



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Speeding Up!

\V/ E ARE GLAD to be advised by the secretary of the Prince Rupert Automobile Association that he has seen are minister of public works in the south and has found Mr. Carson "most conversant with and appreciative of" the highway situation here. This includes the road between Prince Rupert and Port Edward about which there has been so much protest during the past week and on which emergency trucks were called out last Sunday to lay down gravel and obviate what threatened to be a breakdown of transportation between the city and the big industrial construction project at Watson Island.

Almost two years ago we were promised that the road would be straightened out and blacktopped between Prince Rupert and Port Edward in plenty of time before the pulp mill started operations. There may be little point in wondering why the road should be in the state it is at this late date and why the reconstruction work has still a long way to go. We do know, however, that speed is the essence of the contract now and, if the straightening out and the blacktopping is to be done by the time the mill is ready next year, there will have to be a lot more speed put on the job than there has been in the last two years. Meantime, it is not a very desirable thing to have delay and inconvenience, if not danger, to transport of workers to and from not only the big elanese mill construction project but also the important year-round fishing industry that is maintained at Port Edward.

- GETTING COASTGUARD

WHILE WE might have been thinking of having for Canada a coastguard of the ambitious scale of the United States, it is quite possible that existing facilities of the Royal Canadian Navy, Royal Canadian Air Force and Royal Canadian Mounted Police might be co-ordinated so as render an immediate and effective service in time of need. In any case, that is the way it is being recommended at Ottawa that the need be met. After all, the method does not matter much as long as the end is met.

Of course, the matter of providing and co-ordinating the facilities is only the first step. There will have to be distribution and advantageous placing of the facilities which must not be all concentrated around Victoria and Vancouver. To make the service effective in meeting the sudden emergencies, there will have to be bases not only at Prince Rupert but at outlying points of vantage such as on the west coast of Vancouver Island, around Queen Charlotte Sound and on the Queen Charlotte Islands.

"WHO'S WINNING?"

WIVE ARE FREQUENTLY reminded that we War are engaged in a "cold war." Most afterdirmer speakers these days will tell us seriously and solemnly that this war is one of ideas, and that it is being fought for "the minds of men." There can be iii no doubt that this warning is justified. Unfortuniii ately there has been as yet little analysis of the re-= sults of this warfare. Just as the limbs of the human body wither and become useless without exercise, so too does our belief in and desire for liberty atrophy and die unless it is kept bright and shining with a constant faith.-Canadian Chamber of Commerce.
