**ANOTHER RED WALK-OUT**  
LAKE SUCCESS—Russia today walked out of the secret meeting of Big Five powers and Canada on atomic controls, protesting at continued presence of Chinese Nationalist delegates Jakob Malik, Soviet deputy foreign minister, told reporters as he left United Nations headquarters that he will not participate in atomic talks as long as the representative of Nationalist China is present

**GIRL IS EVASIVE**  
CALGARY—Believed to be the missing 17-year old Beverley Van Horne, heiress of Montreal, a girl arrived here by plane early today from Vancouver enroute East she evaded reporters and photographers here and, accompanied by a woman companion, took refuge in downtown hotel. Miss van Horne is the great-granddaughter of Sir William Van Horne, one of the founders of the Canadian Pacific Railway. She disappeared from her home in Montreal in December and had had been working as a dishwasher in a Vancouver restaurant.

**NEW CHEESE CONTRACT**  
OTTAWA—Minister of Agriculture Gardiner today announced completion of a new Anglo-Canadian cheese contract under which Canada will ship 85,000,000 pounds of cheese at 25c a pound. He also announced that the price of cheese would be supported at 28c a pound during 1950.

**STUDY HYDRO BOMB**  
WASHINGTON—The United States government was understood to be going ahead today on experimental work preliminary to production of a super-hydrogen bomb. At least some top officials in the Truman administration believe the bomb will eventually go into production. President Truman, himself, will probably make the final decision, one way or another, but it is understood he wants much more information. General Omar Bradley is being called into consultation on the matter tomorrow.

**NOT FINANCING PORK**  
WASHINGTON—The Economic Co-operation Administration said today that it has informed Great Britain no further Marshall Plan financing will be available for Canadian Pork products. A provision of the European Recovery Act prohibits ECA funds from being used to buy foreign supplies of any commodity in surplus in the United States.

### Tried To Take Her Own Life

MONTREAL — Police said today that 50-year-old Mrs. Joseph Lucas, who reported she had drowned her two grandchildren, attempted to commit suicide at detective headquarters last night. An attendant found her trying to choke herself with her hands in a room where she was being held without charge while police checked her story. Mrs. Lucas told police she had pushed her grandsons, John, aged three, and Pierre Paul, 18 months, into the St. Lawrence River because she could not bear to see them sent to a foster home. Police are attempting dragging operations.

### War Veterans Getting Less

OTTAWA — Government costs for war veterans are expected to decrease by around \$15,000,000 in the next fiscal year, starting April 1. Informed quarters anticipate that the bill for two world wars will range between \$500,000,000 and \$260,000,000 a year for the next five years at least.

### ALL OUT MANHUNT— Boston Bandits Sought Dead Or Alive— Preferably Dead—Trail So Far Cold

**Greatest Manhunt in History**  
Going on After Biggest Robbery

BOSTON — Reward of \$100,000 was posted yesterday for information leading to the capture of nine daring bandits who held up the establishment of Brink's Incorporated, armored car establishment here, Tuesday, and made their getaway with \$1,500,000 in cash and checks, leaving what up to last night appeared to be a cold trail. Federal Bureau of Investigation joined the Boston police in a great manhunt. "We want those men dead or alive—preferably dead," said the head of Brink's Incorporated. All known criminals are being rounded up for questioning and all places where criminals are known to hang out are being combed.

The nine precise masked gunmen pulled off one of the United States biggest robberies, stealing more than \$1,500,000 at gunpoints and leaving behind another \$1,000,000 because they could not carry it. The grotesquely-masked gunmen, in their twenty-minute precision raid, snatched the money from an open vault after gagging and trussing five employees.

Police Commissioner Thomas Sullivan said that Brink's Incorporated, the victim, estimated their loss at \$1,500,000 and "I'll go along with that figure."

The crime set off a country-wide manhunt for the squad of gunmen who marched into the money transportation firm's office.

"There's little to work on," said Police Supt. W. Fallon, when discussing the nine bandits who plundered the premises of Brink's Incorporated Armored car firm, "but officers have their orders. We are out to get every robber. Nothing else matters. If any officer feels he has a clue, pursue it to the end, no matter where it goes or how long it may take. With him, time is nothing. We want every bandit, dead or alive—preferably dead."

The nation's greatest manhunt has spread all over the union. The statement was heard Wednesday that no fewer than three thousand constables and sleuths are operating throughout the States of New England. New York City's Department of Criminal Investigation has thrown all weight into the pursuit.

A check is being carried on among the owners of automobiles to see if any cars are missing. Car owners are asked to be quick in making complaints or any incident that might be significant, where car driving or use of gasoline is concerned. Hundreds of detectives, well known as well as more or less obscure, are at work. The haunts of known criminals, the associates of those who have records, the families, and friends of former convicts are as far as possible, being kept under observation. Even certain people above suspicion are not neglected.

### Two Men Have Narrow Escape Out On Ladder

Moose Temple, one of the old landmarks of Prince Rupert, was totally destroyed by fire which broke out shortly before 6 o'clock this morning. The adjoining Canadian Bank of Commerce building had a narrow escape but efforts of the fire department saved it from serious damage. Two of five men who lived in the third and top storey of the building were assisted down fire ladders in their night attire, losing all their effects in the quick evacuation. Damage, estimated at about \$25,000, is partially covered by insurance.

The fire was fought in sharp 14 above zero weather and efforts of firemen were to some extent hampered at first by low pressure in water mains owing to the general water shortage in the cold spell. Other lines were shut off for the time being as available water was concentrated on the blaze. Two fire hydrants were frozen. Three lines of hoses were used.

**Narrow Escape**  
Two of the residents of the building, who were assisted out of third storey windows on ladders, were Gillis Royer and Leslie Parkes. Waving of flashlight revealed the plight of these men. Others who resided there but made their escape by stairs were Eddie Hildebrand, Joe Long and Howard Walker. Royer and Parkes had tarried in their rooms to try to get into their clothes and then found themselves trapped by flames enveloping the stairs. Hildebrand was aroused by smoke pouring into his room and, wrapped in a blanket, ran to the police station after arousing the other four men. Fireman Bert Cameron assisted by Harold McGowan, played an heroic part in rescuing Royer and Parkes, assisting them down a twenty-foot ladder. They suffered somewhat from exposure.

Two commercial travelers, P. Davis and J. B. O'Sullivan, from Vancouver, using the place for sample room purposes, lost some \$1000 of sample goods. Frozen water pipes were being thawed in the Moose Temple late Wednesday afternoon and it was thought by Fire Chief Earl Becker that this might have been the cause of a smoldering fire.

Basement and first floor of structure were in full flame when the department was called by Edna Sanhals, one of the young woman occupants of the Commerce Mess in the bank building nearby. Occupants of the Commerce Mess are the Misses Edna Sanhals, Audrey Patterson, Margaret Steeves PHN, Ruth Ramsay and Janice Patterson.

Firemen concentrated efforts on saving the bank building to the top of which they mounted with their hoses as the Moose building could not be saved.

Manager R. G. Hopkins of Bank of Commerce, on the scene at 6 a. m. to rush-stationery and documents into safe as his building seemed doomed, said the bank suffered no serious loss except for some minor damage from water. The cornice of the building was shattered. Roof of the bank building was used as the base of attack on the spread of the fire.

All that remains of the building today is a high chimney, and the old fireplace. The lodge safe, containing various documents, lay in the ruins. It is being opened today and a lodge meeting will be held tonight to assess the situation.

Fire Chief Earl Becker and his firemen, all of whom took part in fighting the blaze, were given general credit for doing a good job in saving the bank and other nearby buildings. Residents of the Temple were thankful that they had escaped with their lives from what might have been a serious situation.

### Labor Takes Off Gloves

**Cripps Warns British Industry Flays Conservatives and Communists**

LONDON — Sir Stafford Cripps has warned British industry that gloves will be off if Labor is returned in the general election on February 23. In a major political speech last night, Labor's chief apostle of planned economy made these two points:

1. A new Labor government would establish development councils for industry on a compulsory and large scale "basils" "overriding any political opposition that may be encountered."
2. Britain's trade union movement, 8,000 strong, has given definite pledge that food subsidies will not be reduced as long as the unions continue to support the government's standstill or wages.

Cripps lashed out at both the Conservative and Communist parties. The former would bring the death warrant to democracy its policies being the precursor of Fascism. The Communist were a "sabotage party."

## EASIER LIVING BUT— Paternalism And Absenteeism Hitting British Coal Mining

LONDON (AP)—You can see coal-blackened union Jacks flying over the state-owned coal mines of Lancashire. They signify that the weekly targets of may mines, set by the National Coal Board, have been exceeded.

But it's a temporary, or seasonal phase. Generally, it means a "Bull Week" is in progress when the miners work like mad to bring home a bigger cheque for a blowout. More of these flags fly before a holiday. Then production slips back into a steadier and lower tonnage. Why?

Mainly it appears to be a lack of incentive in Britain's state owned mines.

"The miner has learned to live on a certain standard—a good table and a good (Hearth) fire," one colliery manager said.

"Once he has those and has a little money left, over for sport and leisure, he has few

worries. If he is ill, the national Health Plan takes care of him. In his old age he has his pension. And there's a hard core which naturally tries to take advantage, sits back and says "the State will look after me."

### Absenteeism

Absenteeism is a major problem of Britain's coal-fields. The percentage rate, both voluntary and involuntary, for 1949 was approximately 12.46, almost a point higher than in 1948 and almost double the rate in 1938.

Mine managers say the colliers—piece workers who are the best-paid of all miners—are

among the worst offenders. They take home an average weekly pay of \$24.80 to 27.90 and can earn it in four days. The basic work week is five days with a bonus of a day's pay for working five days, giving them six day's pay for a five-day week. But many colliers said: "Why should I tear my body apart just to give the state six or nine shillings (93 cents to \$1.40) in the pound for taxes?" British income tax is paid on (Continued Page 6)

OTTAWA ©—Canada may protest at a United States decision to offer a million dollars worth of agricultural surpluses on the export market at prices below cost, a government trade source said today.  
An announcement from Washington said that surplus potatoes, which had cost the government \$2.20 for one hundred pounds, will be offered at one cent for 100 pounds bagged at country shipping points. a graduated scale. High rates of tax would begin to take effect for an unmarried miner at about 9 pounds and for a married man at about 12 pounds a week.

Absenteeism tends to hold down average production. Yet the British collier at the coal face has reached a slightly higher output per man-shift—3.01 tons—than he hit in 1938 when it stood at three tons.

Coal board officials attribute this to increased mechanization.

### Still Far Behind

Though total coal production has been advancing since nationalization took effect Jan. 1, 1947, it still is far behind 1938 output. That year 227,000,000 tons of saleable coal were dug. The figure in 1946 was 181,000,000 tons. The years since have shown steady improvement and an estimated 202,000,000 tons in 1949 is just within the target set.

If the individual miner is digging slightly more coal than he did in 1938, why is total production still less than in pre-war years?

Ten per cent of Britain's miners—an annual wastage of 70,000 men—go out every year because of old age and sickness. In 1938, the mines employed 782,000 men. Today the number has dwindled to 720,000.

Most British mines are old. Many have been worked a century or more. When they were first opened engineers chose the easiest and richest seams to work. When they were exhausted, it meant engineers had to go deeper and deeper.

A coal board official summed up: "coal mining was a dying industry at the time of nationalization. It needed new blood—the money which only the state could pour into it to modernize and reorganize. No reputable financier would have invested the necessary money."

After a loss of 23,255,586 pounds, the first year of state operation, the industry showed a small profit of 1,651,965 pounds in 1948. The unofficial estimate profit for 1949 is approximately 11,000,000 pounds.

But how does nationalization look to the coal miner toiling below the surface.

"Aye, and it's champion," says Fred Davies. "We're far better off."

Fred, a 60-year-old Welshman is a typical miner. What he has

to say pretty well summarizes the views of the maintenance man, the haulage worker, the surface employee.
