Tojo and Other Japanese War Lords Hanged

War Criminals Are Executed at Tokyo

TOKYO (CP)—Hideki Tojo and six other Japanese war lords were hanged today. The United States Army announced that the hangings took place at Sugamo Prison one minute after midnight and thirty-five minutes after midnight.

Others hanged were: General Kenji Dohara, Manchurian plotter. Koki Hirota, former Premier. Gen. Seishiro Itagaki, former war minister. Gen. Heitaro Kumura, chief of Japanese armies in Manchuria. Gen. Iwane Matsui, commander at the "Rape of Nanking." Lt. Gen. Akira Muto, chief of staff in the Philippines. Newspapermen were not allowed to attend.

ROOSEVELT IS KILLED

Grandson of President Theodore Loses Life in Air Crash

SHANGHAI—Quentin Roosevelt, grandson of the late former President Theodore Roosevelt, was one of thirty-five persons who were killed yesterday in the crash of a Chinese National Airlines air liner near Hong Kong. All on board the plane lost their lives. Roosevelt was vice-president of the Chinese National Airlines.

PARNELL THOMAS TRIAL DATE SET

WASHINGTON—Congressman Parnell Thomas, chairman of the committee on un-American activities, will stand trial January 10 for conspiracy to defraud the government by payroll padding. He was recently indicted by a federal grand jury.

ULTIMATUM ON ANNETTE ISLE

Not long ago it was made known at Metlakatla, on Annette Island near Ketchikan, that, unless the Standard Oil Co. and army authorities arrived at some settlement with Metlakatla, which claims ownership of the Annette Island air base, both would be served notice to move. It was explained by Mayor Rod Davis that in the past the army had leased the airfield.

CONNIE MACK IS AMBITIOUS

Veteran Baseball Manager is Looking for Another Pennant For Athletics Next Year

PHILADELPHIA—Connie Mack hinted today on the eve of his eighty-sixth birthday that 1949 might be the year for "one more pennant." The man who helped form the American League and guide it through 48 seasons hopes that his Athletics can take the championship next season for the first time since 1931.

Civil Servants And Members of Forces Given Pay Increase

OTTAWA (CP)—Pay increases for civil servants and members of the armed forces, top ranking officials excepted, were announced yesterday by the federal government retroactive to October 1. The new scales with increases ranging between \$10 and \$20 a month are made for a large group of civil service classes.

Over 70 Club Yule Dinner

Over 5,000 years of useful received fitting tribute Tuesday afternoon when members of the city's "Over 70" club were guests of honor at the sixth annual Christmas dinner sponsored by the Women's Co-ordinating Council in the United Church basement. POWER IS OFF IN VANCOUVER

Heavy Snow Affect Electric Service—More Yesterday and Last Night

VANCOUVER—Vancouver was intermittently without electric light and power yesterday, all parts of the city being affected. After heavy snow carried down transmission lines from the new Bridge River plant, Stave Falls, Bulkley and Lake Buntzen plants were all pressed into full service while line crews worked between the city and Bridge River. Heavy snow fell again late yesterday afternoon and last night in Vancouver.

CORNWALLIS TO REOPEN IN MAY

OTTAWA—For use as a new entry training establishment, H. M.C.S. Cornwallis, near Deep Brook, Nova Scotia, has been returned to the Royal Canadian Navy. During the war, the base was the largest of its kind in the British Empire. In 1946 it was declared surplus. The reopening of this \$12,000,000 base will be next May. The accommodation provided would be useful in the event of future expansion of the Royal Canadian Navy.

UNITED STATES TO BUILD GREAT SHIP

Forty-Eight Thousand Ton Vessel Is Planned WASHINGTON—Announcement has been made by the Maritime Commission that early in 1949 building will commence of a 48,000-ton liner, the largest ever built in the United States. Cruising speed will be 28.5 knots. There will be peace-time facilities for 2,000 passengers. As a troop transport, it will be able to handle 12,000 men, with equipment.

FISHERMEN ASK COMPLETION OF BREAKWATER; RULES CONSIDERED

Halibut fishermen and boat owners here will urge the federal government to let contracts for construction of a breakwater at the Fairview Bay floats and building of a road approach to the floats, money for which was appropriated by parliament this year.

The proposal was made at a joint meeting of 60 fishermen and boat owners last night.

The meeting also considered a brief to be presented to the annual meeting of the International Fisheries Commission with representatives of the industry at Seattle on January 12.

Emil Petersen will be the boat owners delegate to the conference and George Anderson, union secretary will represent the union. Both will leave here on January 6 to meet with other groups at Seattle to co-ordinate their briefs prior to presenting them to the international body.

Proposal to speed up government action on the breakwater and road approach was introduced by Mr. Anderson, who pointed out to the meeting that, if the money is not used this fiscal year, it will be returned to general revenue, necessitating a re-appropriation next year. This year, \$72,000 was appropriated for the road approach and \$75,000 for breakwater.

Highlight of the brief to be presented to the International Fisheries Commission is a resolution urging that a proposed new international treaty, drawn up more than two years ago, be ratified by the Canadian and American governments. Contained in the new treaty is provision for the extension of the authority of the International Commission to include other types of fishery, a step which the fishermen feel necessary for the industry. At present, the Commission's authority is confined to halibut.

Other proposals, which will be co-ordinated with fisheries groups from west coast ports for presentation to the Commission: 1. That the opening of the 1949 halibut season be held back one month until June 1. 2. That 25 percent halibut be allowed to be retained under permit when caught with set here.

W. W. Taylor Vancouver Hardware Merchant, Receives Award

MONTREAL—The distinction of being the two millionth passenger to be carried by Trans-Canada Air Lines fell upon W. W. Taylor, a hardware merchant from West Vancouver. He was homeward bound on Tuesday's North Star Transcontinental flight after a business trip here. Just before taking off from Montreal airport, A. C. McKim, traffic vice-president, of T.C.A., presented him with a travelling bag to mark the occasion.

In accepting the gift Mr. Taylor complimented T.C.A. personnel for their very courteous service. "There is one thing I like about T.C.A.—the average passenger gets the same courteous treatment as the most important banker or business executive."

It took T.C.A. nine years to carry its first million passengers and just two years to get the second million.

THE WEATHER

Synopsis

The low pressure area which developed just off the southern coast of British Columbia yesterday is moving slowly south along the Washington coast this morning. Snow and rain falling over the southern part of Vancouver Island expected to end during the forenoon. Conditions should improve appreciably over the southern Island and Lower Mainland with relatively clear skies this afternoon. Variable cloudiness and widely scattered snow flurries over the mountains of the interior will be general during the week.

An active storm moving into the Gulf of Alaska this morning is expected to bring mixed rain and snow to the north coast and gale force winds to the waters of the Charlottes during the afternoon.

Increasing cloudiness and rain are likely to spread to the south coast tomorrow.

Direction Signs Needed

PRINCE RUPERT is not without signs. Yet to many a stranger, this is a puzzling city. Often, in other communities, there are points of resemblance but it can hardly be said that such is noticeable here. The moment one steps from boat, car or plane, a distinct sense of "something different" is felt and the need of asking one's way around even though this is far from being a large centre.

Prince Rupert has signs but they are not displayed in a way readily or easily seen. Signs are cut in an avenue sidewalk and the newcomer may walk over them, and be unaware of any such fact. Local residents who have lived here any length of time know all about the streets and squares but because they are well posted does not mean all are.

It is well to remember that population is changing. New faces are seen every day, and it will continue like this as Prince Rupert grows.

In whatever general policy of local improvement the city follows in the future, it is essential that nothing be omitted or neglected to the end that in motoring or walking, any uncertainty or inconvenience be avoided. It is important to know where places of public consequence are and how to go from one address to another. Sometimes valuable time can be lost through having to make inquiries or wonder which way to go.

PAPERS AND ELECTIONS

SIXTY-FIVE PERCENT of the American newspapers supported Governor Dewey in the election and the list included redoubtable names such as the New York Times, Cleveland Plain Dealer, St. Louis Post-Dispatch, Kansas City Star, Denver Post and Los Angeles Times. To suggest, as many are so fond of saying, that a paper's survival can hinge on a politician's success at the polls or the fortunes of some party, is as mischievous as it is misleading. Papers are expected to have opinions and express them. But readers are entitled to far more than that and they are not disappointed. Papers will live and prosper, as someone has remarked so long as their enduring qualities stem, not from parties and partisans, but from integrity, courage and business principles.

SOMETHING FORGOTTEN

PAUL ROBESON, celebrated singer and earnest Communist, spoke at that recent "peace conference" in Toronto where, according to those in a position to know, there was a strong pro-Soviet attitude. Mr. Robeson, it appears, devoted a lot of attention to George Drew, Canada's Progressive-Conservative leader. He repeatedly urged his defeat. Just why, is not exactly clear.

Mr. Robeson, in his remarks, said nothing whatever about Canada having passed a law in 1793 abolishing slavery. This was seventy years before Abraham Lincoln's emancipation proclamation and during which time thousands of Mr. Robeson's race found freedom and sanctuary in Canada while slavery was still an institution in his own country. He forgot or neglected to mention that.

The average English actor, like the average Irish, can bore one stiff. The characters often seem to fall flat. But there died in Southern California Monday an English actor who remained virile and capable up to almost the end of his 85 years and it seems hardly possible the place he filled with such consummate ability can ever be filled. Sir Aubrey Smith, in appearance and in a hundred other ways, portrayed a certain type of Briton we all know, yet cannot describe to one's satisfaction. He had a blending of lordly graciousness and dignity, coupled with an understanding and exquisite sense of humor that gave to his every act a delightful charm and realism.

This is the shortest day of the year? Or was it yesterday? Anyway, it makes precious little difference so far as the average mortal is concerned. It will no doubt be weeks before anyone will notice daylight appearing earlier to the slightest degree. In this man's town, few people ever see daybreak unless homeward bound but, of course, there are exceptions.

It had been an evening of cheer for the roaming fact-finder. Arriving home Tuesday hours past midnight, he sank into slumber, possibly profound but not noiseless. That early shoulder shake was abrupt and most inconsiderate. Gray dawn was on the way and, despite an uncombed and quaking head, he again found in coffee, scrambled eggs and toast, a comforting potency. Reporting for daily duties he chanced to pass a familiar cafe and felt a sudden craving for more coffee but nothing else. The cup was brought, the waiter, withal, giv-

FIFTY YEARS PENNY POST

Was Started Between
Britain and Canada
Half a Century Ago

LONDON—It will be 50 years ago Christmas Day since the penny post was introduced between Canada and Britain.

When the Postmaster General of Britain told Queen Victoria what was planned, she inquired on what day it was to come in force.

"We thought of the Prince's birthday," said the P.M.G., having in mind the Prince of Wales, born November 9.

"And what Prince?" asked the queen, in her icest tones.

The Postmaster General was equal to the occasion.

"The Prince of Peace on Christmas Day," he replied.

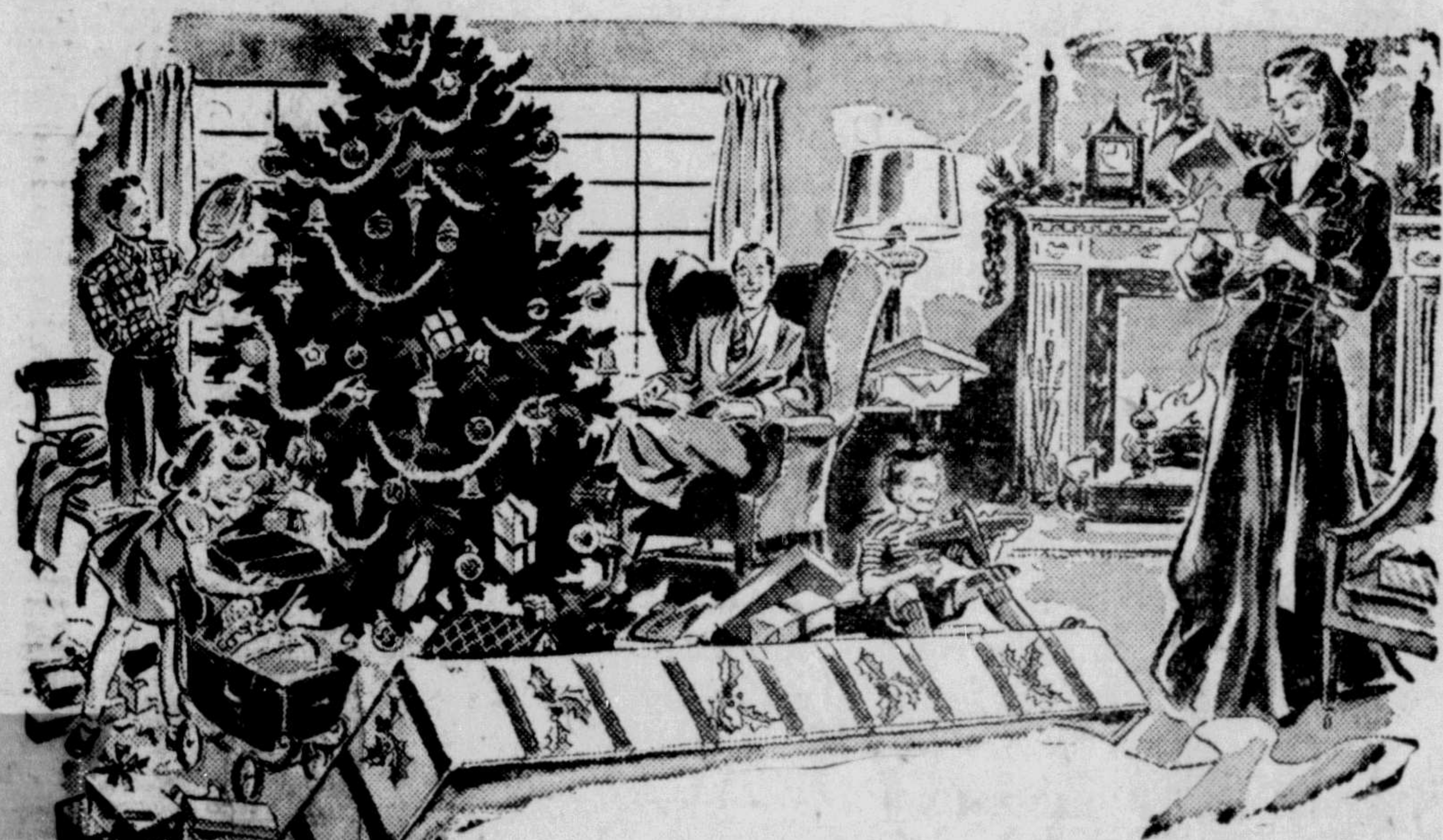
