NEW ORLEANS—An Equadorian plane enroute to Honduras crashed Saturday in Mexico, killing eight members of the crew, the Civil Aeronautical Administration said on Sunday. The plane ran out of gas and tried to land at an air field near Cozumel, Mexico.

Evidence showed that Hayden had "mistreated" his wife over a period of years and on the morning of the shooting had threatened to kill her.

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Their Case is Ours

IF ONE WERE INCLINED to look on the dark side of things it would be easy to believe that liberty is a dying cause. In our tortured world there are millions in whom the urge to be free has burned to grey ashes, the dull hope of survival. They have lived too long in the shadow of fear, fear of hunger and imprisonment and torture and death for themselves and those they love. They have known the power of a wickedness that has wiped a out for them, the kindlier teachings of two thousand years. Where they look forward at all their despairing vision sees no farther than tomorrow's food and tomorrow's safety.

Let us not imagine that their case is not our case. They represent much more than half the people of Europe who dare not think or act for themselves. They occupy more than two thirds of its acres. It is these hopeless millions who make the threat of another war so terrifying.

We still believe that the little, undying spark in the human spirit that demands freedom is everywhere, ready to break into flame. It is easy for us - to believe. We have not lived under so near a threat. We devise and control and administer our own institutions. We think and act and speak as we choose. .. Not so the most of Europe. They are without food, and must be fed. But our obligation goes further than that. They are without hope. We have to help these shrinking millions to want to be free again. Peoples who believe in freedom are the only hope, the only protection against the rapacious dreams of deposits big and little who would despoil a world.

Only free people dare to be generous. Only free people can think as a world, with understanding of a world and consideration for its peoples. We have something to offer besides bread, something more precious and enduring. It is the confidence that man, made in the image of God, need not be subject to any deposit, whether that deposit be a matter of misadventure or of our own tangled thinking and contriving.

Yes, we have to make those milions, who have learned to bow and compromise and accept, want to be free again.

That is what makes us wonder that so many people seem to be ready, so willingly, to sacrifice their personal, God-given rights for that mess of pottage that they call security. The people of Europe have learned to earn a measure of such safety, by cringing before authority. To make them want to be free, shall we offer them only a little different brand of cringing, or the blue sky where only God is man's master?

CARLY NEXT WEEK the United States elections will be held. The outcome will interest the world for the time has long since past when American polling concerned only the nation actually voting.

The times are perplexing and uncertain. No one, with any degree of certainty, can foretell how the balloting will go. The Republicans, from the very commencement of the campaign-perhaps from conviction, or as a form of strategy—have tried to make it appear that, once nominated, there could be no further question about Thomas Dewey's occupancy of the White House. Republican policy has been clothed in restraint. While there has not been aloofness, the G.O.P. would like to have a majority converted to the belief that any choice, other than that of Dewey, is quite hopeless.

Truman, in his hammer-and-tongs campaign, is still going strong. His train stops wherever there are people. No village is too small to be neglected and his line is homey and understandable as he talks from the rear platform.
