
Lightened In Impending Budget

OTTAWA, ()-The burden of the humble Canadian taxpayer, still carrying the weight of war-induced taxes, may be lightened tonight when Minister of Finance Douglas Abbott, commencing at 4:30 p.m. Pacific Standard Time, reads his 1949-50 budget speech announcing the tax structure for the next 12 months.

Customary secrecy prevails on the budget but the general expectation is that it contains much that will gladden the heart of the man who foots the country's bills.

With a general election in the offing, observers predict that cuts will come in income taxes. Some circles speculate that the basic exemption for single persons will be lifted to \$1000 and to \$1750 or \$2,000 for married persons. Present exemptions are \$750 and \$1500 respectively.

Another possibility is that the cuts will be retroactive to January 1.





IS THERE MORE DRINKING?

MUCH IS HEARD about liquor consumption in Canada and, with growth in quantity of actual sales, the presumed expansion of drinking.

Yet, things are not always as they seem as a study of the business in Ontario, by an eastern daily, would indicate. Since 1939, there has been a population addition of 800,000. Last year, the tourist traffic was the heaviest known and this had a great deal to do with per capita figures.

Another point to consider was the fact of higher dollar profits not necessarily meaning the use of more liquor. Something further to remember was that in ten years the cost of liquor had increased. There were cases of prices having doubled.

More people living in a province, tourists more numerous than in any previous season, and inflation of dollars are things to look at, in trying to size up what the trade really amounts to. And what was true of Ontario could no doubt apply with much the same force in any other province with alcohol controlled and sold by the government.
