LONDON — The only known Russian plane capable of dropping atom bombs at long range is a copy of the American B-29 Superfort, Jane's "All the World's Aircraft" reported yesterday. The authoritative annual survey listed a 652 mile an hour jet fighter as the fastest known Soviet military plane. Jane's said the Russians claim to have a faster-than-sound "Yakovlev Super-sonic" but added "insufficient information is available."

## U.S. Senators Invited Here

Three United States senators heading for Alaska October 14 or 15 from Seattle, may visit Prince Rupert on an inspection of defense needs and conditions. It was learned here this week that they are being invited by the Chamber of Commerce to come here to study the strategic importance of this port from the defense standpoint.

The subcommittee of the senate military affairs committee is headed by Senator Lester Hunt (D-Wyoming) and includes Senators Saltonstall (R-NY) and Wayne Morse (R-Oregon) who won fame as a west coast long-shore arbitrator. He is former dean of law at the University of Oregon school of law.

An invitation to the committee to visit both Rupert and Ketchikan was sent to Senator Morse by Editor William L. Baker of the Ketchikan Chronicle, former Oregon friend of the senator, who replied that if time allows, they will make the stops suggested.

## TORY SHOWDOWN—

## Anscomb Resigns Leadership In Surprise Move But Runs Again

VANCOUVER, (CP)—Finance Minister Herbert Anscomb, in a stunning manoeuvre, resigned last night as leader of the British Columbia Progressive-Conservative party but called for a leadership vote today and announced he would be fighting to regain the post he has held for more than four years.

Mr. Anscomb's move, which came at a special night session at the party's annual convention, caught both opponents and supporters by surprise. The meeting broke up minutes later. The fight for leadership is between Anscomb and W. A. C. Bennett, Coalition member for South Okanagan.

The move to oust from the party leadership one of the top cogs in B.C.'s Liberal-Progressive Conservative coalition began some time ago.

Opponents of Mr. Anscomb, chiefly members of the Young Progressive Conservatives, assailed the Minister of Finance for his liquor interests—he has directorates in brewing and wine companies—and is blamed for a drop in the party's prestige. And he was accused yesterday by Gordon Cameron of Victoria, president of the B. C. Progressive Conservative Association, of blocking a plan to unite the federal and provincial organizations.

"My term of office as president," Cameron told the 650 delegates, "has been a total loss of time and money."

For two hours the rebels battled for a motion to force a vote on the leadership. Anscomb supporters tried to stem off the tide with a confidence amendment. Anscomb, in a terse speech, said: "I am satisfied that I can prove to you tomorrow that I have carried out that responsibility as you expected it to be carried out. And I tell you that tomorrow I shall be nominated again for that post."

## Heavy Gale Felt Here

### But Little Damage Reported After Last Night's 36-Mile Blow

Wind velocities up to 38 miles per hour from the south were recorded at the Digby Island weather station between 5 a.m. and 6 a.m. today in the heaviest storm so far this fall. Rainfall during the 24-hour period ending at 4 a.m. today was .55 of an inch. Wind velocities seemed much more intense on this side of the harbor.

Little damage was done in the city. A woodshed is reported to have been blown down and the glass of a door in the Prince Rupert Hotel broken when the wind slammed a door. Only one or two telephones had been reported out this morning.

Telephone lines between Vancouver and Prince George were knocked out at 8:12 this morning, blocking off CBC broadcasts over station CFPR until 10:35 a.m. when lines were in use again for five minutes. They went out again at 10:40 and stayed out until 11:15 when they came in again. Reception was poor after that. Baseball fans found many interruptions while listening to the fourth world series game between New York Yankees and Philadelphia.

## Green Light For Loans Showing

VICTORIA — Authority has been given the cities of Prince Rupert and Prince George to float bond issues totalling \$747,000 to finance improvements to utilities and for school construction purposes.

The provincial cabinet gave both cities the go ahead in issuing and selling debentures for the projects.

Prince Rupert expenditures of \$190,000 on sewer outlets and \$347,000 on school construction and furnishing of a junior-senior high school and an elementary school.

Prince George plans spending \$140,000 to reconstruct and modernize its distribution and generating electric light systems and \$70,000 to replace water mains.

## Sees End of Trade Barriers

VANCOUVER — Trade Minister C. D. Howe said yesterday the "worst" of the sterling area restrictions on Canadian trade may be over soon.

In a speech stressing the need to steer a cautious economic course through current international complications, Mr. Howe emphasized the greater ability of the United Kingdom and other sterling countries to earn dollars. He told the Board of Trade that as a result of this increase in the dollar earning and dollar saving policies of sterling countries, "there is reason to hope that the worst of the sterling restrictions on Canadian trade will soon be over."

## Robbed His Benefactor

Sentence was reserved in the case of Douglas Francis Self who pleaded guilty yesterday in magistrate's court to a charge of theft of clothing from a room.

Self, who was released from custody yesterday after serving a sentence for supplying liquor to an Indian, asked John Matwick permission to share his room. When Matwick returned to his room he found a suit, shoes and other articles of clothing missing. Self was picked up by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police in the railway yards with the clothing in his possession and brought before Magistrate W. D. Vance this morning.

## Whitey Ford is Hero of Today's Baseball Classic

NEW YORK, (CP)—Whitey Ford, 21-year-old rookie southpaw, won New York Yankees their thirteenth World Series title today with a 5 to 2 victory over the Philadelphia Phillies for a four-game sweep before 68,098 fans. It was the lowest scoring series in history. It was also the sixth time the Yankees have made a clean sweep of the series.

With two runs in, two men on bases and two out in the ninth, Aule Reynolds, winner of the second game of the series, relieved Ford and put down a Phillies uprising by striking out Stan Lopata, a pinch hitter.

It was a two-run error by the left fielder, Gene Woodling, that spoiled Ford's shut-out.

Yogi Berra smashed a 365-foot home run into right field seats in the sixth inning to help the Yanks nail down this clincher.

The Yanks routed rookie Bob Miller in the first inning with a two-run blast.

Reliever Jim Konstanty held the champs in check until the sixth when Berra's homer, a hit batsman, Bobby Brown's triple and a fly ball accounted for three runs.

Only in the ninth did the Phillies get after Ford, one of the youngest, if not the youngest, winning pitchers of any World Series. He was nicked for a lead-off single by Willie Jones and hit Del Ennis on the right leg before anybody was out.

Dick Sisler forced Ennis at second and was taken out for a pinch-runner, Ken Johnson. After Granny Hamner had struck out, Ford was only one away from finishing the ball game. But it was not to be.

Andy Seminick's long fly to Gene Woodling was, apparently, lost in the sun and fell out of Gene's glove for a two-run error, both Jones and Johnson scoring.

After Mike Goliat had pumped a single to left, Casey Stengel decided to lift the kid and call in Reynolds. The big crowd gave Ford a tremendous ovation as he walked to the dug-out.

So the series will go down in the books as another sweep for the all-powerful Yankees. It was their thirteenth win in seventeen series and this may have been the richest of them all.

This was the only game of the series that was not decided by one run, breaking the Phil's string of seven straight one-run series losses that date back to 1915.

## Thanksgiving

WE MAY NOT think we have a great deal to be thankful for but, still and all, we have.

We look at the alarming world situation and feel that things are not so good as they were a year ago. Yet, they might be worse—a good deal worse—and there is still hope that they may improve. In fact, things have been looking better the past short while.

Looking at our own home scene, do we realize or admit how well off we are in this fine land of ours? Indeed, we have much to be thankful for and our greatest blessing is that we are citizens of a favored country. If we do not appreciate our own lot, we might reflect on how many people in the world would be mighty glad to be in our free and democratic shoes.

And the people of Prince Rupert, dwelling in the midst of activity, prosperity and good living, are doubly blessed. We may have our troubles some times and our perplexing problems but, after all, in comparison, how small they really are!

Yes we Canadians in this favored area of the Dominion have much more to be thankful than they have to mourn about. In fact, there is little justification for complaint.

## LET'S WAKE UP

IT IS something to be wondered at that, while the rest of the coast is actively interesting itself in the matter of disaster emergency organization, Prince Rupert should be so complacent and so unconcerned.

No doubt, it is the possibility of war conditions recurring and this coast being a possible target that actuates the organization of civilian defence measures which there would not be time to organize in these exposed areas after the war commenced.

Then, apart from war, there are other possibilities of disaster, fire, disease or such like.

It is not a very creditable commentary on the realistic thinking of the people of Prince Rupert that there should be a diffidence or an unwillingness on their part to participate in disaster precaution measures such as the Red Cross is endeavouring to organize on a province-wide basis.

## TERRACE RIGHT

TERRACE Board of Trade has heard a complaint from one of its leading members that Terrace is one of the few towns of its size in the province where there is no hard surfaced arterial highway. Prince Rupert can expect more work along this line. And there are other towns along Highway 16 too that might have similar complaint.

But why stop at the sections of the arterial highways that go through the municipalities? We and our highways are being neglected until we get the hard surfacing all along the way.

Mr. Little's complaint before the Terrace Board of Trade is a point well taken. More power to the representations along this line to the public works department. Let them be vigorous and persistent!

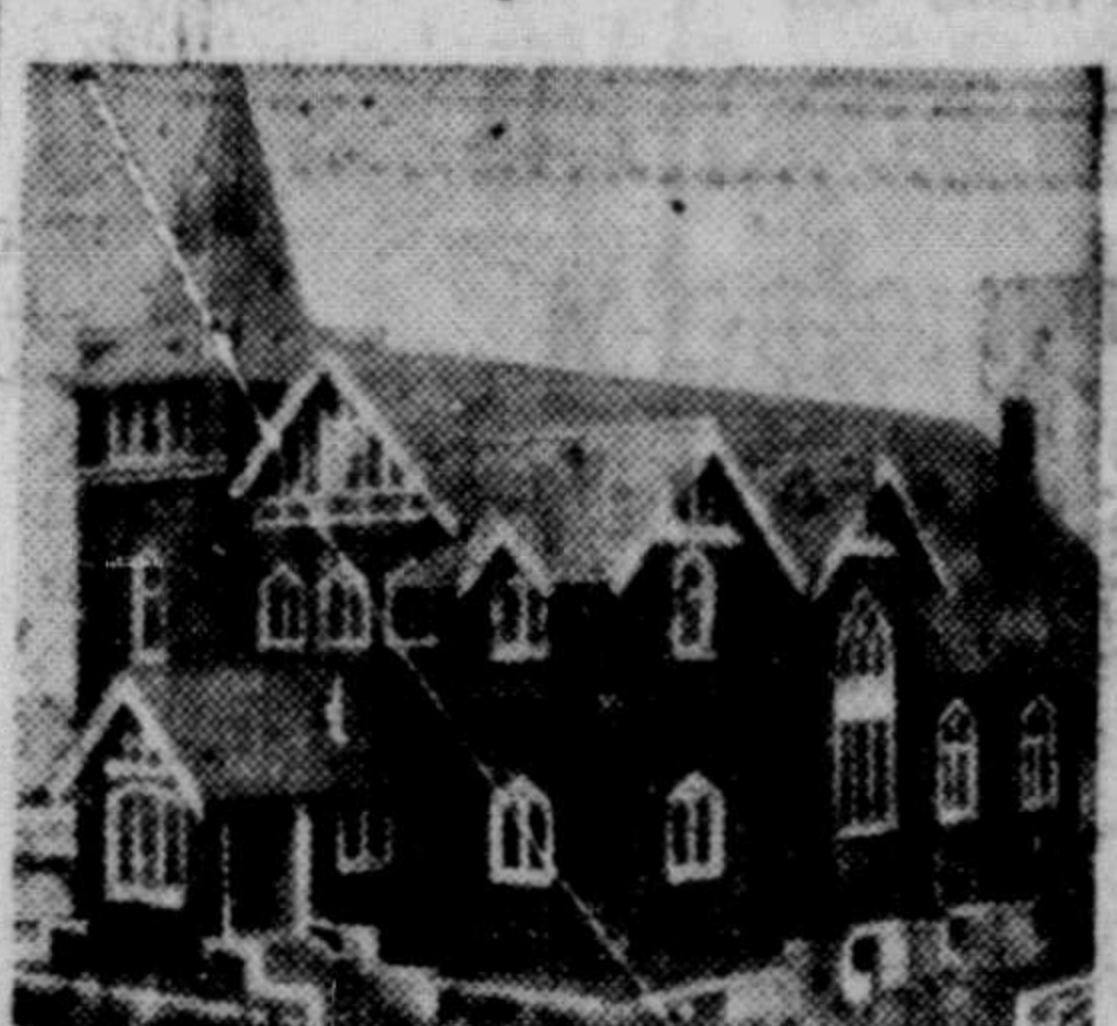

## GOD'S PROGRAM

By human standards the love of God is beyond understanding. It is revealed in the person of Jesus Christ whose life so often contradicted the standards of society. Human standards of conduct frequently breed a sort of smugness and complacency that destroy the finer and more noble humanities. We live

under the code of human conduct which varies in different localities. Basically most of the accepted regulations are essentially selfish and our actions consist of whatever may repay us the greatest satisfaction.

While living under these conditions, God extends to us a call. He informs us that He has a different type of life for us to enjoy and this new type of life is based on His love. This new type of life consists of self-denial and self-surrender. Instead of having a life that is motivated by self, this new type of life is based on God's love first to me and then to others. How strange not to consider one's self! Can there be any satisfaction in that kind of life? The Lord answers by asking that we prove Him and then see if His ways are not the most satisfying.

What are the elements of self denial that God asks of us? There are several listed in the Bible. In the Letter to the Ephesians the Apostle Paul tells us that we should "walk in all lowliness and meekness." Certainly it is natural to be proud. Who doesn't enjoy the acclaim of his fellowmen? Can there be any satisfaction in being humble? Try it and be con-

vinced. God's love as it is reflected in your new life gives satisfaction beyond measure. For where there is true humility there is also an end of petty bickering. Strife generated by selfish interests is gone. A far happier and more satisfying life is enjoyed.

Then we are told to exercise patience. The words "with long-suffering, forbearing one another in love" describe how this is to be done. It isn't true that all followers of Christ are truly patient. Many haven't progressed that far. Those who have, find that they have the secret of an inner peace. Patience brings its reward of greater tranquility and adds to the sum of happiness. Since we are called to a life where patience is to be the rule in our conduct, we are to base it on God's love. Where we lack the necessary self-control to be patient, we can find help in the love of God. For God's love is a stabilizing influence.

God really has a wonderful program for us to follow. It requires that we express in conduct the fact that while we live in this world we are not living for this world. No calling in life can equal the one that God issues when He asks us to become the sons of God. It however has responsibility attached. While we

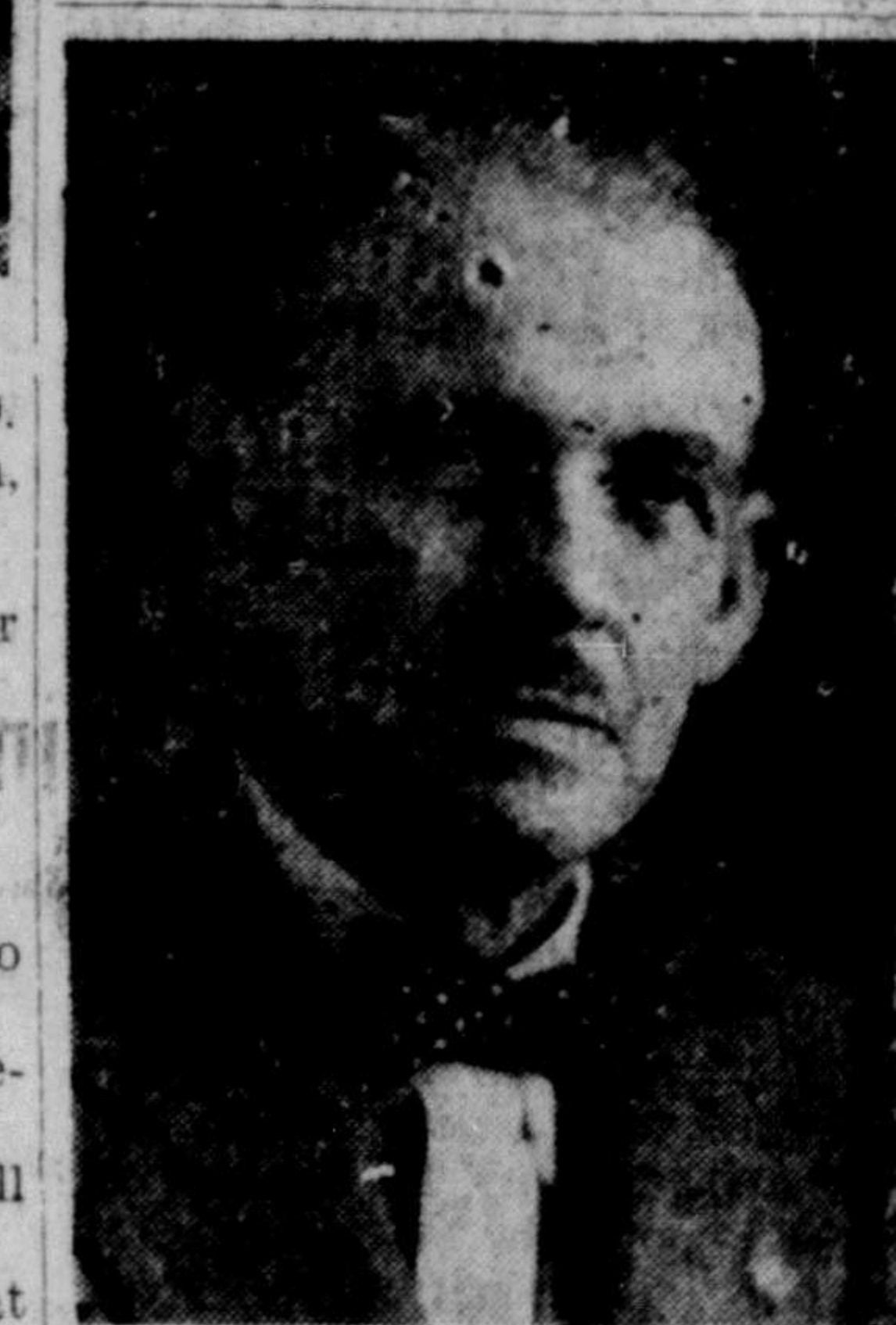

and Russian blocs.  
On the political level Nehru  
leads the world morally.

What Nehru has been trying  
to tell western leaders—but  
without complete success—is  
that imperialism is doomed. It  
was, in fact, due to Nehru's  
personal leadership, and to  
India's direct intervention on  
the side of the Indonesian Re-  
public, that the Dutch imperi-  
alists were compelled to yield.

It is not an accident that  
Indonesians turned out to wel-  
come Nehru in crowds number-  
ing hundreds of thousands; and  
that the people themselves have  
named him "the father of In-  
donesian independence."

The amazing thing is that U.S.  
leaders do not see the main  
consequence of Nehru's new  
democracy in Asia.

Only in India and in Indon-  
esia has Communism been pre-  
vented from becoming a major  
threat. In every other im-  
portant area of Asia, Commun-  
ism has already won power out-  
right, as in China, or has estab-  
lished a civil war base from  
which it could win complete  
victory were it not for the direct  
military intervention of white,  
western nations.

THE WESTERN leaders have  
not yet seen the benefit of the  
dual role that Nehru is play-  
ing.

On the one hand the new dem-  
ocracy which he personifies in  
Asia is, in fact, the only real  
bulwark against complete vic-  
tory for Communism.

On the other hand, he is  
adamant in his determination  
that imperialism must be  
brought to an end—the whole  
overload must go home and  
let Asia run itself.

Nehru also knows—that the  
western leaders so far refuse to  
perceive—that in a struggle be-  
tween two imperialisms—the old  
European type run by foreign-  
ers and the new, more subtle  
type, run by native Communists  
—the new Red type will always  
win out.

I DO NOT SEE how any hon-  
est person, aware of the facts  
of life of 1950, could deny that  
Communism is a new, more  
subtle form of ATTEMPTED im-  
perialism.

But neither do I see how any  
intelligent person could be  
blind to the great truth recently  
stressed by the Archbishop of  
Canterbury (not to be confused  
with the Red Dean). The new  
government of China, says Dr.  
Fisher, is "morally and socially  
preferable to the corruptions and  
inefficiency of the regime it  
replaced."

"We who can see the black  
tyranny of its creed" naturally  
denounce it. But we must  
frankly realize that in the Far  
East it can easily be seen not as  
a tyranny but at present as a  
liberating force."

NEHRU BELIEVES in a two  
fold policy. First, wherever  
Communism has won out, as  
in China he would face that  
fact and attempt to achieve a  
peace of live and let live, by ad-  
mitting China to UN, for in-  
stance.

But above all he stands for  
stopping the spread of phoney  
democracy and disguised Red  
imperialism by genuine libera-  
tion.

He tells Britain in Malay,  
France in Indo China, the U.S.  
in Korea:

"You can't stop something  
with nothing. You COULD stop  
Communism with real democ-  
racy."

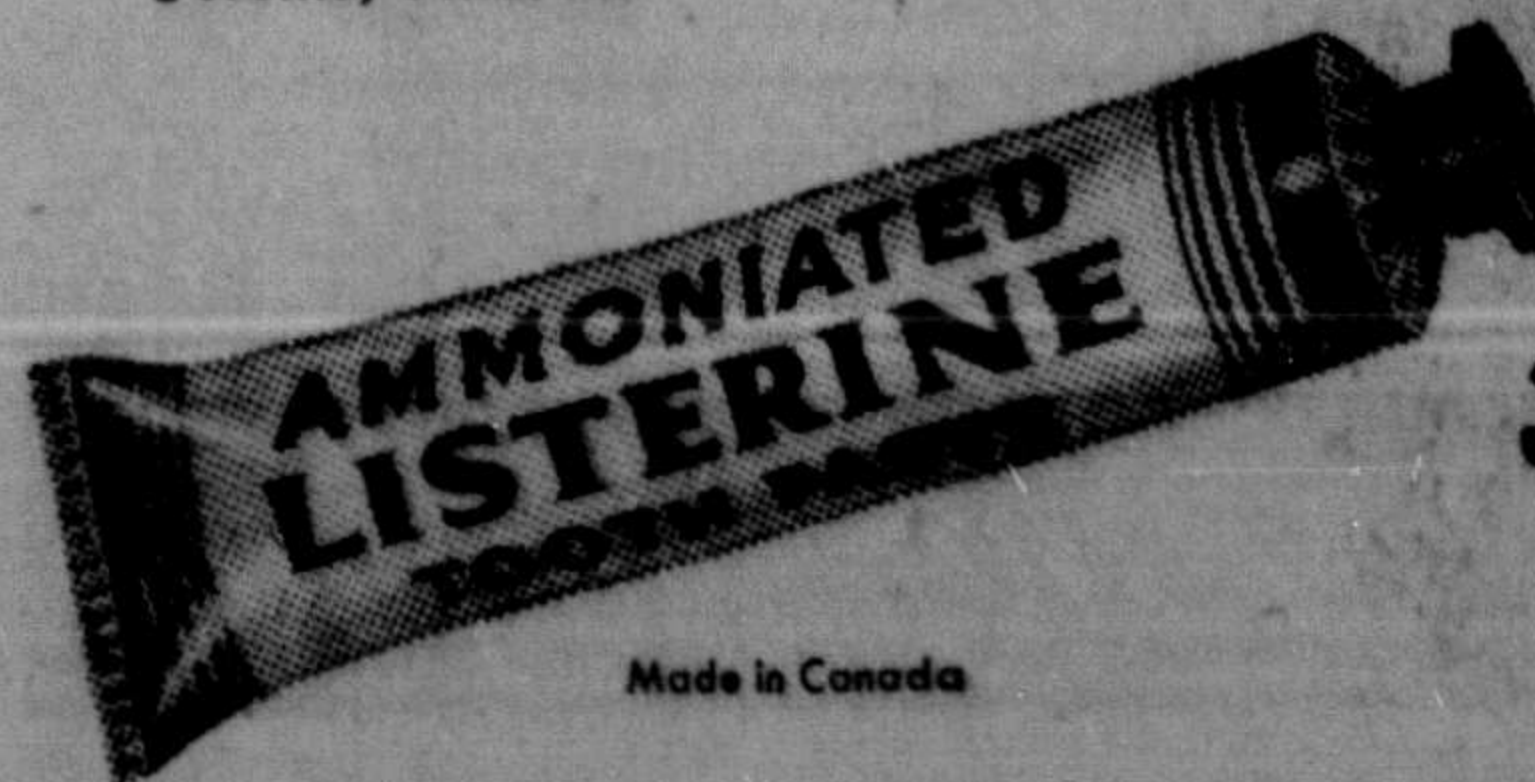
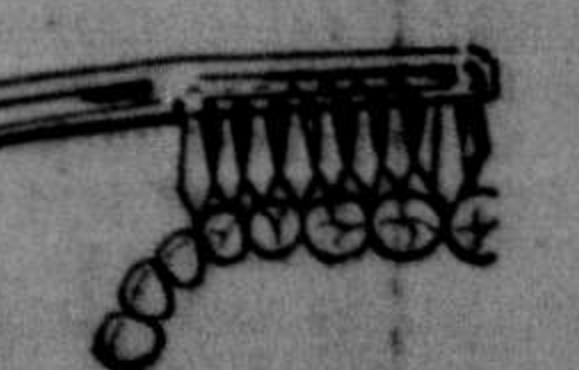

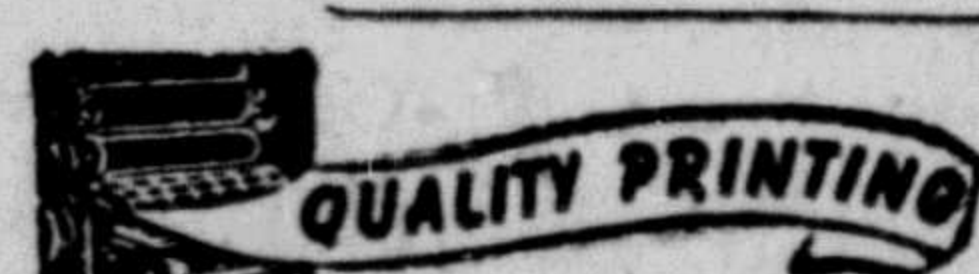
