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Good News and Bad

IF IT WERE not for the seriously deteriorating situation in China, with its compromising incidents threatening an international crisis, the prospect of settlement of the trouble in Berlin through the calling off of the Russian blockade and the convening of Big Four conference to compose differences between Soviet Russia and the western powers would be welcomed as great news indeed. Reaction of London and Washington to the new conciliatory attitude of Russia, whatever the reason for it may be, is reassuring.

It is unfortunate, though, that, just as the air is beginning to clear in one international theatre, the clouds should be ominously lowering in another. Those are serious events that are occurring in the resumption of China's civil war and it is difficult to remain indifferent to their implications. It will be a happy day again if and when the sick old world is restored to the position where all the sore spots are healed or composed at once.
