







## Halifax Heats Donald Gordon

C.N. President Talks of Truck Competition, Coal Orders, Markets

HALIFAX—The railways have always endeavoured to provide and maintain the lowest possible rates for basic raw materials and foodstuffs which move in bulk and in large quantities—commodities such as grain, fish, fruit, pit props, potatoes, pulpwood, and so on—but our ability to do so has been seriously menaced by highway competitors who are free to skim the cream of the traffic and who do not pay their proportionate share of highway costs.

Donald Gordon, chairman and president of the Canadian National Railways, said last night when he appeared as principal speaker at the 200th annual dinner of the Halifax Board of Trade.

"This issue lies at the heart of what is commonly called the

railway problem," Mr. Gordon stated, "and we are asking that road rail competition be placed on a fair and equitable footing both in the matter of regulations and responsibility for costs. We are seeking to have each transportation agency operate in the field in which it is most efficient so that the total transportation bill of this country will be minimized. If it is not done, this traditional rate structure might collapse and our whole economy would be shaken by the event."

As the largest employer of labor and the largest individual purchaser in the Maritimes, the Canadian National's relationships with the Maritimes are very much those of a partner's, Mr. Gordon pointed out. After dwelling briefly on the competitive freight rates enjoyed by Maritime ports despite much longer rail hauls as compared with competing U.S. ports, he said:

"On traffic originating within the Maritimes we have, on many occasions, reached down to the rock bottom of our pocket costs to provide favorable rates which will stimulate the movement of large volume traffic."

On the question of Maritime coal, Mr. Gordon stated that it is the policy of the Canadian National to buy all its coal in Canada and to turn to other sources only when Canadian producers are unable to furnish the desired quantity and quality at a competitive price.

After pointing out that the company's purchases of coal in the Maritimes have averaged 1,200,000 tons a year for many years, he said:

"Under the policy I have outlined, the Canadian National can and will take all the coal of suitable quality and price which the producers can make available and, in a recent meeting with our chief suppliers of coal

Referring to the international trade picture, Mr. Gordon said that, as the buoyancy arising from the financial expedients of loans and gifts from Canada and the United States to allied countries begins to disappear, we must vigorously pursue the search for new markets—particularly in the United States where devaluation has given us a competitive advantage.

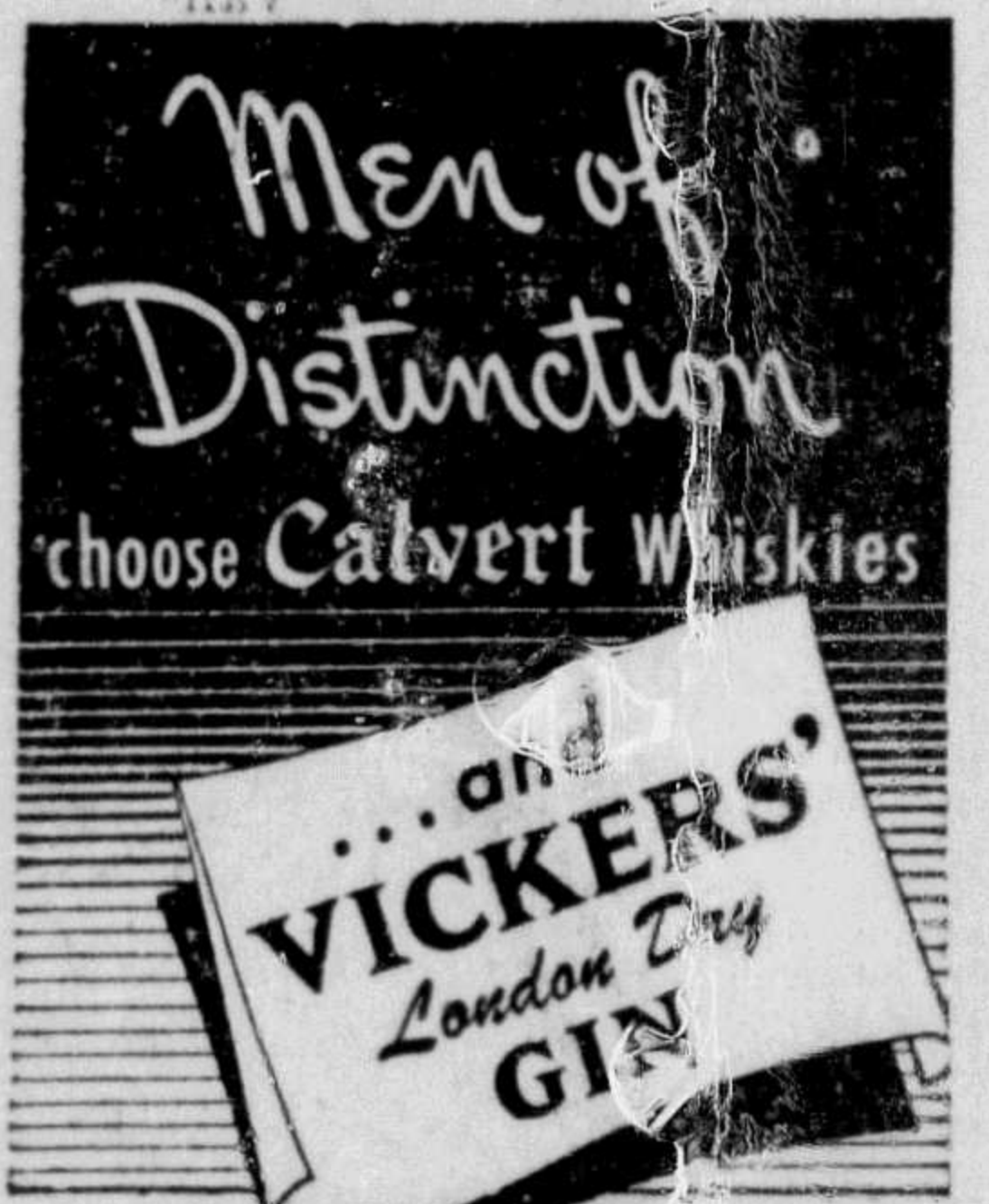
"Through marketing research we must set out to learn what our potential customers want," the Canadian National president counselled, "and through technical research see how it can be provided. We must continually review our methods and techniques of production with an eye to greater efficiency so that our products, in terms of relative price and quality, can compete in world markets."

"Few nations," he concluded, "have so great a stake in international trade as has Canada, and anything we can do to stimulate and expand international trade will ultimately benefit us."

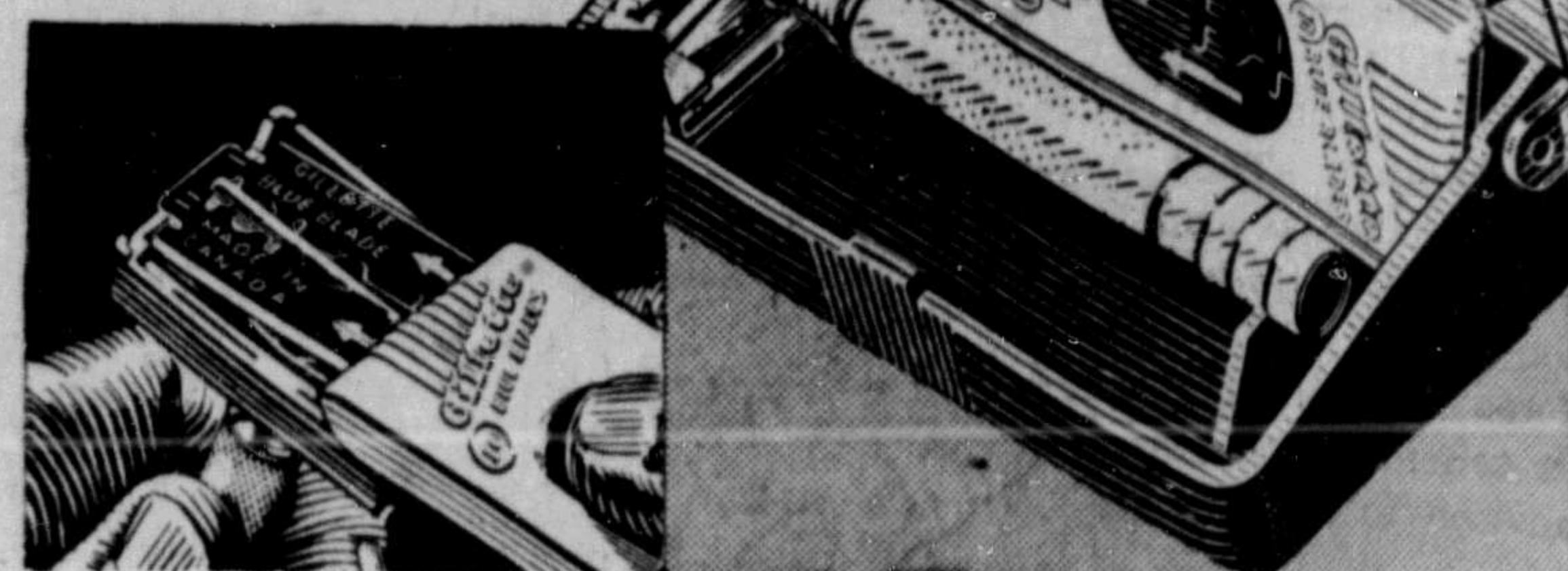

## Liquor And Auto Cases

Total revenue collections in City Police Court during May—\$1,375.00—dropped sharply in comparison with May 1949 total of \$2,340. But revenue last month increased \$200 over the total of April this year—\$1,123.

Fines collected during May netted the city \$1,150 in addition to \$225 in court costs. The above figures are contained in a May report by Sgt. Lance Potterton, N.C.O. of the city detachment.

Liquor violations continued to outnumber all other offenses. Last month city police prosecuted 46 violators under the Indian Act. Under the Government Liquor Act, 37 persons were prosecuted.

Two citizens were prosecuted under the Hospital Insurance Act and one was convicted for failing to provide lists under the Protection of Children Act.

Only four persons were charged and convicted on warranty counts last month. Total number of charges was 142 while 140 were convicted on the various charges.

No outstanding case was listed for May.

Motor vehicle accidents reported to the police office totaled 19, a considerable increase over April. This was no doubt caused, said the report, due to increased traffic during the late weather. Two charges were laid for drunken driving, three for reckless driving with convictions in each case.

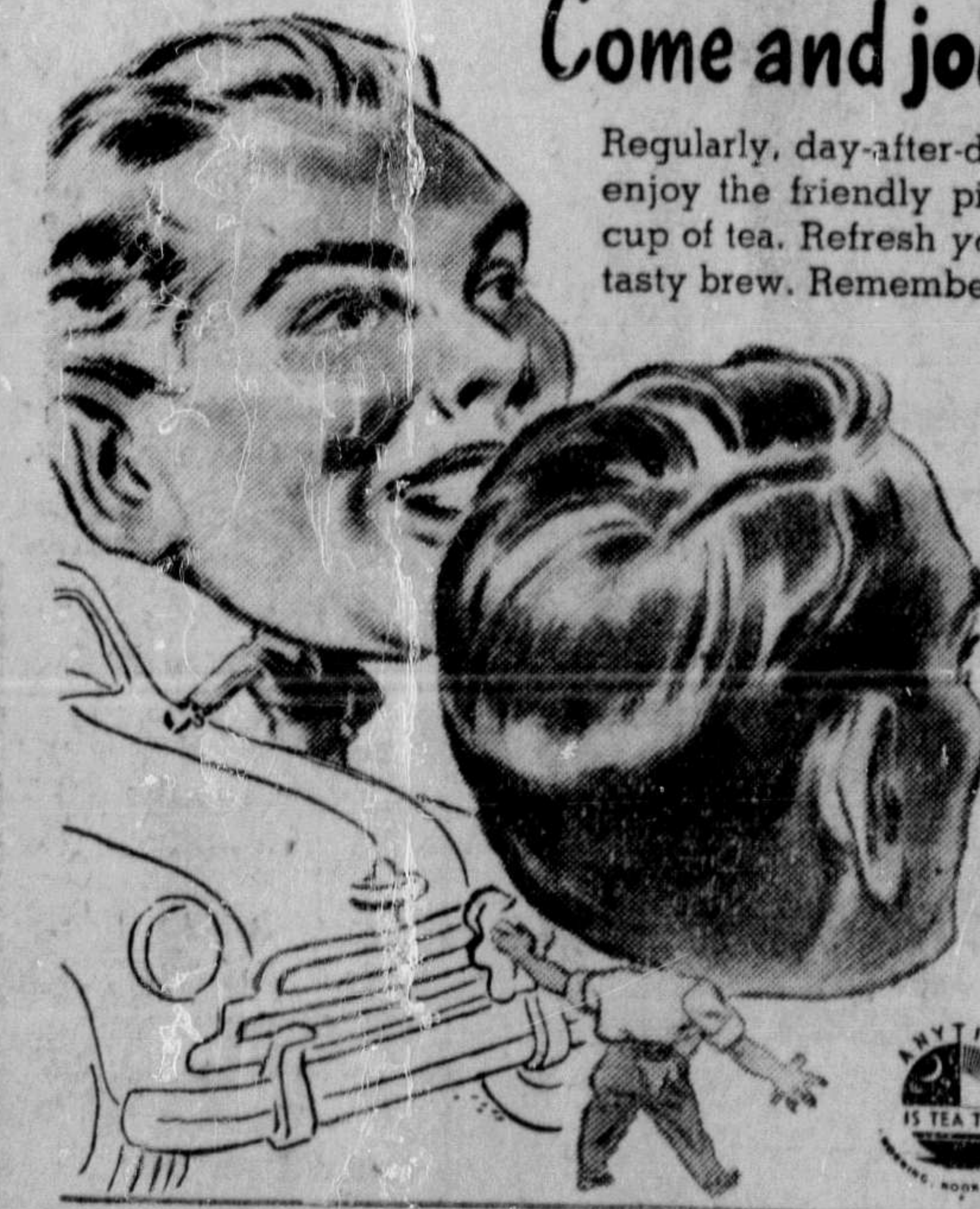

### FEATHER BUNS

Combine 2 c. water, 3 ts. granulated sugar, 1 tsp. salt and 1/4 c. yeast; beat, stirring constantly until sugar and salt are dissolved. Shortening melted; cool to lukewarm. Meanwhile, measure into a bowl 1/2 c. lukewarm water, 1/2 c. granulated sugar; stir until sugar is dissolved. Sprinkle with 1 tsp. Fleischmann's Royal Fast Rising Dry Yeast. Let stand 10 minutes, THEN stir well.

Roll cooled sugar-shortening mixture and stir in 1 well-beaten egg and 1/2 tsp. lemon juice. Sift together twice 2 c. once-sifted bread flour and 1/4 tsp. ground mace. Sift into yeast mixture; beat until smooth. Work in 1 c. once-sifted bread flour to make a very soft dough. Grease place, free from draught. Let rise until doubled in bulk. Punch down dough and cut out rounded spoonfuls of dough with a tablespoon and drop into greased muffin pans, filling each pan about half-full. Grease tops. Cover and let rise until doubled in bulk. Bake in a hot oven, 425°, about 20 minutes. Yield—20 medium-sized buns.

## Seasonable Ideas for Housekeepers

### SALAD POPULAR THESE WARM DAYS, SOME NEW IDEAS HERE

This is truly a generation of salad eaters. The name salad is said to be the result of mispronunciation. The original "salad" became "salett" and finally "salad". Originally, it was the green leaves and raw vegetables which were eaten with salt to make the first salads. Today a salad may be made from raw or cooked foods, it may be hot or cold and light and refreshing or substantial. The dressings have gone far from the simple salt. Green leaves are still an integral part of most salads and of these, lettuce is so universally used that in some locations it is called "salad plant."

A salad for luncheon or supper is perfect in summer time. The addition of hard-cooked eggs, cheese, meat, chicken or fish to the crisp, green vegetables makes a meal that is both refreshing and satisfying.

### Nippy Moulded Salad

1 tablespoon gelatine  
1/4 cup cold water  
3/4 cup vinegar  
1/4 cup water  
2 teaspoons dry mustard  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
3 eggs  
1 cup whipping cream

Soak gelatine in 1/4 cup cold water for 5 minutes. Bring vinegar and remaining 1/4 cup of water to boiling point. Mix sugar, mustard and salt and add to slightly beaten eggs. Gradually add hot vinegar to egg mixture and cook slowly, stirring constantly, until mixture thickens. Remove from heat, add soaked gelatine and stir until dissolved. Chill until mixture begins to thicken. Whip cream until quite thick but not stiff.

### Hot String-Bean Salad Bowl

1 1/2 lb. string beans, cut in 1 inch pieces (4 cups cooked)  
1 cup diced bologna or canned luncheon meat (1/4 lb.)  
2 tablespoons chopped pickle  
2 tablespoons chopped onion  
1 teaspoon elder vinegar  
1/2 teaspoon pepper  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon sugar  
1 teaspoon dry mustard  
4 hot, hard-cooked eggs, sliced

Cook beans in boiling, salted water until tender. Drain. Combine other ingredients, except eggs, in salad bowl. Add hot beans. Mix well. Garnish with sliced hard-cooked eggs. Yield: four servings.

### Supper Salad

2 cups diced cooked meat  
4 tomatoes, coarsely chopped  
1 1/2 cups chopped cucumber  
1/4 cup chopped green onion  
2 tablespoons chopped parsley  
1/4 cup chopped green onions  
Mix the meat and vegetables with sufficient salad dressing to moisten. Serve at once on crisp lettuce. Yield: six servings.
