

Fraser Flood

Death Toll Now Five-Crisis May Not Yet Be Reached

VANCOUVER-British Columbia's 12-day flood death toll rose to five on Wednesday when the body of Eastern Young Hicks, 76 - year - old prospector, was found in a log jam on Heffley Creek.

The sorely stricken Fraser Valley is licking its \$30,000,000 flood wounds today following what appeared last night to be a staying of the onslaught of waters although it was still felt that in some sections the worst might be yet to come. Six thousand more acres of fertile land yesterday became the river floor for the Fraser as a 15-foot siltladen torrent breached an eighty-foot hole in a dyke at Cannol, 55 miles east of here near Chillwack. It is estimated that 1000 persons were evacuated from the area. An Army official said that at least 9000 persons had been made homeless in the Fraser Valley alone.

The Battle of the Fraser continues relentlessly following the lapping up by the cresting river to the top of the dykes at Pitt Meadows, 25 miles east of here. There is no let-up for thousands of men working under Premier Byron Johnson's state of emergency orders.



POSTPONE SALES TAX

THE REMOVAL of the eight percent sales tax on foods by the Dominion together with the special grants towards health services ought to induce Hon. H. Anscomb, minister of finance and Premier. B. Johnson to postpone indefinitely or until the next session of the legislature the three percent provincial sales tax.

The financial position of British Columbia discloses no immediate situation that warrants this unjust tax. A great deal has been made of the alleged poor agreement between Ottawa and Victoria which is to give around \$24,000,000 to B.C. for the transference of its income tax power for five years. But nothing has been said about the extra five percent collected by the Dominion income tax from companies (small and family owned as well as large corporations) over and above the 30 percent for the Dominion, the extra five percent being for the province of British Columbia. This will produce many millions of dollars during the current year for the first time over and above the amount to be received by the province under the agreement.

The financial situation of British Columbia is unquestionably of the highest. No possible harm could be done by postponing the three percent sales tax until the next fiscal year. In the meantime the government of British Columbia should present their case to the Dominion for a revision of the agreement if they believe they have a good case.

Instead of doing so, they seem hell bent on destroying much of the goodwill built up by a coalition form of government and causing such a split within each party as may result in a confused situation at the next election.

A retail sales tax is an easy way for a government to collect huge sums during prosperous times while the electorate are apathetic to government affairs and to basic principles of taxation. The Liberal and Conservative members of the legislature who voted against the measure showed not only a spirit of independence and high courage but much more political foresight than the members of the cabinet. -Prince George Citizen.

Cover with half the gelatin mixture. Chill until set Blend cottage cheese, celery, parsley, onion and 1/2 teaspoon salt into remaining gelatin; pour over peach layer. Chill until firm. Unmold onto salad greens. Slice and serve with desired dressing. Serves 8.
