

modelled into a greenhouse.


### B. SIMUNDSON GOES TO FINALS

sources will have to be replaced in such a way that they will go on in perpetuity. By that I mean as timber is cut for its use new plantings will be made so that for all time that industry in its given area will have sufficient timber to sustain it. That is what 'Forest Management License' means. You can easily see the importance of that legislation when it deals with a concrete case, such as this.

"As far as the government's plan to advance is concerned, it has already been indicated that we propose to extend the P.G.E. Railway from the north end of the line, which is Quessel, at the present time, to the City of Prince George. By that action we shall be undertaking something which has been wanted for many years by the people in that area and even talked about before, but never actually accomplished. It will be done by this government. No one can say what actual effect that will have on the road itself or the development of the territory through which it passes—but that it will have an obviously good effect goes without question. It will open up vast timber resources in and around the Quessel area which at the present time are lying dormant and could not be used in any event without rail transportation. By virtue of its geographical location, it will also enable any industry that may develop there to reach the prairie markets on something like a competitive rail basis which could not be done otherwise.

"The whole object of this move is an attempt to open up the great hinterland of the north, and so expand our economy. It is, of course, only part of the final greater program—the development of the Peace River area where lies the last great north as far as our province is concerned.

### MASSET BUSY DIGGING CLAMS

Practically the entire community of Masset is digging clams, reports E. T. Applewhaite who made a week-end trip to the Queen Charlotte Island community. They anticipate that it will bring an influx of visitors. The publicity which the Queen Charlotte Islands tourist attraction is receiving is also appreciated.

Mr. Applewhaite's trip was primarily for the purpose of meeting the people in his capacity as Liberal candidate for Skeena in the forthcoming federal election. He was gratified with the friendly reception he received and with the prospects generally.

### INDUSTRIAL EXHIBIT FOR CARNIVAL HERE

The Civic Centre Carnival committee meeting, Friday night, attended by carnival chairman W. F. Stone, Orin Odegard, Maurice Brydges, Don Forward, T. Norton Youngs, and Allan M. Hurst, recommended that emphasis be placed on development of a large, varied industrial and commercial exhibit. Mr. Stone said that Edward Mussellam, of the Junior Chamber of Commerce, which conducted the first industrial exhibit last year, had agreed to take charge for the forthcoming carnival.

Dates of the Carnival were announced as August 13 to 20. The meeting also decided to recommend to the directors that it investigate the possibility of building a temporary protecting floor to cover the gymnasium. Mr. Forward said that the present gymnasium floor is in "beautiful condition" and that carnival crowds would damage it. He had been advised, he said, that the gym floor cannot be sanded again, so that some type of protection is necessary.

### WHEAT PRICE IS PROTESTED

ADELAIDE, Australia — Australian wheat growers have strongly protested the world wheat price agreed upon by the international wheat conference in Washington last Friday.

T. C. Scott, general secretary of the Australian Wheat Growers' Association, told reporters last night that the Federation had sent an emphatic protest to the British delegation at the wheat talks and to Prime Minister C. R. Attlee.

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### SUIT OVER BLOCKADE

BERLIN — The Russians threatened today to sue a western German firm which has been unable to deliver orders to the Soviet zone because of the Allied counter-blockade.

The firm is German Metals at Hanau in the United States zone. The Russians will get an answer from United States that the Soviet started the blockade and can restore free trade by lifting it.

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
