

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

TWENTY PROVINCES?

TO EASE the "perpetual feud" between Ottawa and the provincial capitals, Canada ought to be carved up into 20 smaller provinces, A. R. M. Lower, Queen's University professor, says in the issue of Maclean's Magazine coming out this week.

Under the Lower scheme, Vancouver Island would become a separate province, as would the Okanagan triangle. British Columbia proper would retain Vancouver, but would lose its northeast corner to the new province of Athabasca, Prof. Lower might have suggested more appropriately that the present British Columbia might have been divided into north and south sections rather than carving out the southeast triangle and leaving the great area still containing both Prince Rupert and Vancouver.

However what he proposes for B.C. is mild compared with the treatment Dr. Lower recommends for Ontario. If his geopolitical scalpel were given reign it would divide Ontario's heavily settled southern part into three minuscular slices based respectively on Ottawa, Toronto and London, turn its mining northland into fourth and fifth provinces of Timiskaming and Superior. In its present form, Lower contends, Ontario is too big, complex and powerful for the good of itself and the nation. He compares its present place in the Dominion to the place of the old kingdom of Prussia within the German Empire and recalls that "as long as the old Prussia existed the German Empire's inner unity was precarious."

Quebec would be quartered under the Lower plan, but the Maritimes would remain as they are and the Prairie provinces would get a relatively mild reshuffling to make way for one newcomer, Athabaska.

Lower admits he has little hope of seeing his dream come true, but insists that Canada "will never become a nation in the most intense and fruitful sense until the provinces revert to what national subdivision naturally should be-local authorities guarding local rights." Our present system of large provinces, he says, "has reduced Canada to a kind of League of Nations" in which there is general distrust of the central government and "ostentatious ignorance" by older or wealthier provinces toward the new or poorer.

BLESSED RAIN

THERE HAVE BEEN days of rain that were as good as any days one has known. Rain falling into a forest is an especially compelling recollection. The wind withdrawn and the birds keeping their own counsel, the sounds of the forest were the high-pitched insistence of the rain striking the tree tops, the strong low notes of the big drops falling through to the undergrowth and the stirrings of filled pools finding their ways out along the forest

There are places where it is inconvenient for rain to fall, such as on rush-hour crowds and baseball diamonds, and there are other good places for rain besides a forest, but few so beguile the spirit, in retrospect at least. More than all else is the recollection of the greens turning deeper and deeper in the slow slide of water on the leaves of the under forest. Sunny days are a ready-made joy, but the beholder has to put more into a rainy day, and so perchance gets a great deal back for the feed bin of memory, from which we all draw strength.
