# Falls of Clyde

OING BACK along the seventy-one years that the ancient ship, now at the dry dock here for overhaul, has been on the deep would be like listening to, or the reading of, a wonderful yarn. The same can be said of any wind-jammer that old, built to sail anywhere.

Slowly-she seemed scarce-moving-the Falls of Clyde entered the harbor of Prince Rupert from Ketchikan, towed in bright and early on Sunday last by a couple of tugs. She dispenses oil.

Clouds of canvas no longer boom her across the tossing miles "when winds were humming o'er the flood and waves were white below."

The Falls of Clyde! There's a touch of romance in the very name.

She had a lonely, desolate look with her four tall masts—like a man who has exchanged the heyday of active, colorful life, seeing the world, performing useful duties and glorying in lusty adventure, for what might be termed a living death.

Gone, the gallant voyages around and about the globe, forgotten the countless incidents and recollections and gone the generations of blue water sailors.

There is something nostalgic about the Falls of Clyde.

#### MOVIES ECONOMIC PLIGHT

CURRENT low employment in the film capital of Hollywood may become normal. Nine of every ten movies cannot pay off in the United States and have to depend on foreign showings to make a profit. American attendance has declined during the last fifteen years. Production costs have risen so sharply that, for every dollar spent in 1941, \$2.82 is necessary today.

Indications point to an increase in the shift of unemployed film workers to other industries. Yet the glamor of the screen is hard to leave behind.

#### NO SUPPRESSION

HSTORY does not show many instances where suppression of ideas has been effective in the long run. Far better that they should be ventilated and studied and then errors and inconsistencies are more likely to appear.

Attempts to suppress Communists arouse the suspicion in many minds that they have some arguments that cannot be answered. Most of us feel that this is not so, but the best way to prove it is to meet the arguments, and demonstrate their empti-
