## Prince Rupert Radio Situation Clarified

### Question Is Between Transport Department and C.B. Commission

MUCH GOVERNMENT TELEGRAPHS TO CHARGE IS POINT OF ISSUE  
VANCOUVER—When asked for his views on a statement in Vancouver by A. Davidson Dunsmuir, Canadian Broadcasting Corporation, regarding extension of CBC service to Prince Rupert, W. M. Armstrong, Toronto General Manager of telegraphs said that he had a transcript of the statement to the Royal Commission, however, that appearing here on would indicate Mr. Armstrong either misquoted or to Mr. Armstrong the facilities to extend CBC programs to Prince Rupert owned by the Canadian but by the Department of Transport, having been treated as a war measure Pacific communication and transferred, at the end of the war, Government Telegraph under the jurisdiction of the Department of Transport.

(CN Telegraphs and CP Telegraphs) furnish practically all program circuits used in Canada for network broadcasting under a contract with CBC entered into in 1937 and recently extended for a further term. The railways' charges for program circuit facilities throughout Canada are governed by this contract.

"The Department of Transport asked our views as to what charges should be for an extension of service to Prince Rupert," continued Mr. Armstrong. "They were advised what the charges would be under the railways' contract with the CBC, applying to similar extensions to any other point in Canada for 16 hours daily network service."

Apparently the Department of Transport quoted the rate for the use of its facilities by the CBC to Prince Rupert. The question as to what charge should be made to the CBC for these circuit facilities is one between the Broadcasting Corporation and the Department of Transport, which owns the facilities."

### Art Exhibit Showing Here

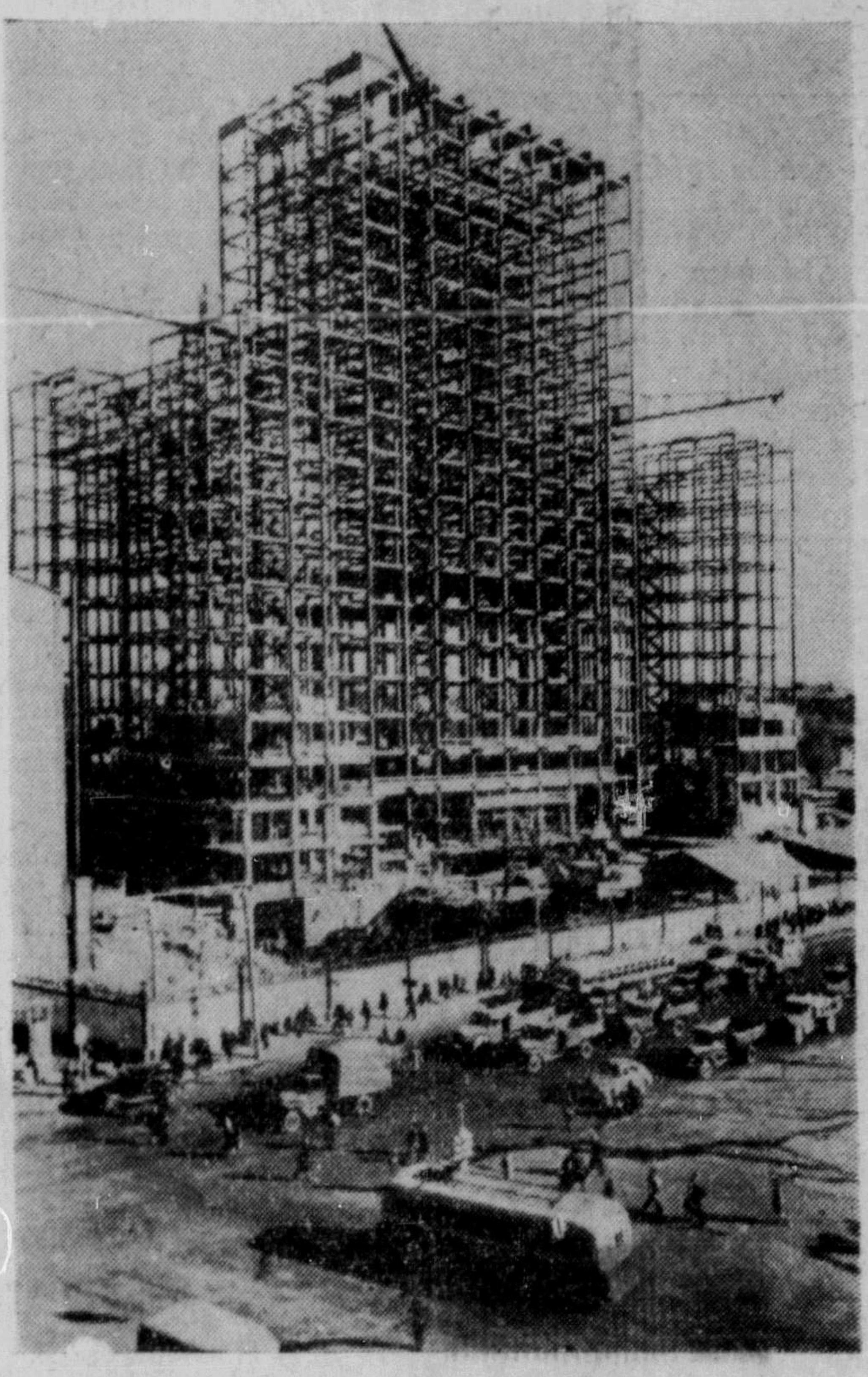
Miss Faure had many comments regarding quality of canvases stating that Vancouver shows a distinctly modern trend but that some of the pictures, even though modern, can express a thought.

A painting entitled "The Yellow Hat" by J. N. Hardman, New Westminster, was in Miss Faure's estimation, a horrible example of portraiture. "Is it meant to scare children to bed? She asked. If that is a portrait, I could certainly take up portrait painting."

### Protecting Canada—Defence Plans Are Told In Parliament

GENERAL PEARKES SOUNDS WARNING OF ATTACK ON DOMINION FROM GREENLAND OR ALASKA

OTTAWA, (CP)—Almost \$17,000,000 of defence expenditures are going toward improvement of transportation facilities in Canada's Northwest, Minister of Defence Brooke Claxton said yesterday, replying to a question by George Murray, (Liberal, Cariboo).

Mr. Claxton said that Canada does not contemplate immediate expansion of the facilities of the Northwest Staging System which lies mostly in British Columbia. The present plan is to continue replacement of temporary structures in the area with permanent structures.

Mr. Claxton said the principal users of these routes were still United States land and air forces. The money spent by Canada represented a substantial contribution to joint defence. The sum of \$9,217,166 had been earmarked for the staging route, \$7,567,382 being spent on the highway system.

### DEMANDS NEW APPROACH

Earlier in the day Major General Pearkes, Progressive-Conservative, Nanaimo, demanded a new approach to Canada's defence problems. He felt defence policy was still of the 1914 and 1939 complex—that there was still time for Canada to get ready with some one else standing behind her.

General Pearkes envisioned the attack in the next war upon Canada from the direction of Greenland or Alaska. Canada should be ready for immediate resistance to keep the fighting as far away as possible.

The Pacific Coast was now a most vulnerable front and reserves should be well trained to protect it. Defence Minister Claxton described General Pearkes plan as a painting artist and teacher, who presents an informative review of each canvass, bringing to light the good and bad points.

LULU ISLAND NATURAL GAS  
VANCOUVER—A natural gas well blew in on Lulu Island yesterday. The well, with an estimated capacity of 500,000 cubic feet, is located on the farm of Tom Brooke, who has been drilling around the area since he first noticed gas seepages last spring. Oil slicks in the gas pool may prove the presence of oil. Dr. Colin Heater Crickman, Calgary geologist, said the find is "bigger than anything in the past."

PROBING FILM BOARD  
OTTAWA—Newspaper publication of a government secret and a persistent stream of questions from Opposition members combined in the House of Commons last night to draw confirmation from a reluctant government that employees of the National Film Board are being investigated by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police.

HOUSING PLAN 'GRAND'  
VANCOUVER—Premier Byron Johnson describes the new federal housing plan as a grand thing. It should solve a real housing problem out here, said the Premier on his return to Vancouver after a trip to Ottawa.

NEARING CHUNGKING  
CHUNGKING—Chinese Communist forces are within ninety miles of Chungking and there are no signs that the Nationalists plan any real defence. A breach between Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek and his high command is reported.

Two persons were taken to Prince Rupert General Hospital by ambulance Friday afternoon. James Constant, elderly resident of the Prince Rupert-Port Edward highway was rushed to hospital after collapsing in a local hotel due to a heart attack. Hospital authorities stated he was resting comfortably and is expected to be released some time today.

Mrs. B. Wilson, Kitimaat, passenger on steamer Camosun, was taken off the boat and admitted to hospital. She had given birth to a child while enroute from Vancouver to Prince Rupert.

### Sewer Bylaw Going Thru

Bylaw to raise the sum of \$190,000 for the purpose of constructing various new sewer outlets serving the central part of the city was given introductory readings at a special meeting of the city council last night with a view to having it ready for presentation to the ratepayers for their assent at the civic election next month.

The council also gave initial readings to a referendum also to be presented at the civic election, on a proposal to place custody, care, and management of public parks under control of an elected board of park commissioners.

### Fine Concert—Orchestra Acclaimed

Symphony Body Demonstrates Further Attainments  
Prince Rupert Symphony Orchestra's concert last night at the Civic Centre drew a large and responsive audience and a splendid modicum of appreciation. An estimated 400 persons attended.

The orchestra under conductorship of Neville Gerrard and with A. C. Cameron as concert master, demonstrated a splendid measure of further proficiency since last being heard in public. The repertoire was of versatile range from popular ballad numbers, standard overtures and marches to classical selections.

One of the ambitious numbers was the Largo from Dvorak's "New World Symphony," an outstanding feature of which was the muted trumpet solo of George Brown in the slow movement of the principal melody rendered with pure, perfect notes.

Other notable numbers, of particular appeal to those with a deeper understanding of music, were the Minuet from Mozart's Symphony No. 39, E Flat Major, and the Andante from Haydn's Symphony No. 94 in G Major.

Pleasing tenor solos of Rowland H. Miles, principal assisting artist, were another high note. They were "Neopolitan Love Song," "There Is a Lady" and "Moya, My Girl" for an encore. Henry Pluym was accompanist.

F. E. Anfield, president of the Prince Rupert Symphony Orchestra, during a brief speech, praised the orchestra on its attainments and explained that the purpose of the concert was to raise funds for the purchase of new instruments.

An interesting incident was the personal introduction by Mr. Anfield of 11-year old Robert Jensen, second violin, pupil of Mrs. Molly Anderson and youngest members of the orchestra.

## Bad Food Habits

PRESENT DAY food habits are causing the medical profession much concern, states the Public Health Bulletin, publication of the Toronto Department of Public Health.

"Both adults and children are eating far too much of the more expensive rich sweet foods—cakes, pastries, candies, soft drinks, etc.," says the Bulletin. "These are the foods which supply energy only, which lead to overweight and enter into the serious modern dental picture as well. They are expensive in more ways than one.

"On the other hand, the cheaper, healthier and more nutritious foods, milk, the whole grain cereals, whole wheat bread, fruits and vegetables, etc., that supply, as well as energy, bone building and health materials, are neglected.

The Bulletin states that such necessities are neglected by children often because the parents do not care for them sufficiently. Bad food habits of parents as a rule are an influence on the eating habits of the children because foods that parents accepted are usually accepted by the family. Parents' likes and dislikes frequently influence the likes and dislikes of children, because children are great imitators.

"When parents decide to eat and to enjoy the right foods, thus setting the example for their children, they not only do themselves a good turn but are shaping the dividends which come from a healthy well-nourished family."

Discussing overweight, the Bulletin says that medical authorities ascribe this condition almost invariably to overeating, especially to the overeating of wrong foods, and very seldomly to glandular disturbance.

"They further assure us that overweight enters very definitely into the current picture of heart conditions, high blood pressure, diabetes, etc."

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### SATURDAY SERMON

(REV. B.S. PROCTER, ST. ANDREW'S CATHEDRAL)  
CHARITY

There was a letter in the paper recently from the pen of my friend (he will not be outraged if I call him so, for he is a friend to all) Alderman George Casey. George is not richly endowed at present with God's gifts of Faith and Hope but he has a double portion of that greatest gift of Charity.

His letter you may remember, concerned the plight of two poor and aged men and was illustrative of the misery and need which can still exist in spite of government welfare agencies. It was in part a cry against the red tape of these agencies. But it had a far deeper message.

The message, as I see it, is this—that no matter how many

humanitarian laws are passed and how much can be done legislatively and collectively to solve the problems of poverty, there will never be a time when it will be right and proper for a human being to forget all about his neighbour and regard another's need simply as a government problem.

"Charity" in our time has been regarded as an ugly word. In the face of some of the immense social problems of our industrialization the ordinary human and Christian care and concern of one individual for his fellows has seemed no better if as good as applying a little ointment to a carcinoma.

And certainly legislation and collective community action has accomplished ends which are outside of the scope and ability of the ordinary outflow of Charity. Christians should be and I think are, happy that so much of their tax money is going for the very

purposes that are specifically mentioned in the Gospels.

But when we have done all the things that we are forced to do, let us remember to say that we are still unprofitable servants and that it is still our duty to seek out the poor and the unfortunate and to exercise as individuals the Divine gift of Charity. There will never be a time when this will be not necessary. Or, in other words, the time will never come when it will be right for human beings to be inhuman and unhuman.

And don't forget to exercise this Charity in prayer towards those for whom our hands and resources can do so little. For every person is fighting a desperate battle, and he needs which lie beyond the scope of material help. If you have the faith to do all that you can do, please go on to ask God to do what you cannot do.

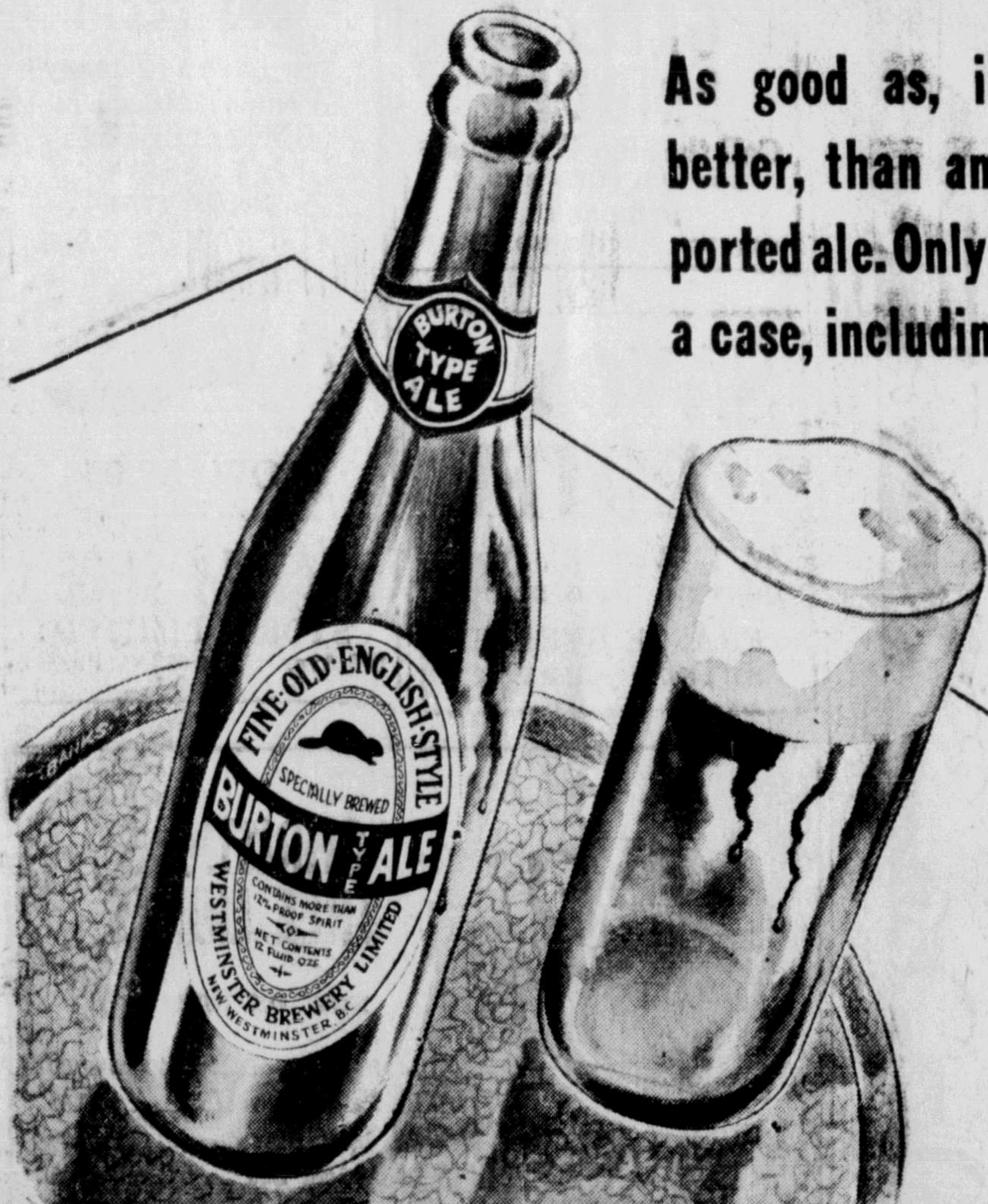

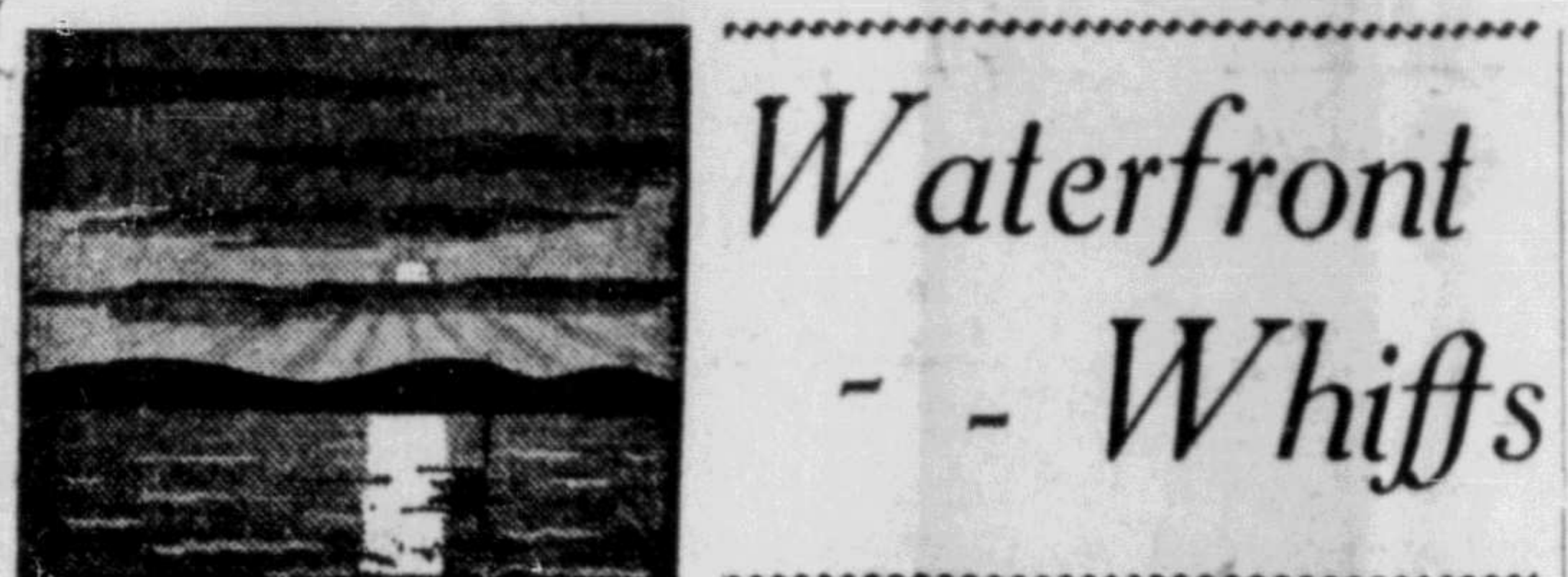
