Stirring Address at Banff Convention by United States Justice


BANFF (P) The Nuernberg trial "has forever laid to rest in the minds of statesmen the vicious assumptions that all war must be regarded as legal and just," said Robert H. Jackson, Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Court here yes-

terday. A 90-minute address to the Canadian Bar Association reviewing the history and ramifications of the war crimes trials won for Jackson a standing ovation from 1000 Canadian Bar Association members.





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ABOR WILL MARCH on Monday-the 55th anniversary of Labor Day as a legall recognized holiday in Canada and the United States.

There may not be much demonstration in Prince Rupert but elsewhere in Canada there'll be speeches and parades with gala floats, picnics and sports. And everybody in Canada will take advantage of the workingman's special holiday to enjoy summer's last "long week-end."

Altogether, organized labor, as an accepted and integral part of society, forms a contrast today with the still-young unions which attended Labor Day's birth.

It was the militant Knights of Labor who, in 1894, lobbied at Washington and Ottawa to achieve governmental recognition of labor's claim to a day it could call its own.

The passing of the legislation in Canada was preceded by sporadic street parades and labor demonstrations-at Toronto in 1885, in Montreal a year later and in Quebec City in 1891. The demand for a labor holiday had become a political issue and · the bill was personally piloted through parliament by a Conservative prime minister, Sir John Thompson. Even then Sir John faced strong opposition in his own ranks and in the Senate.

As well, the holiday, in its concept and practice as a distinctly North American celebration, contrasts with Europe's May Day on May 1-an unrecognized holiday flaunted by labor's extreme left wing and often marked by street scenes and conflicts with civil authority.

Canada's Labor Day, instead, has more in common with the parades of craft guilds in medieval England. Their festival, as is ours today, asserted the workingman's claim to an honored position in society and gave him a chance to show his pride in his work.

Much credit for the holiday must go to a Canadian, the late Alexander W. Wright, born in Markham township near Toronto. A colorful figure, Wright was a newspaperman with the Guelph, Ontario, Herald, then secretary of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, and finally editor of the journal of the U.S. Knights of Labor.

In this last position he was one of the forces behind United States recognition of the holiday. He insisted in Washington that it be held in September and not on May Day, which even in 1894 was being taken over by European radicals. And then he went to Canada as a one-man lobby to persuade the prime minister that Canada should have her own labor holiday.

Today labor is faced with the results of a postwar levelling off in the ranks of industry. The full employment of wartime is no longer.

Though Canada had a relatively quiet summer for strikes, the first half of the year saw a 33 percent greater time loss through strikes and lockouts than the first six months of 1948. Up to June 30 this year there were 63 strikes and lockouts affecting 18,701 workers. Time lost totalled 671,891 working hours.

TEN YEARS AGO

WITH SOLEMN announcements to a tense and trembling world ten years ago today, September 3, 1939, the King and Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain declared Great Britain at war with Germany and thus World War II began.

Six years of bitter conflict ensued with first the surrender of Germany in May, 1945, and along in September the formal capitulation of Japan.

Terrible events happened in those six years and, tragically enough, the past four years of nonfighting have not produced the peace which the world had hoped for.

Yet, on this tenth anniversary, man's hope still casts about valiantly that right and reason may still prevail and that the nations, cold conflict of today notwithstanding, may yet and soon see the light of a better path.

IAN MACKENZIE

Mackenzie fitted in somewhere between the dark poverty of his youth in Scotland and his rise to cabinet rank in an adopted and beloved Canada.

A bachelor until two years ago, six feet, two inches tall, with Scotland forever entrenched upon his tongue, with his legal training almost entirely transmuted into a political career, he became one of the orators of his time in Canada. But his mastery of the high-flown phrase and the purple passage entered upon the national stage in a dying age of rhetoric and it was largely lost upon ears attuned to briefer, harsher things.

Yet when first he entered parliament in 1930, it is recalled that at least one Scot on Parliament Hill left his first Mackenzie speech with a tear in his eye and a word of gratitude on his tongue for the God that had at last brought to the national forum a golden voice from the glens. Even on the hustings-and he made at least one stirring speech in Prince Rupert-he aroused emotions.

A veteran of the First World War, Ian Mackenzie was appointed defence minister by Prime Minister Mackenzie King on the election of the Liberal party in 1935 and in this key position directed Canada's military planning before Hitler issued his challenge to the world in 1939.

Mackenzie completely reorganized the militia and wangled increasing budgets between 1937 and 1939. He organized the first production for the R.C.A.F. He enlarged the navy to six destroyers and four minesweepers, iniboth coasts and practically doubled the size of the air

His long years in parliament won him recognition as an expert in its sometimes thorny procedures. For some years he was Mr. King's House leader when the prime minister was absent. In this capacity, he became known for his accommodating manner in courtesy and his sharp tongue in re-


