PUBLIC AND HEALTH

T IS MUCH to be desired that the public apathy which has been so apparent where the public health services were concerned should be reduced. The current annual "Health Week" observance, should help make the general public realize that health is a matter of vital importance-that it is a matter of public and individual responsibility.

The health of the people is improving, due to the fact that the public health services are improving, and health information is being gradually absorbed by the public.

However, much remains to be done in the field of health education-not only by the educators, but by the people themselves. No campaign can be successful if the people to whom the campaign is directed are apathetic. The bringing under control of such diseases as typhoid fever, smallpox and diphtheria can be considered joint triumphs of medical science and public health authorities-yet none of the preventive measures required would have been successful without the co-operation of the public. As more and more Canadian communities are provided with public health services it is to be hoped that all Canadians will become better acquainted with their health officers and the work of the local health departments.

Any community's health services will be as good or as bad as the amount of interest that is evinced by the people of that community.

STRASBOURG

F THE SELECTION of Strasbourg in France, as the meeting place of what it is hoped will be the home of Europe's first parliament is a coincidence, it is a happy one.

For it was in Strasbourg there was born one of the greatest of patriotic songs, "The Marseillaise," in April, 1792. France was in the throes of revolution against oppression and tyranny and the hymn was composed by a young army officer, Rouget de l'Isle.

- In one sense, "The Marseillaise" belongs more to the world at large than to one nation alone. For wherever there is love of peace and liberty and relentless opposition against injustice and absolutism, it has power to arouse and thrill.
