partisan, local or doctrinal consideration but basically the beauty and the simplicity of the 1549 book are

The idea of a Book of Common Prayer is, of course, the principle of unity of thought and intent that ought to exist among Christian people, also the principle of educating Christians in the path of the prayer and praise they ought to make rather than simply what they may feel like making. But incidentally it is the comfort and neurishment of things that are put into good words that are often so hard to express at all. There are those who contend with some justice that it is of greater importance to have a book of common prayer in the language of the people than to have the Bible so rendered-since the important thing about religion is not how much we know but what action will issue from that knowledge.

Many rejoice in the fact of the Prayer Book who habitually worship in a much freer manner. Uncounted numbers borrow from it when it comes to the observance rites and ceremonies as are common to all Christians. Long may it continue to exercise its stable strength among all who speak the tongue that Shakespear spokel

Basis of the dispute, which also involves the negotiating committee of the Native Brotherhood of B. C., acting for the Indian fishermen, is not the sockeye price, but the price offered for pinks and chums which will be fished later. However, the fishermen want the whole price schedule settled befor the season begins.

Prices sought by the fishermen are last year's minimums: pinks, (average) 7 cents; chums (average) 61/4 cents; coho, 14 cents, sockeye 18 cents.

Major differences now are in he pink and chum prices and whether or not settlement will be reached by the official opening of the season, time alone

Actual number of boats which will fish on the Skeena this year is not known at present, but it is expected that it will be as many as 700 gillnetters were large as former years when as operating.

Opening of the Naas and Skeena on June 19 is a departure from previous custom, being a week earlier than usual. Another departure is to redefine the Naas river gillnet area to include Port Simpson harbor which has been closed to gillnetting for the last 15 years.

Spring salmon gillnetters on the Skeena river found better fishing this week fater a discouraging period when bad weather and absence of fish made things difficult. Size of the week's catch was not reported, but it is said to be considerably better than the previous week. There are about 100 boats on the river.

The big question facing deep sea fishermen at the present time is: Will tuna show up off this coast this summer? The answer, so far, according to Capt. Lewellyn Sheppard of the fisheries protection vessel Laurier, is that they have not made an appearance yet-

But Capt. Sheppard and Inspector Art Touchings, who is in charge of the investigation, are not worried yet. They pointed out Wednesday that, since there has been no previous investigation at this time of year, it cannot be known what time the fish might ordinarily approach ne Queen Charlottes.

In addition to being immediately valuable to the fishernen by sending out daily reports from the areas they cruise, the investigation is of longterm importance in discovering the movements and habits of the fish which last year made their first recorded appearance off the Islands.


