## BRITAIN IS STANDING FIRM---BEVIN

### LIBERALS MENTIONED MACKENZIE KING MANTLE

OTTAWA, (CP) — Nearly a dozen top-flight members of them admittedly of the dark horse being mentioned as potential candidates for leadership being vacated by Prime Minister Mackenzie King next month.

Some of them, by their own declaration, will be in the running when nominations close at the National Liberal Convention Saturday, Aug. 7, and others may find themselves nominated by provincial and regional delegates as "favorite son" candidates, for the first ballot at least.

The two who already have tipped their hats in the leadership ring are External Affairs Minister St. Laurent, 66, suave, brilliant lawyer from Quebec, and Agriculture Minister Gardiner, 64, bouncy, politically-wise little man who gave up the premiership of Saskatchewan 18 years ago to enter the federal cabinet.

Others in the federal cabinet who may choose to run include Finance Minister Abbott, Transport Minister Chevrier, Health Minister Martin, Defence Minister Claxton and Trade Minister Howe. All except Mr. Howe are younger men in the cabinet.

Rt. Hon. James Isley, who resigned as justice minister at the end of June, also is considered to be a possible candidate, though he reportedly has told friends he does not wish to run.

Outside of the federal field, there are two men being mentioned prominently. They are Premier Macdonald of Nova Scotia and Premier Garson of Manitoba. One or both of them might be persuaded to allow their names to go before the convention.

### Boy Drowns At Carlisle

Nine-Year Old John Bernard Van Rhyn Loses Life

John Bernard Van Rhyn, nine-year old son of Bernard Van Rhyn, head mechanic at Carlisle Cannery on the Skeena River, was drowned there late yesterday afternoon when he presumably fell in the river.

The lad had been playing outside and was to have reported at half hour intervals to his mother. When she failed to hear from him at 5:30 she became worried and a search was instituted. About 7 p.m. the body was found lying in the sand under a dock after the tide had gone out.

Artificial respiration was attempted but without success. The remains were brought in to the city this morning and Constable John Medley of Port Edward has gone to Carlisle to investigate for Sheriff M. M. Stephens.

### Longer Workers Hours Requested

OTTAWA—The Ottawa firemen have requested that their working week be increased from 48 to 56 hours. In submitting this unusual request to the board of arbitration, W. M. Magwood K. C., stated that working conditions under the three-plateau system are "unbearable." He declared that the firemen of Ottawa would revert to the two plateau system and work fifty-six hours.

OTTAWA—All barbers in Ottawa have been notified by the Barbers' Advisory Board that they must remain open from 8 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. except Wednesday, when the shops will be closed.

DETROIT—A thirteen cent an hour wage increase for 116,000 C.I.O. production workers today erased a national strike threat against the Ford Motor Co. Settlement was reached at a meeting today. It is estimated the new contract will cost the Ford Motor Co. \$32,000,000 annually.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld.—Two years of paper propaganda, radio campaigns and wharfside dissertations finished last night and Newfoundland was choosing today between union with Canada and responsible government as the future form of administration. It is the greatest decision this island of 300,000 persons ever faced. Voters who did not like either confederation or autonomy and stalemated a referendum on June 3 now hold the balance of power.

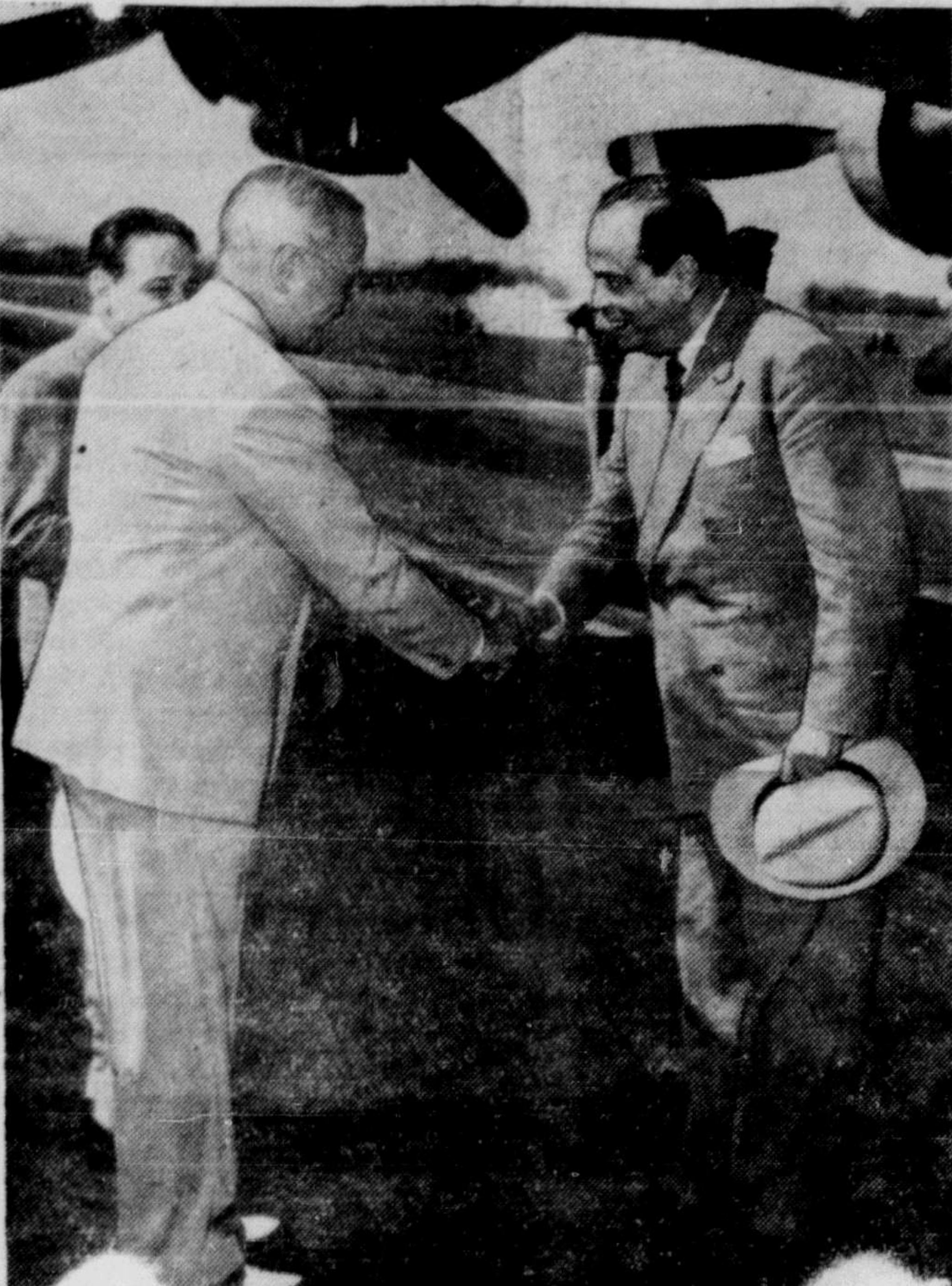

### Takes Premier Case To Ottawa

**Mine Dispute Federal Matter, Wismer**  
OTTAWA, (CP)—Attorney General Gordon Wismer of British Columbia conferred with federal ministers and officials yesterday on two big points—the mountain differential and gold mining situation—and on smaller ones.

Mr. Wismer hopes to carry the gold mining case to Minister of Trade C. D. Howe. It arises from the shutdown of the Silbak-Premier gold mine at Premier and the request of the labor unions for an investigation of the hole situation, a request which Mr. Wismer thinks belongs on the federal doorstep.

### IT'S RAINING IN NEW YORK TOO

NEW YORK, (CP)—Transportation facilities were back at normal today after a heavy downpour late last night which flooded city subway lines, stalled busses and halted trolleys. It was the heaviest downpour in years.

### SIX DROWN IN OTTAWA RIVER

DES JOACHIM RAPIDS, Que. (CP)—Six employees of the Ontario Hydro-Electric Power Commission were drowned yesterday in the Ottawa River. They tumbled into the water when a Bailey bridge collapsed. The men fell 125 feet into the swirling rapids. None of the bodies were recovered.

### RUSSIA SEEKS ITALY'S SHIPS

ROME, (CP)—The newspaper Giornale Della Sera says that Russia has again insisted on immediate delivery of Italian warships awarded to her as reparations. Italy replied that the peace treaty allowed her two years in which to turn over the ships.

### ILSLEY NOT IN RUNNING

MONTREAL, (CP)—Former Minister of Finance James L. Ilesley has denied rumors that he is running for the leadership of the Liberal party at the convention in Ottawa next month. He was here Wednesday enroute home from a trip to London where he appeared in a Privy Council case.

### PEACE CHANCES ARE 'EXCELLENT'

WASHINGTON — President Truman, at a press conference today, said the chances for peace are "excellent." He endorsed yesterday's statement of General George Marshall, secretary of state, that every diplomatic resource to settle the Berlin question would be exhausted.

President Truman said he was to confer later in the day with General Lucius Clay who met this morning with the national security council.

### WAR VETERAN SHOT DEAD

VANCOUVER, (CP)—Theory of suicide was advanced today by police in the death of William F. Rodgers, 33-year old Army veteran, whose body, with a bullet hole through the heart, was found on a busy waterfront street intersection in the East End last night. A revolver was found a few feet from where a trail of blood led to the street.

### SIR MALCOLM TO KNOW ON MONDAY

LONDON, (CP)—Sir Malcolm Campbell will know next Monday whether he has overcome blindness that threatens to keep him from piloting his "Bluebird" to new speedboat records. Sir Malcolm underwent an operation a month ago and his surgeon will tell him Monday if his sight will be improved enough for him to take the wheel of his jet-propelled craft again.

### PEACE IS NOT YET SECURE

Conflict Continues in Near East in Spite of Truce

CAIRO, (CP)—Air raid sirens wailed for forty minutes in Cairo early today and anti-aircraft guns went into action. It was not immediately determined whether a raid actually took place.

In Damascus the Syrian government said that Zionist groups attacked Syrian positions at Tel Aziziyah last night and twenty-seven Jews were killed. Air raid sirens were also heard in Damascus.

The Syrian government said that it had protested to the United Nations against alleged truce violations by the Jews.

### Must Retain Self-Respect In Berlin, He Tells House

**Meantime Talk of Making Concessions To Russia is Being Heard**

LONDON, (CP) — Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin declared today that Great Britain will not back down in her demands for lifting the Russian blockade of Berlin as a preliminary to four-power talks on Germany. "It is impossible," Bevin told Commons, "for a self-respecting government to sit down and discuss these things when your troops are cut off from normal communications and 2,500,000 people are being used to put pressure upon you to come to a decision." Britain's policy, Mr. Bevin said, remained unchanged.

EARLY PIONEER REVISITS CITY FINDS IT DEVELOPING NICELY

One of Prince Rupert's earliest pioneers, who first came to Kaien Island in 1905, revisited the city this week and found it far removed from the wilderness that greeted him and the Grand Trunk Pacific townsite planners 43 years ago.

Jean Wacker, 70-year old founder of Wacker, Alaska, which claims Ketchikan as a suburb, does not think that he will pioneer any new territory until his past projects bloom into cities rivaling New York and San Francisco.

Mr. Wacker has been here for the last week visiting friends and he thinks that Prince Rupert, which he first knew as a gleam in a group of idealists' eyes, has justified their early faith.

Mr. Wacker arrived on Kaien Island first as a special constable for the B.C. provincial police and recalls vividly that his first duty was to take a group of Metlakatla natives to Port Essington for trial because they had defied the G.T.P.'s exclusive claim to Kaien Island and had attempted to re-establish their own claim by moving across the harbor.

Moving north, he settled on Revilligigedo Island and opened up the townsite of Wacker which saw some development but languished mainly because somebody else decided that Ketchikan had better prospects.

"I am glad to learn that Prince Rupert has got its celanese mill because it makes me feel that I was right on two counts," said this short, energetic man happily. "Wacker, Alaska, has a pulp mill, too."

## Party Has No Funds

QUEBEC, Q.—A new style in campaigning has been introduced in Quebec by the union of electors contesting July 28 provincial elections.

The union of electors seeking the application of Social Credit principles in Quebec boasts that it has neither election fund nor election machine.

Its speakers pay their own travelling expenses, get lifts from meeting to meeting as they can, and save hotel and meal costs by putting up in the homes of supporters.

The union is led in its bid for Legislative Assembly seats by 62-year-old J. Ernest Gregoire, Professor of Political Economy at Laval University, former Legislature members and former mayor of Quebec City.

General direction of the movement in the province is in the hands of Louis Even who runs from Montreal its weekly newspaper "Vers Demain" with the help of Mrs. Gilberte Cote-Mercier, the union's provincial organizer.

The group is making little use of the familiar banners, brass bands, flags and parades. The

union claims that one way or another the voter has to foot the bill for such display.

So far the union seems to be making its way with its own methods of raising expense money which include passing the hat at meetings.

"Le Chapeau du Credit Social va Eraser la Maudite Caisse Electorale (the Social Credit hat will beat accursed electoral funds)," its speakers tell their listeners.

Its promise of a \$20 monthly dividend for every man, woman and child in Quebec, which would mean a lot for the larger Quebec families, is part of the Union of Electors' plan to achieve greater distribution of the things in store windows.

The union also proposes monthly dividends of \$60 for everyone on their 60th birthday and similar pensions for blind, invalids and the helplessly needy.

The Social Credit movement had its start in Quebec about 15 years ago. It became active in politics in 1944 when the Union des Electeurs ran a dozen unsuccessful candidates in the provincial election.

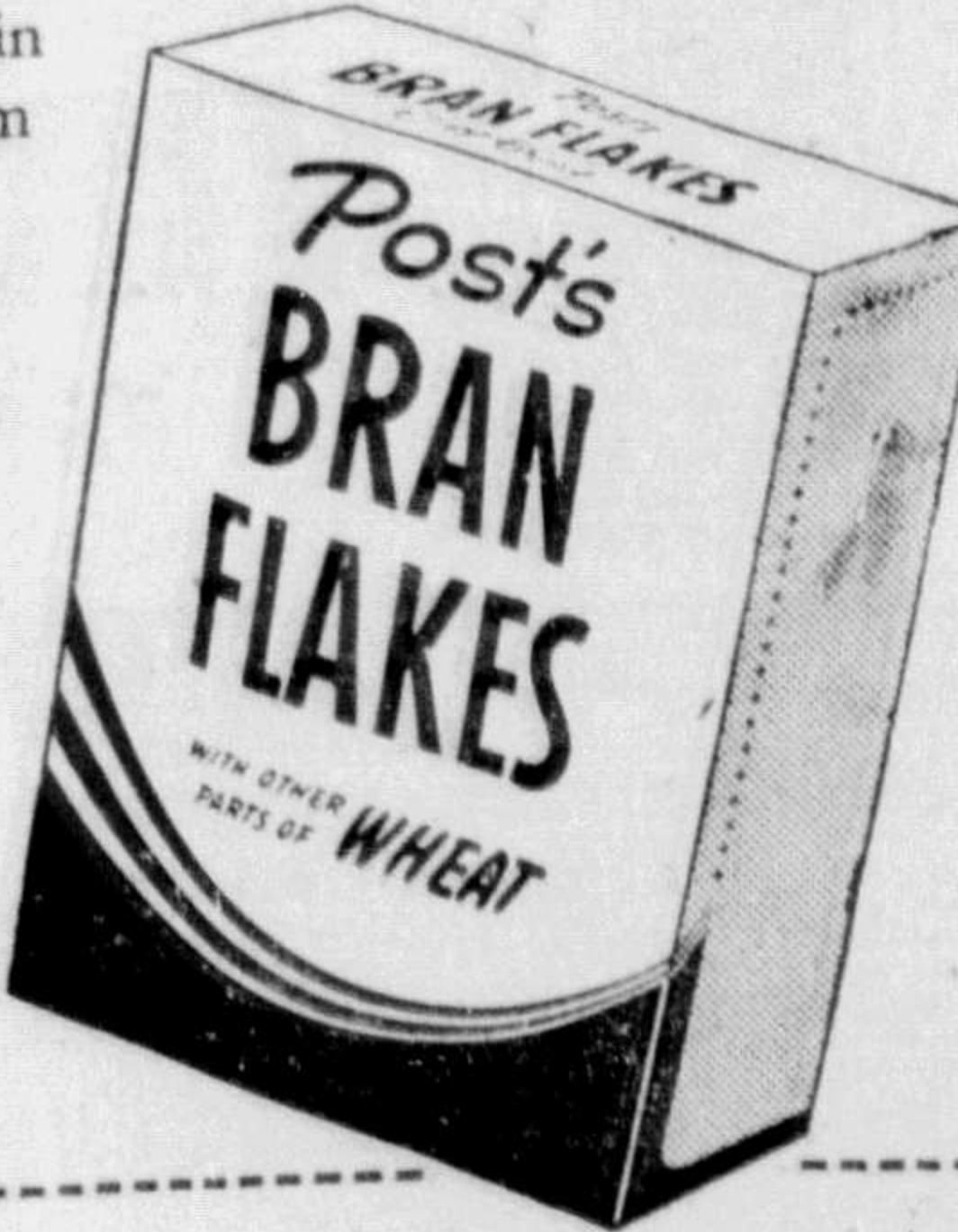

## LOVE LIFE OF ALGAE

Unidentified Chemical Sparks Single-Celled Creatures in Presence of Light

PALO ALTO, Calif.—Science is finding out something new about reproduction.

In a Stanford research laboratory are several million one-celled creatures which pay no attention to each other in the dark.

But after they spend a while in the light they go for each other like mad.

When they mate they literally become one. They melt into each other and become a single cell. The fused cell finally breaks up into four offspring—two males and two females which never mate unless they happen to get into the light for a while.

Professor Gilbert Morgan Smith says this means that these simple creatures produce some mysterious and potent substance which resembles sex hormones. But they produce it only when exposed to light.

This is significant because these organisms are the lowest kind of plants, yet under the influence of light they act like the main characters in a boy-meets-girl plot.

The one-celled things are a type of algae or seaweed called chlamydomonas. Algae and other simple organisms ordinarily reproduce without sexual activity. The cell simply grows and divides in a chain reaction which perpetuates the species.

Sex hormones presumably are produced only by the higher plants and animals, which are made up of many different kinds of cells and which have sex organs. The alga has nothing like that. Under light he just breaks out with some comelier chemical.

Two Year Job  
If the lowly alga, which lives on carbon and water, can produce a hormone-like substance, then maybe science has been missing something. Professor Smith has just found this substance after nearly two years of research. He doesn't know exactly what it is. Its isolation and identification is a job for the biochemist. Smith's interest is in learning more about algae.

To do this work the scientist collected more than 500 samples

of algae from various places in the United States. They came from the soil rather than from the sea. Algae live in earth as well as in water.

Usually Professor Smith keeps the males and females separate. But to make tests he lets them together now and then. Under the microscope they look like slightly-greenish air bubbles about half as big as the head of a pin. They swim around aimlessly. But when algae are mixed the effect is almost startling. They start pairing off like couples on a dance floor.

To prove his theory, Smith had to make algae grow in darkness. There they reproduced themselves in the conventional non-sexual way. They never were aroused except after exposure to light. That demonstrated the mysterious power of light to promote reproduction.

Dr. Smith found also that the algae were a bit clannish. Of all the different kinds, only those from Amherst, Mass., and Deerfield, Mass., would mix. The non-mixers were of different species. They produced hormone substances that would work only on like species.

This means there are different kinds of these elemental chemicals, and that their effect depends upon whether they "click" with their objective. Where this will lead scientifically, nobody knows yet.

The Experts Say

RAISING CHILDREN - Patience is one virtue parents must have if they want to raise children with well developed personalities.

Two brisk little booklets—"Fear" and "Temper"—have been published by the health and welfare department with a view to smoothing the path of child training for parent and offspring alike.

It's nothing out of the ordinary for the two-year old child to throw temper tantrums, says one booklet, explaining that the baby now is becoming a person and able to make his demands more known.

Parents must limit their controls over the child to the most necessary ones. While it's normal for a young child to be frightened at times health experts claim that if his fears are too intense or prolonged they can be harmful and cause much permanent damage to his developing personality.

Some fears are brief and immediately forgotten, such as a loud noise, or a scary Halloween mask. But others are lasting and deeply injurious. Fear of authority may develop from a father who is too stern; fear of dirt from constant harsh scolding for getting dirty during play.

Avoid the growth of such fears in your child by being tolerant and friendly about his progress, or lack of it... says the booklet on "Fear." It urges that the child be praised for his efforts even if they are clumsy. If you make him feel a failure he will be full of fears.

A child of three or four often is afraid of thunderstorms, snakes, cats, dogs and so on, especially if the parent has

shown a similar tendency in his presence. In such a situation it's up to the adult to reassure him and avoid ridicule. The youngster needs affection to help him over the insecurity that is the basis of such fears.

Family quarrels should be taboo when the young child is around. Parents may not know it, but experts say that family bickering can produce an uneasy fear in the child which may endure and become most damaging.

Bubble gum may be fun for the kids, but it's no joke when mother has to remove it from Junior's hair, or his face. One easy means of taking it off is by applying a little turpentine or alcohol to a soft cloth and gently wiping the gum away. Rinse with water.

Keeping the two-year old baby out of mischief is the problem of many a busy mother. An old purse with a few articles—a compact, comb and so on—put in its several compartments will keep the youngster quiet for a while. It will take him a long time to remove everything and meanwhile mother will have finished a few of those odd jobs.

**PRINCE RUPERT YEARS AGO**

July 22, 1923

City Council accepted a Victoria company's bid of 98.47 for the city's \$78,000 six per cent debenture bonds covering Booth School repairs and erection of a bridge over Hays Creek.

After being closed down for five days following a fire which destroyed a number of buildings, the furnaces at the Granby smelter at Anxox were blown in again, resuming full production.

William George Barrie, proprietor of a city furniture store, died in Peterborough, Ontario, after a long illness, according to word received by S. V. Cox, manager of the business. Mr. Barrie was a former city alderman and a member of several lodges.

George A. Findlay and Miss Belle McDonald were rescued from the harbor by Jack Boddie after their canoe had capsized. They had been in the water for half an hour.

July 22, 1913  
In a spirited 15-round bout at the McIntyre Hall, Lem Kegg,

local light heavyweight, defeated Eddie Shannon of Seattle on points. Mr. Jones of New York refereed. Cyclone Scott outpointed Killer Campbell, a local man in the preliminary.

A fisherman named Lawrence Burns, age 26, was drowned when he fell from the gasboat Verna at the Davis floats.

A Forbes, mineral expert for the provincial government, examined the salt bed at Kwiltsa owned by Frank Mobley and associates and expressed the opinion that there had been a salt lake there in prehistoric times.

**Dutch Envoy Sees Peace**

In the midst of new alarms suggesting imminence of the breaking out of World War III it was refreshing to hear a chief envoy of one of Europe's most severely subjugated and suffering nations in World War II express confidence that, if the freedom-loving countries held fast together, there would be a good chance of another global conflict being averted. It was Dr. A. Evenster, consul-general for the Netherlands in Canada, who spoke thus before the Prince Rupert Gyro Club at luncheon yesterday, his subject being "The Relations of Canada

and the Netherlands." Dr. Evenster acknowledged the instrumentality of Canadians in liberating his country after its painful years of Nazi bondage as a result of which "Canada entered into our history forever." He further acknowledged how Canada had been among the first, after the liberation, to rush supplies of food and materials to a starving and stricken people. A rapidly re-establishing Holland was now attempting to do what it could to repay by sending to Canada a good type of immigrant citizenry and goods on a reasonable basis.

Up to ten years ago Canada and the Netherlands had seemed far apart with but little in common. All that, however, had now been changed. Canada had given hospitable sanctuary to the Crown Princess and her family during the war. The Canadian Army had been ninety per cent responsible for the liberation of Holland. Then there had been the food and building materials which this Dominion had provided after the war. In return, Holland had made one contribution in the way of 2500 war brides who would be a real addition to this country. There had also been the contribution of immigrants, 3000 last year, 10,000 this year and an expected 20,000 next year, mostly a type of mixed farmer well adapted to conditions in this country.

Dr. Sevenster reviewed in some detail the excellent post-war progress which Holland was making in spite of difficulties. The nation, dependent upon exports for its economic stability, had been stripped of her natural resources, forty per cent of her shipping had gone and her ports had been destroyed. The country was flooded, bridges blown up, roads gone, transportation disrupted. She had been bereft of Indonesia which had provided fifteen per cent of the national income with its oil, rubber, sugar, tea, coffee, and tobacco.

The consul-general then reviewed the remarkable progress which had been made in rebuilding the country which had now reached 80 per cent of its pre-war capacity in production. The merchant fleet had been rebuilt. There was enough food and, with well regulated distribution and price control, the country was in excellent spirit, remarkably free of strikes or any form of internal dissension.

Holland was sharing in the new European Recovery Plan through which Canada was continuing to give aid. But it was hoped that Holland would before long be independent even of this and would be able to regain its old position of trade and export with the rest of the world and Canada.

President O. G. Stuart occupied the chair at yesterday's luncheon and the speaker of the day was thanked by Dr. Jens Munthe, the Norwegian vice-consul here. Guests included Rev. Basil S. Prockter, E. T. Applewhite and C. A. Berner.
